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Voke Refiles Consumer Utility Board Bill

"The time has come for consumers to have a strong and constant voice in the setting of electric, gas and telephone rates," said Rep. Richard Voke upon the refiling of legislation to establish a Consumer Utility Board (CUB). In again initiating the bill to provide consumers with the ammunition to fight mammoth utility companies, Voke had dedicated the effort to the late Joe Kent, the Charlestown community activist who for several years, worked tirelessly with Voke on the CUB bill.

"Among the many community efforts in which he was involved, Joe was the local community organizer for the passage of CUB, Back in the mid-80s, Joe spent a great deal of time canvassing local neighborhoods to educate people about CUB and gain their support. It will come as no surprise to any who remember his commitment to Charlestown when I say that never have I received so much mail on a particular issue as I did on CUB after Joe hit the streets in his attempts to again help others," said Voke.

Unfortunately, those efforts by Voke and Kent were derailed as constitutionality questions dogged the passage of CUB. Voke says the consumer advocacy organization MASSPIRG (Massachusetts Public Interest Research Group), with whom he is again sharing his crusade, has been able to resolve CUB's constitutionality, an effort he hails as tremendous news for consumers.

"While David versus Goliath struggles end happily in fairy tales, the cold truth of the real world is much harsher. Given the tremendous and seemingly unlimited weaponry utilities possess, even the best organized grass roots efforts are outgunned. CUB seeks to 'level the battlefield' by gathering the resources consumers need to wage a fair battle to capture rate equi-

ty," Voke stressed.

If adopted, CUB would be voluntarily funded and democratically controlled by ratepayers. Consumers would learn about CUB through their utility bills or government mailings. These notices would describe CUB and invite consumers to join for a \$6 per year contribution, or \$1 per year if the ratepayer is low-income. A Board of Direc-

tors would be elected from the membership to make policy decisions, hire staff and oversee the budget. Best of all says Voke, since CUB is self-supporting, it uses no tax dollars and creates no government bureaucracy.

"Consumers in this day and age need lawyers and accountants, engineers and researchers in order to arm themselves with the same level of sophistication and expertise utility companies have. Elderly living on fixed incomes, homeowners who can no longer absorb tax and utility rate increases and tenants who seemingly get squeezed in every direction all need stronger advocacy and more determined resolve," commented Voke.

"Although Joe is no longer with us, the ideals he pursued still live on. I can think of no better tribute to him than to again take up the cause of ratepayer equity," concluded Voke.

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



ESTIMATED TAX PAYMENT RULES TO BE MUCH SIMPLER THIS YEAR

Currently, taxpayers required to make quarterly estimated tax payments must generally either prepay 90 percent of their current tax bill or 100 percent of their prior year's tax bill. But the the rules have a complicated hitch in them. The prior year's tax option is not available if your gross income for the year is (1.) at least \$75,000 (\$37,500 for separate filers) and (2.) has increased by at least \$40,000 from the prior year (\$20,000 for separate filers).

But thanks to the new tax law, this complex set of rules will soon be tossed aside. Beginning next year, taxpayers whose incomes fluctuate widely from year to year will no longer have to worry about being hit with underpayment penalties if their income takes a substantial jump upward. Like other taxpayers, most will generally be able to escape any penalty by simply prepaying 90 percent of their current year's tax or 100 percent of their prior year's tax.

Under the new rules, people with more than \$150,000 of adjusted gross income in the prior year who choose to base their payments on the prior year's tax will have to remit 110 percent of the last year's tax. However, they can still get around the penalty by prepaying 90 percent of the current year's tax. The new law will be much simpler because the trigger for higher estimated payments is based on the prior year, not the current year. It is often difficult to figure out current year taxable income on which to base estimates.

Keep in mind, however, that the new law changes don't take effect until the April 15, 1994 estimated tax payment. The estimated tax payments for 1993 are still subject to the current tough rules. Therefore, if your 1993 income will take a substantial jump over 1992, be sure to prepay at least 90 percent of this year's tax to avoid underpayment penalties.

Looking back over these two school years, what makes this project unique is that tricky math word problems are invented in New York for 80,000 youngsters worldwide in such a way that a standard is set and it is the child's job to reach up to that standard. Any

pleas to make the problems easier are ignored.

The child's production in solving problems is the only thing which is measured. For example, no credit is given for effort, smiling nicely, personality or who your friends are. The most impressive thing about the Harvard-Kent youngsters is that they have accepted and stayed with this big challenge. By accepting such a

challenge, the children know they must work creatively each week in spite of the strain.

This March contest brought out the best in four students who gave their top performance of the year: Phan Quoc Hoang, Christina Dalrymple and Joshua Gans got an awesome three out of five correct, while Sandy Ha got two out of five, showing that she has

finally found the knack of problem solving. The overall best problem solver, Yu Lin Tan (Janice), equaled her best output of the year getting three out of five. Also, fourth grader James Smith was outstanding, getting two out of five. Finally, giving above average performances with one correct were: Megan Burke. Teresa Chow, Melissa Noe and Jessica Sherrion Henderson.

Healthy Charlestown Coalition

The Healthy Charlestown Coalition has been hard at work over the past several months developing an Action Plan to take us through the next one to three years. The Community Assessment Report we completed in the fall set the priorities for the group to address. Underlying all solutions is our vision of a healthy community; one that is inclusive; provides opportunities for residents to participate and contribute; and addresses concerns proactively. From the assessment, we heard residents say that we need to think in terms of individual responsibilty, building on our resources.

The Action Plan Committee worked diligently to make sense out of all the report's information in order to come up with program ideas that were on target. The focus that emerged was on communication within the community. If we can get people to talk to each other across the arbitrary boundaries that divide us, we're on our way to solving the problems that unite us, like community violence, substance abuse and other health and lifestyle issues. The groups that seemed the most likely place to start were young families and adolescents because that's where the generations meet.

Some ideas include Options for Charlestown. This program would include mentors for families and teens; internships and career fairs; a volunteer bank; ESL and adult literacy classes, to name some proposed activities.

The Violence Prevention Program would build on what is already in the community such as the Words Not Weapons program at Charlestown High and add activities like conflict resolution training for families and youth and how about an intergenerational volleyball league this summer for everybody in town? Another great idea for everybody: a Welcome Wagon to introduce Charlestown to newcomers. This might include a history and map of Charlestown, a guide to services and organizations, informational brochures and maybe the business community might want to contribute coupons for their services or products. We're also exploring health and lifestyle issues.

We've recently applied for a grant to offer smoking cessation programs at various sites in the community e.g. Edwards Middle School, St. Catherine's and the BHA Teen Center, to make it easier and more convenient to quit. Environmental health issues are also on the agenda. And lastly we're thinking about a Public Service Campaign to get at attitudes and perceptions that hold us back as a community.

If any of these ideas strike your fancy, there's still time to get involved. We're at the activity design stage and we're looking for the input of interested residents and professionals to help us sketch in the details. Call Joanne at 241-3756 or Lynn at 241-8866 and we'll put you in touch with the right team. These are exciting ideas for Charlestown and we need you to make them work.

A team representing Community Boating in Boston won the Shake-A-Leg Mid-Winter Regatta held March 4-6 in Miami. Shake-A-Leg is an organization devoted to providing recreational opportunities to the disabled. One of its cornerstones is the sailing program which originated in Newport, R.I. in a boat specially designed for its needs.

The Miami regatta was held in Freedom 21's, a specially adapted boat which has specially designed rotating seats and a simplified rigging plan to make operating the boats easier so the sailors can concentrate on their tactics and forget about their special needs.

The Community Boating team was made up of skipper Rusty Sergeant, a paraplegic, and Duncan Gilles-

pie, a hemiplegic, both of Charlestown, and Warren Trafton, an able-bodied representative of the Community Boating staff. The team received 7.75 points in eight races sailed in light to moderate breezes on Biscayne Bay. Eighteen threeperson crews consisting of two disabled sailors and one able-bodied sailor participated in the three-day event which was preceded by a three-day clinic to help sailors hone their skills.

Shake-A-Leg founder and Executive Director Harry

Horgan echoed the sentiments of each participant when he said, "This is what the Regatta is all about integrating disabled sailors with able-bodied crews in a celebration of sailing abilities not disabilities.
