
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




* Spray Pool At The Doherty Park . . . Representatives from the Boston Parks Department met

with residents at the site of the spray pool in Doherty Park on Bunker Hill Street on July 19.

Boston Parks personnel Justine Liff, director of Planning and Development, Stan Ivan, chief enand James gineer; "Stretch" Walsh, regional administrator, explained to the residents the procedure necessary to correct the problems at the spray pool.

The residents were told that it would be necessary to dig up the spray pool. They came to the decision that the spray pool should be left as is through the hot weather. Parents were admonished to take extra precautions with their children due to the rough surface of the facility.

According to the Parks Department, the spray pool will be dug up after Labor Day and will be resurfaced with concrete similar to the current edging on the pool. Also, four sprays will be installed, bring the total number of sprays to 10.

Parents were also told that when the concrete is poured at the pool, the youngsters will be able to put their handprints into the surface.

During this time, the licensed premises shall be closely monitored for sound emanation problems. At the end of this provisional period, the licensee may petition for a revision of the above conditions.

Sen. John F. Kerry, a former Navy swift boat commander in Vietnam, will be the guest speaker for the commissioning ceremony. Vice Adm. Douglas Katz, Commander Naval Surface Force, Atlantic Fleet, will place the ship into commission during ceremonies set to begin at 10 a.m.

The Arleigh Burke Class guided missile destroyer is 505' long, 66' wide and is propelled by four gas turbine engines (continued on page 5)

History Comes Alive On The 'USS Cassin Young'

Boston National Historical Park will again present its program, "Tin Can Blue Jacket," a free living history tour of the WW II Destroyer USS Cassin Young (DD-793), every Monday and Friday at 2 p.m. through Aug. 20 at the Charlestown Navy Yard. There will be no program on Friday, Aug. 13.

The hour-long program will transport visitors in time and place to San Diego, California in May of 1946, where USS Cassin Young was being refitted. Their guide during the tour of Cassin Young will be Boatswain's Mate Second Class Christopher Heywood, portrayed in character by National Park Service Ranger Chris Edwards.







The mission of Ramage is to operate offensively as a unit of a carrier battle group and surface action group. Ramage is equally capable of conducting air, surface, sub-surface and strike warfare. The ship was built at Ingalls Shipbuilding in Pascagoula, Miss.

Ramage is named in honor of Vice Adm. Lawson P. Ramage, a native of Monroe Bridge, Mass. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for his actions during a pre-dawn attack by USS Parche (SS 384) on a Japanese convoy on July 31, 1944.

Throughout the remainder of WW II, Ramage served a personnel officer on the staff of Commander Submarines, Pacific Fleet.

Following WW II, Ramage served as chief of the Surface Objectives Branch, Office of the Assistant Chief of Naval Operations (Guided Missiles); director of the Undersea Warfare Division, Office of the Chief of Naval Operations and deputy commander of the Submarine Force, Atlantic Fleet.

He retired from active service in the U.S. Navy in April, 1970, and died at his home in Bethesda, Md., on April 15, 1990.

World War II Vets Honored At Legion's 'Nite Before' Banquet

This year's 'Nite Before' Banquet, a tradition
with Bunker Hill Post 26,
The American Legion, for
over 75 years was cosponsored by the Bunker
Hill Day Parade Committee and Bunker Hill
Council 62, Knights of
Columbus, who donated
their hall for the event.

While the parade allowed for a public tribute to the veterans of World War II, the banquet was a special time, not only for this year's Chief Marshal Tom Hickey, but for the almost 30 veterans of that war who joined in the celebration. They were the recipients of a memorial coin marking the 50th anniversary of the World War II victory, designed by Tom Gorsuch and provided by Bunker Hill Post.

The evening began with the posting of the colors by the color guard from the USS Samuel Eliot Morison, docked in the Charlestown Navy Yard during the Bunker Hill Day festivities. A delicious fullcourse turkey dinner by Marty's Caterers, with the background music of the WW II era by the Richard DeLuca Band.

The tone of the evening was set by Rev. Daniel J. Mahoney, pastor of St. Francis de Sales. In his invocation, Father praised the WW II veterans as "true keepers of the peace."

World traveler Joe Kelley, who had spent the previous weekend with Ambassador Raymond Flynn in Rome, brought an Apostolic Blessing to Jim Conway, parade chairman, and his wife Gloria. The blessing was offered to the "Conways and to the American Legionnaires of Charlestown on Bunker Hill Day as a pledge of continued divine protection from His Holiness John Paul."

Conway, who acted as master of ceremonies, introduced headtable guests including K. of C. Grand Knight Ed Woods and Building Committee Chairman Tom Cunha; WW II Marine veteran Herb Hodge; and U.S. Navy veteran and retired presiding justice of the Charlestown District Court Mary Brennan. Also present was Mayor Thomas Menino, who had to leave prior to the start of the banquet, as did Senator Thomas Birmingham and Senator Robert Travaglini.

Cmdr. Thomas Daniel, USN, commanding officer of the Morison, brought greetings from the officers and crew of the ship, and presented Hickey with a souvenir packet.

Daniel was a shipmate of Cmdr. Richard Amirault, USN, commanding officer of USS Constitution, and that led to some banter. Amirault spoke of his relief of command of "Old Ironsides" the end of July and how it will be up to Cmdr. Michael Beck, to go up and down the hills of Charlestown. He also suggested a Charlestown turnaround on Constitution when her repairs are completed and she is out of drydock, and suggested a tape of the discussion be forwarded to Beck.

The 1995 Monument Orator James P. O'Donnell, USMC praised Conway for the work he does, noting he was a Marine, and said he was looking forward to Bunker Hill Day.

Past Commander Arthur Hurley took the opportunity to introduce Charlestown Mayor Tom Donahue and Rose Nicole DeRoeve. Commander Paul Morceau expressed his appreciation for those who came to the event.

Boston City Councillor Diane Modica was joined by Councillor Albert O'Neil in presenting a City Council Resolution commending Hickey.

John Burchill, superintendent of the Boston National Historical Park, presented a WW II ballcap to Hickey. He told Hickey that he could never think of him without the verses of How Great Thou Art, the hymn Hickey sings traditionally during the Bunker Hill Day Patriotic Exercises. Burchill told him: "Tom, how great thou art!"

Commissioner of Veterans Services for the city Thomas Materazzo, was also a WW II U.S. Army veteran in the Battle of the Bulge, as was Hickey and O'Neil. He was joined by Judy Evers, regional coordinator of the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, in presenting Hickey with an engraved Paul Revere Bowl.

Rep. Richard A. Voke, House Majority Leader, reflected on the WW II conflict. He spoke of the dedicated service by U.S. men and women in 1940 when this was an isolationist nation. After the attack on Pearl Harbor, the call went out and this single nation sent its troops into all the battles in Europe, Africa, the East and Near East and the Pacific, and defeated both Japan and Germany.

Voke noted, "Lest we forget." He did explain that he had not fought in time of war, but he has fought and will continue to fight for veterans benefits, veterans housing and proper medical care.





Hot Weather Spells Danger! Attention Boston Senior Citizens

Heat is a killer. Most of the victims are elderly and hot weather can place a dangerous strain on your body, especially your heart. If the burden is too great, heat can make you very sick.

Facts About The Heat

- Temperatures above 90°F can be very dangerous, especially when the humidity is also high. Crowded living conditions increase this danger.
- Your body needs time to adjust to hot weather. A sudden increase in temperature, especially in early summer, is particularly dangerous because your body is unprepared for the
- It doesn't take a "Killer Heat Wave" to kill you.
 If you are feeling hot and uncomfortable, take steps to avoid heat stress

 Heat stress can cause many medical problems including heat exhaustion, heat stroke, heart failure and stroke. Proper precautions can make you more comfortable, prevent illness and even save your life.

Watch Your Step

Your chances of getting sick in hot weather are increased by: A weak or damaged heart; hypertension; problems with circulation; diabetes, a previous stroke, being overweight, an infection or fever, diarrhea, drinking alcoholic beverages, skin diseases or a sunburn which may reduce sweating.

Drugs

Many prescription drugs can make you much more vulnerable to the heat. If you take medicine for high blood pressure, nervousness, depression, poor circulation or sleeping, check with your doctor or pharmacist for advice.

Early Warning Signs

Heat stress can cause physical and mental changes. These changes are warning signs that your body is in danger. Some changes are more dangerous than others. Most people feel hot and uncomfortable during hot weather, and may notice a lack of energy or loss of appetite. These are MILD SIGNS, and unless they last a long time, there is no need to be alarmed.

Other signs are more serious. If you experience any of the SERIOUS SIGNS such as dizziness, weakness, fainting or vomiting during hot weather, call your doctor or seek other medical help.

To beat the heat:

- · Drink plenty of fluids;
- Limit outside activities to early AM or late PM;
- Use a fan or air conditioner; if you do not have an air conditioner in the house, access a building where it's available;
- Take frequent baths or showers;
- Wear a hat and loose, light-colored clothing;
- Open window at top and bottom, and keep the shades down during the
 day:
 - Avoid using the oven;
- Keep an eye on your neighbors who are at risk for heat disorders - "The Buddy System."



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'Serving The Fleet' Exhibit Now Open At The Charlestown Navy Yard

John Burchill, superintendent of the Boston National Historical Park, announced that a major exhibit, "Serving the Fleet," the history of the Charlestown Navy Yard, has opened. The free exhibit, located in Building 125, near the historic Lightship, Nantucket, is open every day from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. through Oct. 8.

The Charlestown Navy Yard has a rich history of serving our nation's defense spanning the period from 1800 to its closure in 1974. During its most active period in WW II, it employed over 50,000 workers, some 20 percent of whom were women.

"Serving the Fleet" details their stories, as well as the ships built at the Yard and the many innovations in shipbuilding developed at the facility. The making of rope and the invention of die-lock chain are also discussed in the exhibit. A Park Ranger is available to answer questions about the exhibit, Navy Yard history and the National Park Service programs.

Davis-Mullen Seeks Re-Election To City Council

Although it has never been a secret, Boston City Councillor Peggy Davis-Mullen made it official at her campaign kick-off in South Boston last week. She will seek re-election to the Boston City Council!

The first-term Boston City Councillor, who has virtually never stopped campaigning, made the announcement in front of an audience of more than 250. Davis-Mullen plans on using a positive campaign strategy that will focus on the issues and concerns of Boston residents.

Introduced as the "Education Councillor," and "an asset to the city of Boston who is getting the job done for our families," Davis-Mullen has followed through on her promise to make the Boston Public Schools a credible, viable and better educational option for Boston parents.

In addition to assuring that more money for regular education students was put into the \$444 million school budget before her committee would pass it, Davis-Mullen's other accomplishments include: helping to create 17 new full-day kindergarten classes; obtaining \$31 million to improve public schools in danger of losing accreditation; \$750 thousand to

fund GED and Adult-Ed classes; and helping to create and implement Charter Education classes this fall for youngsters in grades K through 12. "If the neighborhoods of Boston are going to survive, it depends on the success of our public schools and the confidence parents have in those schools," she said.

Of particular note, however, is the progress she made on her "Neighborhood Schools" proposal. A strong opponent of the Boston Public School Controlled Choice assignment plan, Davis-Mullen is following through on her pledge to allow child-

ren to attend the school of their choice. Her Neighborhood Schools survey, which is privately funded by the Bain Co., is currently underway and changes in the assignment process will happen as soon as 1996. "I like my job and I want to go back to the city council to make sure the job is done right," Davis-Mullen told her supporters.

Davis-Mullen, who resides in South Boston with her husband William and three young sons, Jake, Jesse and Bartley, vowed to continue a leadership role on issues that are important to the residents of Boston. (political announcement)

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

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


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EFL Notebook

Last Friday evening, Charlestown yielded 35 points in its loss to Marlboro. The Townies, 0-2 in the Murphy Division, fell behind early in the Shamrocks tilt, suffering a 16-0 deficit after only one period of play.

Shamrock starting quarterback Dave Palazzi (2 of 5, 41 yards) put the game's inaugural score on the board when he hooked up with veteran Frank Fay on a 23-yard pass play down the right sideline. Ex-Townie kicker John Toyias booted the point after through the uprights to put the hosts ahead 7-0. Toyias would soon extend the Shamrock advantage when he kicked a 24-yard field goal midway through the period, giving Marlboro a 10-point cushion.

Palazzi, considered the best quarterback in American Minor League Football and a former quarterback with the Shreveport Pirates of the Canadian Football League, struck again late in the quarter when Bob Ferrari hauled in an 18yard pass to put the Shams comfortably ahead. A 20-yard run by Fay in the closing stages of the first-half pushed Marlboro's lead to 22-0.

Things continued to be rough for Charlestown in the second-half when Chris Butts snared an Eddie Sullivan pass near midfield and returned it for a score, putting Charlestown down 29-0. Antwon Lark put the final nail in Charlestown's coffin when he gained possession of a Ken Kinsey throw at the 20 yard line and subsequently romped into the end zone in the game's closing minutes. While facing one of the best defenses in minor league football, Sullivan did the best that could be expected. The Pope John product completed six of 15 passes for 51 yards, not great, but solid.

John Fidler was the leading Townie rusher accumulating 25 yards on six carries.

Dan Hendrix excelled as Marlboro's second string quarterback. The former Maine Sabres' standout made five completions for 105 yards.

Charlestown made an improvement when playing Marlboro last Friday, although that may be hard to believe. The last time the two teams met on Aug. 6, 1993, the Shamrocks handed the Town Team a 36-0 defeat.

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Now that April 15 has passed, you probably aren't thinking about income taxes. But with summer here, you can still cut your taxes for 1995

Vacation homes. If you're planning to spend several weeks at the beach house that you rent out for the rest of the summer, you might want to check out the tax rules concerning personal use. By adjusting the number of days you use your vacation home, you may be able to deduct any rental loss you incur.

Combing business and vacation travel. Travel expenses are deductible if the travel is undertaken primarily for business purposes; thus you may wish to combine attendance at an out-of-town business conference with a visit to family or friends. (The expenses attributable to the personal part of the trip, though, remain nondeductible). When doing any business traveling, make a distinction in your records between expenses for lodging and transportation and those for meals and entertainment. Only the latter are subject to a 50% deduction limitation.

Hire the kids. If you own your own business, pay your children to work for you. You'll get a deduction at your higher bracket, while the children will be taxed on their wages at their lower rate. They won't be taxed at all on the first \$3,900 of earned income. Wages you pay to your under-18 child may be exempt from Social Security and Medicare tax. (This exemption applies only to your own children). The pay must be reasonable for the work actually performed.

Fixing up the house? If you make permanent improvements to your home - such as adding landscaping, fencing or a new porch - you will get no immediate tax benefit. But those costs will add up to additional tax basis in your home, which will reduce whatever gain you may realize when you sell.


