

Main Street Reconstruction Update

by Kathy Giordano

The reconstruction work along Main Street has had a few delays this past week, due to frigid temperatures and the early "winter" snow storm. Nevertheless, the roadway between Mishawum Street and Albion Place that had been excavated earlier in the year by the previous contractor, has been paved.

Reconstruction of the sidewalks along that stretch of the roadway will begin as soon as weather permits. The curbing will be placed first and then a dense grated crushed stone surface will be laid. This process is expected to take at least two weeks, due in part to the weather conditions and a delay in the arrival of replacement curbing needed to complete the job.

When this work is completed, safety markings will be placed on the new roadway for traffic directions, the barriers will be re-arranged and signs posted before reconstruction begins on the opposite side of Main Street. This change will affect the parking ban in that area and residents are advised to watch for the "no parking" sign changes. Cars will be towed if illegally parked.

All interested residents are invited to attend this Housing Committee meeting on November 25th.



Development And Delivery Of City Services On Council Agenda

by Rebecca Nevers

Development issues dominated discussion at the October 30th Charlestown Neighborhood Council meeting, held at the Knights of Columbus Hall.

Among major concerns was debate about the Wylie house off 12 Washington Street, on Washington Ter-

The house, which was built in the 1700's, was used as a dumping ground for about 20 years, said council member Kathryn Down-

The Preservation Society cleaned the house in 1981, and in the processfound a whole willow tree. a laundromat, and the house was filled with plas-"You literally could not

walk through it," she added. 'It was physically impossible.

The house currently is being renovated by architect Robert Neiley.

Council Chairman John Tobin said Neiley showed him plans for the house and wants input from the committee.

"He's very serious," Tobin said. "He wants to get us involved."

Tobin also said Neiley wants to build a three family home on an adjacent lot. which is owned by the Boston Redevelopment Autho-

But Downing said the property should be offered to area residents.

"There should be a bidding process," she said. "That would seem a lot more fair to everyone in the community.

Tobin said he promised Neiley the council would review the plans.

Tom Cunha, council vice chairman and Housing Committee chairman, said his committee should mediate a dispute between Sackville and Sheafe Street residents and Sheafeville Realty Trust.

Joe Fidler, of Sheafeville Realty Trust, is planning to develop a lot between 19 Sackville Street and 11-13 Sheafe Street.

The Boston Zoning Board of Appeal delayed voting on the issue because the dispute is unresolved, Cunha said. The board did so at the Housing Committce's request.

"The developers and residents should meet privately before bringing the issue back to a public forum.

'Things get more heated," he said. "This is the first time they've sat down together. Things get done quicker that way

Also discussed was the conversion of the former Nancy Sales Warehouse on Medford and Terminal Streets to an apartment building.

Kathryn Downing said 200 units and 50 parking spaces have been discussed as being able to be built into the building.

"It's a big change that they're proposing," she added.

Council member Dennis McLaughlin, reporting for Development Committee Chairman Mike Powers, said a public meeting should be held to determine lot allocation of property at Tremont and Prospect Streets.

The Council voted to recommend the lots be "no smaller than 3,000 square feet" at its last meeting. based on community input.

But John Tobin and Tom Cunha both expressed concern about holding more public meetings.

"We've already taken action," Tobin said. "We don't want to hold a public meeting until the BRA (Boston Redevelopment

Authority) tells us what they want.

Mike Powers later said the process of taking the issue to the public is effec-

"I'm trying to move and I'm trying to move in a fast fashion," Powers said. "Everything should be put out publicly."

Larry Brophy, Charlestown project coordinator for the BRA, said the recommendation (of 3,000 square feet) has not been acted upon. He said neighborhood opinion will be considered in the vote.

In other council business. Basic Services Committee Chairman Dave Flanagan outlined a plan to improve services in Charlestown.

He said the committee members want to invite different city administrators to







French Vessel Visits Navy Yard

The French vessel Centaure is docked at Pier One in the Charlestown Navy Yard, directly behind the USS Constitution, through Friday, November 21st. Visitors may board her on Thursday and Friday between 2:00 and 4:00 p.m. for a tour.

The Centaure, a French tug, has a crew of five officers and 37 enlisted men. Her homeport is Brest. France, but she works out of St. Pierre, Canada with the French Canadian fishing fleet. She is an auxiliary ship with principal duties similar to her American counterpart, the U.S. Coast Guard. The Centaure patrols the harbor, performs rescue missions for which a medical doctor is always on board to handle emergency situations, performs an anti-pollution patrol and, in general, assists the French fishing fleet.

This "tug" is 168 feet long with a 24 foot draft (width). She is one of only three ships of her class. She was commissioned on November 15, 1974. Her visit is part of the Visiting Ships Program at the Charlestown Navy Yard, sponsored by the National Park Service.



oramic history of life and work aboard USS Constitution. His artwork graphically depicts the building and inner workings of the ship, and the day-to-day life of the men who sailed on the world's oldest fully commissioned warship.

Commander John Charles Roach was born in Newport News, Virginia. where his intense interest in ships and naval architecture was fostered by his father. a naval architect. He received his formal educaiton at l'Ecole Nationale Superieure des Beaux Arts in Paris, before returning to the

This collection of his finely detailed sketches of USS Constitution began as a two week project while he was serving at the Navy's Public Affairs office in Boston and, says Roach, "it instantly became one of my most satisfying artistic endeavors. Ships have always held a great fascination for me, coming from the shipbuilding city of, Newport News, but the Constitution became very special. As I worked aboard her, I actually began to feel as though I had sailed as a crew member back in the 1800's."

State Transportation Agencies Announce Storm Emergency Numbers

Five Massachusetts State Transportation Agencies have announced public information telephone numbers for transportation conditions during winter storm situations. These agencies include the Massachusetts Department of Public Works (MDPW), the Metropolitan District Commission (MDC), the Massachusetts Turnpike Authority, the Massachusetts Bay Transit Authority (MBTA) and Massport. All numbers are within the 617 area code:

MDPW: 973-7500 For driving conditions on state roads and bridges.

MDC: 727-7240 For driving conditions on MDCcontrolled parkways and boulevards.

PIKE: 973-7300 Driving conditions on the Massachusetts Turnpike (Route 90).

MBTA: 722-5050 Recorded announcements, and 722-3200 Operator assisted: Status of service on the Red, Blue, Green and Orange Lines; Bus and Commuter Rail operations.

Commissioner Robert T. Tierney of the MDPW, the coordinating agency for the storm public information program, has requested that individuals rely on radio and television broadcasts as much as possible for storm information, calling the agencies directly only if the specific information is not being broadcast. "State agency and authority phone lines are often inundated with calls during the winter storm," Tierney said. "We all keep the media regularly updated on conditions and the fastest way for the public to acquire information on the current status of road or rail is to listen to the radio or television."

Tierney said that the DPW, MBTA, MTA, MDC and Massport storm information lines are staffed either around the clock or for extended hours during serious weather conditions.






