North Area/Central Artery Update

The North Area/ Central Artery project to replace the overhead roadway looming above City Square with underground tunnels is a complicated and overwhelming project for residents as well as professionals to visualize. Just how overwhelming the project is to

understand became apparent at a recent community meeting at which engineers and consultants presented the scope of the project and its effect on Charlestown. To simplify the proposal, the consultant team of Childs Bertman Tseckares & Casendino Inc. have submit-

ted a synopsis of one aspect of the plan; namely, the proposed uses for the seven land parcels which will be created when the overhead roadway is removed.

At the meeting, consultants and residents discussed various alternatives for each parcel. The community expressed a desire for a re-evaluation of the decisions that were made in 1982 when the consultants plans were finalized, especially those decisions about the nature of City Square plaza, known as Parcel 5, and the largest parcel bounded by Chelsea and Water Streets, known as Parcel 1.

Six parcels totaling 8.13 acres will be available for development in 1991. The 1982 plan shows Parcel 5, a

ABCD is a private, non-profit corporation established in 1962, with a majority of board member elected from Boston's neighborhoods through the decentral-

ized ABCD network which is funded from a variety of sources totaling over \$30 million annually. Among the ABCD programs are Fuel Assistance, Foster Grandparents, Head Start, Day Care, Center for Jobs, Edu-

cation, and Career Training, the Summer Youth Employment Program, a tuition-free, accredited Urban College administered in conjunction with area colleges and universities, Health Services, Community Services, and others.

MBTA Announces Public Meeting To Discuss Reduced Fares

The MBTA today announced a series of public meetings to review a proposal to reduce fares for special needs riders during rush hours. The meetings will also address proposals to increase the cost of obtaining reduced fare identification cards for special needs and senior citizen riders.

Special needs riders cur-

rently pay 10 cents during off-peak hours, but must pay full fare during the peak hours; 7:00 to 9:30 a.m. and 4:00 to 6:00 p.m.

The proposal would keep fares at 10 cents at all hours similar to the current fare structure for senior citizens.

In Boston, a meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, September 3, 1985 from

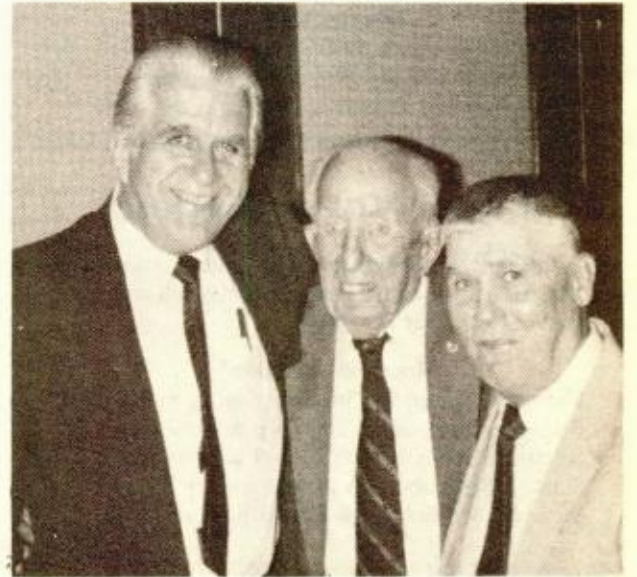
4:00 to 6:00 p.m. at the State Transportation Building, Conference Rooms 2 and 3, 10 Park Plaza, which is handicapped accessible.

Another proposal would increase the price of reduced fare identification cards for persons with special needs and senior citizens from 50 cents to three dollars to cover administrative costs. With 30,000 cards issued annually, current losses absorbed by the MBTA amount to \$75,000 per year.

The MBTA will also propose measures to curtail abuses in the current system with a set of strict procedures to check fraudulent applications and unauthorized use of reduced fare identification cards.

At the meeting, the public will discuss various other recommendations and proposals in order to institute changes in the administration of the program, including allowing only one replacement card per year at the cost of \$10.00 which will eliminate the "temporary" special needs category as well as enforce the applying eligibility criteria in a more strict manner.

Doris Pushing For Tax Relief For Elderly Care

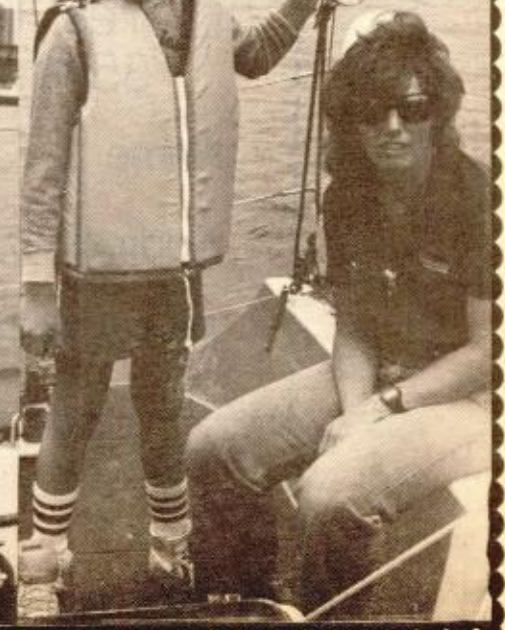

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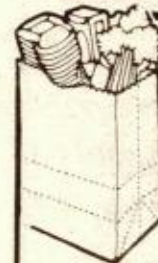

1.08 acre parcel, serving as an anchor for redevelopment in the area, with approximately 8,000 square feet of retail space included. The community, however, expressed great interest in keeping the City Square plaza area as open, green space with no building on the parcel at all. Some ideas included amphitheater or a grove of trees on the parcel. Residents who were in favor of keeping City Square open said that Charlestown

could use more open space and that keeping the focus of City Square on the old buildings, such as Roughan Hall and the Court House, would enhance the area. Some residents indicated that they would like to have a scheme studied that showed a low building that would act as a buffer between heavily trafficked Rutherford Avenue and the new City Square park space. Both of the options will be looked at in more detail by the project team.

There was also discussion about the proposed uses of Parcel 1, the largest development parcel that will be created. A 3.17-acre site, Parcel 1 was proposed as a site for mixed-use office and residential, a hotel and parking. Some of the community said that a hotel would be undesirable, because it would be too high and would be a visual obstruction of views of Boston and the waterfront, including the USS Constitution. In addition, someone doubted whether Boston could even support another hotel, given the number of new hotels built in recent years. Later, the the number of jobs for local residents that a hotel would create was mentioned,

as well as the number of spin-off retail activities that would result. Other comments made at the meeting included a general desire for the heights

of buildings to be reduced from five stories to three or four stories, and the need for more affordable residential housing units in Charlestown. The project team will

be restudying the 1982 proposed plan and looking at the various options for the development parcels and the urban design possibilities for the entire area.

Where's Silber When You Need Him?

Recently, Boston University President John Silber made newspaper headlines by asking the City of Boston to hand over control of Boston's public schools to him. A revolutionary idea that had never been proposed by anyone prior to him.

When he came before the Boston City Council and proposed B.U. take control of the day-to-day administration of the Boston Public School System, he presented a powerful condemnation of Boston's approach to education. Dr. Silber presented his Commonwealth Avenue challenge: "Either use your ample funds wisely to create an excellent school system, or the Mayor and Boston City Council should file a petition to contract out the management of the public schools."

Silber says he can whip the public schools of Boston back into shape, if the politi-

cians will just give him a chance. I say there's a bigger challenge waiting for Dr. Silber. Bigger than public education. That's right public health. When Mayor Flynn announced his plans to rebuild the Boston City Hospital at a cost of \$180 million, I say give it to Silber and the B.U. Medical School which already uses it for their medical training.

Let's take public health out of politics and give it to the professionals at Boston University. There is no need for a brand new public hospital in Boston when we are supposed to be a medical mecca, there is no need for a new public hospital when University Hospital is right next door. If Boston University wants to use the City Hospital to train their doctors, give them the hospital rather than de facto leasing it.

Boston University might as well as own it, it is a B.U. hospital already and the med-

ical residents cross back and forth every day. Why not marry Boston City to University Hospital rather than having them living together as is today's fashion?

If Silber is really concerned about making a mark in Boston's history, he should forget the classrooms and go for Wards. I urge Mayor Flynn to reconsider any heavy re-investment in a hospital that has lived beyond its life and ask Boston

University President John Silber to take over the day-to-day operations. If Silber can't make Boston City run right, no one can.

The poor who are in need of quality health care are deserving of better than expensive band-aids for Boston City Hospital. Giving the hospital over to a private outfit like the B.U. Medical School would benefit the poor of the inner city and medical trainees at B.U.

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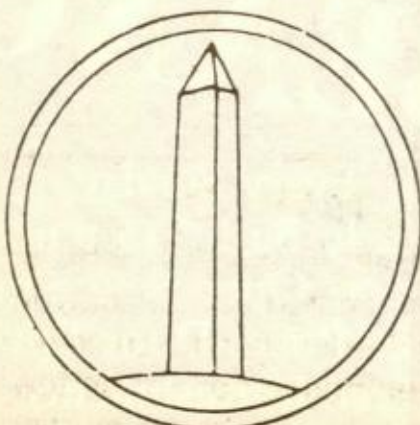

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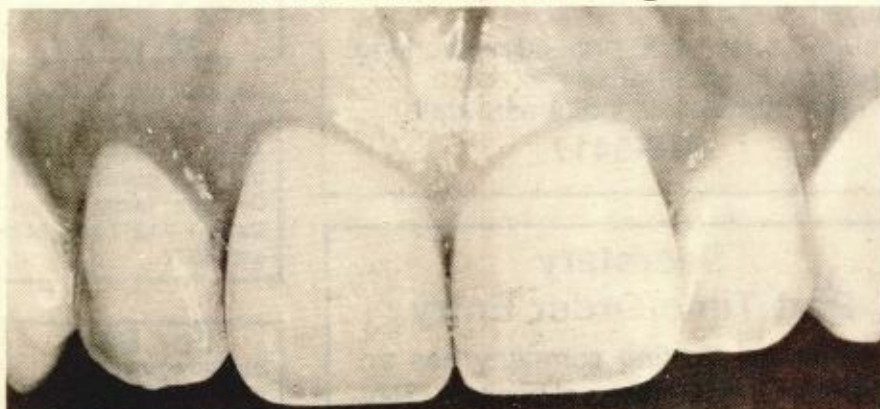

RECOMMENDED "DAY-TRIP," OUT-OF-STATE....

We often visit the yachting capitol of the world, and it isn't nearly often enough. We're talking about Newport, Rhode Island, of course, and if you haven't been there, we commend this less than two hour trip to your attention. Uniquely, it has something for everybody, and once on the Southeast Expressway (and onto Route 24) you have simply to follow the Fall River - Newport signs for a pleasant, traffic light-free trip and a day you'll long remember — promise!

Surely you've heard of the fabulous mansions located there? For first-timers, we suggest a look-see at the super colossal "summer home" of the Vanderbilts (The Breakers) and Hamersmith Farm (used as a Summer White House, 1961 - 1963), home of Jacqueline Bouvier's mother and, truly, the last working farm in the city.

History buffs will be enamored of the quaint, narrow streets and the many homes refurbished under the strict guidelines of their Preservation Society. Do plan on finding/visiting The White Horse Tavern (oldest operating pub in the U.S.), and the former headquarters of Revolutionary heroes General Rochambeau and Admiral de Ternay, and seek out the Old Colony House (center of downtown) and learn of George Washington's connection therewith. Others will wish to photograph St. Mary's Catholic Church, where President John

F. Kennedy and Jackie were married, and/or visit and tour Trinity Episcopal Church (on the hillside with the clock in the steeple tower), as well as Touro Synagogue — the older synagogue in America.

Hikers will particularly enjoy the famous Cliff Walk (renovated under the chairmanship of someone you might've heard of — Claus von Bulow), while bathers, boaters and fishermen will find ample opportunities to do such.

Those who enjoy a slower pace will ultimately wind up on a park bench in beautiful Perotti Park gandering at Goat Island Marina, dining at any one of the fabulous waterfront eateries, visiting the Tennis Hall of Fame Museum, or browsing in curio shops along Thames Street. If you decide to remain overnight, an abundance of hotel and motel rooms are available — or cabins in the immediate outlying areas. On August 13, 1985 at 7:44 a.m., Police Officers responded to Monument Square relative to a fight with a knife. On arrival, the Officers found a man suffering from stab wounds to his left arm and chest. This victim reported that he had been stabbed by a male suspect, who then stole the victim's motor vehicle. A description of the suspect and the vehicle were broadcast over the radio. A short time later, the suspect vehicle was observed on Old Landing Way, being operated by a 17 year old Charlestown man. The weapon, a large hunting knife, was found a short distance away. This suspect was returned to the scene of the attack where he was identified by the victim. The victim was removed to Massachusetts General Hospital for medical treatment. The suspect was placed under arrest for Assault With Intent to Murder, Assault and Battery With a Dangerous Weapon, and Larceny of a Motor Vehicle.

On August 13, 1985 at 2:00 p.m., Detectives accompanied a larceny victim to 411 Main Street. This victim had received a telephone call from a male suspect who stated that he had stolen the victim's property and would return it for a fee. He requested that the victim meet him at Main Street and sign an extortion note. The victim went to the location while the Detectives observed a short distance away. The Detectives observed the victim as he was approached by two males, one of whom was carrying a brick. The Detectives moved in and placed both suspects under arrest placing them in the police vehicle. Both suspects somehow managed to jump from the locked vehicle and flee. One suspect fled up Baldwin Street, while both Detectives subdued the other suspect. Assisting Officers conducted a search of the area, but were unable to locate the suspect. The first suspect was taken to Area A and booked for Receiving Stolen Property and Extortion. Warrants have been issued for the second suspect.

On August 13, 1985 at 2:45 p.m., as a result of information received and observations made, Detectives arrested three men for drug violations. The first suspect, a 23 year old Charlestown man, was found to be in possession of two bags of P.C.P. (Angel Dust). He was charged with Possession of a Class B Substance with Intent to Distribute. A second suspect, a 21 year old Charlestown man, was charged with Possession of a Class D Substance (Marijuana). The third

suspect, a 28 year old Hyde Park man, was charged with Possession of a Class B Substance and Receiving a Stolen Credit Card. All three suspects were arrested at Bunker Hill and Green Streets and conveyed to Area A.

On August 16, 1985 at 8:30 p.m., Police Officers entered the Doherty Playground and observed a motor vehicle operating towards them. The Officers stopped the vehicle to inquire as to why the vehicle was in the park. The Officers observed a box with ice and beer in the rear of the vehicle and asked the four male occupants to step from the vehicle. 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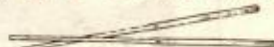

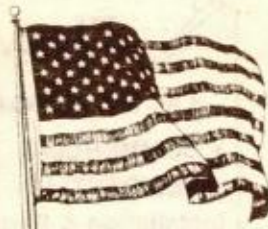
