## TONGUE THRUST PROBLEMS

Every person swallows some 2,000 times a day. During that swallow, the tongue can exert one to six pounds of pressure. During the correct swallow, the tip of the tongue presses with the force slightly behind the top teeth. The main pressure of the tongue is against the strong palate. This is good.
During an incorrect swallow, the tongue force is ex erted fully against the front teeth. The teeth are not equipped to withstand this type of pressure and may be pushed out of alignment. Also, it may prevent new teeth from erupting properly
In order to correct this situation, Myofunctional Therapy (sometimes called tongue-thrust therapy) is used for both children and adults. This therapy is designed to retrain the muscles of the tongue, lips and cheeks to properly perform as to strength and place ment: to teach correct swallowing patterns; and to in still a permanent, correct swallowing pattern. Tongue thrust can be overcome, but it requires full coopera tion by the patient

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AN OPEN LETTER TO THE GLOBE The following is our letter to Martin Nolan, Editorial Page Editor of The Boston Globe, of September 6, 1982. It was not printed as a letter to the editor, nor did we receive personal response. Wonder Why? Dear Mr. Nolan:
As a member of the Steering Committee of the Political Education Committee of The Ancient Order of Hibernians, 1 wish to express my personal displeasure at your decision to allow the racial insult perpetrated upon those of Irish heritage to stand because of your selfradmitted ignorance of the leprechaun's long-standing Irish symbolism of joy and cheer.
Your adamant attitude in refusing disclaimer or apology is abhorrent, and further insulting given the fact of your own admission of an erroneous presumpt on that the leprechaun-rat portrayed in Mac Nelly's cartoon bore an I.R.A. marking. Your ambigious comments made your refusal to redress the grievance of many all the more aggravating, and the offer for an Op -Ed article some six weeks after the fact is totally patronizing
Enclosed articles from the most recent issue of the Irish Star are forwarded to help enhance the "learning something" attitude expressed by yourself at our meeting last Saturday. Whose kidding whom, Mr. Nolan?
Thank you, at least, for confirming a long-held suspicion that your big newspaper is small.....very, very small. 'Up Wexford'
Similarly, a letter (under the same date) from the newlyelected National President of the Ancient Order of Hibernians in America, the Hon. Joseph A. Roche of Baldwin, Maryland, to The Globe of Hibernians in America, was not utilized as a letter to the editor (as requested) and, insofar as we know, also went without personal reply.
Add to the preceeding, if you will, the fact that requests for an official ruling (on this obvious racial slur by The Globe) were made to the Boston Committee and the Boston Covenant (weeks ago) ... and the courtesy of a reply hasn't been received from either. Is it possible that these august bodies are colorblind when it comes to green?
Mr . Roche's letter, incidentally, corraborated the general consensus of many of Boston's Irish in vehementa
ly protesting "the tasteless attempt on the part of your paper (The Globe) in depicting Irishmen as lowly sewer rats," and in demanding "public apology.

Recent "new" face joining "the Irish being Irish") have included Catherine McConologue of Dorchester ( 84 years young), Bill Pacla of Everett and Al Nunnally (blind) of Chelsea. Even "Louie the Leprechaun" (Charlie O'Callan of 「_rrington, Rhode Island) has been on hand with AntiRat Patrol to make his objection vistble

## The Virtues Of Greatness

by Charlie McGonagle Greatness is measured in many ways, but true greatness can only be measured by man's contributions to his fellow man. Greatness is most readily recognizable in men of great stature - kings, scientist, and world leaders - but all too often. greatness in people of lesser distinction goes totally unrecognized. Fortunately. another example of this type of oversight was avoided last Friday night when John Walsh was honored by family and friends for his accomplishments. John is not a world leader who might be instrumental in formulating a plan for peace among nations. He is not a medical scientist who might be working on a new surgical procedure nor is he capable of developing technilogical advances in fields of transportation John Walsh is a church sextant, a janitor who has proven that greatness is not a virtue reserved only for the notables of this world. When plans were announced, several months ago, that a night in John's honor would be held, the three hundre fifty available tickets were sold in a matter of days. The demand for tickets was so great, in fact, that the wonderful people who planned the evening felt that at least four times that number could have been sold - and for a janitor To define John's popularity with the people of Charlestown would be to measure intangibles, for he is warm. he is caring, and he is loving. Since 1931. when John was but fourteen years of age and an assistant to his father. Maurice, he has looked after the buildings of St. Mary's in a way a parent would look the buildings hildren. For ninety of the nearly one hundred years of St. Mary's existence. John and his father atyearded to these duties. When John decided several tended to months ago. to limit his duties fo weeke years of service to his church and community, and fifty-one years of memories St. Mary's Pastor. Rev. Robert Boyle, recalls his early


days at the church with a touch of awe. "In a single day, I was to see John prepare the church for morning mass, change to a suit and tie to serve as church usher, change back to work clothes to clean the church after the day's several Masses, and back to the suit and tie to sing beautifully at an afternoon wedding.
Time and space would not allow a recounting of all of Time and space would not allow a recounting of all of ohn's contributions, be they touching or comical, but one tory related by Father Boyle last Friday evening cerainly bears repeating.
It seems Father Boyle had a visiting priest at St Mary's a few years ago, and after an hour or so of discus sion. it became evident to him that his visitor was a fine person, but one who enjoyed a rather conservative outlook on things. He liked subdued colors, quiet people, and small cars. He was a fan of classical music, and an exciting evening for him most always involved a good book generally Emerson or Thoreau
While the two priests sat enjoying a cup of tea, the door to the room which they occupied opened to the visiting priest's back. From his vantage point. Father Boyle held a clear view of the figure which filled the opened door. John. resplendent in a bathing cap generously John. resplendent in a bathing cap generously suit top, puffed to its fullest with giant grapefruits, and a suit top. puffed to its fullest with giant gra
grass skirt, stood. bouncing a basketball.
He had prepared the little scenario for Father Boyle, a
He had prepared the little scenario for Father Boyle, man whose sense of humor he greatly admired, but he knew not of his friend's visitor
As Father Boyle's chin dropped in silent shock, the visitor turned to the noise of the bouncing ball. With no other recourse. Father Boyle simply said, "Hi there John." and acted as though scenes of this nature were common occurences at St. Mary's. Truth of the matter is, that in John's fifty-one years at the church, they weren't all that UNCOMMON
"Good afternoon Father," answered John as he dribbled himself away from the door frame, much to the amazement of the silent. astonished visitor
According to Father Boyle, he has not seen his friend since.

This was only one of the many stories told last Friday evening. In fact. John's family history from the time his parents first migrated to Charlestown from Ireland, to his present day, was beautifully recounted in verse by Mary Wilkins.
The highlight of the evening, however, came very early on. John and his lovely wife, Mary have a single child, also named Mary. Not only is young Mary a beautiful person who shares her father's aoility to make people laugh. she is highly intelligent and articulate everything two proud parents would cherish in a child Mary's work however, has taken her halfway around the world to Japan. For the past ten years or more, she has been home very infrequently. The cost and interruption to er work schedule makes visits to home impractical and ext to impossible
In retirement. John and Mary, decided to make a life's dream come true. They would travel to Japan to be with their daughter
However, upon hearing of the night planned for her father. young Mary took a month's leave of absence from work. and in total secrecy, returned home.
Only a handful of people knew of her homecoming, and right on cue, as her parents stood at the head table, she walked into the hall to the strains of "Daddy's Little Girl.
It had been nearly two years since last they spoke in person, and with a rose in her hand, and a tear in her eye she came to her parents.
For many minutes the three hugged and cried, and for those many minutes, each of the three hundred and fifty people in attendance shared their moment of joy, and cried tears of happiness with them

It was a beautiful night for a beautiful person, and as a paragraph stated in the booklet handed to all in atten dance.
"The many hats worn by John Walsh over the past hal decade have now been hung upon the rack, never to be worn again. for they will fit no other man.
Greatness is a virtue difficult to capture, but as John Walsh has proven, it is not captured by kings alone.
