

Task Force Has New Plan — And New Ramp

Members of the North Area/Central Artery Task Force are looking at an alternative plan, which they and the Boston Neighborhood Development Agency designed and which will compromise between CBT's (Childs, Bertrand & Tseckares) O-1 scheme and the task force's favored L-2 scheme, announced Bill Lamb, Chairman of the Task Force.

Basically the new plan modifies the L-2 scheme but works better as a traffic scheme while keeping traffic out of City Square. This solves problems the task force had with the O-1 scheme shich they saw as producing more noise and traffic in the City Square area. They also feel that their new scheme will cost less than the preferred L-2 scheme which was rejected in July for the primary reason of its \$14 million excess in construction costs.

While the modified scheme will compromise the L-2 and O-1, it presents a possible third problem of an off-ramp located near the Medford/Chelsea Street intersection. Members of the task force

are compiling information on the type of traffic that will use this off ramp and the noise level to be expected. Upon compilation of this information, residents of the task force will hold a meeting to discuss the merits and disadvantages of this ramp, as it relates to the whole of Charlestown.

To date, several agencies and community spokesmen have voiced their dislike of the O-1 scheme. These include Chelsea/Charlestown Representative Richard Voke, The Charlestown Preservation Society, Massachusetts Port Authority, and the City of Boston.

Task force members are working on an alternative route to fight implementation of the O-1 scheme through a letter voicing their disapproval, to the Federal Highway Administration which will supply most of the money to build the artery.

The North Area/Central Artery Project will be further discussed at the September 9th Charlestown Town Council Meeting to be held at the American Legion Hall, 7:30 p.m.





In collaboration with the Charlestown Preservation Society and the Boston Landmarks Commission, Historic Boston will assemble a development plan to make the develop-

ment and preservation of the

Hurd House financially feasible.

Historic Boston is a private charitable corporation founded in 1960 to restore the Old Corner Bookstore at the intersection of School and Washington Streets.

This organization seeks to facilitate real estate development that restores pivotal historic buildings to continuing uses. It has already carried out structural repairs on the Austin House ("Stone House") at the intersection of Main and Hurd Streets.

Boston Business School Charges Tuition

The Boston Business School will open for its 68th consecutive academic year on Monday, September 14, 1981.

For the first time in its long, proud history, the school wili be charging tuition to all returning students as well as to new students. To help defray the cost of the program, the School Committee voted recently the modest charge of \$400.00 in tuition and \$50.00 in fees for the academic year. It should be noted that a seat is reserved for all returning students who have paid their tuition. However, new applicants are accepted to the school on a "first come, first serve" basis.

The Business School, known until 1971 as the Clerical School, is a junior college level school, training men and women of all ages to become secretaries or accountants. Five major programs

are offered including bookkeeping, accounting, machine transcription, shorthand, and executive secretarial. The school is in session Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 2:15 p.m. A charter bus leaves the Arborway Station each marning at 7:45 for the school and makes a return trip at the close of the school day.

The Business School is housed in a modern, two story building at 989 Commonwealth Avenue - a mile beyond Kenmore Square - and is equipped with modern, electric typewriters, a computer, computer terminals, word processing machines, and I.B.M. Mag Card II equipment.

The Placement Department assists students to secure parttime employment and places all graduates in full-time positions.

Housing Rehab Program Offers Cash Rebates To Eligible Homeowners

The Housing Rehabilitation Program, begun on July 29, will provide eligible Boston homeowners with cash rebates for making code-related repairs and energy-conservation improvements, the director of the Mayor's Office of Housing announced today.

"The Housing Rehabilitation

Program," explained Joseph Courtney, "is essentially designed to help low and moderate-income homeowners pay for many of the normal home repair items, as well as for improvements to conserve

The director added, "When a home is made weathertight and properly insulated, homeowners

not only receive a cash rebate from our program, but they also begin cutting their heating costs by as much as 40 percent."

The program, administered by the Office of Housing and funded through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), offers cash rebates of 20 percent or 40 percent of the estimated costs

for code-related repairs, such as porch or roof rehabilitation. Rebates of 40 and 50 percent are provided for energy-related work, including furnace replacement, storm window installation, and attic or wall insulation.

To help homeowners determine the most cost-effective and beneficial energy repairs, the Housing Rehabilitation Program staff will perform free home energy audits for participants.

To be eligible for the Housing

Rehabilitation Program, a property must be owner occupied and consist of one to six units. The owner must meet income guidelines established by the program.

Homeowners must apply for assistance before starting repairs to be eligible for a rebate. For more information, call or visit the Charlestown Office, located at 232 Bunker Hill Street, telephone number 241-

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Free Coffee On "Pike" During Labor Day Weekend

The Massachusetts Turnpike Authority, anticipating heavy traffic over the Labor Day weekend, issued a warning to motorists that the 55-mile-perhour speed limit will be rigidly enforced along its 135 mile roadway. Chairman John T. Driscoll said, "State Police from Troop E who patrol the Turnpike will augment regular radar teams in order to discourage excessive speeding." In addition, radio-equipped emergency service patrol vehicles will assist police in locating and assisting motorists in disabled vehicles and a full force of toll collectors will be at all interchanges across the Turnpike.

Service stations and restaurants along the Turnpike will be opened 24 hours a day, everyday. Chairman Driscoll also said, "The Howard Johnson Restaurants along the Turnpike will provide free coffee to patrons of the Turnpike to promote safe driving." The gesture is intended to remind motorists that rest stops and coffee stops can help to keep drivers alert. Thereby improving driving performance. Certificates will be distributed at toll plazas allowing motorists to be served coffee without charge from 10:00 p.m. on Monday, September 7th, through 7 a.m. Tuesday, September 8th.

Driscoll added, "It has been proven that complaince with the 55 mile-per-hour speed limit has reduced fatalities by at least 10 percent annually along our nation's highways. It is especially important during this weekend that all motorists, without exception, limit their speed to this legal limit. We are determined to enforce this law. In doing so, we will achieve a safer weekend for





'There was further evidence to indicate the article was a subtle attempt to confuse the voters,' added Kelly. "The article made clear that a Dennis Morgan, not James Kelly (of the Mayor's Office), was coordinating the effort to elect the Kevin White candidates. The name "James Kelly" was totally unrelated to the story. It should never have even been mentioned.'

"It's not a case of being over sensitive, but I want to keep the record straight. I am not a Kevin White candidate and I do not want the press inferring otherwise. No one, directly or indirectly, affiliated with the Mayor's organization is involved with my campaign," Kelly said.

"I never expected the media to embrace my candidacy. They would not support a candidate they could not control. For the past seven years I have criticized their news departments for down-playing, or totally ignoring crimes of violence such as stonings, purse snatchings and assaults. Since 1974 I have vehemently disagreed with their editorial support of forced busing and racial quotas. I maintain that the press should use their considerable influence to rectify some of the real problems facing the city rather than blindly endorsing policies which are counter-productive to education, racially devisive and a financial burden on the Boston taxpayers," concluded Kelly.







Available For Artists

Applications for the \$5,000 Massachusetts Artists Fellowships in fiction, poetry, playwriting, film, video, music composition, and choreography are now available at The Artists Foundation. Any artist who is a resident of Massachusetts, over 18 years of age, and not enrolled as a student is eligible to apply to the Artists Fellowship Program. Applications must be completed and returned to the Foundation office by 5 p.m., Thursday, October 1, 1981. Several fellowships will be awarded in each field. Applications for visual artist will be

available in January, 1982.

Applicants must submit samples of their work demonstrating a high level of accomplishment. Writers submit up to ten poems, 50 pages of a novel, or one fulllength play; filmmakers submit up to two films; video artists submit an hour's worth of tape; composers submit two pieces of music; choreographers submit video tape documentation of up to three dances. Panels of out-ofstate artists in each field will select the fellowship recipients solely on the basis of the quality of the work. Project proposals are not required of either applicants or recipients.

The Artists Fellowship Program is one of several programs administered by the Artists Foundation, Inc., a nonprofit organization in Boston that assists individual creative artists in Massachusetts. The Fellowship Program is supported by funds from the Massachusetts Council on the Arts and Humanities. 


