

Help! Help! It's Your Parade

The Bunker Hill Day Parade on Sunday, June 16, marking the 221st anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill and dedicated to the Boston Fire Department and all firefighters active, retired and deceased is less than three weeks away. The contributions again this year toward hiring bands, drum corps and other units are coming in very slowly.

If this trend continues and the Bunker Hill Day Parade Committee is unable to raise the \$35,000 in funds to underwrite the expenses of the over 25 musical units and other units already committed to march, the committee will have no alternative but to cut the size of the parade drastically. The committee cannot put bands and drum corps in the parade if it cannot afford to pay them.

It is up to you, the residents, business persons and community organizations to come forward immediately and contribute financially to the Bunker Hill Day Parade so that the committee can continue to put the type of parade on the streets that the community has come to expect and of which it can be proud.

Although the monument, which appears each week in the **Patriot** acknowledges contributions of \$25 or more, any donation is welcome. Residents of limited means, might consider donating the cost of going to a movie or renting a video, a small price to pay for the Mummer's Band Concert on the eve of the parade and the parade itself, an afternoon of great entertainment.

Also, committee members are in the mall and out on the streets selling chances and booster stickers, each for a minimum \$1 donation. There are canisters in many of the local stores ready to receive your change.

The number of candidates in the running for state representative in the Second Suffolk District narrowed this week as certified signatures were filed at the Election Division of the Secretary of State.

At the 5 p.m. deadline on May 28, two candidates, both Democrats, had filed and will be on the September primary ballot -William "Bill" McCabe of Charlestown and Eugene "Gene" O'Flaherty of Chelsea.

Charlestown Attorney Michael Powers had filed nomination papers by the April 30 deadline. He did not file the certified signatures with the Secretary of State by the Tuesday deadline and thus his name will not be on the ballot.

May Brings Awareness Of Violence Prevention

As part of the Healthy Charlestown Coalition's May Violence Prevention Month awareness activities, Judi Wright of the Boston Police Department Safe Neighborhood Crime Watch spoke to Charlestown residents and agency representatives on May 21 at 55 Bunker Hill St. about how to organize with each other for street safety.

"These are not vigilantes," Wright said, "but are a way to make your street safer."

Some 900 crime watches have been set up in Boston since 1986, when an individual, Chris Hayes, put his energies behind an idea and organized the effort to teach neighbors how to take care of each other.

"We find they (crime watches) work best on a block-by-block basis," Wright said. "This is not a police program. We teach people how to work with the police and their neighbors."

Wright said that it typically takes a street, block or building about two to three meetings to get started.

"We teach you to aid the victim without worrying about the attacker," she said. According to Wright, crime watch groups nurtured by the BPD-sponsored effort have sprung up all over the city and contain all economic classes.

"It's hard to convince people who live in particular neighborhoods that they can make a difference," Wright said. "There are no bigger or overall strategies, it just has to be done bit by bit."

BPD Sgt. Joe McLean agreed, telling residents that "without citizen participation, we're useless."

Wright explained that the simple education program provides such basic, but often misunderstood, information, such as how the emergency 911 phone number works and simple neighbor-to-neighbor communication. Wright noted that the now seven-member team finds that residents are typically afraid to start a crime watch.

"People find out that what they have in common far outweighs their differences," she said.

Youth Officer Ted Boyle also described his involvement in school-based prevention programs. Targeting third-graders, Boyle said that students learn the differences between street

"We talk about how to keep the family structure strong, about parents, goals and the future," Boyle said. "They learn that 90 to 95 percent of crimes are related to drugs and alcohol."

Education continues to the older grades, when young people learn to empathize with victims, cultural sensitivity and prejudice, and their basic physical and emotional needs, such as belonging and getting affection from their families.

"They learn how to take responsibility for themselves, their neighborhood, school and their family," Boyle said.

Community Meeting Focuses On Drugs And Related Crimes In Charlestown

Well over 100 people gathered at the Knights of Columbus hall on May 14 to meet with representatives of the Boston Police Department (BPD) to take a look at the rise in the use of heroin in the town and the increase in the number of crimes that go hand-inhand with drug activity.

The program, co-sponsored by CHarlestown Against Drugs (CHAD), the Charlestown Neighborhood Council Public Safety Committee and the Healthy Charlestown Coalition, was one in a series of programs and activities marking May as "Violence Prevention Month."

Peter Looney, chairman of CHAD and the Neighborhood Council, served as moderator for the forum. He opened the program, stating that the "main reason for being here is drugs - PCP and heroin, which is making its stand in the Bunker Hill Housing Development." Looney stressed that drugs are "killing our young people putting them in jail and taking away their future." He also spoke of the number of crimes, particularly house breaks, that have increased.

Capt. Ron Conway, commander of Area A of the BPD, stated that drugs are "not just a Charlestown problem, they are a nationwide problem." He said that the police officers were present at this forum to tell the people what they are doing and to solicit the support of the residents in combating the problem.


Conway spoke of the Neighborhood Policing Center on Main Street, calling it a "user-friendly" facility staffed by "officers who volunteer for the duty and know the community." He added that he hoped it can be open 24-hours a day with the new police being added this summer. Conway did announce that beginning at once, the center would be open daily until midnight.

Boston City Councillor Diane Modica, who Conway credited with being the driving force to get the center open, spoke on the importance of acknowledging the problem and of education and enforcement.

Modica went on to say that CHAD is reaching out to the young people with education on drugs. She spoke of enforcement and the fact that attacking the problem is not easy - noting "it cannot be done without a community partnership between the police and the residents."

USS Constitution Museum Extended Summer Hours

The USS Constitution Museum salutes the summer with new extended hours. The museum will open daily at 9 a.m. and close at 6 p.m. from June 1 through Labor Day, Sept. 2.

It was an evening for renewing friendships, enjoying a delicious dinner and, of course dancing.



Bock's Mission: Fight Breast Cancer By Raising Money In Cross-Country Bike Tour

Sandra Bock, PA-C, at the Bunker Hill Health Center will be one of the modern-day cowgirls riding for the elimination of breast cancer in the crosscountry Pony Express Tour '96. In conjunction with the Women's Motorcyclist Foundation, Bock will ride a 200-mile stretch of the relay on her 700-cc Yamaha to support the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation.

Among Bock's strongest supporters is her "campaign manager," Judy Evers of St. Martin Street. Bock is required to raise a minimum of \$1,000 of an anticipated \$100,000 in rider-sponsorship money, all of which will go directly to the Komen Foundation for breast cancer research. Companion or associate riders raise \$250. As she completes her leg of the relay, Bock will hand off a symbolic bronze medallion and a scroll of names to be included in the foundation's Book of Hope.

"Breast cancer is the number one killer of women 34 to 55 and a big killer in Charlestown," Bock said. "Between 1982 and 1992, there were 94 cases of breast cancer in Charlestown for women ages 20 to 44. That's high for one square mile." Those figures are expected to be higher for 1996.

Evers offered to take on the task of helping Bock raise the principal-rider \$1,000, and was also one of the first to make a pledge, "My role is to encourage Charlestown residents to give whatever they can give," Evers said. "I'm involved because I've seen family, friends and neighbors struggle through the disease."

"Charlestown residents with breast cancer seem to be getting younger and younger," Bock said. "Without early detection, once it goes too long, it goes beyond breast cancer."

According to Women Riding for Research statistics, nearly 50,000 women died last year from breast cancer, and 300 of 1,000 men who will get the disease will die this year.

The Pony Express Tour begins on June 29 from St. Joseph, Missouri, drops down to Dallas and then to Houston before it begins its counterclockwise route round the U.S. A reception at Boston's Hard Rock Cafe will welcome the principal riders, who are mostly women, and their companions on July 15.

Closing ceremonies will be held at the South

Fork Ranch in Dallas on Aug. 18. The rider who raises the most money will receive the bronze medallion, created by New York City sculptor and motorcy-



Community Meeting Focuses On Drugs In Charlestown

(continued from page 6) Sgt. Jim Fong of the Drug Control Unit, stated that it was "easy to blame the police" in the handling of the drug problem in Charlestown, but "the reality is that the drug dealers are killing our children."

Fong stated that Charlestown is not unique in its drug problem. He spoke of heroin, marijuana and powdered cocaine in Mishawum, crack cocaine on Medford Street and PCP. He told of the 17 people arrested last year in the Bunker Hill Housing Development with most being convicted, some cases still pending and some evictions from the housing development resulting. Fong said, "Things take time."

Fong urged residents with information on drug activity to utilize the confidential tip line at 343-4627 or the send information to the confidential post office box: BPD A-1, P.O. Box 5894, Boston, MA 02114.

Information that should be included, if at all possible, is: person's name, address, age, race, sex, hair color, facial hair, eyes, height, weight, occupation, vehicle used, type of drugs, weapons, location of drug activity, usual time and any other information that might be useful. Fong added that persons should be specific as possible. He said that it is not necessary to include your name, but if you do, an officer will be back in touch with you within 2 1/2 weeks.

Another officer noted that 911 should be used for emergency response by the police. Bob Tulley, a detective assigned to Area A, spoke primarily of PCP and heroin. PCP, or angel dust, has been used as a horse tranquilizer. He said it is smoked, or ingested in pill form or a liquid. It affects the brain and central nervous system.

Tulley said that heroin is more prevalent as the price is down and so "there is a lot of it out there." He went on to say that with a purchase of 50 or more bags, the price is \$5-6 each while an individual bag has been selling for \$10-20. According to Tulley, a bundle is 10 bags of heroin and there is a stamp on them which is the heroin dealer's trademark. He said if you see glassine bags and elastics, you will know that a heroin user is around.

Charles Bartoloni, an assistant district attorney with District Attorney Ralph Martin's office, stated that he is part of a team responsible for specific areas, including Charlestown. He told how cases are handled by his office, noting the the majority of the cases are drug-related. He said he would speak with residents to find out about local problem areas.

One resident was concerned about tenant evictions in the housing development if a person is arrested for drug activity. Officer Kevin McKenna of the Boston Housing Police said that the eviction process involves a grievance panel and eventually goes to Housing Court with a time frame of 3-6 months. It was also noted that Mishawum, which is presently under HUD regulations, is the same as the BHA, but it was unknown what the procedure was at Charles-Newtown.


A woman asked how more detailed information on crimes and arrests could be accessed or rumors addressed. McLean said to call him at 343-4627 and he would "track it down." He did note that some names, including those of juveniles, and those on some court orders are confidential.

Conway was asked about public drinking. He said that patrols have been out and arrests have been made. It was suggested there be more police visibility in the parks where drug dealing went on in the daytime last summer .

Both a CharlesNewtown and a Mishawum resident expressed concern on the increase in drugs in their respective areas. Another pointed out blatant drug dealing at Sullivan and Main streets and in the Eden Street Park. Community Service Officer Sgt. Joe McLean urged "dropping a dime." He said that if the police have details, they can get a warrant.


A resident of the Bunker Hill Housing Development was critical that the manager of that housing, where much drug activity goes on, was not present for this meeting. Looney offered to arrange a meeting with the management of BHA, Mishawum and Newtown.

Judy Evers of the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Service, asked Con-



way about the role of residents. He said, "There is no easy answer but to ask residents to support us [the police]." He said, "Provide us with information be our eyes and ears," adding that the police don't want to put anyone in harm's way. "Call us, write us, get the information to us and we will do something about it."

Loooney suggested residents "get involved" in CHAD or the Healthy Charlestown Coalition and invited all to join the June 10 March Against Drugs.

the 40s, recording songs which included "The Gypsy" and "I'll Be With You In Apple Blossom Time" on the old Majestic label. He also recorded "I'll




Jack also acted in several films, including "The Treasure of Monte Cristo," and a mid-60s western called "The Long Rope," along with Richard "Palladin" Boone.

Students Graduate From Project D.A.R.E. At The Harvard-Kent School

On May 21, Suffolk County Sheriff Bob Rufo and Officer Timothy Cole joined 75 Charlestown fifth graders as they graduated from Project D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) considered to be one of the best drug prevention programs ever developed. Students were from the Harvard-Kent Elementary School.

Since the 1987-88 school year, Rufo has assigned uniformed deputy sheriffs to conduct Project D.A.R.E. in the Boston and Chelsea schools. This year, in addition to teaching Project D.A.R.E. in Charlestown, it was also taught at the South

End's Blackstone Community School and Dorchester's Joseph Lee Elementary School.


Over 3,000 fifth and sixth grade students have participated in the program whose goals can be summarized as, "Teaching kids to never take drugs." Officer Cole had the responsibility of teaching the 17-week D.A.R.E. curriculum to four, fifth grade classes.

Each week Cole used examples, role playing and other techniques to instill in youngsters an awareness of drugs and their effects; methods to resist peer pressure or others trying to

push drugs; and, the selfesteem needed to resist the false hope of drug abuse.

The program ends with a recognition and awards ceremony where the community and businesses are asked to join. This year, the graduates enjoyed pizza from Haymarket Pizza and soft drinks from Pepsi.



LIMITED LIABILITY COMPANIES: A NEW CHOICE FOR BUSINESSES

Corporation. Partnership. Sole proprietorship. For many years, these were the only choices for the legal structure of your business. Now almost all states allow another choice, the *limited liability* company.

A limited liability company (LLC) is a cross between a corporation and a partnership. Owners of an LLC are shielded from legal liability if their company goes bankrupt or loses a lawsuit, just like the shareholders of a corporation. However, as in a partnership, profits and losses pass through directly to the LLC members.

How do you decide between an LLC and the other forms of business? If you need protection from legal liability, you should consider an LLC or one of the corporate forms - either a "C" or "S" corporation. If you expect your business to incur early operating losses and you want to claim those losses on your personal tax return, consider an LLC or S corporation. If you have co-owners and you want losses to pass through, you also might opt for one of the partnership forms, either "general" or "limited."

An LLC and an S corporation often seem quite similar. However, members of an LLC have considerably more flexibility when allocating profits and losses. Also, S corporations may have a maximum of only 35 shareholders. And non-resident aliens, corporations, partnerships and many trusts may not own S corporation stock. None of these restrictions apply to an LLC.

The LLC is a relatively new legal concept, and there are still a number of unanswered tax, business, and legal questions. If you are starting a new business, or if you are dissatisfied with the structure of your existing business, we can help you weigh the pros and cons of an LLC.






Boucher Graduates From North Adams State

Her extracurricular activities included the Berkshire Food Project, intramural program, the tutor exchange network, Parents Place, Red Cross and Habitat for Humanity.


