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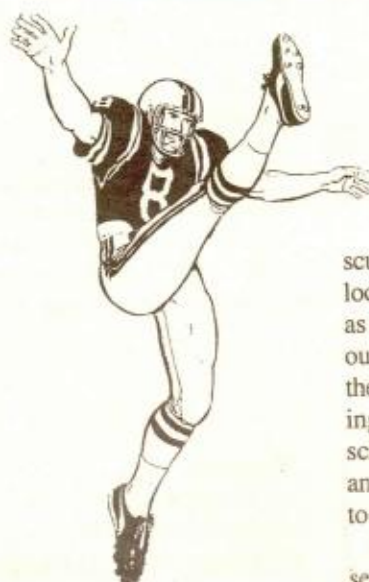

It was September of 1955. The trees were just beginning to dress themselves in the colors of autumn, and the warm summer air was slowly being moved away by the cooler touch of the new, young season. Baseball was reluctantly holding on, but the chalk lines of another football season were quickly being painted on the grasses of local ball fields.

Not one of us in this town could know of the magic that would visit us over the next few months, but as that magic began to unfold, we reached out for it and we rode with it.

The football program at Charlestown High School had endured two full decades of near ob-

scurity. Victories for the local eleven were as rare as snow in July, and serious talks of discontinuing the program had been taking place between the school's administration and the downtown powers to be.

However, the previous season had seen a new, young coach come to the school and, along with him, there seemed to be a rebirth in enthusiasm from the players point of view. Frank Power was that coach, and in those who played for him, he saw promise.

Mr. Power asked that the program be continued. Much discussion followed, and it was finally agreed that, because of the school's poor performance in District League play, they would no longer be able to compete at that level. To keep the program alive, Charlestown High School would agree to a Class D schedule.

The school would face teams from Lynn, Somerville, and other areas outside of the city. To the few of us who were following the team's adventures, this

somehow seemed a step in an upward rather than a downward direction, for city teams historically had a more difficult time with their neighboring contemporaries.

Much of what follows comes from memory, so it may not be one hundred percent accurate, but ultimately it is fact.

Charlestown High School was still slated to compete in the annual Boston Public School Football Jamboree at the White Stadium. For years they had been soundly defeated in this abbreviated affair, but this year, September of 1955, they played against Boston Trade and made a fine showing. It was but a sign of things to come.

Facing their Class D rivals, quite often on Saturday, was a new experience not only for the players, but for local parents and fans as well. As members of the District League, the team played their games during the week, and parents, for the most part, were unable to attend.

Momentum began to

Money Matters

DOCUMENTING CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS

For 1994 tax returns, the new rules state that you must have written acknowledgements documenting charitable contributions of \$250 or more. Unlike prior years, cancelled checks are no longer good enough. Also, the acknowledgements must be in your hands when your 1994 return is filed, or before the due date, whichever comes first.

The IRS realizes many taxpayers are having difficulties getting documentation from charities, so the Service has relaxed the rules a bit. The revised requirement for 1994 returns is that you must obtain acknowledgements by October 16, 1995, or at least have made a good faith effort to get them by that date. If you don't meet this requirement, you can't take the deduction. It doesn't matter whether you file your 1994 return before October 16th - you're eligible for the relief in any case.

Some charities are confused about what information must be provided on acknowledgement forms. You can get what you need by supplying your own form. A sample acknowledgement that complies with IRS guidelines is printed below.

5. Were any goods or services provided by the organization in exchange for the contribution
(other than intangible religious benefits)?

(not needed if only intangible religious benefits were provided).

Recommendation: Before October 16th, send charities letters requesting acknowledgements along with the above form. Keep copies. That proves you tried to get documentation. If the charity doesn't respond, you can still take the deduction.

Want To Learn About The Building Trades?

The Kennedy Center is now taking applications from those interested in applying to The Boston Building Trades' Apprenticeship Preparedness Program.

This program is free of charge and is a 10-week orientation to the building trades from Sept. 12 through Nov. 16.

Classes meet on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 6 to 9 p.m. at

185 Kneeland St., Boston. Students will also visit different construction/union sites on five scheduled Saturdays.

The purpose of the APP program is to acquaint students with the many different Boston building trade unions. APP instructors work and tutor students on mathematics and on developing students' career interests with the trades.

While in the program,

students will have the opportunity to apply for paid apprenticeships with a building trade. If accepted into an apprenticeship, students will earn an apprentice salary while gaining valuable work experience that they may use later in a trade union or private sector job.

As part of the Apprenticeship Preparedness Program, an organization called Women in The Building Trades offers classes for women to prepare

them to enter a primarily male work force. The women's program will focus on the issues of women in construction.

The deadline for applying to this fall's Apprenticeship Preparedness Program is Aug. 4.

CHECKING THE MARGINS FOR 'ARMS'

When you're shopping for Adjustable Rate Mortgages (ARMs), the "margin" is almost as important as the initial rate. The margin is the percentage point above the average yields for Treasury notes on which future rate adjustments will be calculated.

Let's compare two hypothetical one-year ARMs. The first may have an initial interest rate of 8% with a 2.5 margin, while the second begins at 7 7/8% with a 2.75 margin. Both loans have rate caps of 2%. Let's say that at the end of the first year of the loan, the average of the one-year Treasury note yield has been 6 1/2%. For each loan, the lenders will add the margin to that 6 1/2% average yield. Thus, the interest rate for the first loan would increase from 8% to 9%, and the second would go from 7 7/8% to 9 1/4%. While the first had a slightly higher initial rate, it will have lower rates in subsequent years unless the Treasury note rate increases enough to activate the annual caps on the amount of the increase. There is a wide variance among margins in ARMs offered by competing lenders, and this should be a factor when you decide which loan to select.

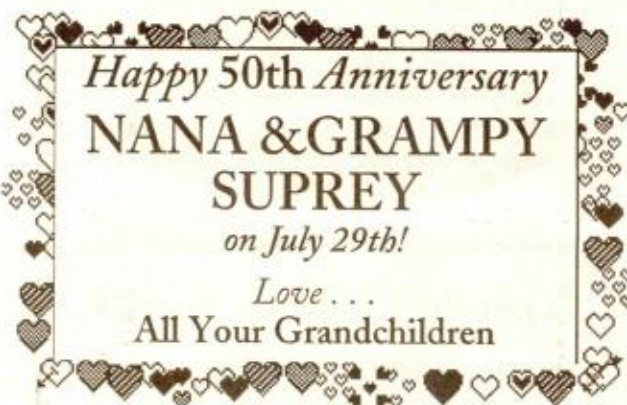

A majority of the customer services offered will be located at the Nashua Street facility. The RMV was ordered out of their current, leased headquarters at 1135 Tremont St. after the Department of Public Health shut down the structure because of ongoing health problems attributed to the building.

"We plan to make this transition as painless as possible for our customers and our dedicated employees," said Registrar Jerold A. Gnazzo. "The telephone numbers will remain the same. The customers utilizing the Boston operation will have to get used to going to Nashua Street again," the registrar added.

The Registry moved into 1135 Tremont St., a building constructed and managed by Metropolitan Structures/Columbia Ventures, in April 1994. Since then, a majority of the 650 Registry employees have experienced physical illnesses believed to be linked to flaking - exposed fireproofing.

Approximately 200 employees will work out of the Nashua Street location. The remaining employees will be housed at Copley Place.

Almost all Registry customer services will be housed in the Nashua Street location. Most problems (title/registration corrections, etc.) can be resolved over the phone. Customers should call the Registry Customer Service Center at 351-4500 with questions or problems. The center is open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Also through the phone center, customers can obtain answers to Registry questions, plus renew an existing registration/pay a moving violation/pay a registration fee, all using MasterCard or Visa.

Public parking for a fee is available nearby to the Nashua Street location. By MBTA, customers should exit at North Station. Nashua Street is located directly be-

hind the Boston Garden.

★ **Parent Information Centers Open Late Every Wednesday . . .** Boston's Parent Information Centers (PICs) can be busy places in August, as thousands of parents register their children for school. This year, the four "PICs" will extend their hours to make it easier for parents, especially working parents, to visit a PIC in the early evening.

For the month of August, all PICs will be open every Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., and every Wednesday from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

"We are extending our hours to accommodate parents' busy schedules, but there is another benefit to visiting a PIC now: If they register their child soon, parents can also avoid the long lines that form later in August," notes Acting Superintendent of Schools Arthur Steller.

To register a child, parents must bring two pre-printed proofs of address (such as a BHA lease and a utility bill) and the child's immunization record, including the results of a tuberculosis test. By state law, a child cannot be registered for school without proof he or she has been immunized. For children going into kindergarten or parents must also bring the child's birth certificate. For more information, Charlestown residents can call The North Zone PIC at 635-8340.

(continued from page 1) build with the first regular season victory, and with the victory, followers grew in numbers. A few more convincing wins fostered a huge dose of confidence, and Frank Power's boys began to truly believe in themselves. Thoughts of a Class D State Championship were still light years away, but those thoughts were slowly beginning to creep into the minds of both players and fans.

The team had many stars, but the one name that quickly became synonymous with Charlestown High School football was Joe Whalen. Although he weighed but one hundred thirty five pounds, Joe was lightning fast, and possessed the moves of a cat. Throughout the season, his exploits were closely followed by the now frenzied citizenry.

It had been so long since a winning football team had graced the local high school, that it seemed everybody was caught up in the excitement.

Joe scored, and Joe scored again. His closest scoring rival that year was a fellow from Winchester High School. His name was Joe Bellino, and he went on to have a fabled career at the United States Naval Academy. Bellino finished his collegiate career by receiving the Heisman Trophy, recognizing him as the best college football player in the country.

There was a Saturday contest against Somerville Trade in which Joe Whalen carried the ball six times in the first half. Each time he carried the ball he scored. Mercifully, Coach Power did not play him in the second half.

Although Joe was the top scorer on the squad, he certainly was not alone in his performance. I do not pretend to know all of the players from that team, but at a future date, when more information is at hand, all will be recognized. There are, though, some whose names are remembered. The quarter-

back was Chuck Chevalier. Chuck's prowess as a basketball player at CHS was already becoming legendary, and his ability on the baseball diamond was nothing short of sensational. Some have gone so far as to say he could run faster than Joe Whalen.

Everything Chuck did athletically, he did with brilliance. It is the opinion of many that he was the greatest athlete in the history of Charlestown High School. His wizardry with the football was a perfect compliment to Joe Whalen's running ability.

The fullback was Ted Fandel. Ted was a good and willing blocker who was able to run quite effectively when the defense

keyed on Whalen.

Bill Healey and John Cowin were running backs whose speed enabled Coach Power to rest Joe Whalen when the situation presented itself.

Bo Batchelder was an end whose long strides and sure hands made him a threat each time Chuck Chevalier stepped back to pass.

Brian and Jim "Crash" McNeil were brothers who terrorized opponents with their devastating line play. Millie - Brian and Jim's mother, - once told me that her boys "helped put Charlestown High School football on the map." She was right!

When the season was finally over in November of 1955, Charlestown High School's football team had saved the program and proved that football did belong at the local school. They had, against all odds, become the State Class D Champions.

Plans are currently underway to recognize this accomplishment with a fortieth anniversary celebration at the Knights of Columbus Hall on Friday, October 20. Although many details including ticket prices, etc., have not yet been worked out, the affair will be open to the public.

Currently, Moe Gillen a member of the 1955

squad, is looking for assistance in locating his former teammates. He is also hoping to hear from any member of that team who might be interested in helping out with the event. Moe can be reached by calling 242-3746.

In September of 1955, I was a fourteen year old high school sophomore. Thoughts of the impact that the CHS team had on this community are so vivid, that it hardly seems forty years have been torn from the calendar. If you were here during that time, I am sure you, too, remember.

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EFL Notebook

So far this season, the Charlestown Townies have had the unfortunate luck of having to play three of the Eastern Football League's (EFL's) top teams right out of the box - those being Billy's (Boston) Cowboys, the Marlboro Shamrocks and the Merrimack Valley Outlaws. The Shamrocks are in first place in the George Murphy Division, while the other two teams are in second place in their respective divisions.

The Townies, now 0-3, fell again last week to the Outlaws 26-0, in a game played at Haverhill Stadium. Townies co-head coaches Jack Green and Jack Morris must now regroup their team for tomorrow night's jaunt to winless Medway, for an 8 p.m. game at Charland Field. Despite losing by four touchdowns, the Charlestown offense showed signs of continued improvement. Quarterback Eddie Sullivan played solidly in the loss, completing nine of 24 attempts for 110 yards.

The main problem for the Townies was inside the red zone. The Charlestown offense was 0 of 6 on converting for a score while inside the Outlaw 20-yard line.

It took the Outlaw offense, which was ranked third in the league entering, nearly one full half to put any points on the board. Merrimack broke through with slightly under two minutes remaining before halftime when former R.I. starter Anthony Squituri connected with former Townie wide out Rob Tammario in a 35-yard bomb, putting the hosts ahead 6-0. Squituri and Tammario hooked up on another score 90 seconds later, this time on a five-yard dump pass, to extend Merrimack's lead to 13-0 entering intermission.

Merrimack didn't wait long to score its only touchdown of the third quarter. Squituri, who completed 20 of 27 passes for an astounding 335 yards, handed the ball off to running back Greg Anderson, who plunged in from two yards away to extend the Outlaw lead to 20-0.

Merrimack Valley put its final touchdown on the board midway through the final period, when Squituri found former Maine Saber Rob Hibbert 70 yards away and subsequently tossed him the ball, making the score 26-0.

John Fidler was the leading rusher for Charlestown in its losing effort (6 carries, 29 yards). Jim Gillis (10-12) and Rick Centola (6-4) also contributed to the ground attack. Orlando Soto, in his second week with the Townies, was the team's leading receiver as he made three catches for 54 yards.

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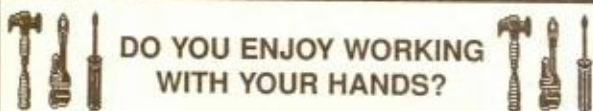

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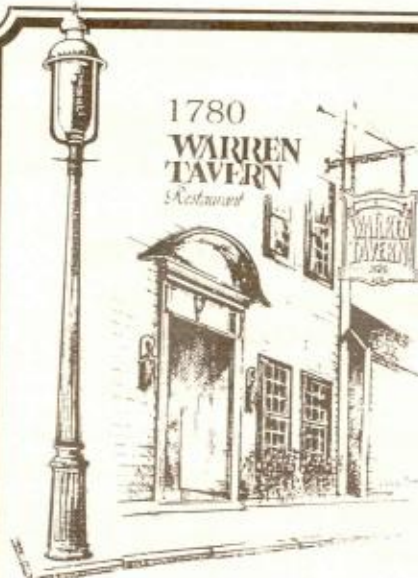
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
