

## Ward 2 Democratic Caucus

To Be Held On Saturday, Feb. 12

Registered Democrats in Charlestown will be holding a caucus on Saturday, Feb. 12 at $11 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. to elect delegates to the 1994 Maschusetts Democratic Convention.
Charlestown, Ward 2 will be electing 12 delegates and four alternates, equally divided between men and women, to send to the Convention. The apportioned number of delegates has been allocated on the basis of

a formula giving equal weight to the Democratic Party registration and the average vote for Democratic candidates in the last general elections for governor and president for which figures were available at the time delegate tabulations were prepared.
Thomas S. Cunha will call the caucus at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School St. The caucus is open to all registered Democrats, persons ineligible to register and media representatives. The only persons eligible to participate in any portion of the caucus are those who are registered Democrats in the ward as of Dec. 31, 1993. There will be no absentee or proxy voting.
Registration shall remain open until all persons presenting themselves by $11: 15$ a.m. have registered, in-
cluding any in line or outside the meeting place. Candidates for delegate and alternate must also be present, voting and give his or her written consent to be nominated and that nomina tion must be seconded by two persons present at the local caucus.
All ballots will be written and secret. Those candidates receiving the greatest number of votes on the first ballot will be elected. Each candidate will be allowed to make a two-minute speech and to distribute on his/her behalf one sheet of paper listing qualifications and ideas.
Slate-making is allowed, but no special preference shall be given to slates. There is no quorum required for the caucus
There will be no admis sion or expense charge at the caucus.

## KEEPING TRACK OF YOUR

## MILEAGE EXPENSES CAN CUT YOUR TAXES

If you use your car for certain purposes, you may be able to deduct the expenses you incur on your federal income tax return. Best of all, many of these special uses of your car may be written off even if you failed to save your gas receipts throughout the year.
Instead of keeping tract of your actual out-of-pocket expenses for the use of your car, the Internal Revenue Service has established predetermined amounts that it will allow you to deduct on a "per mile" basis. What's more, you may use these rate and still tack on any additional expenses that you incurred for parking and tolls,
For 1994, the IRS will allow a standard mileage rate of 29 cents per mile for automobiles used for business purposes (up from the 28 cents permitted in 1992 and 1993). The use of this business standard mileage rate method is limited to self-employed individuals or employees who operate only one car for business purposes. It cannot be used for any vehicle that is leased.
IRS mileage allowances, however, aren't restricted solely to people who use their cars for business purposes. Individuals who operate their automobiles in conducting volunteer work may be able to deduct 12 cents per mile as a charitable contribution. You may also be able to deduct 9 cents for each mile you use your car for trips to and from the doctor, dentist or optometrist. Using your car to move your household from one location to another can also be tallied at the rate of 9 cents a mile - if the move qualifies under the federal rules.
Since the IRS will disallow mileage deductions that can't be substantiated, be sure to keep accurate records to back up any mileage deductions taken on your tax return. Estimates are not permitted. To nail down your rightful deductions, keep a log or journal in your car and get in the habit of recording your trips as they occur.

## Voke Says Home Health Services <br> Are Available

Rep. Richard Voke has oined the Massachusetts Advocacy Project (MAP) to announce the availability of the Medicare Home Health Services Program. This program offers those in need of specialized care the option of receiving that care at home, instead of in a nursing home.
"This program, which provides skilled home care to many elders and persons with disabilities, is a less restrictive as well as a less expensive care option than
institutionalization. This benefit, however, is one that is often not utilized, mainly due to a lack of informa tion," says Voke
MAP services are available to people who meet four requirements: they must be a Medicare beneficiary, their ability to leave home must be restricted, they must require the skilled care the program offers and their doctor must prescribe home-based services. Such services can include: skilled nursing, phy-

## Cautioned Against 'Bumping'

With the recent snowstorms has come the return of "bumping" to the streets of Charlestown. This is the practice by young people who attach themselves to the rear of vehicles and slide along as it moves forward.
