

Surrey Policing: Wave 2



Methodology

- Methodology/Sample: Online and phone survey of randomly-selected sample of 803 adult (18+) Canadians, of which 317 were South Asians, residing in the City of Surrey, BC
 - Online Sample = 497
 - Phone Sample = 306
- Field Window: April 17 to 27, 2020
- Reliability: Non-probability samples cannot be assigned a margin of error. *As a relative guideline, we have provided margins of error for a probability sample of this size. The margin of error for a probability sample of this size is ± 3.5%, 19 times out of 20.
- Data has been weighted by age, gender, ethnicity (South Asian), and balanced between three sub-regions based on postal code groupings, as per the latest census data to be representative of the adult population in the City of Surrey.






IMPRESSION & PRIORITIES




Surrey RCMP Officers and RCMP Management held in high regard

- Over three-quarters of Surrey residents have a favourable opinion of RCMP officers. Over half (52%) of 55+ age group have a "very favourable" impression.
- Over half (53%) of Surrey residents have an unfavourable impression of Mayor Doug McCallum.



Open End: Crime/Safety leads top-of-mind priorities

- When combined, "Keeping the RCMP", "Police/security", "Drugs/addiction", and "Gangs" account for 46% of top-of-mind mentions
- "Keeping the RCMP" was the top priority for over 1 in 5 (21%) of 55+ age group and almost 1 in 5 (19%) South Surrey residents.






9 in 10 agree that Council should step back on spending plans due to announced budget shortfall

Broad agreement among demographic groups, with intensity of agreement stronger with older residents.


Mayor and Council need to take a step back and evaluate its spending plans to ensure they are focused on the most urgent priorities





Maintain core services, protect vulnerable are much higher priorities than replacing RCMP

- Surrey residents were asked to give priority level of eight items. Six of eight were seen as top or major priorities by a majority of respondents, ranging from 61% to 85%.
- Extending Skytrain (29%) and replacing the RCMP (16%) were lowest in terms of being ranked as top/major priorities.








MAYOR'S PLAN



Almost 7 in 10 residents aware of most or some of the details of the Mayor's plan to replace the RCMP


• Familiarity increases with age, ranging from 18-34 (56%, top 2 categories) to 55+ (81%).






Opposition to replacing the RCMP now outnumbers support by almost 2:1

- Support for the Mayor's plan to replace the RCMP has dropped 17 percentage points from 48% (January) to 31% (April).
- Opposition to the Mayor's plan has increased from 46% to 60%
- Those saying they strongly support the Mayor's plan (12%) are outnumbered by those saying they strongly oppose the plan (43%), up fourteen percentage points since January.



A majority strongly support a referendum on the Mayor's plan to replace the RCMP

- About 3 in 4 Surrey residents support a referendum on the Mayor's plan, including half (50%) that strongly support a referendum.
- The intensity of support for a referendum varies among age groups from 18-34 (34% strongly support) to 55+ (64% strongly support)






MESSAGE TEST



2 in 3 strongly agree that with Coronavirus disruption, "now is not the time" to replace RCMP


- Messages concerning cost of mayor's plan, focusing on more urgent priorities, and affordability of property taxes received strong agreement of a majority of respondents, and overall agreement of over 4 in 5.
- About 3 in 4 agreed that "policing and politics" should be separate.





Messages favouring Mayor's plan received mixed response; recruitment messages were strongest


Messaging on diversity and recruiting officers that will stay in Surrey were strongest






Post-Test #1: over 3 in 4 would stay the course or retain RCMP with improvements

- Following message testing, respondents were provided with options about the Mayor's plan and asked to choose one.
- Overall, half of Surrey residents say they are satisfied with the service ... from the RCMP and want to "stay the course", while 1 in 4 have concerns but would retain the RCMP with significant improvements.
- One in 7 (14%) chose a third option which was to replace the RCMP with a municipal police force
- About half (49%) of those who supported the Mayor's plan to replace RCMP (earlier in the survey) moved to either "satisfied" (22%) or "concerns...would support retaining" (27%).




Post-Test #2: over half say the City should "scrap the idea" and 3 in 10 say hold referendum

- Respondents strongly prefer either scrapping the plan or at least holding a referendum, than moving forward with the Mayor's plan
- As with post-test #1, under 1 in 7 (13%) prefer to "move ahead" with replacing the RCMP, while a significant majority prefer other options
- Over half (51%) say City should scrap the idea highest among 55+ (59%) and females (57%), while about 3 in 10 (31%) say that the City should hold a referendum before moving ahead
