

## Midget "B" Hockey Team In Xmas Tourney

During the Christmas vacation, the Charlestown Midget "B" Hockey team participated in the first annual Acton Invitational Christmas Hockey Tournament.

Action began on Thursday evening with the "Townies" playing Chelmsford. The boys dropped a close decision, bowing with only a minute remaining, 5-4.

On Friday evening, the "Townies" took on the host team Acton. The team continued to impress, and having overcome first night jitters, skated to a hard fought 4 - 2 victory.

Saturday evening saw the team playing undefeated Marlboro. A victory over them would ensure a rematch on Saturday for the Tournament Championship. A loss would elevate Chelmsford to the finals and send the "Townies" home early. The game contained all the action of the Stanley Cup Finals, and after regulation, the teams were deadlocked, 4 - 4. The team knew they needed this victory and with 1:03 remaining in sudden death overtime, a rematch had been assured with a beautiful goal to

the top corner by Kevin Millerick.

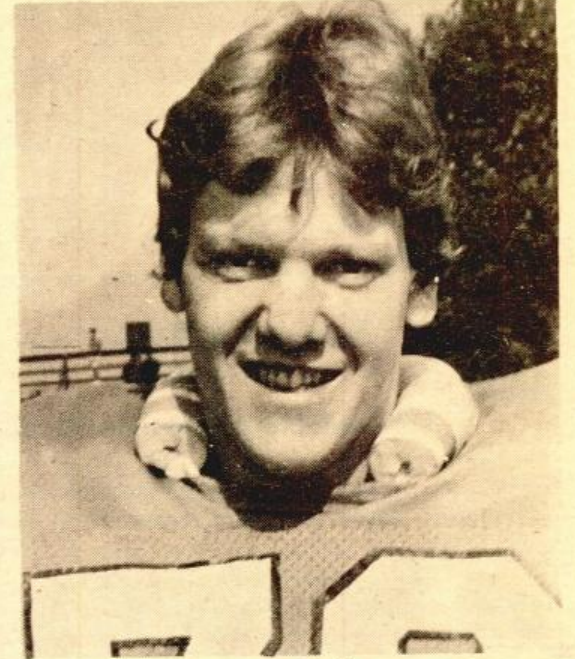

The battle continued through the first sudden death overtime with Charlestown clearly controlling the play only to be denied time and again by the Marlboro goaltender. The game rolled on into the second sudden death overtime and Charlestown was still one minute remaining in this overtime, Marlboro intercepted an errant clearing pass and fired home the game winner. ### PRESCRIPTION REFILLS

The staff members of the Adult Medicine Unit of Bunker Hill Health Center have adopted a new method of handling prescription refills. The need for this new method is a result of an increasing number of patients requesting refills daily.

Essentially, we are asking you to wait approximately 24 hours prior to picking up your prescription at the Bunker Hill Health Center or at the pharmacy of your choice. This requires you to call in your prescription before you run out of your medication.

If you are telephoning us or stopping here at the Bunker Hill Health Center for your prescription refill, please have the following at hand:

1. Your name and telephone number.
2. Your blue MGH ID card.
3. Your prescription bottle with its label attached.

Remember, check the amount of your medication often, (you may want to do this, now) so that you allow enough time (24 hours) for us to handle your prescription needs adequately.

## Start A New Career As A Homemaker Or Health Aid

You can start a new career as a homemaker or home health care aide by enrolling in a 12-week training offered by the Women's Service Club of Boston. The next course starts January 29.

The City of Boston's Employment and Economic Policy Administration (EEPA) funds the training, which is open to CETA-eligible Boston residents. Participants receive a wage allowance in addition to their free training.

Graduates of the course fill a growing need for skilled people

who can care for the elderly and disabled in their homes.

"Because there's a need for people with these skills, this training is giving Boston residents a chance to succeed in the job market -- even if they haven't had a job before," Mayor Kevin H. White said.

In the course, participants receive training in consumer and nutrition problems. For example, they learn how to use food shopping dollars most effectively to provide clients with a good diet. They also learn about caring for people with a variety of illnesses.

When they complete their training, the graduates will be able to choose from a number of homemaking and health aide jobs. Many graduates of the program work with clients in their homes, but others work in nursing homes, food services or day care centers. Domestic chores such as cleaning are not part of their work.

"I can almost guarantee a job the next day to people who complete the training. That's the kind of demand there is," said Jane Brodeur, who directs the homemaker training program.

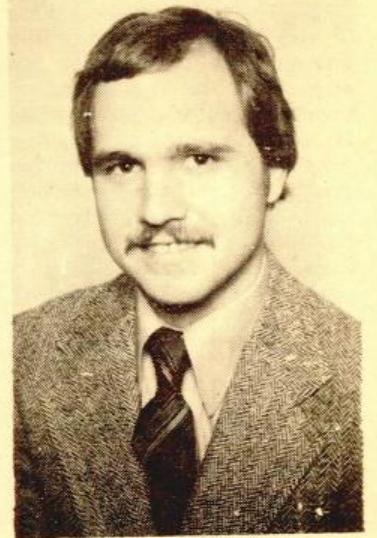
## Named Legislative Aide

On January 2, 1979, Representative Richard A. Voke appointed John McLaughlin of 22 Tibbetstown Way, Charlestown, to be his legislative aide at the State House. John has been living in Charlestown for about five years since his marriage to the former Mary Powers, herself a lifelong resident of Charlestown. The couple has two daughters, Rachel, 4, and Mary Carol, 9 months.

John was graduated magna cum laude from Tufts University in 1977 with a Bachelors Degree in Political Science. He is currently a second year evening student at Suffolk University Law School where he finished his first year on the Dean's List.

In commenting on John's appointment, Representative Voke said, "I recognize that my office represents the closest link that the people of Charlestown have to any elected official, and I know that John will be able to help me respond to the daily needs of the Charlestown community."

The opportunity for each state legislator to appoint an aide came as a result of the cut in the size of the House of Representatives and the necessary increase in the size of each legislative district. Each aide is

responsible for helping the elected representative serve his district. The aide's primary duties are to process and follow up on constituent requests, research upcoming legislation, and to offer advice. In commenting on his own plans for his new job John said, "I hope to be able to encourage people to call on us when they need help by developing a reputation for responding efficiently and honestly to the needs of the people of this district."

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## College Credit For Free Reading Course

People who can volunteer three or more hours a week in the Boston Public Schools are eligible for a free six-season course, "Tutoring Remedial Reading," which begins Tuesday, January 23 from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. at 16 Arlington Street, Boston. Free college credit from Bunker Hill Community College is available for the training course which is offered by School

Volunteers for Boston. Mrs. Earline Pruitt, a graduate of Wheelock College and Two-Way Tutoring Reading Coordinator at Hyde Park High School, is teaching the course. The sessions will meet January 23, 30, February 6, 13, 27 and March 6, all from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. Because of the great need for reading tutors in schools in all parts of Boston this is the third time during the current school year that School Volunteers for

Boston has offered the reading tutoring course. The two earlier courses have been filled to capacity, according to David Hildt, Program Director, School Volunteers for Boston. "The course offers a great opportunity for parents and grandparents to learn how to help their own youngsters with reading as they learn how to give individualized help to other students, Hildt said. 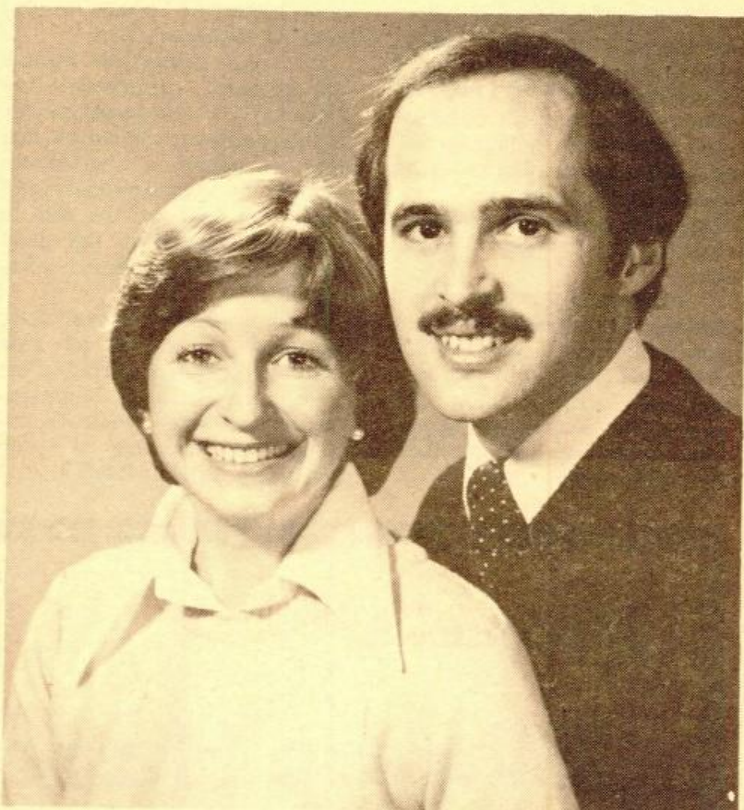

John Wayne at 71, the last true Hollywood hero, is recovering from another operation. This one was for a malignant stomach

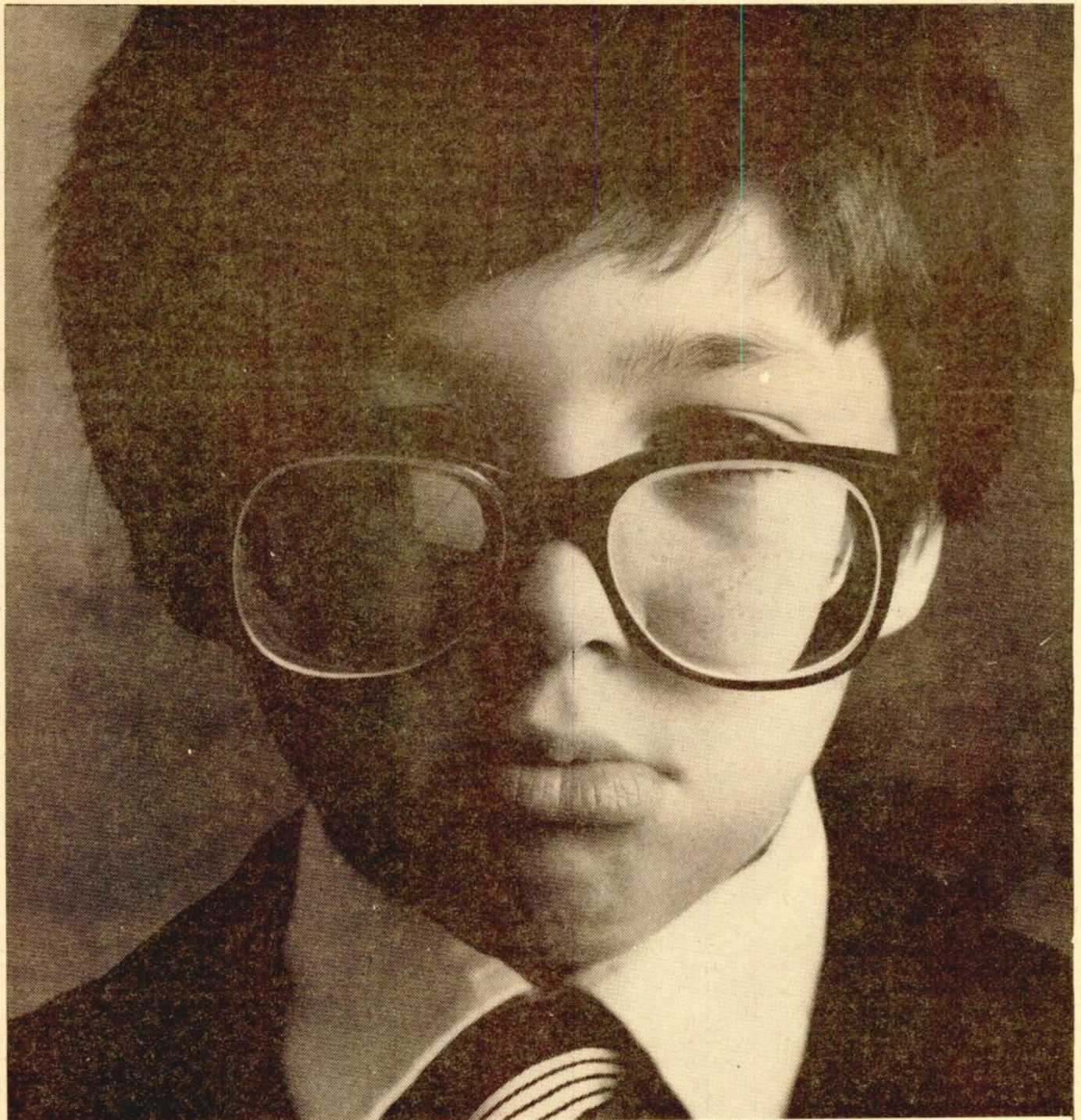
tumor last week. It was supposed to be a routine gall bladder operation until the cancer was discovered in surgery.

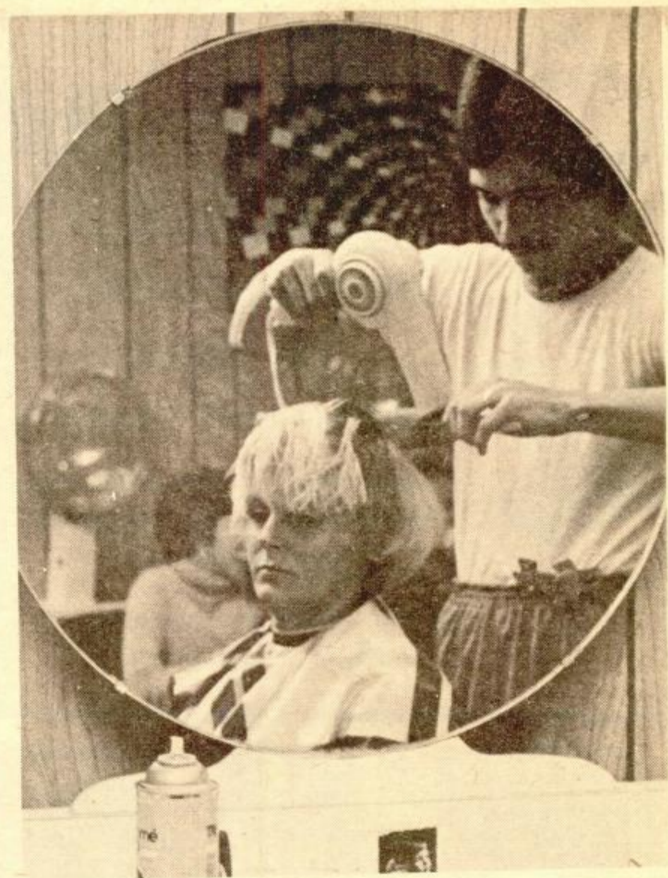
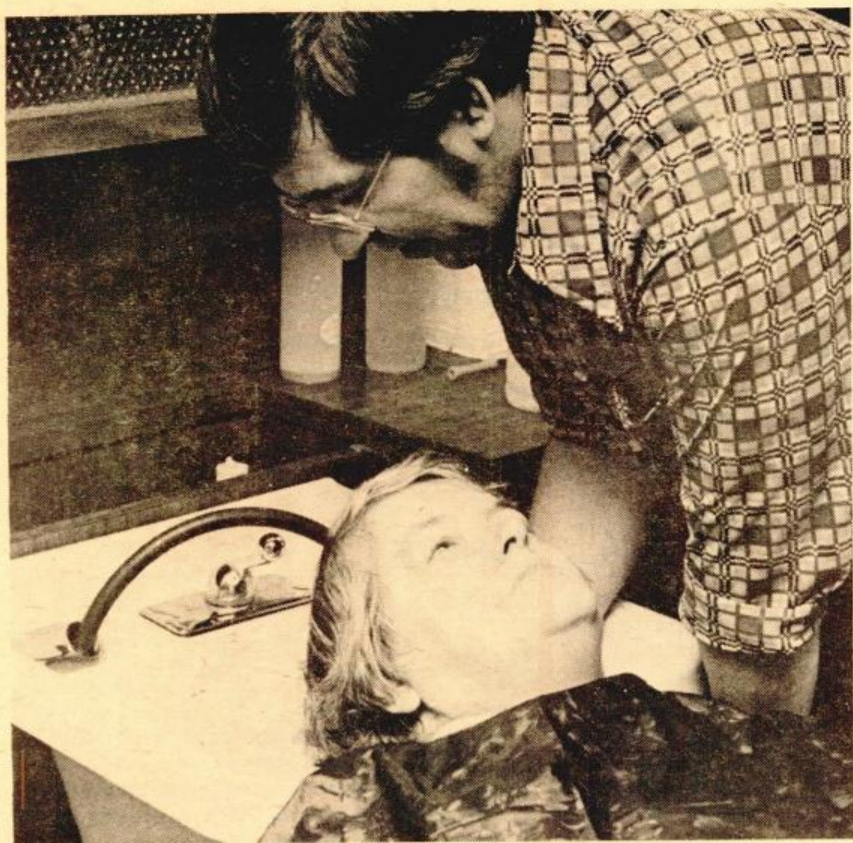

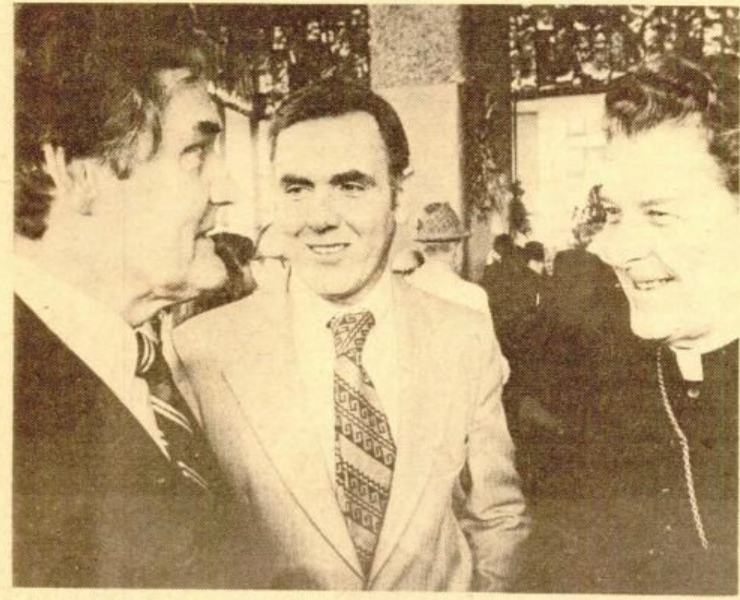

They commented that "apparently the courts aren't going to change their minds and we'll continue to have busing." Jean Ruffra, NANS National President, told the station that she liked the editorial but asked if she could rebut the part about the "unbiased" source. Her reply was welcomed by WAVE TV 3 and Jean said, "I don't think there is an "unbiased" source, but as a member of the Louisville School Board, I have seen the decline in test scores, a declining enrollment and loss of support for the public school system."

She said there is a great need for the true story of busing to be made public and she believed that someday, the courts will change their minds when we have judges who are concerned about education and not mathematical ratios.

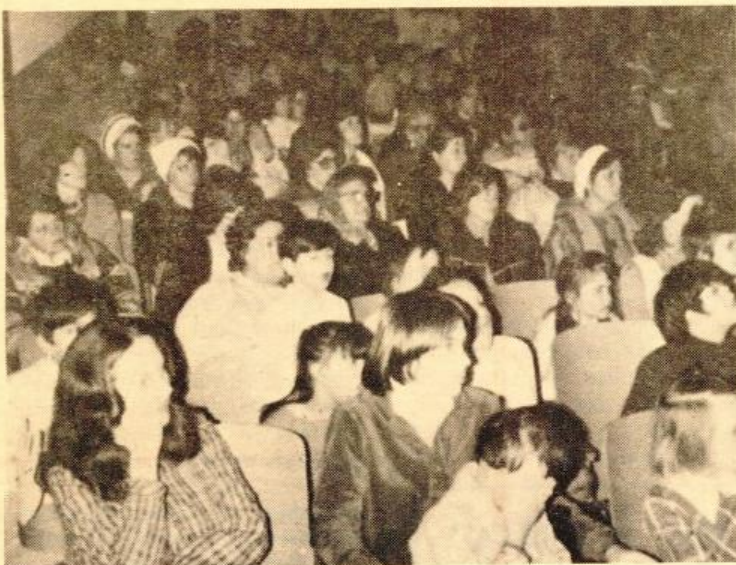
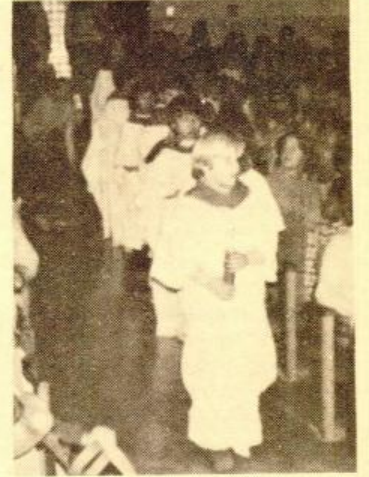
The fourth graders then put on a skit which included a live doll, a wrapped gift and two genuine

## Voke Investigating Overcrowding On MBTA Buses

Representative Richard A. Voke has launched an investigation of the M.B.T.A. bus service along both the Main Street and Bunker Hill Street routes. The inquiry was sparked by complaints from many Charlestown residents who have been unable to board buses along the route and at Haymarket Station because they were overcrowded. Many reasons have been cited for the over-crowding, including charges that non-resident commuters have been using the Charlestown buses instead of taking the train. The buses began to attract commuters when they began running to and from downtown.

Representative Voke has made a formal request by letter to Mr. Ron Tober, Operations Manager of the M.B.T.A., asking him to study the situation. Using suggestions offered by many Charlestown residents, Representative Voke has proposed a number of possible solutions. The proposals include the possibility of running more buses during the morning and evening rush hour, or of alternating the starting and stopping points of the buses. For example, if during the evening rush hour some buses departed from

downtown and some started from Haymarket, those persons who now are having difficulty getting on a bus at Haymarket would be able to do so.

In order to determine which, if any, is the best course of action to pursue, Rep. Voke began riding the buses himself last Friday during both the morning and evening rush hour. He plans to continue riding them for a couple of days this week. If there is anyone who wishes to have some input into this investigation, please call Richard at the State House. priest. "Of course" the priest said. "Then why didn't you go to work today?" the boy continued. The priest realized then the reason for the question. Obviously the child's father left the house early each morning to "go" to work. The presumption then was, if father was still at home, he wasn't working!

Perhaps, like the three-year-old, there are others who wonder "what does a priest do all day". To answer that partially, it might be appropriate to list services or activities that occupy the average priest's time, thereby providing some insight into what is generally offered in most parishes.

While priests for the most part are not professional counsellors, it is amazing how much time is spent in giving counsel or lending an ear whether it be in personal visits, on the telephone, home visits, at the shopping center, on the bus or even in chance meetings on the street. Certainly the average priest has more to offer in terms of direction and advice than the "good neighbor" because of his broad experience in helping many people face many crises. Some examples might be family conflicts, marriage break-ups, "hard-to-

handle" children, a drinking relative, parent-teenager confrontations, etc., etc. We often are (and should be) called upon to visit the sick, someone in prison, someone having a bout with depression, or someone dealing with grief over the loss of a loved one. People who are confused about their faith, addicted to drugs or alcohol, bearing awful burdens of guilt, worried about a job—all are among those to whom we extend service time or concern; and whom we help very often by referral to professional services when it may seem appropriate. We also "trouble-shoot" in any number of situations too varied and unusual to name.

Generally 'on call' are Fr. Serino, Fr. Quinn, Fr. Buckley and Sr. Nancy. A warm and willing rectory staff are always 'on duty' to answer the door or phone, set up an appointment or just offer a cup of tea while you wait.

It's not exactly "going to work" like that three-year-old's father but it's work that comes to us here at St. Catherine's and, we are sure, to any rectory or parsonage.

And, may we add, it keeps us busy.

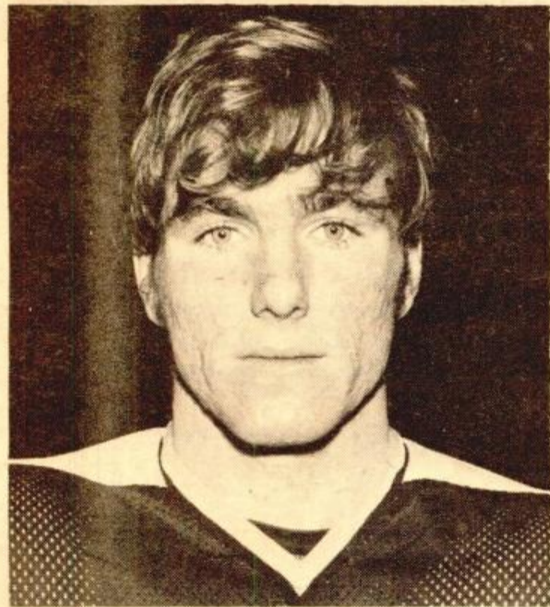
