

FDITORIAL

'And Solomon, my son, learn to know the God of your ancestors intimately. Worship and serve him with your whole heart and a willing mind. For the LORD sees every heart and knows every plan and thought. If you seek him, you will find him. But if you forsake him, he will reject you forever."

In the NLT version, David urges Solomon to learn to know the God of his ancestors intimately. Other versions talk of 'God of thy father'. David had learned to know God and had reaped a bounty harvest from that knowledge and relationship. He wanted nothing less for his son.

Interestingly knowing God is something that is learned. It does not just happen. It takes time and dedication in building that relationship, seeking God in prayer, listening to Him, reading His word. What am I putting into this relationship? It is only after knowing Him intimately that we are able to worship Him and serve Him with all our hearts and a 'willing mind' as David instructs Solomon.

We may be able to put on masks and fool man (indeed many have done so successfully) but the LORD sees every heart and knows every plan and thought. In essence David was telling Solomon 'the Lord sees you in every aspect: your heart, your plans and your thoughts. You cannot be fake with Him.' Therefore, if we are in His service, we need to serve Him with all we have and the truth is He is there to walk with us.

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For the last two days my heart has been warmed greatly as my colleagues have shared individually their experience visiting one of Kenya's maximum prisons: Manyani. As you will see in their stories, it was a great opportunity to show love and to serve but it must always start with knowing the one we serve, because we serve as His representatives. We need to know Him so as to love and serve Him.

The judge gave me a Life Sentence but God made it 10 years

It's always the desire and wish of every suspect in courtroom that the judgment will find them innocent and even if found guilty the sentence wouldn't deny them freedom for long. Just try and imagine the thoughts you would have when you stand at the dock and the judge says ".....I here hereby find you guilty and sentence you to life imprisonment."

Well this not fiction but the real life testimony of Manyani Maximum Prison Mass Choir leader brother Mwacharo Mzee Movee. Who more than five years ago was sentenced to life imprisonment and at that moment thought all was lost.

Born and brought up in the coastal town of Mombasa Mr Mwacharo Mzee Movee was arrested and found guilty of having a sexual relationship with an underage girl, that earned him sentence of life imprisonment on a defilement charge according to the Kenyan Law.

At that time he was 27 years and when it dawned on him that he was going to spend the rest of his life in prison, he knew he was doomed and there would be no one to give him back his freedom till he dies. He regretted what he had done but it was too late. He was moved to Shimo La Tewa Prison.

Its while he was at Shimo La Tewa that God sent the right people to encourage and give him hope that as much as he thought he was in captivity he would get freedom if he decided to follow Jesus. Although he could witness the joy the believers had he still resisted the attempts to make him become a believer, but they persisted. He later decided to appeal his sentence just to try and redeem his freedom. In that process of appeal he presented this as a prayer need to the believers and that marked the beginning of his walk with Christ.

He would join them in praise and worship session and its here that God led him to discover that he had a talent in singing and dancing and as he praised the Lord, he prayed over his appeal.

It successfully went through and the Court of Appeal reduced the sentence from life imprisonment to 10 years (in prison a day has 12 hours). "This was God telling me that I am forgiven and calling me to serve him in and outside the prison. I am free both in out" he boldly testified.

He joined Shimo la Tewa choir and later he was transferred to Manyani prison. He was sad that he was going to miss his brothers but was delighted that he was going with Christ and indeed he had Christ in him. When He arrived at Manyani he found that they also had a Mass Choir but not as strong as the one he was came from. As the Bible says in Roman 8:28- And we know that God causes all things to work together for good to those who love God, to those who are called according to His purpose. Mr Movee would later on become the leader of the Mass Choir, a Preacher and a pillar of encouragement to his fellow inmates.

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When Trans World Radio Kenya teamed up with SIFA FM Voi to the prison mission, it had never anticipated that it would get a well organized and prepared team that would lead in Praise and Worship. At one point during the planning we had thought of inviting a gospel artist to accompany them. Somewhere along the way, the thought was dropped and we later came to realize that God had already prepared a team.

Despite the challenges like getting time for practice, instruments and the continuous replacement of members due prisoners transfer program, they have already prepared an album of 8 songs but they have not found a sponsor to assist them produce the songs but still trust that all shall be well.

He is very grateful that the prison management through their Chaplain Reverend Daniel Nzalu have also been very generous to them and occasionally lends them the P.A system and Piano. Although they are old and faulty they still find joy in using them as they know whom they are using it to glorify. They have also had to improvise a speaker by cutting a hole on two 20 liters jerry cans and strategically placing them on the roof rails just to boost the sound output.

As we concluded our interview so that he doesn't miss the day's sermon being delivered by Through The Bible - Swahili (Neno Litaendelea) Pastor Geoffrey Wanjala Munialo it dawned on me that certainly you can be physically imprisonment and still free in Christ Jesus our Lord.

We would like to share our appreciations to Kim Fay Company limited who ensured that each of the 975 inmates get a tissue Paper, African Gospel Church, African Inland Church Langata, All Saints Cathedral Missions Department and Trans World Radio Kenya for also ensuring the inmates get bar Soap each, bibles and devotional materials, cooking oil and baking flours. We cannot forget to thank the Management of Mayani including the prison's Deputy Officer in charge Mr Titus Musyoka who was also grateful that for the first time in his life he was going to own a Bible thanks to Trans World Radio Kenya.

We also thank our brothers in Christ for the welcome and it was a big lesson on our walk with Christ as we able to see through the faces of those who had Christ and those who didn't albeit in the same environment and we hope that God will provide for their needs and as Movee finishes his sentence early next year, he requested that we all commit him to the Lord that he will continue fully serve Him and the society will accept him back just as Christ has.

We would like to conclude by a brief in the prison, Manyani is located around 40 Km away from Voi town on the Tsavo West National Park and it was used as a detention center during the pre and post independence period to withhold political detainees and freedom fighters. It served as a good strategic detention center as any prisoner who tried to escape would be eaten by wild animals like lions also referred to as the Man Eaters of Tsavo. According to the Prison's Chaplain currently the prison has 236 inmates who are born again, 72 of them got saved while in prison, 36 of them were believers who had backslidden before they were jailed, 60 of them are in the process of giving their life to Christ and 22 are attending Baptism classes.

A Defugee Ministering To Defugees

"We were chased from our country, Southern Sudan and came to Kenya as refugees, some of our relatives and friends were killed in cold blood and this was as a result of the civil war that targeted our tribe "Nuer" because we were

considered renegade to the government." This is how Reverend John Jiath Lew starts his story. He is from Upper Nile State in Southern Sudan but currently is based in Kenya. He is a reverend with the Presbyterian Church of Southern Sudan and working with Words of Hope Ministry, a partnering ministry of TWR Kenya.

The 56 year old Reverend, graduated from Giffen Bible School in Malakal, Southern Sudan in 1991 and later joined Carlile College in Nairobi Kenya in 2000. He however, returned to his home country in 2002 for lack of college fees. God came through for him later in 2004 and he managed to return to Kenya and continued with his studies and graduated.

He went back to Southern Sudan and the joined Presbyterian Church where he was ordained as a pastor from 2004 to July 2015.

Due to the heightened civil unrest in his country, Reverend John fled to Ethiopia as a refugee and it is from Ethiopia where he was brought to Kenya with the help of his church. Despite the fact that he is a refugee in Kenya, he has not shielded away from spreading the gospel. His faith and passion to God stands strong and is highly admirable. As he was narrating to me his ordeal, I reminisced the words by Criss Jami, in her book Venus in Arms"Faithfulness imparts God's reason for all circumstances. No matter what the world says or does, losing is no longer an option." Reverend John is now ministering to Nuer refugees through words of hope ministry at TWR Kenya. He records messages

of hope at TWR which are then broadcasted by BHB radio in Lokichoggio.

He is not short of words to thank TWR – Kenya; "We are much grateful to TRANS World Radio Kenya for giving my friend Moses Gat Bell and I this opportunity and also allowing us to work from here". He acknowledged boldly.

And Michael Bassey Johnson quote comes to mind that, "there are better people in the world, do not let the worst do the worst to you; you deserve the best in life." Even as he preaches the gospel of peace, he is a man who has lost alot in conflict.

He says, "My property was destroyed, my houses were burnt down, some of my relatives and friends lost their lives in the heinous incidence, we fled and walked very long distances to secure ourselves. We saw people being killed which was traumatizing."

But he counts it all joy knowing that God will never give him more than he can handle. He is grateful that he is safe and he can provide for his family even though difficult.

Reverend John profoundly misses his friends and relatives as some were displaced and others killed in the war. He fondly remembers his colleague, Reverend Simon Nyang' Lam who was killed in Juba town. Unfortunately civil unrest in Africa is all too common. Many countries have had destabilized peace environment, Burundi being the most recent. People have lost lives, others displaced and property destroyed.

Reverend John extends his sympathy and prayer to Burundi and her people. He encourages the affected that God will compensate them extensively.

He urges Africans and their leaders to embrace unity, peace and love through reconciliation and collective responsibility. And this responsibility he says has to be between the state and the church.

"Conflicts should be resolved on a round table instead of killing people because no one can replace them" he says emphatically, "The leaders should listen to the church".

He hopes that his country will experience peace and he will go back and serve his people. Whatever has a beginning must have an end.

The tides might get stronger and the sea might be so rough however by the hand of God we shall sail. Reverend John is serving God regardless of the hardships that come along with being a refugee. Any weapon planned against us shall not prosper in whichever situation we are in because in Psalms 146; 9, LORD watches over the foreigners and sustains the fatherless and the widow, but He frustrates the ways of the wicked.

One on One with Loma Kizito

For almost five years now Trans World Radio Kenya have been promoting healthy living In Soroti Uganda through Etop Radio in English and in two other local dialects through a partnership with Netherlands' based MFS II project. We recently caught up with the team leader during a visit and granted us a one on one interview

Writer- Who is Kizito and what do you to for Trans World Radio Kenya?

Kizito- My Name is Loma Kizito Maruk and am 31 years old blessed family man with one daughter and presenter cum producer for ETOP Radio. About my role for TWR, am the Team leader for Your Health programs running on Etop Radio.

How and when did you start doing the health programs?

Etop management informed me in 2010 that I was going to be the head of new health programs done in English and in Ateso and N'karamojong dialects sponsored by T WR Kenya. I was a bit nervous because there was a specific format in which the programs were to run. I was relieved when I was told that I was going to be trained by Trans World Radio Kenya in Nairobi then come back and train other producers.

So how was your experience in Nairobi and coming back to train others?

Wow! Am really grateful for that opportunity, I met experienced producers who really took me through various production techniques, I learnt a lot and met friendly people other than getting an opportunity to

tour Nairobi. After that trip I came back rejuvenated and armed with vast knowledge. Trained my team of five producers and am glad they grasped quickly and were already eagerly waiting for the roll out.

On a general perspective do you think you have made any impact to the Community?

Generally speaking I would say the program came at the right time and it has made a tremendous impact, not only to the community but also to us the producers. You see Soroti is one of the areas greatly affected by HIV and this had even prompted

the government to shortly sponsor awareness campaigns on radio. Although I don't have the statistics with me here but am sure when you talk to the AIDS Commission you will be told that AIDS awareness is effectively running in Soroti and people are getting more informed. Thanks to the different and more direct format that TWR introduced to us on program presentation. But a lot still needs to be done to reduce the high prevalence rate here.

As one of the producers has the program had any impact on producers?

As one of the producers other than expanding our knowledge on HIV, we have also become the town celebrities and always receive appreciations wherever we introduce ourselves. Initially we used to struggle to get people to interview in the programs but currently it has been the other way round as most people call to find how they can be involved. You see success has many friends. Some of our producers have been consultants to some Non Governmental Organizations doing health research.

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Since you also handle responses do you have that particular feedback that you would say really touched you after reading?

I have many but there is this particular a listener who wrote to appreciate the program because he reconciled with his wife back after listening to the program, they had broken up because of an alleged unfaithfulness in the marriage. I was happy when the man said the first condition was to go for a HIV test together. Other than this I am always very delighted to read feedbacks from pastors because the Church has also been our key target audience.

What challenges have you faced?

Other than production challenges, we have also occasionally encountered life threatening challenges for example I was once attacked by an old man when I went to interview him about sex, thankfully my contact link was there and we explained to him why its important to get his opinion and he understood. Since we have a community that has different tribes with different cultures, sometimes it's challenging for a producer to do a topic that is conflicting with the culture. Another challenge we mostly get is sometimes you go for an interview and the situation of the interviewee is so appalling but you are limited on how you can help. Soroti is also a rural area and the roads are not in good condition and this hinders accessibility

The MFS II project is ending this year and that means that TWR will no longer be sponsoring programs, what your take and your closing remarks?

Looking back it's very sad that we will have end the programs at this stage, its not easy to let go something you have grown attached to just like that. I don't know what we will tell our loyal listeners. Some of the producers were earning their living from the production. It's very hard and we hope TWR and MFS may reconsider another project for Soroti. A lot still needs to be done here to promote healthy living

In conclusion I would like to pass my gratitude to ETOP and TWR for this opportunity to serve the community. I have had a good exposure. Special thanks to Your Health team members who include Akia Stella, Okotel Jonathan and Martha Akure who produce Angaleu kon (Ateso dialect), Stella and Becky doing English and Caro Icumar who assist's me to produce in Akoni Ngaleu (N'Karamojong in dialect)

Morning Drayers Endearing Beyond Christians



It was of those afternoons I decided to take a routine saunter, and decided to pass by Mkunguni a common meeting point in Lamu. As usual I met people chatting and from a distance I spotted an

adherent fan who is also the chairman of Sifa FM Lamu fans club Mr. Zacharia Joel Mzee commonly referred to as Mzee Zachariah chatting with two other fans.

There is no way I could have passed them without greetings, I went ahead and it was like I had come at the right time judging from the excited greetings and immediately I was invited into their conversation, yes they were talking about the impact the SIFA FM dawn prayers are having. "Even non Christians are listening and talking about the prayers." Mr. Zachariah said as his friends echoed.

The statement catapulted my eagerness to a great height and it prompted me to invite him for a one on one talk so that he would share with me the talk of the town. Just to tell you more about him, Mzee Zachariah is a married man who is blessed with four children. At 56 years he is already a proud grandfather of two grandchildren and he lives in Mukowe, Lamu's main land.

Fast forward, Mzee Zachariah visited the station to continue with the story and he begun by sharing how one day as he was going on with his work in the island, got a surprise call from his first born son who is a civil servant.

The son informed him that his colleague from another religion had assembled them to a corner and excitedly started to play the SIFA morning prayers that he had recorded that morning on his cell phone. That morning Mzee Zachariah had called the Station to do the 5 AM prayers.

"I now realize that the airtime was not wasted, my son told me that his friend told him that he was in the bathroom and when I started praying, he recognized my voice, left the bathroom and immediately started recording my prayer. He was excited about the prayers and even asked my son whether I am a pastor." Mzee Zachariah explained.

This was not the first time, as he remembers how one day after praying for peace and families on air, he went on with his work at the Ministry of Forestry, friends who recognized his voice stopped to thank him for the morning prayers and it inspired him that even non Christians came to thank him for having prayed. "They were all happy to hear me pray for them on air and appreciated that I pray without discrimination. Some even ask me to mention their names during greetings sessions. "He added. When asked what it means for him as the chairman for non Christians to embrace the hourly prayers he says "You see people weren't used to praying on air and thought its not normal, but now they have realized that it's important and they are happy that we pray for our needs on air. It's also good for our friends to know that we are not just Sunday worshippers but we can also pray anytime."

As we concluded Mzee Zachariah appreciated SIFA for the extensive coverage of local news adding that this has earned SIFA many listeners. He is also grateful for active and silent listeners especially the non-Christians and prays that Sifa Lamu will extend its coverage to reach the entire costal counties so that even listeners who relocate from Lamu continue to listen.

Recently in November the program's host Samwel Mkare received a no ordinary adherent fan of the program that prompted us to share the encounter. He hosted Dhahabu Simba, a twelve years old girl who is the first born child to Mr Simba Kahindi and Mrs Faith Mae.

At first sight, she may give you an impression of a shy girl but if you start a conversation, you will be amazed by her confidence and knowledge in both spiritual and education matters and her favorite subjects are Christian Religious Education and Science.

When you ask her about what she would like to be in future, she categorically replies, "I want to be a Sunday school teacher," and even when you try persuading her to other careers she is not afraid to repeat her choice. I then ask her what is that drives her to want to be a teacher she says "I want to help these children who just wander in the streets and don't know about God and those who are not well behaved. I will help them by teaching them the word of God. There are some who come to church but they don't know what they are following while others just come to church to be seen or to buy snacks with the offering money given to them by their parents."

Watoto wa Sifa program usually invites a Sunday school teacher but on this day of her visit, the teacher didn't show up and the presenter dared Dhahabu to be the teacher. She readily accepted and recapped what the teacher had taught them in the previous program word by word. She even framed her own bible quiz, which is used to gauge who the next guest to show will be. That is how Dhahabu had made it to be a guest.

But that was not all, after she was done with the Bible trivia; she started asking current affairs questions that even children older than her couldn't answer correctly. She was running the show. She attributes all these knowledge to school, church and home.

Dhahabu couldn't hide her excitement of having the opportunity to teach her fellow children. She advises them to always listen to Sifa FM especially Watoto wa Sifa show.

"I am happy to be here and to even teach my fellow children. I love Watoto Wa Sifa because it has a lot of good Bible teachings. Through this program I have learnt a lot about Christ and I also like learning from other listeners who call in the show. I urge other children to keep listening to the program so that they can be taught." She explains.

My Manyani Prison Experience - Testimonies



Linah Kitala - My only experience with prison, prisoners and prison life has only been through movies, but I am glad that Manyani Maximum prison visit gave me a real life experience. I was ready for the visit but upon arrival got very anxious, so many things run across my mind, I wondered whether I will be safe, how the day would go, how the prisoners will react upon seeing us.

As we approached the area where the prisoners hall something changed. The atmosphere was so different; I could feel God's presence. I could not hold back the tears as they led us through the worship session. I was touched by the freedom of worship I was witnessing.

Though in prison physically, their Spirits were free and they reminded me of the scripture where Christ says that he has come that we may be free and free indeed. The prisoners within the hall had excited faces with honest smiles.

They danced and praised the lord with vigour as they knew for a fact who they were praising. The story was totally different outside the hall. Other prisoners whom we had also met on our way in looked as though life had been drawn out of them despite being able to breathe. They looked gloomy and scary, indeed a direct contrast from those we were with in the hall. Even the warders kept a close hawk eye watch as the ones we had in the hall just sat looking relaxed.

It was amazing to watch them use their talents in a good way as we listened to their Mass Choir and watched them act a drama on effects of drug abuse. Manyani helped me value the blessings I have in my life, made me realize how freedom is a privilege. Helped value the freedom we receive in Christ upon accepting him as our Lord and Saviour. Truly I saw the redemption of Christ and the power of salvation.

I can say Manyani made me realize that the worst prison in life is not the one where criminals are kept so as to pay for their mistakes but the worst prison in life is when one never gets to experience the fullness of God and his saving grace. It reminded me of Luke 4: 18- 19. "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor. He has sent me to heal the broken hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind. To set at liberty those who are oppressed. To proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord."

My prayer is all of us will experience the healing of our broken hearts, no longer be captives, will recover our sight and be set free from our oppression as I saw manifested in Manyani among the prisoners who had a connection with Christ.



Hellen Ogore - Visiting the Manyani Maximum Prison was very poignant. It was my first time life experience. As the program of the day progressed, I clearly noted a distinction between two categories of prisoners. There were those who were profoundly praying, praising and dancing for Jesus and it was evident that they have a personal relationship with God as you could easily see that the group is actually dancing for someone they value so much.

The other category were outside and their faces were very unpleasant and I would get scared when we had an eye contact. They looked dejected albeit in the same environment with those in the hall. This mission opened up my spiritual eye, and realised two groups literally need prayers. The group that loves the Lord needs God to strengthen and rejuvenate them everyday with wisdom so that they are able to live together and inspire this other serious group which also needs prayers for God to save them and have hope for tomorrow. I have taken it upon me to always pray for these two groups and am convinced this could be the reason God allowed me be part of the mission to the prison. I really thank God for the chance.

My Manyani Prison Experience - Testimonies



Ann Koki - My prayer every morning when I wake up is that God will open my eyes to the work of His hands. I love living in the noticing; searching and meeting God in the mundane things of life because this is how I'm always reminded that God is ever close as the breath under my nose. And so when I joined my colleagues in the mission to Manyani prison, I

thought it would not be just an office's mission trip, but a journey that will be an altar for me to meet Him. When we drove in through the prison's gates, my heart was met by an intense feeling of banishment that permeated the prison sphere. This was a place where hundreds of men were incarcerated, facing with their hearts, minds, bodies, and lives, the consequences of their criminal offences. Some were guilty, others innocent.

As we approached the hall where a section of the inmates were worshipping, I could feel intense layers of fear and pity that filling the air, getting thicker as we passed through throngs of disconsolate inmates and I would a shiver if we had a direct eye contact despite the fact that were had armed warders around us . But getting into the half walked walled hall, I got a huge sign of relief and within seconds I had forgotten the outside experience, we found them in the middle of worship. It was gloriously exhilarating with voices rising higher and higher in unison as they moved in unified dances. Faces sparked with sincere smile, my heart was moved and tears could not be restrained.

Our voices joined theirs in lifting praise and worship to the Holy One, redeemed hearts poured out, hands lifted high and tears flowing freely. What moved me the most was how these incarcerated brothers were fully surrendering their hearts to God.

Some of them were serving life sentences, but it did not deter them. Jesus was their life and hope regardless of the circumstances. That was enough! Their testimonies were soul refreshing and their zeal for God abounding. This really re-oriented my perspective about life. It opened my eyes to the things that are of arrant worth in life; peace, joy, and love. And only Jesus can give these. I may be walking freely outside prison walls, but my heart can be trapped in agony and restlessness. That day I knew not to take God's mercy and grace for granted. That I should learn to give thanks in everything because this is the key to joy, as those inmate brothers taught me that day. They reminded me that when you have Jesus, you have life and life eternal. That is all, and that is enough. Jesus' love and grace shatters walls and Levels Mountains to fill the hearts that welcome Him. Incarcerated or free, we are all the same in Him.

And our voices and laughter that were in one accord that day, as we worshipped and danced to our King reflected the oneness that we are in Him. I left that prison with so much of Jesus. My heart was so full. It still is. I will forever be grateful to Jesus for meeting me in the faces and hearts of those Manyani brothers.



Stella Kimuyu - This was my first ever real life experience in prison. As we walked from the gate I felt some how uncomfortable. I had missed the final brief on the dress code and although the team had been informed that it okay for ladies to be in loose trousers, I still felt bothered that I was not in a long dress.

Since I had been informed that most the inmates had been accused of rape and we were nine females and nine males, I had foreshadowed that as we walked we would experience lots of lecherous stares and whistles. Oh, I was completely wrong. I was greatly stunned when we entered the half walled hall and the inmates welcomed us with great jubilation as others were worshipping God with honest great passion. Some were kneeling; others let the tears roll freely as they passionately prayed. I felt I was in the right place. As I settled the spirit led me to the book of Luke 7:38-50, where the sinful woman who broke an alabaster jar of perfume, and she wet Jesus' feet with her tears wiped His feet with her hair and poured perfume.

As the Pharisee thought that Jesus did know who the woman was.

Jesus' response in verse 47 really dawned on me "I tell you, her sins and they are many have been forgiven, so she has shown me much love. But a person who is forgiven little shows only little love."

At that point I asked God for forgiveness, forgot that I was in jeans and joined my brothers in the intense praise and worship. I realized that we have been redeemed with the precious blood of Jesus regardless of what we did.

These men are in prison because they broke the laws of the land but they have been forgiven and are free in their spirits because they have accepted Jesus Christ as their personal saviour while in prison.

- 5. Our events and programs for 2016 will happen according to his will.

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
