

Aubrey Gamble, 1997 Craig Graduate

Aubrey graduated from Craig High in 1997 and never looked back. She had applied to Stanford University and with-

out ever visiting the school, accepted her place in the graduating class of 2001. While at Stanford she enjoyed the social life everyone told her she was sure to leave behind while getting a double major in Human Biology and Psychology.

Among the elite, she didn't get straight A's anymore but accepted this fact in exchange for the life experiences she was enjoying and the lifelong friendships she was gaining. Aubrey found a home away from home among the close-knit Native community at Stanford and volunteered at the powwow each year. One summer she spent at the University of Hawai'i, where she fell in love with the Aloha spirit.

After graduation and a Hum Bio internship, Aubrey was invited to join the staff at the Bing Nursery School, Stanford's laboratory preschool where she taught children ages 2-5. Deciding to move closer to home, Aubrey moved to Seattle where she decided to become a professional Nanny for boy-girl twins. For five fabulous years, Aubrey helped raise these children and was fortunate to travel with this family to London, Paris and Vienna. She decided it was time for a change and took advantage of living in the Camden neighborhood of London, with a friend she met on these trips, for 6 months.

Once her time was up abroad, she decided she would move to one of her favorite places in the world, Hawai'i. There she found a job working at the harbor, which made her happy and reminded her of home in many ways. While here, Aubrey decided to go back into the teaching field. After a few months, she realized that being in the education field would require more education so she was welcomed back to teach at Bing Nursery School while she worked on her Master's in Education at San Francisco State University. Every possible break she would travel, usually to Hawai'i but once to New Zealand.



Most recently, she became a mother to her son Kaikoa Tzintzuni who will be 16 months this May. This again prompted a move closer to family so his grandparents could enjoy their first grandchild. Aubrey is currently happy being a mom and working miscellaneous stay at home jobs, still in the education field. Her days include story time at the library, afternoons at the Children's Museum, walks with her husky Aloha and naps. Eventually, she will have to return to the professional working world, but has still to decide in what capacity. She knows someday she will call Hawai'i her home again, possibly with summers in Alaska so her son can pick salmonberries, wrestle with the halibut, see the eagles soar and turn over rocks on the beach looking for crabs. Her dreams still include becoming a writer and learning how to make her dad's smoked salmon.

Aubrey hopes students who read this realize that taking risks and following your dreams are important parts of growing up. We all will fail sometimes, but you will never know what you can accomplish unless you just try. Don't be afraid to ask for help, and try new things and be imperfect. People might discourage you out of their own fear, but you never know where your path will take you unless you start walking: navigating the potholes, detours, obstacles and unexpected adventures! Get out there, experience life and remember you can always return home! Your community supports and believes in you, just as the Chamber of Commerce and everyone else did for me so many years ago! I truly appreciate everyone there who helped make me who I am today.



The University of Alaska Fairbanks and the University of the Arctic are pleased to announce *The Arctic Broadband Forum 2017* which will be held in Fairbanks, Alaska, USA, May 8-9, 2017

The Arctic Broadband Forum will bring together educators, researchers, and industry from across the world to discuss the challenges, successes, and potential of telecommunications and broadband deployment in



the Arctic. Specific emphasis will be placed on the role of broadband and digital technologies on the cultural preservation and self-determination of indigenous populations throughout the Arctic.

A wide-range of presenters from across the Arctic, including Canada, Finland, and the U.S will provide presentations and lead discussion on topics relating to broadband. The sessions are as diverse as the Arctic itself and run the gamut from how broadband is changing lives in the Arctic to the challenges of implementing telehealth in northern Canada to public-private partnerships to the continued role of satellite technology in the

Arctic. The Forum will also feature several panel discussions: How Broadband is Changing Lives in the Arctic, Indigenous Perspectives and The Government's Role in Broadband Development in the Arctic. We are still confirming panel membership, but attendees won't be disappointed.

- 6. But he's a cop, servicemember, firefighter, etc.
- 7. You really need to be stronger and figure this out.
- 8. Why haven't you figured out how to help him stop his behavior?
- 9. What kind of parent do you think you are if you're exposing your kids to this?
- 10. Are you sure that's what actually happened?
- 11. He hasn't hit you, so it's probably just normal relationship stuff.
- 12. Why don't you go to the police? If you really wanted it to stop you would.
- 13. You need to stop thinking about this so much and letting it define you.
- 14. It can't be that bad if you keep going back.
- 15. Why don't you fight back?
- 16. He's not really going to kill you.


Southeast Conference March Meeting report from Shelly Wright
