

Each family honored at the Dedication Ceremony had either a member of the family or a friend who spoke in behalf of their honored loved ones.

Their remarks we believe are worthy of printing so as to capture the spirit of this impressive ceremony and its significance to those present.

Ronan Fitzpatrick representing the Quinn family made the following observations:

As General MacArthur took his final review parade at West Point he said to the cadets assembled "Duty, honor, country - those three hallowed words reverently dictate what you ought to be, what you can be and what you will be. They are your rallying points; to build courage, when courage seems to fail; to regain faith when there seems to be little cause for faith, to create hope when hope becomes forlorn."

Today as we dedicate the Lt. Michael P. Quinn Athletic Complex we had in him the man that most typified those remarks. The eldest child of Mary V. and the late Leo F. Quinn, Mike enjoyed his athletics in this proud community. From the early days of sand lot football and hockey, to his supervision of recreation at the Barry Playground, also known as the Oilie's. Mike loved his Charlestown. Attending St. Francis De Sales School, Mike obtained great grades, leading to his acceptance at Boston Latin School. His interest in sports CYO and unorganized sand lot teams continued and grew at Latin School. Playing defense on the hockey team and guard and linebacker on the football team. He was all City 1963-64 in both sports. His career was topped off with the awarding of the Patrick Thomas Campbell award for excellence in Gridiron Club in 1963 for excellence in scholarship,

leadership and football prowess. Mike's talent was recognized, and he entered Holy Cross on a four year scholarship in Sept. 1964. Once again he met with success in both football and hockey, Co-Captaining the Varsity Hockey Squad. While at Holy Cross Mike enrolled in ROTC receiving his Marine Commission upon graduation coupled with a Bachelor Degree in May, 1968.

Perfection was his goal, but humility his standard. Advancing to Quantico, Va., Mike distinguished himself once again graduating first in his class. Quohog as we nicknamed him shipped off to Vietnam in December, '68 to serve his Country which he truly loved. Recognized for his leadership skills and initiative, he was promoted to executive officer in 1969. It was not unusual for Mike to risk his life for his men, as he did many times. On a patrol 30 miles South of Da Nang on 8/29/69 Mike was killed in combat. His men risked their lives for eight hours that night bringing Lt. Mike to friendly lines. A Purple Heart was posthumously awarded to Mike, and given to his parents in 1970 down the street at the Navy Yard.



Since that date we have awarded \$6375 to the fine youth of Charlestown for their college career.

To the Beckwith, Boucher, Kelley, Keating, Kelley and Powers families, and the families of the other Charlestown Veterans remembered today I feel the following remarks must be instilled in us.

Though last to sight, to memory dear thou ever wilt remain, One only hopes our hearts can cheer, the hope to meet again.

In conclusion, a crusader, a Marine and always a Townie Lt. Michael Quinn must not be forgotten. He has left us his death as an example of noble courage, a memorial of virtue not only unto young men but unto all his nation.

H. Vincent Strout made the following remarks in behalf of the Kelley brothers:

For a few brief moments we assemble this afternoon to dedicate this athletic complex, and particulaly this gymnasium, to two sons of this town who offered their lives in the service of our Country and who made the ultimate sacrifice.

This community, the Mother of Boston, has witnessed the departure of her sons and daughters to war in all the conflicts in which this Nation has been engaged. In a then bucolic setting, the Town Fathers laid out the Training Field, still preserved, for the military training of the townsmen. The very ground of which this complex is sited was consecrated 204 years ago by the blood of those gallant Americans who repelled two furious onslaughts by British Grenadiers and Light Infantry at the rail fence.

Many of this town's sons and daughters have paid the supreme sacrifice in defense of America's freedom. Today we dedicate this Gymnasium in honor of Staff Sergeant James P. Kelley and PFC Daniel A. Kelley, U.S. Marine Corps; two of seven brother sons of Michael and Mary Kelley who answered their country's call to the colors.

Jim and Dan Kelley were born in this community and educated in its schools. Jim Kelley enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps prior to Pearl Harbor. In the finest tradition of the Marine Corps and its motto, Semper Fidelis, he died a hero on the night of November 28, 1942 in

the most horrendous catastrophe in the history of Boston, the Coconut Grove fire. After helping a number of people to safety, he reentered the Coconut Grove to search for a fellow Marine and perished in the attempt.

Inspired by his brother's heroism and sacrifice, Dan Kelley enlisted in the Marine Corps as soon as old enough in June 1944. After six months of basic training he departed for overseas and was killed in action at Iwo Jima, a battle first impressed on the American memory by the unforgettable photograph of the raising of the American flag on Mt. Suribachi and now perpetuated forever in bronze by the Marine Corps memorial in Arlington, Virginia.

While we publicly honor Jim and Dan Kelley this afternoon, we commit to your prayers their brother George, a classmate of mine, a stellar athlete at Charlestown High School and Captain of the Track Team who served in the China-Burma theatre in World War II and who passed away on September 7th.

Speaking for the Kelley family, their relatives and friends, it is with pride and honor that we gather here. We

do so in obedience to the commandment expressed in the Second Book of Maccabees. "It is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead." We pray not only for Jim and Dan Kelley whom we honor by dedicating this gymnasium but also for Mike Quinn, Tom Beckwith, Joe Boucher, Francis Powers and Jeff Keating in whose honor the other sections of this athletic complex are dedicated. We particularly pray that the memory of those in whose honor this complex is dedicated will serve as an inspiration to all the youth of this Community and this City, black and white, Americans all, who strive here in athletic competition rather than struggle on a foreign soil in mortal combat.

Jim Conway in speaking for the Powers Family mentioned that Captain Francis E. Powers, Jr. U.S. Army, was killed in action in Vietnam on Monday, October 12, 1970 by hostile enemy mortar fire while serving his second tour of duty in Vietnam. Two days prior to his death, on Saturday, October 10, 1970, he received his second bronze star for valor.

A third bronze star for action on October 12, 1970 was awarded posthumously to the family of Captain Powers.

Francis E. "Red" Powers, Jr. was the oldest of the seven children of Francis and Mary Powers. He grew up on Decatur Street, Charlestown in the Charlestown Housing Project and attended nearby St. Catherine's Grammar School

In his teens "Red" was a member of the YMCA, and the Boys' Club. He swam on the championship swim team of the Boys' Club and was an outstanding baseball player all through high school.

In 1952, at the age of 17, he entered the U.S. Army and made it his career. While stationed overseas, he was a member of the European Baseball All-Star Team.

In 1964, "Red" Powers had successfully risen to the rank of Technical Sergeant in the Strategic Air Command, Airborn Division. In July of 1968, he volunteered for his first tour of duty in Vietnam.

On July 16, 1969, "Red" Powers received his first bronze star for valor in ground operations against hostile forces. During this tour of duty in Vietnam, "Red" received a field commission as First Lieutenant and shortly thereafter he received the air medal for meritorious achievement while participating in aerial combat.

One year later, with the rank of Captain, he volunteered for his second tour of duty in Vietnam, arriving there on August 30, 1970.

Captain Francis Powers was the highest ranking officer from Charlestown killed in the Vietnam conflict.

Captain Francis E. "Red" Powers, who died nine years ago at the age of 36 was a typical product of Charlestown. He was a "True Townie" who was proud of his community, was actively involved in sports and was willing to lay down his life - make the supreme sacrifice for the

country he loved.

In my youth, I delivered newspapers to the Powers' home and first met "Red" who was five years my junior. Later, I employed him as a newspaper boy for Conway News.

He was a conscientious, energetic boy who pitched in to make a few dollars to supplement the family income, he being the oldest of the seven children.

Charlestown is richer for having known Captain Francis E. "Red" Powes, U.S. Army.

I would like to close my remarks by reading to you a poem written by his mother, Mary Powers, and first read at a Square Dedication in honor of Powers on April 19, 1971.

TO A FALLEN HERO IN VIETNAM

No more tears to be shed No more words left unsaid. With silver and bronze stars and other citations, We are now left with a sad realization In a world that positively wreaks He has found everlasting peace.

Charlestown Firefighters Thomas Beckwith and Joseph Boucher died heroically fighting the Hotel Vendome Fire. Representing Boston Firefighter Beckwith was his daughter Karen who made the following remarks:

My father, Tommy Beckwith was born and brought up in Charlestown. He played football for Charlestown High School and also played for the TOWNIES football team for quite a few years. My family and I are very proud and honored to have this football field named in behalf of my father. He was a member of the Boston Fire Department, stationed here in Charlestown at Engine 32. I know my father would have been proud to receive an honor like this. His fellow brothers of the Boston Fire Department share in our thoughts to know one of their own is receiving a great honor in the town which he admired so much. I'd like to take this opportunity to thank everyone involved for making this event possible!


Mrs. Katherine Boucher, wife of Firefighter Joe Boucher summed up her feelings in the following brief but poignant remarks:

As I stand here today, I can't help but think that Joe would be proud to have this football field named in his honor. He loved football as much as he loved Charlestown and as a TOWNIE, he brought the strength and courage he showed as a football player to the City as a Firefighter. On behalf of Joe, our son Joey and myself, I thank you all for this lasting Memorial.

Jeff Keating's son Jack made the following remarks concerning his dad:

In reading the general invitation letter for this dedication ceremony, it mentioned a fitting tribute to a dedicated teacher... Jeff Keating was that, but also one of your own, a fellow Townie.

He was born and raised on Cordis Street. They tell me



he really lived at the Boys' Club. He graduated from this High School, class of '23 and starred on the local amateur and semi-pro football and basketball teams. He returned to teach and coach at this high school for many years and was a regular attendee at the Old Charlestown Schoolboy's dinners.

He was many things to the youth of Charlestown; a respected teacher and coach; a job placement and personal counselor; and subsequent friend. Dad had more than a few jobs in his working career. He was a journeyman in the electrical trade, wading through the depression, worked in the control tower at Logan Airport, taught and coached at Charlestown, and later moved on to Beacon Street as the Director of Vocational Education for Boston Schools.

But unquestiomably, I think the years at Charlestown

High were his happiest.

Contrary to the very topical social condition of one not liking their job, Jeff Keating loved teaching and coaching at this high school. Sure, he had his ups and downs like everyone else. To listen to some accounts, Jeff Keating in a half time locker room, was like a reenactment of the Battle of Bunker Hill. Mom always said she could tell how Charlestown had fared athletically on a given day, by the sound of his footsteps coming up the front stairs. One anecdote that remains vivid in my memory concerned a conversation about 20 years ago when I was still in grammar school. Chuckie Chevalier, who most of you know played ball for Dad, was working as a summer park and recreational counselor at Rogers Park in Brighton. And one afternoon I was holding the step ladder for Chuckie while he was hooking up a basketball net. We were talking about school, and how well I did, did I like school and so forth. And also how Dad used to get after him about his own studies. And in summary fashion, Chuckie remarked "I loved your Dad....He used to beat hell out of me." This apparent contradiction was difficult for a young boy of 12 to fully comprehend, but as I grew older and I heard the same comment echoed by other former students, I began to assimilate the message...Jeff Keating taught and coached with a blend of passion, dignity, discipline, and concern.

He loved Charlestown...its youth and its people...and today is another measure of that love being returned.

So on behalf of my mother and our family, I want to convey how grateful we are to you the people of Charlestown for conveying this recognition of Jeff's contribution and your obvious feeling for him. Thank you.

The November 12th dedication ceremony will long be remembered by those who attended for it was indeed a fitting tribute to our heroic servicemen who made the supreme sacrifice, our brave firefighters who died in the line of duty and a dedicated teacher who was able to broaden the horizons for many of his students.

It was truly a proud day for Charlestown and her people.

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





Voke Files MBTA Bills

Representative Richard Voke (D-Charlestown) filed four bills for the 1980 Legislative Session aimed at bringing the Massachusetts Bay Transit Authority under greater public scrutiny.

According to the Charlestown Lawmaker, who has been an outspoken critic of the current MBTA management, his proposed legislation will increase the public's role in the decisionmaking processes of the Transit Authority

One bill will require public hearings to be held before any changes in local service are made. According to his bill, hearings must be held in the affected community so that riders there may have a say in transit decisions before they are made.

A second bill will mandate that before any fare increases are instituted, the MBTA advisory board must hold a public hearing and its members approve the proposed increases.

"Following the outrageous legal fees paid by the MBTA for work performed by a private attorney, the Authority, like other state agencies, must be compelled to have their legal contracts scrutinized by the Attorney General's office," Voke explained, adding, "I have filed a bill which will mandate the MBTA do just this.'

In a final piece of Legislation, Representative Voke will seek to change the procedure by which the MBTA's Executive Director can be removed from office. Under the current statute only the Governor may dismiss the Executive Director, but Voke's legislation will allow a threequarter vote of the Advisory Board to remove the Executive Director. "This law will give greater representative authority to the Advisory Board and the taxpayers they represent," Voke explained.

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

Mayor White Announces Unique Fuel Emergency Delivery Program

Mayor Kevin H. White today announced a unique emergency fuel delivery program for Boston residents for the balance of the winter heating season which began December 12.

The fuel program assists persons who have completely run out of home heating oil and cannot obtain fuel from their regular dealer. The service is being implemented by the Mayor's Office of Public Service in conjunction with the Massachusetts Of-

fice of Energy Resources and the Texaco Oil Company.

People who use this emergency delivery are entitled to only one time delivery of home heating oil from Texaco. Once this fuel is received they are ineligible for any further deliveries.

Residents needing assistance should contact their local Little City Hall Monday-Friday, 9 to 5. A Little City Hall coordinator will then determine if all steps have been taken by the caller to purchase fuel from his regular supplier. When this verification process is completed, a delivery of 25 gallons of heating oil from the Texaco Company will be delivered within a few hours.

Said Mayor White, "The nation is in the midst of an energy crisis and Boston like other northeast cities are the most affected. The fuel emergency program is one of the city's responses to this

"It is intended to help people through a night or weekend while they make arrangements to get a delivery from their own dealer. This service along with the city's No Heat Complaint hotline, free energy audits and winter emergency shelters will ensure that Boston residents receive aid during the harsh winter months." Mayor White continued

Unlike the ABCD fuel assistance program which pays for the fuel costs of low income families, there are no restrictions on the 25 gallon delivery. People already receiving other forms of fuel assistance can also use this service provided they are out of oil. Those using the program will be billed by Texaco and required to pay for the fuel within 30 days.

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



These are not very pleasant things to mention but we all know there are "these People" who prey on shoppers either in a large mall or small store.

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


