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### Housing Committee To Hear Washington And Sackville Streets Proposals

Thomas Cunha, Chairman of the Housing Committee of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, has announced that a meeting of this committee will take place on Tuesday evening, November 25, 1986 at 7:00 p.m. at the Charlestown High School Auditorium, 254 Medford Street.

On the agenda will be a presentation concerning the ongoing restoration of the Wylie House on Washing-

ton Terrace, off 12 Washington Street, by Robert Neiley, as well as a proposal by Neiley to purchase an adjacent vacant land parcel, presently owned by the Boston Redevelopment Authority, on which he proposes to construct a three-unit dwelling. This parcel, R59-D2, has the address of 41 Old Rutherford Avenue.

Also on the agenda will be a presentation by

Sheafville Realty Trust, Joe Fidler and Artie Pelton developers, of their revised housing development proposal for 17-19 Sackville Street and 11-13 Sheaf Street.

According to Mark Landsberg, Architect for the development team, the developers have been working on plans for the site, taking into consideration concerns of the neighborhood. (continued on page 9)

When the Howleys bought their house two years ago, it needed complete renovation. "Had we known how much work the house needed, we may not have decided to buy it," Tom said. "But now that it is finished, we are glad we did. Winning this award is confirmation that we made the right choice."

The Howley's first step was to convert the house from a two-family structure to its original condition as a single-family home. Outside, they replaced the brick portion of the foundation, which was crumbling, removed the asphalt siding to reveal the original clapboard — some of which had to be replaced — and painted the house. Inside they opened up the four

fireplaces, which had been blocked, lined them and replaced the crumbling brickwork. They also replaced all the windows, rewired, replumbed and insulated the house.

"Newworld is happy to recognize such an extensive home improvement," said James M. Oates, president

and chief executive officer. "Tom and Nancy's resourcefulness and dedication to their project should be an inspiration to others. Their improvements serve as a model for the entire community."

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## Gentlemen Jims — A New Restaurant For Charlestown

"Have you every tasted the steak tips at the New Bridge Cafe in Chelsea?" asked Jim Ward, "Well, we are going to challenge them, for our steak tips are better!"

Ward sat in a booth, sipping a cup of coffee on a recent morning, as a cleaning crew washed the floors of this sparkling clean restaurant.

Ward and his partner, Jim "Chippa" Godding, opened their new restaurant, Gentlemen Jims, this past week.

Ward explained that the name is a play on words, in that they are both named Jim.

Gentlemen Jims is located on One Mystic Avenue, Charlestown and, as Ward explains, it is just around the Sullivan Square rotary on the right, as a driver heads towards the Cinema in Somerville.

The facility had been known for years as the Mystic Lounge. Ward said that they have been renovating the building, with a new roof, new bathrooms, and interior remodeling.

He said that renovations will continue in the Spring with new windows, booths, bar stools and awnings.

But with the completed and planned renovations, the most important feature

to the restaurant is the addition of the Bar-B-Q Pit.

Ward explained that all their meat is freshly cut on the premises daily — and "marinated, not just dipped," he added. He said that they are featuring steak tips, lamb tips and pork tips, as well as sweet or hot sausages — all cooked to perfection in the Bar-B-Q Pit.

Ward pointed out the boxes of fresh produce used in their salads and the mound of potatoes ready to be cut into fries. Yes, Ward said, we use FRESH potatoes — not frozen.

Jim Ward is a native of Charlestown, the son of Patricia Ward of Monument Square. He is a graduate of Saint Mary's Grammar School, one of the last classes to attend the school, he noted.

Ward went on to Boston Technical High School and graduated from the University of Massachusetts in Amherst, with a degree in Hotel/Restaurant Management.

While he was in college, Ward worked as a steward at the Sidney Hill Country Club, carrying out food purchasing and set up.

From college, Ward's professional career took him to Dallas, Texas, where he worked for three years in the Food Service Division of American Airlines, returning to Boston to

work two and a half years for the same organization at Logan Airport.

Ward's partner at Gentlemen Jims is Jim "Chippa" Godding of Green Street. "Chippa" is the son of Joan and Jim Godding.

"Chippa" made headlines at Charlestown High School in the late 1970s. He served as Student Council President and was Captain of both the Football and Hockey Teams.

Godding has worked for Boston Gas for the past seven years.

Asked how the two Jims came to be proprietors of Gentlemen Jims, Ward said that he heard that the business was for sale and they made an offer. He said that he is very happy to be working in his own business.

Ward stated that he and Godding are "full partners," with Ward being on board early in the morning to oversee the food preparation, which is served from 11:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday and from noon to 8:00 p.m. on Sunday. Ward said that Godding comes in during the dinner hour and is the night manager.

Ward stressed that Gentlemen Jims will feature good food, that is fresh and reasonably priced. He said that they also serve daily luncheon specials, sandwiches and salads — and good coffee. All items on their menu can be ordered for take-out.

Ward and Godding invite all to visit Gentlemen Jims for the best Bar-B-Q in the area.

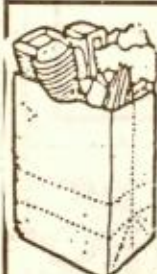

## Factory Clothing Outlet Provides Bargains For Charlestown Shoppers

Charlestown residents have a bargain basement in their backyard. Now, instead of heading into Boston, shoppers may find what they're looking for at The Sportswear Factory, a factory outlet that manufactures women's clothing.

The Charlestown outlet, opened six weeks ago, can be found at 50 Terminal Street, Building Two on the third floor.

Owner/manager Mel Sudalter said he has gotten a good response from shoppers.

"I've been swamped," he said. "Some people even come back the same day."

The outlet is open to the public on Saturdays from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., Sudalter noted.

Aisles of moderate to better coordinating separates can be found in petite and average sizes ranging from 3/4 to 15/16 and 8 to 20, Sudalter said.

The Charlestown factory is the third home for the Boston outlet, Sudalter explained. Before that he was in Chinatown and South Boston.

Sudalter owns thirteen outlet stores throughout New England. He said he was a teacher before joining the clothing business as a manufacturer fifteen years ago. When he saw the opportunities presented to him, he decided to change careers.

Now Sudalter has his own designers who make traditional sportswear.

"Fads aren't impor-

tant," he added. We stay away from them."

Shoppers will find wholesale prices at Sudalter's factory. "This is the actual factory where the garments are made," he said. "They'll always save at least 50 percent."

The clothing is designed, cut, sewn and shipped from the outlet, Sudalter said. It is then distributed to stores nationwide.

Sudalter said many things are involved in running his own clothing business.

"I like doing a lot of things," he said. "It has been rewarding."

The Sportswear Factory can be found off Medford Street behind Charlestown High School Athletic Facility on the third floor of the Charlestown Commerce Center.

## Main Street Reconstruction Update

by Kathy Giordano

The reconstruction work along Main Street has had a few delays this past week, due to frigid temperatures and the early "winter" snow storm. Nevertheless, the roadway between Mishawum Street and Albion Place that had been excavated earlier in the year by the previous contractor, has been paved.

Reconstruction of the sidewalks along that stretch of the roadway will begin as soon as weather permits. The curbing will be placed first and then a dense graded crushed stone surface will be laid. This process is expected to take at least two weeks, due in part to the weather conditions and a delay in the arrival of replacement curbing needed to complete the job.

When this work is completed, safety markings will be placed on the new roadway for traffic directions, the barriers will be re-arranged and signs posted before reconstruction begins on the opposite side of Main Street. This change will affect the parking ban in that area and residents are advised to watch for the "no parking" sign changes. Cars will be towed if illegally parked.

## Charlestown Navy Yard To Receive Financing From Japanese Investors

Two commitments were received this past week from Japanese investors for financing proposed developments in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

During their recent visit to Japan, Mayor Raymond Flynn, Boston Redevelopment Authority Director Stephen Coyle, and Neil St. John Raymond, an investor and developer of the Charlestown Navy Yard project, were present at the announcement of \$100 million in financing for the development of residential rental and condominium units at the Navy Yard, by Dai-ichi Kangyo Bank Ltd., shared by Asian Oceanic Securities, Inc.

The \$100 million project is for 500 units with a mixture of luxury condominiums and market rental units in approximately six acres

at the Mystic River side of the Navy Yard.

This announcement was followed by the public notification that the Nishimatsu Construction Company Ltd. has agreed to invest in a \$25 million to \$30 million project to build a yacht club, pier and marina at the Charlestown Navy Yard.

According to published reports, Raymond still needs final state and city approval for his plans, but with the financial involvement of Nishimatsu, he may start the foundation work for the marina early next year — some three years ahead of the projected schedule.

Coyle reported that he expects the entire development program at the Navy Yard to be completed by 1990.

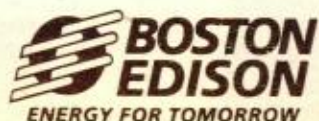
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## Development And Delivery Of City Services On Council Agenda

Among major concerns was debate about the Wylie house off 12 Washington Street, on Washington Terrace.

The house, which was built in the 1700's, was used as a dumping ground for about 20 years, said council member Kathryn Downing.

The Preservation Society cleaned the house in 1981, and in the process found a whole willow tree, a laundromat, and the house was filled with plaster, Downing said.

"You literally could not walk through it," she added. "It was physically impossible."

The house currently is being renovated by architect Robert Neiley.

Council Chairman John Tobin said Neiley showed him plans for the house and wants input from the committee.

"He's very serious," Tobin said. "He wants to get us involved."

Tobin also said Neiley wants to build a three family home on an adjacent lot, which is owned by the Boston Redevelopment Authority.

But Downing said the property should be offered to area residents.

"There should be a bidding process," she said. "That would seem a lot more fair to everyone in the community."

Tobin said he promised Neiley the council would review the plans.

Tom Cunha, council vice chairman and Housing Committee chairman, said his committee should mediate a dispute between Sackville and Sheafe Street residents and Sheafeville Realty Trust.

Joe Fidler, of Sheafeville Realty Trust, is planning to develop a lot between 19 Sackville Street and 11-13 Sheafe Street.

The Boston Zoning Board of Appeal delayed voting on the issue because the dispute is unresolved, Cunha said. The board did so at the Housing Committee's request.

"The developers and residents should meet privately before bringing the issue back to a public forum."

"Things get more heated," he said. "This is the first time they've sat down together. Things get done quicker that way."

Also discussed was the conversion of the former Nancy Sales Warehouse on Medford and Terminal Streets to an apartment building.

Kathryn Downing said 200 units and 50 parking spaces have been discussed as being able to be built in-

to the building.

"It's a big change that they're proposing," she added.

Council member Dennis McLaughlin, reporting for Development Committee Chairman Mike Powers, said a public meeting should be held to determine lot allocation of property at Tremont and Prospect Streets.

The Council voted to recommend the lots be "no smaller than 3,000 square feet" at its last meeting, based on community input.

But John Tobin and Tom Cunha both expressed concern about holding more public meetings.

"We've already taken action," Tobin said. "We don't want to hold a public meeting until the BRA (Boston Redevelopment

Authority) tells us what they want."

Mike Powers later said the process of taking the issue to the public is effective.

"I'm trying to move and I'm trying to move in a fast fashion," Powers said. "Everything should be put out publicly."

Larry Brophy, Charlestown project coordinator for the BRA, said the recommendation (of 3,000 square feet) has not been acted upon. He said neighborhood opinion will be considered in the vote.

In other council business, Basic Services Committee Chairman Dave Flanagan outlined a plan to improve services in Charlestown.

He said the committee members want to invite different city administrators to

appear before the council or the committee to discuss how different city agencies and departments operate.

Representatives from the Public Works Department, Inspectional Services Department, Parks and Recreation and similar departments, would be invited to meetings, Flanagan said.

The committee also will print a questionnaire in *The Charlestown Patriot* asking residents to provide information about services needed in their neighborhood.

"I know they (the City) have a lot of people who like to help us," Flanagan said. "But emergencies come up often."

He said the information gathered from the forms would be helpful to the city and the council.

"We want to help those with complaints who have not been able to get the problem resolved," Flanagan explained. "It would be beneficial to City Hall because they would know our concerns."

The report was adopted by the council.

Human Services Chairman Ronan FitzPatrick said a scheduled meeting to discuss the Charlestown Community Fund allocation was cancelled.

Tom Cunha said seven Charlestown organizations have submitted bids for money from the fund.

"The money is frozen right now," Cunha said. "I know of a couple of organizations in Charlestown that have been told they'd receive it by the first of the year."

"It may be lip-service," he added.

Tobin suggested a meeting be scheduled to discuss allocation of the linkage funds, and concluded the meeting.

The next Council meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, December 2nd at 7:00 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School Street.

### RENOVATIONS AT BUNKER HILL HEALTH CENTER

The Massachusetts General Hospital is about to begin major renovations to the facility at 73 High Street. In order to better serve the Charlestown community, the MGH plans to renovate the first floor and part of the second floor of the Bunker Hill Health Center.

The project is scheduled to begin in early January, 1987, and is expected to take approximately six months to complete. The contractor, hired by the MGH Planning Office, is The Henry Wile Corporation of Newton. The renovations will improve patient flow, by moving accounting and registration to the first floor and consolidating adult services, including adult specialties, on the first floor. In addition, it will upgrade and modernize the physical plant to create a more comfortable and private setting for patients.

The Health Center will remain in full operation during construction. Work will take place in three carefully planned phases in order to keep the disruption of services and inconvenience to patients to a minimum. Peggy Carolan, Health Center Manager, believes that the work will not detract from the quality of care that patients are accustomed to receiving at the Health Center.

Staff at the Health Center see this project as a clear sign by the MGH of its continued commitment to the Charlestown community. They are excited about the new look for the Health Center and are looking forward to an Open House in the Spring when the project is completed.

Further details on the renovations will be published in this column throughout the project.

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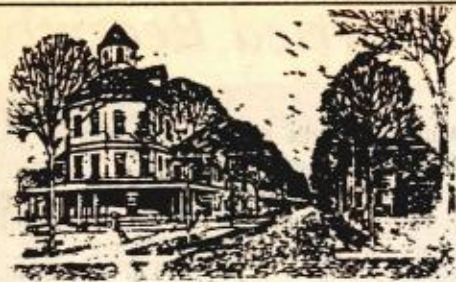


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## Life Behind The Wall

### French Vessel Visits Navy Yard

The French vessel *Centaure* is docked at Pier One in the Charlestown Navy Yard, directly behind the USS Constitution, through Friday, November 21st. Visitors may board her on Thursday and Friday between 2:00 and 4:00 p.m. for a tour.

The *Centaure*, a French tug, has a crew of five officers and 37 enlisted men. Her homeport is Brest, France, but she works out of St. Pierre, Canada with the French Canadian fishing fleet. She is an auxiliary ship with principal duties similar to her American counterpart, the U.S. Coast Guard. The *Centaure* patrols the harbor, performs rescue missions for which a medical doctor is always on board to handle emergency situations, performs an anti-pollution patrol and, in general, assists the French fishing fleet.

This "tug" is 168 feet long with a 24 foot draft (width). She is one of only three ships of her class. She was commissioned on November 15, 1974. Her visit is part of the Visiting Ships Program at the Charlestown Navy Yard, sponsored by the National Park Service.

oramic history of life and work aboard USS Constitution. His artwork graphically depicts the building and inner workings of the ship, and the day-to-day life of the men who sailed on the world's oldest fully commissioned warship.

Commander John Charles Roach was born in Newport News, Virginia, where his intense interest in ships and naval architecture was fostered by his father, a naval architect. He received his formal education at l'Ecole Nationale Supérieure des Beaux Arts in Paris, before returning to the

United States and enlisting in the Navy. His precise technical and artistic skills catapulted him to the position of official Navy artist, where, among other official assignments, he traveled to Vietnam to sketch combat situations for the Navy records.

This collection of his finely detailed sketches of USS Constitution began as a two week project while he was serving at the Navy's Public Affairs office in Boston and, says Roach, "it instantly became one of my most satisfying artistic endeavors. Ships have al-

ways held a great fascination for me, coming from the shipbuilding city of Newport News, but the Constitution became very special. As I worked aboard her, I actually began to feel as though I had sailed as a crew member back in the 1800's."

The Roach exhibit, which is open to the public, will be on display from now through January 23, 1987. The USS Constitution Museum is located in the Charlestown Navy Yard and is open daily from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

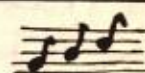

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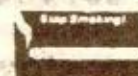

Tierney of the MDPW, the coordinating agency for the storm public information program, has requested that individuals rely on radio and television broadcasts as much as possible for storm information, calling the agencies directly only if the specific information is not being broadcast. "State agency and authority phone lines are often inundated with calls during the winter storm," Tierney said. "We all keep the media regularly updated on conditions and the fastest way for the public to acquire information on the current status of road or rail is to listen to the radio or television."

Tierney said that the DPW, MBTA, MTA, MDC and Massport storm information lines are staffed either around the clock or for extended hours during serious weather conditions.

Action for Boston Community Development (ABCD) has been awarded a federal grant of approximately \$900,000 by the State Executive Office of Communities and Development. The grant will fund the Heating Energy Assistance Retrofit Task Weatherization Assistance Program (HEARTWAP).

ABCD is one of twenty-six agencies in Massachusetts receiving a share of a \$6 million energy conservation budget to finance heating system improvements for low-income households receiving government benefits to help pay some of the cost of heating their homes this winter.

Last year, ABCD served approximately 3,500 low-income households participating in the HEARTWAP Program. Services varied depending upon the results of a heating system evaluation. Many clients were provided with routine home heating system maintenance, including cleaning, tuneup, and system evaluation. Others received minor and in some cases major repairs for their heating systems.

"We encourage all energy consumers who are low-income to contact ABCD to find out if they qualify for services provided by any one of the energy programs that the agency offers," stated Amy Anthony, Secretary of the Executive Office of Communities and

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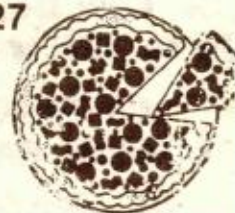

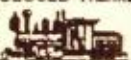

Homeowners are expected to pay an average increase of 7.5 percent over last year.
