

### Ward 2 Democratic Caucus To Be Held On Saturday, Feb. 12

Registered Democrats in Charlestown will be holding a caucus on Saturday, Feb. 12 at 11 a.m. to elect delegates to the 1994 Maschusetts Democratic Convention.

Charlestown, Ward 2 will be electing 12 delegates and four alternates, equally divided between men and women, to send to the Convention. The apportioned number of delegates has been allocated on the basis of



a formula giving equal weight to the Democratic Party registration and the average vote for Democratic candidates in the last general elections for governor and president for which figures were available at the time delegate tabulations were prepared.

Thomas S. Cunha will call the caucus at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School St. The caucus is open to all registered Democrats, persons ineligible to register and media representatives. The only persons eligible to participate in any portion of the caucus are those who are registered Democrats in the ward as of Dec. 31, 1993. There will be no absentee or proxy voting.

Registration shall remain open until all persons presenting themselves by 11:15 a.m. have registered, including any in line or outside the meeting place.

Candidates for delegate and alternate must also be present, voting and give his or her written consent to be nominated and that nomination must be seconded by two persons present at the local caucus.

All ballots will be written and secret. Those candidates receiving the greatest number of votes on the first ballot will be elected. Each candidate will be allowed to make a two-minute speech and to distribute on his/her behalf one sheet of paper listing qualifications and ideas.

Slate-making is allowed, but no special preference shall be given to slates. There is no quorum required for the caucus.

There will be no admission or expense charge at the caucus.


Jimmy Tallent, a Boston College High School junior, member of the Bunker Hill Teen Council and a Teen Connection Peer Leader, was elected president.



This major fund raiser for the college scholarship in Michael's name will held at the Bunker Hill Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School St., commencing at 6:15 p.m.

A tribute to Michael, who graduated from Boston Latin School in 1964 and from the College of the Holy Cross on May 29, 1968, receiving a Bachelor degree coupled with his Marine Commission as a second lieutenant.

Mike was sent to Vietnam and, while on a patrol 28 miles south of DaNang on Aug. 29, 1969, was killed in combat. He served with Company H, 2nd Battalion 7th Marines, 1st Marine Division.

A youth of 23 years taken from us. To perpetuate his truly great traits, on Sept. 8, 1969, the Quinn Scholarship Fund for future leaders of Charlestown was established by myself, Stephen Driscoll and Ed Johnson.

To keep pace with the accelerated cost of a college education, Michael's scholarship has been increased to a combined annual award of \$3,000. This 14.3 percent augmentation has been made possible by all of our loyal supporters. Without Stephen Driscoll, Edward Johnson, William Koelsch, Edward Doherty, John Tibbetts, Thomas Morrissey, Michael Powers, Robert Quinn, Thomas White and the late James Kiely and Francis McCluskey, who have given altruistically, the scholarship's positive goals would not have been obtainable.

I thank them on behalf of the Quinn family, the community and myself, for they have made my tenure as treasurer smooth.

Joining Lynn O'Brien at the head table will be her mother, Eileen O'Brien; Michael's resident advisor, Father William J. O'Halloran, S.J., vice president, College of the Holy Cross; Sen. Thomas F. Birmingham, chairman of the Senate Ways and Means Committee, Rep. Richard A. Voke, House Majority Leader; Michael Contompasis, headmaster, Boston Latin; Paul Paget, owner of the Swan Boats; Mary V. Quinn, Michael's mother; and the featured speaker, Lt. Gen. John J. Sheehan, U.S.M.C., representing the commandant of the Marine Corps.

A Somerville native, Sheehan is the Director for Operations, J-3, Joint Staff, Washington, D.C. A 1962 graduate of Boston College, he has served in various command positions ranging from company commander to brigade commander. His combat tours include duty in Vietnam and Desert Shield/Desert Storm. During his career, Sheehan has been awarded The Defense Distinguished Service medal, Silver Star medal, Defense Superior Service medal, Bronze Star medal with Combat "V" and gold star in lieu of a second award and a Purple Heart with gold star. Sheehan is married to the former Margaret M. Sullivan of Boston and they have four children, Kristen, Catherine, Karen and John.

Taxpayers, including those whose first language is not English, will be assisted by students of Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC) in the preparation of their federal and state income tax returns in the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA).

Natasha Lyman of Charlestown is participating in the VITA program.

A unique feature of the BHCC VITA program is the fact that many volunteers are bilingual or multilingual. In addition to English, assistance will be

available in Africaans, Amhoric, Arabic, Byelorussian, Cantonese, Creole (Haitian French) French, Spanish, Ibo, Mandarin, Polish, Russian, Ukraine and Vietnamese.

For the second year, the BHCC VITA program is offering free electronic filing of returns, assuring quicker returns. Taxpayers must sign Form 8453 which is available at BHCC. It must be signed by the filer and by the spouse if it is a joint return.

Between now and April 15, the 45 accounting students, supervised by Vaccaro, will prepare returns for anyone who needs assistance, with special attention going to senior citizens and middle income taxpayers.

The students were qualified to participate in the VITA program after taking a tax course at the college and passing an examination conducted by an IRS representative. The Mass. Department of Revenue also is represented in the program.





### **KEEPING TRACK OF YOUR** MILEAGE EXPENSES CAN CUT YOUR TAXES

If you use your car for certain purposes, you may be able to deduct the expenses you incur on your federal income tax return. Best of all, many of these special uses of your car may be written off even if you failed to save your gas receipts throughout the year.

Instead of keeping tract of your actual out-of-pocket expenses for the use of your car, the Internal Revenue Service has established predetermined amounts that it will allow you to deduct on a "per mile" basis. What's more, you may use these rate and still tack on any additional expenses that you incurred for parking and tolls,

For 1994, the IRS will allow a standard mileage rate of 29 cents per mile for automobiles used for business purposes (up from the 28 cents permitted in 1992 and 1993). The use of this business standard mileage rate method is limited to self-employed individuals or employees who operate only one car for business purposes. It cannot be used for any vehicle that is leased.

IRS mileage allowances, however, aren't restricted solely to people who use their cars for business purposes. Individuals who operate their automobiles in conducting volunteer work may be able to deduct 12 cents per mile as a charitable contribution. You may also be able to deduct 9 cents for each mile you use your car for trips to and from the doctor, dentist or optometrist. Using your car to move your household from one location to another can also be tallied at the rate of 9 cents a mile - if the move qualifies under the federal rules;

Since the IRS will disallow mileage deductions that can't be substantiated, be sure to keep accurate records to back up any mileage deductions taken on your tax return. Estimates are not permitted. To nail down your rightful deductions, keep a log or journal in your car and get in the habit of recording your trips as they occur.

Rep. Richard Voke has joined the Massachusetts Advocacy Project (MAP) to announce the availability of the Medicare Home Health Services Program. This program offers those in need of specialized care the

need of specialized care the option of receiving that care at home, instead of in a nursing home. "This program, which provides skilled home care

provides skilled home care to many elders and persons with disabilities, is a less restrictive as well as a less expensive care option than institutionalization. This benefit, however, is one that is often not utilized, mainly due to a lack of information," says Voke.

MAP services are available to people who meet four requirements: they must be a Medicare beneficiary, their ability to leave home must be restricted, they must require the skilled care the program offers and their doctor must prescribe home-based services. Such services can include: skilled nursing, phy-




### Youngsters And Parents Cautioned Against 'Bumping'


