



FINANCIAL LESSONS FOR YOUR CHILDREN

Your children are ready to hit the books again, but there's one subject they aren't likely to learn in school: personal finance. If you want your kids to pick up good money skills and become financially responsible adults, you should give them some training yourself.

Preschoolers and teenagers obviously have different financial concerns and abilities. But there are a few basic lessons that all children should learn by the time they enter college or start a

- Having money means making choices. Teach your child how to choose between spending and saving, and how to do both intelligently. A regular allowance will help your child gain real-world financial experience.
- · Money requires planning. At the appropriate age, usually about 9 or 10, show your child how to develop a simple spending plan. In later years, show how to plan for larger expenditures.
- Money means responsibility. Inevitably, your child is going to make some money mistakes. Try to avoid criticism, but don't automatically fix every problem and let your child off the hook. Help analyze the reason for the mistake, and suggest how to avoid it in the future.
- Money needs to be managed. Specific lessons might range from how to compare interest rates on savings accounts, to the pros and cons of mutual fund investing. But there should be one common element to all of your teaching in this area: money doesn't take care of itself.

The way you handle your money may be the most powerful lesson of all for your children. For your child's sake, as well as your own financial well-being, it's important to practice what you

Crosswalks will be placed at the street corners to connect the newly constructed sidewalk wheelchair ramps. This month, tree plantings are scheduled on Union and Tremont streets.

Installation of precast concrete bases for new gas street lights will begin this week on Monument Square in the areas where they have not been previously installed under other contracts. Boston Gas Company crews will follow with installation of service piping to connect future lights to the gas main in the street. Work crews are also currently patching trenches in this area that were created from the previous installation of the gas main.

Upcoming work will include the installation of wheelchair access ramps on Monument Square, installation of gas light bases and piping on Pleasant Street and setting of additional gas light poles and fixtures on various other streets.

Resident are reminded that weekday parking restrictions remain in effect as posted on those streets where construction work is taking place. Continued cooperation in complying with these restrictions is appreciated.

'Operation Dien Bien Phu' Vietnam, July 15 - 26, 1994

Operation Dien Bien Phu, which took place this July, was certainly one of the most interesting and challenging operations I have ever been on in my 32 years of military service, both active and reserve, in Airborne and Special Forces units. I have seen and done things not many have or ever will have the opportunity to do in their entire lifetime. It was a combined parachute jump with the Vietnamese Airborne and French Foreign Legion to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the battle for Dien Bien Phu, which the French had heavily fortified. This critical defeat marked the end of French military power in Indo China on July 21, 1954. The route took me from Boston to Los Angeles to Seoul, Korea, to Bangkok, Thailand, and from Bangkok to Hanoi, Vietnam.

James Cipolla of Haverhill, heard that I was going to make a parachute jump in Vietnam and asked me to fulfill his son's last request to have some of his ashes spread over Vietnam and Thailand. I promised him I would jump with the ashes in Vietnam and spread them in Thailand. I kept that promise to Mr. Cipolla - may God hold his son, Jimmy, in the palm of his hand.

Also, I had two MIA flags and 50 small American Flags, one for each state of the United States of America. I didn't think the Vietnamese would have a problem

with the ashes and small flags. However, I did think the MIA flags would be a problem. I took an MRE (Meal Ready to Eat) ration and cut it open carefully with a razor blade, took out the rations, replaced them with the MIA flags and resealed the pouch with a hot glue gun. I packed it in my rucksack with five other rations, and only I knew that they were in the pork patties. I figured my odds were now five-toone that they wouldn't pick the pork patties - and they didn't. When they went through my rucksack, all the custom officials in Hanoi asked was what they were. I explained that they were rations in case I didn't like the food, and there was no problem.

The jump took place on Wednesday, July 20 near Hanoi, between Son Tay and Dien Bien Phu. We jumped from an H1-8 Russian helicopter with a Russian parachute. It was quite windy - I would estimate at least 25 knots. Fortunately no one was injured seriously, but there were plenty of black and blues though. I can vouch for my own - it was a beaut! My right thigh was indeed colorful.

I believe that I may not have taken the first MIA flags into Vietnam, but I know that the two I jumped with were the first two ever parachuted into Vietnam. As for my 50 American Flags, I hope those relatives and friends I gave them to appreciate the guts and determination it took to make that jump under the existing wind conditions. I felt very strongly that it had to be done and I am both proud and happy that I did it - no pain, no gain. But I'm getting too old for this jumping stuff.

After the jump was completed, those who jumped (some did not because of the wind), were awarded the Vietnam parachute badge from the general in charge of the Vietnamese Air Force and the Brevet Militaire de Parachutiste badge from the ranking French officer, a major, in honor of the 40th anniversary of Dien Bien Phu. The parachute wings are engraved and numbered. - I received number 16. They will go alongside those I have from Canada, United Kingdom, Germany and Norway.

The French were good soldiers, so were we. I met John Donovan, who served with the Special Forces, Ron Storm of the 101st Airborne Division and one of the survivors of Hamburger Hill, and Larry Duncan who lost his left leg below the knee and tore up his right leg from a hand grenade during a Viet Cong ambush. One Vietnamese showed us his scars from the war. Duncan came along and they took

one look and off they went. He didn't bitch and moan, although he certainly could have, and he made the jump with us, one leg and all. You could tell right away that these were good men and good soldiers. I only wish that I had served with them, any time, any place.

We flew to Saigon, (Ho Chi Minh City)

out over the Gulf of Tonkin and down the coast to Tan Son Nhut airport. In Hanoi, the people work hard and accept hardships. A laborer makes \$30 a month, a professor makes \$60 a month. Saigon has a different way of life - life in the fast lane, anything for a buck.

I know they certainly want American tourists and more important, American dollars, but they will have to get rid of the propaganda in Hanoi and clean up Saigon. In the Hard Rock Cafe and Apocalypse, there are now Boston Fire Department patches on the wall behind the bars. I'm sure those are the firsts, in case any of my brother firefighters get to Saigon.

No, it wasn't easy to see how they dis-

played things in their museums. The Air Force Museum in Hanoi was a strange place to have our airborne refresher training. It lasted all of five minutes and was very poor training at best, but we were a captured audience. They showed us exactly what they wanted us to see - their side of the war. What hurt me the most were the helmets belonging to pilots/crew chiefs, just thrown in a pile, fatigues and personal gear, and a Kodak camera treated the same way. That, for me, was hard to take.

Those guys gave the last full measure their young lives - and deserve more respect. Life is cheap there. It still leaves me with a lump in my throat and I will never forget what I saw. I prayed for them, all of them. God certainly will take care of them, they earned it. They spent their time in hell. They showed us the Hanoi Hilton, right in the middle of Hanoi. We asked to go inside, but permission was denied. I wonder why? Those guys who were in there deserve more than medals. I thought of what they must have endured in that place. Bless them all, every last one of them.

My final thoughts as I flew back home to Charlestown were: I'm proud to be an American, (I believe I always have been), I stand at attention for the National Anthem and whenever our colors go by. Maybe I do it because of my military background and love of my family and country. But now I know why I do it. After seeing and doing what I did on the operation in Vietnam, I will stand taller and salute with everything in me. This country is the best. You only have to leave it and see what I've seen to really appreciate it, and boy, do I appreciate it! God bless the United States of America, my Home Sweet Home.

Preview Of The Temporary CANA Ramps

area media and traffic reporters. Making the presentation were Bill Rogers, resident engineer; Ed Barr, director of construction; Peter Zuk, project director; and Jerry Riggsbee, project manager. The northbound ramp is scheduled to open today, Sept. 1, while the southbound ramp is due to open on Sept. 8. Rogers related that the 5,000-foot bridge was constructed in less than a year at a cost of \$18.6 million. The sides of the structure are 2 feet 10 inches in height with approximately 50 feet of fencing at the bends and on all areas that cross above railroad tracks. A truss bridge provides extra support above Tower A control station (top left) where the ramp system comes within 4 1/2 feet of the top of the building. Officials expect to begin demolition of the ramps over City Square a week after the second new ramp opens with completion of the demolition and new Chelsea Street expected before winter.



Charlestown World War II Merchant Marine Veterans Honored



Charlestown Merchant Marine Veterans Of World War II Honored

Last week, a 441-foot Liberty Ship, the S.S. John W. Brown, steamed into the port of Boston, docking at Pier One in the Charlestown Navy Yard. Her arrival may have been routine a half century ago, but today she is one of only two such ships left from a fleet that once numbered 2,700.

The visit to Charlestown by the Brown brought back long-repressed memories of men who served on ships such as this as Merchant Marines as well as members of the U.S. Navy Armed Guard who protected the

With the arrival of the Brown and the cooperation of her volunteer crew, on Aug. 28, Charlestown was afforded the opportunity to honor her sons who served in the Merchant Marines, particularly the seven who made the supreme sacrifice over 50 years ago. With this ceremony, Charlestown has become the first town in the nation to pay tribute to the Merchant Marine Veterans of World War II since they were designated as veterans in 1988.

The Brown served as the location for an Ecumenical Service combining music, prayer and readings. It was fitting that this ship be a part of the event as four of the seven local men killed in action served on Liberty Ships such as this. Family members and friends of three of the deceased Merchant Marine Veterans climbed to the decks of the Brown to join with clergy, veterans, military, elected and appointed officials, former Merchant Marines and caring residents under a hot summer sun to pay tribute to these

At the outset, James W. Conway, chairman of the Charlestown Veterans Committee and of the ceremonies, related: "The men of the Merchant Marines faced danger in the service of others, and they did not waver. Never in the darkest days

was there any lack of willing hands to man the ships, however hazardous the voyage, though the seamen knew, often from bitter experience, the horrors which followed enemy attack at sea. They took the troops to the scene of battle and sustained them while they fought. They carried the food without which whole populations would have perished and the supplies without which the needs of the fighting forces and the civilian economy which nourished them could not have been met. They made victory possible."

The Charlestown men honored at Sunday's service

· Frederick W. Cahill, whose mother Mary C. Cahill resided at 276 Bunker Hill St., served as an oiler on the S.S. M.F. Elliott, a tanker owned by Standard Oil of N.J. The ship was torpedoed by a German submarine on June 3, 1942.

· Paul E. Carroll was the son of Mary E. Carroll of 74 Medford St. He served as a maintenance oiler on the freighter S.S. Malantic out of Maritime Transportation in N.Y. which was torpedoed by a German submarine on March 9, 1943.

· Alan I. Doherty was the son of James Doherty of 13 Bolton Place. He served as an ordinary seaman on the S.S. City of Atlanta, a freighter from Waterman Steamship of Mobile, Ala. which was torpedoed by a German submarine on June

· Robert D. Eatherton, son of Elizabeth Eatherton of 130 Chelsea St., was an ordinary seaman on the Liberty Ship S.S. William King out of Marine Transport Lines, N.Y. It was torpedoed by a German submarine on June 6, 1943.

· Jeremiah J. Harrington, the son of Christine Harrington of 50 Walford Way, served as deck maintenance on the Liberty Ship S.S. John Winthrop which was owned by the United Fruit Co., Boston. It was shelled and torpedoed by a German submarine on Sept. 24, 1942.

· Edward F. Kelly, son of Mary Kelly of 43 Austin St., served as an ordinary seaman on the Liberty Ship S.S. Jonathan Sturges owned by the Miss. Shipping Co. of New Orleans, La. It was torpedoed by a German submarine on Feb. 23, 1943.

· Charles H. Stevens, son of Henrietta Stevens of 10 Tufts St., served as messman aboard the Liberty Ship S. S. Flora MacDonald owned by Calmar Steamship Co., N.Y. It was torpedoed by a German submarine on May 30, 1943.

Members of the Eatherton, Harrington and Kelly families were on hand for the dedication.

The deck of the ship was ringed with the flags posted by the numerous color guards. The military was represented by the U.S. Navy's USS Constitution color guard and the U.S. Marine Corps color guard from the Site Support Element at the South Weymouth Naval Air Station. Also presenting colors were: the American Legion from Somerville Post 19, Jamaica Plain Post 76 and South Boston Post 368; the Dept. of Mass, DAV; Merchant Marine Veterans of W.W. II; New England Shelter for Homeless Veterans; and the U.S. Veterans of Vietnam Era Post 4, East Boston.

Music was provided by Irish lyric tenor Richard Kerry Thompson, the St. Francis de Sales Choir, soloist Thomas M. Hickey, the Kevin Barry Irish American Pipe Band and the Colonial Band of Lawrence.

Rev. Daniel J. Mahoney, pastor of St. Francis de Sales Church, delivered the invocation. Rev. Ramon Reno, chaplain on the Brown, read the Seamen's Paraphrase of the 23rd Psalm, while Rev. Dr. Harold C. Small, protestant chaplain at the Soldiers' Home in Chelsea, concluded the service with a benediction.

Capt. Paul Esbensen, master of the Brown, welcomed all to the ship. At the conclusion of the service, the ship and her crew were honored with citations presented to Esbensen from the Senate by Leo Purcell, administrative assistant to Sen. Thomas Birmingham, chairman of the Senate Committee on Ways & Means; from the House of Representatives, put forward by Rep. Richard Voke, Majority Leader; city of Boston by Veterans Services Commissioner Thomas Materazzo and Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services Liaison Judy Evers; and City Council by Amy Chardavoyne, aide to District One Boston City Councillor Diane Modica and At-Large Councillor

Albert L. O'Neil. Readings were done by Conway; Thomas J. Butler, director, Massport Office of Government and Community Affairs; Father Mahoney; and Capt. Jerome F. McGourthy, professor, Mass. Maritime Academy.

The service concluded with the ceremonial tossing of a memorial wreath off the side of the ship in memory of the Merchant Marines killed at sea as a bugler from the Colonial Band played

The gathering then assembled on Pier One and began the march to the Massport Terminal at 333 Medford St. for the dedication of the memorial. Transportation was provided by the Teamsters Local 25 Van, driven by Mel Stillman, and

a bus from Massport. The participants reassembled amid trees and plantings in the newly created buffer zone along the Massport facility. Conway spoke of the appropriateness of the location of this Merchant Marines Veterans memorial at the gateway to the port, near the water and the shipping terminals. He praised Massport for its cooperation and support in providing the site, the design and financing for the memorial.

Invited guests had the opportunity to praise the Merchant Marine Veteran of W.W. II as some recalled specific incidents relative to these men who transported troops, food, supplies, fuel across the vast expanse of ocean. Speakers included: Butler; McGourthy; Materazzo; O'Neil; Esbensen; Virginia Barber, president, Dept. of Mass. American Legion Auxiliary; Cmdr. Allen A. Auerr, Dept. of Mass. DAV; and John P. "Jake" Comer, Past National Commander, The American Legion.

Prayers were offered by Father Mahoney, Rev. Reno

and Rev. Small, and musical selections by Hickey and the Colonial Band of Lawrence were enjoyed.

Conway asked that one person from each of the families of the men being honored represent their familv for the ceremony. Roberta Eatherton-Schofield, who is named in honor of her uncle, Arthur Harrington and Bernard Kelly, brothers of two of the deceased men, accepted citations from the Senate, House of Representatives, Mayor Thomas M. Menino and the city, and the Boston City Council in honor of the dedication. Also, the three joined Massport's Butler in unveiling the memorial with its granite base and bronze plaque.

The guests then marched to Bunker Hill Post 26, A.L. for a collation.



Voke Says State Mortgage Funds Now Available

Participating lenders are already accepting applications for the mort-gages which will be made available at the fixed 30-year interest rate of 6.99 percent. In addition to the low interest rate, the program requires a minimum down payment of only 5 percent of the home's selling price.

MHFA has stated that the funds will be accessible only to parties who have already signed a Purchase and Sale Agreement, but cautioned prospective buyers not to rush to sign an agreement because there will be another offering later this year.

MHFA has assisted more than 28,000 families with their various programs since its inception in 1979. During this time, it has channeled more than \$1.6 billion in private sector investments into Mass. cities and towns.

"MHFA's home buyer program is a winning proposition for everyone involved. It is a win for the families who purchase homes they otherwise could not afford and a win for the taxpayers who realize the benefits to the state's economy without the use of their state tax dollars," commented Voke.



On behalf of the surviving members of the late Edward and Mary Kelly family, formerly of Austin Street, we wish to thank an ever-loving community of friends and neighbors who found time to participate in the long-awaited honor bestowed on our brother, Edward F. "Mugsy" Kelly, and the equally honored six other merchant marines, Cahill, Carroll, Collins, Eatherton, Harrington and Stevens, who also gave their lives to assure freedom for their loved ones back home in Charlestown.

U.S. Merchant Seaman Edward F. Kelly enlisted in Jan. 1942 and served until his death on Feb. 23, 1943, aboard the S.S. Jonathan Sturges, a Liberty Ship, which was sunk while on convoy through the Murmansk Run off the coast of Newfoundland during World War II.

This honored program and ceremony came about because of the tireless efforts of one determined native son, namely James "Jim" Conway, USMC, whose constitution would never say, "Die"...but, ask... "why not?" These efforts began way back when the cry was, "Don't make a wave, don't disturb the status quo!"

The long overdue recognition, although 51 years late, finally corrected the record, helped those belated broken hearts, brought recognition and honor to those heroes of a sometime forgotten war, and the pledge that something like this doesn't happen again!




