A series of important urban archaeological digs related to the Central Artery North Area (CANA) project in Charlestown are ending as researchers excavate the Great House site in Charlestown's City Square. Archaeologists contracted by the Massachusetts Department of Public Works (MDPW) have excavated eight sites in the City Square area since June of 1985. Their work uncovered the foundation of the Great House, the residence of the first governor of the Commonwealth, John Winthrop. The Great House was the first substantial building in the Boston area (erected in 1629) and was used as a meetinghouse by revolutionaries and it was later used as a tavern.

Neill DePaolo, recorder and assistant field supervisor for the archacological team, said the Great House foundation is a valuable find because of its historical importance to democracy but, he added, artifacts such as pottery, plates, musketballs, wooden barrels, glassware and utensils are equally important because they help archaeologists and historians formulate an accurate account of colonial life.
"The difficulty of an urban archaeological dig is that the site is rarely in pristine condition, it is often chopped up. So, the problem for the team is to try and determine what items were originally present at the site," DePaolo said.

The Great House foundation will be excavated, removed, documented and carefully stored until a decision is made on where to place it. The foundation, and the rest of the artifacts, are the property of the MDPW and will be treated
to prevent deterioration and stored until a suitable site is found for an exhibit. DePaolo said the damp-

by Kathy Giordano On Tuesday of this week, another walking tour was made on Warren and Main Streets to check on the progress of the reconstruction work and to investigate the complaints of residents received during this past week.
The only visible work in the area was the bricklayers laying sidewalk bricks in various locations. It was noted last week that the crew had dwindled down to three men from the original
fifteen or so seen on the job when the brickwork was begun. This week, complaints continue to be heard on the quality of that work. The tree openings that cover the width of the sidewalk on Warren Street between Church Court and Cordis Street are still un Cordis Street are still un ouched, causing very dif ficult walking conditions through that area. A steel plate was left on the roadway at the bottom of Cordis Street over the weekend creating so much noise that
it would be heard on High Street whenever a car went over it. Similar steel plates can be seen along the reconstruction route thrown on sidewalks and roadways for no apparent reason, since they are not covering an open hole.

At 81 Warren Street, not only has a pile of debris been left in the gutter for days, but the newly laid brickwork is so uneven, a depression in the sidewalk has resulted. The bottom step of the house at 77 War

ren Street has been made level with the new sidewalk at the new owner's expense. Brick sidewalk work continues along the odd side of Warren Street - the side of the street that has had the sidewalks narrowed. The Massachusetts Department of Public Works (MDPW) is in the process of obtaining reconstruction cost figures on widening this sidewalk. However, if the MDPW gives the go ahead, that work would not be done until the spring.
On Main Street, the sidewalks have not as yet been bricked from City Square to Pleasant Street, but problems persist there that have to be corrected before the bricklayers get that far. At the corner of Winthrop

Street, there is a hole on the sidewalk large enough for a barrel to fit into it and the sunken hole outside St .

Michael's Emporium still has not been touched. The courtyard entrance at 50 Main Street has been left so broken that the owner is worried about the condition it will be left in after the bricklayers are finished. Survey markers in that location are not painted for easy visibility and residents have reported that they have fallen due to this problem. Gas and water gates are also protruding. Residents ask hat if these sidewalks are not finished this fall, will they be left in this condition all winter? One resident stated that although she was getting impatient with the slow progress of the reconstruction work, she would rather see a good job done instead of a speedy job. "I (continued on page 19)

## Housing And Development Committee Seeks

## 50 Per Cent Moderate Income Housing On Parcel P－2A

Anyone who thinks of New England as a quiet， quaint little area of the country obviously has never attended a meeting of Char－ lestown＇s Housing and De－ velopment Committee of the Neighborhood Council when a heated issue is the topic of the evening＇s agen－ da．
The October 21 st meet－ ing，appropriately held at the Charlestown Working Theater，concerned the sta－
tus of Parcel P－2A，located at the corner of Main and Bunker Hill Streets，and featured dramatics not ap－ parent in many a play． With the consent of the community attending this meeting，the Committee voted to request that the Boston Redevelopment Authority（BRA）ask the four developers submitting proposals for the land，to include 50 per cent market rate and 50 per cent mode－ rate affordable housing，ex－

cluding the low－incom housing consideration．Pro－ posals submitted for devel－ opment of the Parcel by Charlestown Garden Town houses／Conroy Develop ment Corporation，Myer－ son／Allen and Company and Crowninshield Corpor－ ation included plans for 25 per cent－low income affor－ dable， 25 per cent moderate affordable and 50 per cent market rate housing．The fourth developer，Gate Five Associates，listed housing for the Parcel at 70 per cent market rate and 30 per cent affordable．
In the BRA＇s Request for Proposal in seeking a devel－ oper for the site called for 25 per cent being designa－ ted as aftordable while 25 per cent would be low af－ fordable．The remaining 50 per cent of the housing would sell at market rate Committee members and residents expressed their objections，both at this meeting as well as at previ－ ous meetings，to the inclu－ sion of low income housing in this development．At var－ ous points in the meeting both groups said that Char－ lestown has its share of low income housing and now needs more affordable housing to allow its own residents to stay in the com－ munity．There was some concern that the low－in－ come component would
ranslate into more persons from outside the town ob－ taining houses，to the exclu－ sion of current residents． Charlestown resident Dan Kovacevic said that more affordable housing could be attained for the community through the $50 / 50$ percentage．Although many people agrued with him throughout the even－ ing，Committee member Tom Cunha said，after a short break in the meeting， that he realized that Kova－ cevic was correct．Cunha said that no matter what the actual number of units are eventually built on the par－ cel，at least half of them would be affordable hous－ ing．Thus，the shift of the discussion and opinion focused upon the $50 / 50$ percentage without the low income housing．
The Committee original－ ly wanted a $70 / 30$ ratio as members felt that more af－ fordable housing would be－ come available for＂Town－ ies＂through this percen－ tage，without the low in－ come component．In fact Committee member Julia Rodriguez said that the Committee expected to ex－ amine the developers＇pro－ posals with the 70／30 per－ centages at this meeting in order to compare the plans of the four developers．Cun－ ha said that they had re quested that the BRA speak

with the developers to ar－ range this．However，the BRA did not follow this through．

Residents，Committee members and representa－ tives of the BRA extensive－ ly and emotionally discuss－ ed the percentages of affor－ dable and market rate hous－ ing proposed by the four developers who have sub－ mitted their plans for the Parcel．A decision on P－2A was expected some time ago but the decision has been delayed due to ques－ tions that have arisen con－ cerning the percentages．
A communications pro－ blem appeared to exist be－ tween the Committee and the BRA staff concerning past discussions of the per－ centages．In an attempt to clarify whether the percen－ tages involved in previous discussions were 25／25／50 or $70 / 30$ ，Committee Chair－ person Petie Hilsinger read a chronology sent by Neighborhood Council President John Tobin that detailed events and corres－ pondence between the BRA and the Council．The chro－ nology did not list any of the relevant figures

Larry Brophy of the BRA stated that if he had misled anyone about the numbers he had not intended to do so and apologized if that was the case．Additionally，Bro－ phy said that this $25 / 25 / 50$ breakdown is a city－wide policy that attempts to max－ imize the amount of affor－ dable housing to be gained． Brophy stressed that this low－income housing would not produce a project
At the request of one resi－ dent at the meeting．Brophy listed the figures that defin－ ed the criteria for encom－ passing low and moderate incomes of families．A yearly income of $\$ 35.500$
for a family of two with an additional $\$ 1,500$ for each dependent after that defines a moderate family income． while $\$ 17,700$ a year for a family of two with $\$ 1,500$ for each additional depen－ dent defines a low－income family，Brophy said．

At one point in the meet－ ing，Hilsinger asked the au－ dience to express their opi－ nion on the matter by a show of hands．When ask ed how many wanted to change the RFP from 25 per cent low affordable， 25 per cent moderate afforda－ ble and 50 per cent market rate，almost a unanimous response was in favor of a change．One resident voted no to this question．Further， when questioned whether the RFP should be chang－ ed to $70 / 30$ or $50 / 50$ ，more voted for the－50／50 ratio．
At this point the residents walked out of the room，so Hilsinger called for a break in the meeting．When the meeting resumed，only half the audience returned
Several residents made references to the 25 per cent community equity going back into the development to bring down the price of the housing．Cunha said that was already discussed by the Committee，but the Neighborhood Council did not agree with this proposal at their last meeting and two out of the four developers begged off，noting prior commitments to organiza－ tions．Committee member Dennis McLaughlin added that he didn＇t remember it being stated that the 25 per cent equity should be pro－ mised to a specific organi－ zation．Instead，he said that the 25 per cent should just be set aside for the com－ munity，with no definite tag．

Youngsters will be walking the streets thinking about fun. not safety, said Conway. "This puts an added burden on motorists who need to be especially careful when driving in residential areas
Deputy Conway has some advice for parents to help make this Halloween safe for their children

- The most important thing is visibility. Make sure your children can see and be seen. If the children must be out at night, they should wear light colored costumes, preferably outlined in reflective tape.
- A flashlight will not only allow them to light their path, it will serve as a warning to oncoming motorists.
- Face masks can reduce peripheral vision. An alternative is makeup.
- If a face mask is necessary, make sure the children know to take off the mask before crossing the street.
- Make sure a parent, older brother or sister, or guar dian goes with the children when they trick or treat
- If someone older cannot go along, be sure children ravel in groups rather than alone.
- Plan the trick or treat route ahead of time. Pick streets that are well-lighted
- Remind children to cross only at corners. Never cross the street between cars or in the middle of the block.
- If there is no sidewalk, walk facing traffic.
- Wait until getting home to sort, check, and eat treats.

## Seeks Assistance In Solving Garbage Problem

Dear Sir:
I am writing to you in the last stages of my fruitless efforts to solve a disastrous "garbage problem" at 358 Main Street (or 3 Essex Street, as entrance to building was moved) adjoining my house in Charlestown. I have tried every avenue, barring none, to rectify this situation - to no avail. To name a few - the Inspectional Services Division, the Board of Health, Rodent Patrol, Neighborhood Services of Charlestown, the Boston Fire Department, my weekly newspaper The Charlestown Patriot, etc., etc.
I started sixteen months ago, initially contacting the perpetrators, occupants of a nineteen unit condominium next door to me. They, with the permission of the building owner, dispose of their garbage in my yard. I sent them gracious letters, pleaded with them through their intercoms, and finally succumbed to cleaning their garbage every pick-up day and placing it at its appointed place. After six months of maid service, I gave up and since then have been torturing City Hall, inspectors, anyone who will listen to me. As of this writing, I have had no success, and today there are close to sixty "hefty" trash bags, full of garbage, spilling out everywhere, and duly so, rats feasting on them. witnessed by a health inspector who I flagged down two weeks ago in the neighborhood.
Please, someone heed the aforementioned and help. This is a prime example of condo-conversion and the victims who lie in its wake.

## Mothers Bereaved In Childhood Subject Of Study

Mothers, who during heir childhood lost their own mothers through death, is the focus of a study being conducted by Donald S. Zall, LICSW, a doctoral candidate at Boston College School of Social Work. The study is being supervised by Dr. Rich ard Mackey, Professor of Social Work at Boston Col lege.

According to Zall, "One of the greatest fears of chil dren is that both, or one of their parents will die or leave them. When this comes true, the impact can be lifelong." He also notes that, unfortunately, this kind of loss occurs more frequently than people think.
Although there are no official statistics kept, it has been estimated that as many as $11 / 2$ million children in

the United States have one, or both, parents die before they are 15 years old. There is very little actually known about what happens to these young children, whose mother died during their child-
hood, when they become mothers themselves. An important question is whether this early loss effects how these mothers parent their children.
Zall is planning to inter
view 15 mothers. He estimates that four to six hours spread over two to three sessions will be needed to complete the interviews Mothers who participate in the study will be paid $\$ 50$.
