To Discuss Reduced Fares

The MBTA today announced a series of public meetings to review a proposal to reduce fares for special needs riders during rush hours. The meetings will also address proposals to increase the cost of obtaining reduced fare identification cards for special needs and senior citizen riders.
Special needs riders cur-
rently pay 10 cents during off-peak hours, but must pay full fare during the peak hours: 7:00 to 9:30 a.m. and 4:00 to 6:00 p.m.
The proposal would keep fares at 10 cents at all hours similar to the current fare structure for senior citizens. In Boston, a meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, September 3, 1985 from

## Charlestown Police Line

From the desk of

Downtown, Charlestown, East Boston, Beacon Hill
On August 13, 1985 at 7:44 a.m., Police Officers responded to Monument Square relative to a fight with a knife. On arrival, the Officers found a man suffering from stab wounds to his left arm and chest. This victim reported that he had been stabbed by a male suspect, who then stole the victim's motor vehicle. A description of the suspect and the vehicle were broadcast over the radio. A short time later, the suspect vehicle was observed on Old Landing Way, being operated by a 17 year old Charlestown man: The weapon, a large hunting knife, was found a short distance away. This suspect was returned to the scene of the attack where he was identified by the victim. The victim was removed to Massachusetts General Hospital for medical treatment. The suspect was placed under arrest for Assault With Intent to Murder, Assault and Battery With a Dangerous Weapon, and Larceny of a Motor Vehicle.

On August 13, 1985 at 2:00 p.m.. Detectives accompanied a larceny victim to 411 Main Street. This victim had received telephone call from a male suspect who stated that he had stolen the victim's property and would return it for a fee. He requested that the victim meet him at Main Street and sign an extortion note. The victim went to the location while the Detectives observed a short distance away. The Detectives observed the victim as he was approached by two males, one of whom was carrying a brick. The Detectives moved in and placed both suspects under arrest placing them in the police vehicle. Both suspects somehow managed to jump from the locked vehicle and flee. One suspect fled up Baldwin Street, while both Detectives subdued the other suspect. Assisting Officers conducted a search of the area. but were unable to locate the suspect. The first suspect was taken to Area A and booked for Receiving Stolen Property and Extortion. Warrants have been issued for the second suspect

On August 13, 1985 at $2: 45$ p.m., as a result of information received and observations made, Detectives arrested three men for drug violations. The first suspect, a 23 year old Charlestown man, was found to be in possession of two bags of P.C.P. (Angel Dust). He was charged with Possession of a Class B Substance with Intent to Distribute. A second suspect, a 21 year old Charlestown man, was charged with Possession of a Class D Substance (Marijuana). The third
suspect, a 28 year old Hyde Park man, was charged with Possession of a Class B Substance and Receiving a Stolen Credit Card. All three suspects were arrested at Bunker Hill and Green Streets and conveyed to Area A.

On August 16, 1985 at 8:30 p.m., Police Officers entered the Doherty Playground and observed a motor vehicle operating towards them. The Officers stopped the vehicle to inquire as to why the vehicle was in the park. The Officers observed a box with ice and beer in the rear of the vehicle and asked the four male occupants to step from the vehicle. One man fled on foot while three others were arrested for Public Drinking. The Officers then observed a bag containing a white powder believed to be Cocaine in the ashtray. A search of the trunk revealed a scale, mirror, and other drug paraphernalia. The operator of the vehicle was charged with Possession of a Class B Substance With Intent to Distribute and Public Drinking. The other two suspects were charged with Public Drinking.

On August 17. 1985 at 9:30 p.m., Police Officers after hearing a radio broadcast relative to a motor vehicle just stolen from Main Street, observed this vehicle heading toward Sullivan Square. The Officers pursued the vehicle to High Street where the passenger exited the vehicle, fled on foot, and was quickly apprehended. The operator continued to Salem Street where he abandoned the vehicle and made good on his escape. The passenger, a 14 year old Charlestown resident, was charged with Larceny of a Motor Vehicle and Possession of Burglarious Tools. $\qquad$
On August 19, 1985 at 7:20 a.m.. Detectives arrested a 20
year old Charlestown resident on a warrant. The warrant was issued from Charlestown Court for Assault with a Dangerous Weapon, to wit a gun.

On August 20, 1985 at 3:20 a.m., Police Officers responded to a radio call relative to a breaking and entering in progress at Walford Way. On arrival, the Officers observed a man breaking a window and attempting to gain entrance to an apartment. This man, a 46 year old Charlestown resident, was placed under arrest for Breaking and Entering and Willful Malicious Destruction of Property
