"Blue Flu" Hits Police/Community Relations Meeting

"It's sad that the police didn't come and it's sadder because five people sitting around won't change anything," stated one area businesswoman and Charlestown resident at Tuesday's Police/Community meeting

And so it was - five residents, one reporter and no police

According to Deputy Joseph Saia, Commanding Officer of Area A, who was contacted on Wednesday morning, the lack of police attendance was due to a communication error. Saia stated that this was the first meeting in four years that there were not police present at the monthly meetings.

"That was our fault and I apologize," stated Saia, We had planned to cover the meeting." According to Saia, a last minute call at

the station was responsible for the police absence.

In an interview last month, Saia stated that the Police / Community meetings were held the second Tuesday of each month at the Kent School at 7:00 p.m. Lately, attendance has been low. Saia attributed the low attendance to a low number of complaints and area concerns.

"Attendance at the Community Meetings is low, which reflects the low crime rate. When things are going good, few people show up. But when things are bad, a lot of people

show up," stated Saia

The women who attended Tuesday's meeting stated that for the majority of them this was their first meeting. One woman, who has been robbed twice in the past month and a half, stated that many people do not attend meetings because they can see nothing changing.

In a word, these woman stated that they were frustrated. Two were victims complaining of no satisfaction from the police. Another was a business woman disgusted with vandalism and (continued on page 3)

BOA Defers Action On Proposed Bunker Hill Street Condos

The Board of Appeal of the City of Boston voted unanimously to defer a decision on a proposal presented to the Board on Tuesday, December 11, 1984, to convert the former supermarket at 191-193 Bunker Hill Street, at the corner of Polk Street, into condominiums.

BOA member, Richard Dennis told developer, Jim Langley, that the postponement of a final decision was based on the Board's uncertainty of the appropriate density for the number of units within the two story building, which is

120 feet x 48 feet.

Langley's proposal is to renovate the building, which has been vacant four years, into 18 two-bedroom condominiums units. There would be six units per floor with the price per unit in the range of \$60-70,000. Onsite parking space for 21 cars would be provided in the rear of the building.

While three area residents did voice concern over aspects of the proposal, such as the red brick facade and the safety of exposed utility wiring, there was no opposition to the proposal presented at the hearing.

Patrick Sweeney of Bunker Hill Street stated his only objection was the planned red brick facade, since the building is

located adjacent to the Bunker Hill Projects which are also red brick



Street said that his main concern was that all utility wires, such as cable and telephone wires be grounded for the sake of safety. As far as the design, Haluska stated despite "being boxy in nature," the plan would change a neighborhood "eyesore" into a structure "with a strong sense of character," similiar to the rest of Charlestown.

Langley told the Board that the windows and front door will be replaced with fixtures similiar to "Old Charlestown," stating not only will the building become beneficial to the community by providing moderate income housing, but will be "architecturally eye pleasing."

The BOA will hear the proposal again on Tuesday, January 22, 1985 at 10:00 a.m. at City Hall in Room 801. In the meantime, the Board recommended that Langley meet with the Boston Redevelopment Authority on the issue of density.

Howell Grand Prize Winner In Holiday Greeting Cards Program



"The police are as lax in their meetings as much as they are in protecting the town," stated one angry woman

While Saia stated earlier that Charlestown has the fastest response time of any area of the city, the delay from the time that the the individual calls the station and the arrival of a patrol is due to the prioritizing of calls by the dispatcher.

"You mean to say, there is a difference between a call to report a robbery and a call reporting a robbery in progress? It's so obviousit's stupid, that if I am being robbed I can't call the police until afterwards," stated one

Another woman came to the meeting Tuesday because "I wanted to talk face to face with someone because when I call 911 I get someone on the other end asking me 'What do you want the police to do?"







Paramount Development Seeks Land Parcel

The City of Boston Public Improvements Commission will hold a public

hearing on Thursday, December 20, 1984 on a petition by Paramount

Development Associates, Inc. to purchase an approximately 1000 square

foot land parcel from the

The triangular parcel, which was once part of Hurds Lane, extends 60 feet west of Hurds Lane on the northerly side of Harvard Square. This land abuts the former Boston Filter Building.


Paramount Development Associates are presently constructing the Courtyard Condominiums which will be residential and commercial condominiums, on the area of land enclosed by Main Street, Hurds Lane, Harvard Square and Harvard Street. The cityowned parcel is located on the corner of Harvard Square and Hurds Lane.

According to Project Manager Jack Rizzo, the city suggested the developer purchase the land because of its relatively small size and proximity to the construction project.

Rizzo stated that the land will allow for flexibility in the construction of a new building abutting the lot and additional courtyard

According to Kathryn Downing, President of the Charlestown Preservation Society, the cobblestone


streets, with granite pavers in the area of Harvard Square are some of the oldest streets in the Commonwealth. They were laid out in 1629, a year before John Winthrop's colony arrived in Charlestown. There is still some of the original paving in this area. Downing has received a commitment from Rizzo Paramount that Development will replace the cobblestones and granite pavers in this triangle of land, if they are awarded the parcel by the Public Improvements Commission.

Facts About Drugs -F.A.D.

'My name is Peter. I am a recovering drug addict. I'd like to share my experience, strength and hope so that other people who can identify can seek help.

Peter (not his real name) told his story. He was from a large Charlestown family and he says he was spoiled. He more or less got what he wanted. When he was ten years old, he had his first experience with alcohol on the streets, and he was able to continue drinking, using his parents' supply. At age 12, he tried sniffing glue and liked it better than alcohol. He used it daily with a friend until the friend had a bad experience, and Peter got scared. So he stopped sniffing glue, but soon discovered Darvon (a narcotic pain killer) given to him by an older relative.

Peter says one of his problems was that he really didn't want anyone to know who he was, and he didn't know how to express his feelings. He hung out in a lot of places and considered himself a loner, though he always had a lot of friends. He never took drugs in front of his family, but he was a master manipulator. When he was caught for breaking and entering at age 14. he got off. During this time, he worked and went to

school. Part of the excitement of drug use, said Peter, was finding ways of getting his next drug. "It becomes an obsession." He used a variety of drugs, speed, downers. hallucinogens, and would stay near his suppliers. After a period of time, hooked on barbituates, he overdosed and ended up in the hospital. Back on the streets he switched to uppers, cocaine primarily. He



The family that stays together can not avail themselves of the hand

This life style is what the Catholic bishops are asking the American people to blindly support. It is the wrong approach. What the bishops should be advocating is less dependence on government, and more in the free enterprise systems which has stood the test of time and is the most successful economic policy in the history of mankind.

I doubt if there is any man or woman who does the family shopping who has not witnessed at the check out stand of their local supermarket, the number of people with over-loaded shopping carts paying for their purchases with food stamps, then wheeling them out the parking lot and loading them into trunks of automobiles far newer than the average taxpayer can afford to own.

These are the people who have learned how to beat the system. They are the women who are supposed to have been abandoned by their husbands or live-in boy friend.

I contend that the man of the household must, in theory, live apart for the sole purpose of insuring

that the woman will continue to receive welfare and food stamps, and at the same time receive her weekly allotment from the husband or friend (unknown to welfare agency, of course).

What is truly amazing, and what upsets the taxpaying supporters of this life style is the fact that the man of the house is never made to support the family he is responsible for. It is apparent that he is close enough to home to assure himself of conjugal visitations which usually result in another dependent for the welfare state each vear.

The problem with the system is that the bureaucracy that administers the welfare state is so massive, and so far removed from it that it is totally out of control.

What is needed to rectify the situation is to return to the welfare system to the local level where it can be monitored correctly to insure against the massive abuse that now exists. It should be reduced, if at all possible, right down to the city or town level where inspectors can do the job that the bureaucracy can not do.

If those capable of working for a living were made to do just that, then the truly needy could be cared for in a dignified way, and we could increase the benefits they 50 desperately need and
