Charlestown Records A 45% Voter Turnout In Tuesday's Primary Election

Some 45% of the registered voters in Ward Two, Charlestown cast their ballots in the State Primary Election on Tuesday. September 16th. The present voter registration in this community, as released by the City of Boston Election Department, is 6,321 Democrats, 423 Republicans and 1938 Independents - for a total of 8,682 registered voters.

National attention has focused on the race to succeed Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill as United States Congressman from the Eighth Congressional District. The Kennedy "magic" at the ballot box, combined with an energetic, aggressive local political organization, placed Joe Kennedy far out in front of the field of candidates. Kennedy captured some 62% of the Democratic vote cast for Congressman in this community - with eleven candidates on the ballot. The nearest opponent, George Bachrach, garnered only 16% of the vote cast, with Jim Roosevelt receiving 13%. Kennedy will face Republican Clark Abt in the November Election.

Boston City Councillor Maura Hennigan fared well in Charlestown in her quest for the seat of State Auditor,

Charlestown Primary Election Results By Precinct - Page Nine

The race for the Sheriff of Suffolk County generated considerable interest in the community, with Boston City Councillor Albert L. "Dapper" O'Neil and Special Sheriff Robert Rufo going down to the wire for the nod. The tally was close in this community, with O'Neil taking 49% of the local vote and Rufo receiving 46%. Both candidates displayed strong support among residents - resulting in a few confrontations during the final weeks of the but the nomination went to State Representative Joseph DeNucci of Newton. Hennigan received 59% of the Charlestown vote with 37% for DeNucci.

Former United States Congressman Jim Shannon took 74% of the local vote to JoAnn Shotwell's 26% in the race for Attorney General, with Shannon receiving the nomination statewide.

Joseph A. Langone was successful in seeking a fifth term as the Governor's (continued on page 9)



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Nomination Papers Available For Kennedy Center Board

Will Wheeler Paddle To Plymouth — And Paddle Back?

Will Richard Wheeler, Director of the USS Constitution Museum in the Charlestown Navy Yard, fulfill his promise to paddle his kayak from Charlestown to the Mayflower II in Plymouth and then paddle the return trip? Wheeler says yes, skeptics aren't so sure.

When questioned as to the reason for this kayak excursion, Wheeler explained that the Museum, as with other non-profit organizations, frequently has problems raising funds for both operational expenses and special projects. This was the case in 1984 when road access disruptions to the Museum site created a deficit in working capital and Wheeler was pondering a novel way to raise needed funds. He combined his interest in his kayak with a plan to paddle 50 miles to Plymouth. thus Paddlethon I was born and the necessary operating monies were raised.

Now comes 1986 and Paddlethon II.

Wheeler stated that the USS Constitution Museum has been offered the opportunity to buy a Constitution-related treasure that he feels "simply must become a part of our permanent collection" - an oil painting of Commodore William Bainbridge that was done by Sarah Peale in 1822.

In relating the importance of this piece of art to the Museum, Wheeler said that Commodore Bainbridge followed Hull as skipper of Constitution. Six months after the Guerriere victory came the Java engagement, and the name Bainbridge was carved forever into our history.,

Wheeler stated that this painting, done by a superb artist from a renown family of artists, is by far the best likeness of the Commodore and he feels that the asking price of \$40,000

The Director is asking the Charlestown community to support him in his Paddlethon to purchase the painting of Commodore Bainbridge. He said that a booklet will be printed, crediting each contributor to the fundraising effort.

Wheeler will begin Paddlethon II from "Old Ironsides" on Friday morning, October 17th. He will paddle the 50 miles to Plymouth, have dinner, take a nap and then paddle the 50 miles back to Charlestown, arriving at "Old Ironsides" before she fires her "sundown" cannon on Saturday, October 18th. A radio equipped "chase boat" will trail Wheeler both ways.

Wheeler stated, "Museums are about a lot of things and one of those things is collecting. Here is a once-only chance for the USS Constitution Museum to acquire a major work of art that represents just about everything the Museum stands

Wheeler requests that residents support him in his Paddlethon efforts - either with a donation or a pledge per mile.

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

USS Bunker Hill Arrives At Charlestown Navy Yard To Warm "Townie" Welcome

Captain Quast, Commanding Officer of USS Bunker Hill, is no stranger to Charlestown and her residents. He captured the hearts and respect of many during last June's Bunker Hill Day celebration when he, his wife, Peggy, and their son, Tommy, participated in the community's festivities. Captain Quast was an Honorary Chief Marshal in the Bunker Hill Day Parade and was the Monument Orator at the Patriotic Exercises on June 17th. His wife and son also marched the parade route carrying signs in recognition of the POW/MIAs. Their spirit and sense of caring was contageous and they left Charlestown last June with many friends in this community.

Several aspects of the arrival of the USS Bunker Hill in Charlestown were unique. Immediately noticeable, as the ship neared the docking area between Piers 4 and 5 in the Navy Yard, was the flag flying from the top of the ship in the strong wind a white flag with black lettering and a red heart reading We Love (with a heart) Townies'

Later in the day, Captain Quast related a telephone call he had received from a reporter on a Boston daily newspaper asking him what the flag on top was. Captain Quast replied, "It is a 'We Love Townies' flag." The reporter questioned him as to why they were flying this flag, to which the Captain responded, "Is there any other part of Boston?"

As the USS Bunker Hill was making her way into Boston Harbor, a delegation of Charlestown residents waited on Pier 5 in the cold wind. Facing outwards toward the harbor, all looked anxiously for a glimpse of the vessel. Helicopters hovered over the area and finally the sails of the Spirit of Massachusetts were sighted, leading the ship into the inner harbor. The excitement mounted as the grey mass on the horizon came closer and the spectators stood in awe as this, the most technologically

the world, prepared to dock. As the ship approached, the crew lined the decks, and as they looked toward the Monument, a sign delivering the message "Charlestown Welcomes CG-52, USS Bunker Hill and Crew" was in sight, draped on the side of Building 197 in the Navy Yard.

Besides the Charlestown delegation, military and National Park Services personnel, the Navy ROTC from West Roxbury High School, representatives from Ingalls Shipbuilding in Pascagoula who built the vessel, former Navy persons, families of crew members, along with a brass ensemble - were all on hand to greet the USS Bunker Hill.

Those gathered watched as the harbor tugs guided the ship towards the Navy Yard, and when the vessel was positioned across Pier 4 and Pier 5, the tugs pushed USS Bunker Hill sideways to the docks - the bow at Pier 5 and the stern at Pier 4. National Park Services personnel then secured the ropes from the ship and positioned the gangway.

During this procedure. there was much handwaving and greetings from the shore as families of the crew and local residents spotted familiar faces on board the ship.


Each of the Charlestown residents wore a "I Love USS Bunker Hill" button and soon crew members were sporting "I Love Townies" buttons - thus linking the bond of affection and pride, with the town having the distinct honor or hosting the commissioning of this ship and the crew bringing her to this area, so rich in history, and being the first crew to man this new

Committee, led the residents and guests to the Ward Room for a presentation to Captain Quast and the crew from Mayor Raymond L. Flynn. The framed citation related the significance of the Battle of Bunker Hill on June 17, 1775 as it noted the importance of this new ship and declared Monday, September 15th as "Charlestown Welcomes USS Bunker Hill Day In Boston". Making the presentation to Captain Quast, along with Commander Gillen, was Jim and Gloria Conway, Tom Cunha. Joe and Margie Kent, William "Zeke" Marsden and Kay Whelan.

Many of the committee members and other residents and guests present were afforded a tour of the ship. Among the many advanced systems on board the USS Bunker Hill is a bit of history directly related to this community — a bronze plaque that will go with the ship throughout the world.

This bronze plaque, designed by Hugh Montgomery, a deceased World War I member of Bunker Hill Post 26, American Legion and presented in 1942 by Post 26 to the original USS Bunker Hill CV-17, a World War II Essex Class aircraft carrier, is now mounted on the quarterdeck of the soon to be commissioned guided missile cruiser.

displayed at the Legion Quarters. It was then put on loan to the Bunker Hill Museum and shown there since 1975.

When Conway and his fellow members of Post 26 were made aware of the new USS Bunker Hill, it was decided that it was the most appropriate place for this historic plaque. It was then presented to Captain Quast at the Patriotic Exercises on Bunker Hill Day, June 17, 1986 and shipped to Pascagoula, Mississippi where it found its permanent home mounted on the wall of the cruiser's quarterdeck.

Commander Gillen, who had been in the Navy Yard since early Monday morning finalizing plans for the welcoming of the ship, commented that he was thrilled with the view of the ship coming into the harbor. He said that as a naval officer, he is proud of the USS Bunker Hill — and as a resident of Charlestown, he is proud of this community.

Gillen continued, "My position is unique. I know what sometimes happens when a ship visits a port. In my 30 years in the Navy, I have never seen a ship respond to a community with such as the "We Love Townies" flag so prominently on display from the ship. Also, I have never seen such an outpouring from a community. I must commend the Welcoming Committee —

they were cohesive and did the necessary work as a group — they were just sensational!"

The dinner, prepared under the direction of Tom Culbertson of Seiler's Caterers, was served to all under a yellow and white tent.

The Bunker Hillbillies, directed by Bob Munstedt and organized for this event by Jim Sullivan, were a great hit. Footstomping and hand-clapping were the order of the day as the Hillbillies played and sang their repertoire and even handled some requests from the gathering.

Presentations were made to Captain Quast, officially welcoming him and the crew to Charlestown, for this was the community's day. Commander Gillen introduced Boston City Councillor Robert Travaglini, who presented a proclamation on behalf of Mayor Raymond L. Flynn and also a citation of welcome from the Boston City Council. Kay Whelan represented Senator Francis Doris and presented Captain Quast with a citation from the Massachusetts Senate. Development Issues Continue As Focus Of Neighborhood Council Meeting

Neighborhood Council Chairman John Tobin at their Wednesday, September 10th meeting, held at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School Street.

The Neighborhood Council was given three Request for Proposals (RFPs) from the Authority in June to read and comment upon. The draft RFP for parcel P-2 stated that the developers either retain the garden in its present location, or move the garden to another 13,000 square feet site on the parcel. To those who would rather see the entire parcel be developed as affordable housing, this was not an acceptable solution, nor was the thought of moving the gardens, even on the same parcel, acceptable to the gardeners. The council deferred the garden question to their development committee who, under the chairmanship of Mike Powers, held a public hearing on the subject on

mended on the hearing by Tobin and again by Don Gillis of the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services. told the full council that his committee did not have a recommendation on the matter. After some discussion amongst the council members as to what to do since the committee failed to answer the question, Tobin relinquished himself as the

Tobin passed out to the council members a copy of his proposed solution to the controversy which, he said, "is dividing the community." He told the members that the issue of the need for affordable housing is "too complicated" for residents to answer and he suggested that those developers "who pay people to answer questions like this", to "knock on the doors" and conduct the studies, "We're talking in a vaccuum. We don't have the resources," he added. "Why in God's name are we trying to decide. We're saying 'no' to people and I don't think we should exclude any part of our community."

Tobin's proposed amendments drew no opposition from the other council members. Even those who confessed to having a personal bias on the subject, such as Dennis McLaughlin who favors affordable housing as opposed to gardens, admitted, "This is the most concrete thing I've seen. 1 strongly approve this docu-

Member Steve McHugh offered another change to the RFP regarding the density factor. The RFP draft allows for 25 units of housing per acre. McHugh suggested that this wording be dropped from the RFP, allowing developers more freedom of design. Kathryn Downing, however, disagreed and she reminded council members of a community meeting held last summer in which three versions of possible density for the parcel were presented and 25 units per acre were decided upon. Rather than striking the language altogether, she suggested "fudging language such as 'approximately 25 units per acre." "

The council voted to adopt both Tobin's proposed amendments and the "fudging language" suggested by Downing.

The second development issue discussed at the meeting dealt with the RFP draft for parcel R-87, located at the corner of Tremont and Prospect Streets. The draft was first discussed before the council at the development committee meeting held on July 21st at which the members voted on changing the wording on the drafts proposed facade materials from 'red brick' to "red brick and/or wood frame". This vote was forwarded by Tobin to BRA Director Stephen Coyle. Discussion of the RFP was reopened again by the development committee when they sponsored a public hearing on September 4th regarding possible future uses for the parcel. This hearing, however, generated more questions than it did answers. Thus the committee

members voted to postpone action on the draft RFP until a later date when a representative of the BRA could be present to answer these questions.


Kathryn Downing asked Tobin what the council's position was in regards to the parcel, especially since the BRA has twice tried to advertise the parcel since September 4th, yet the development committee could not answer residential questions on the parcel.

"I was embarrassed that people asked legitimate questions and I didn't have the answers," stated Downing. "If I was an abutter and I came to a meeting and I had a question and couldn't get the information, I would blame the Neighborhood Council."

The council voted to request the BRA to hold off advertising the parcel until an informational meeting could be held with someone from the Authority present. The meeting has been scheduled for Thursday, September 18th at 7:30 p.m. at the Kent Community School.

Other committees were asked for a progress report. Moe Gillen told the council that the Human Services Committee has met and will be focusing its attention on educational and health



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Groundbreaking Ceremonies For New Park And Moderate Income Homes

Thousands Enjoy Entertainment, Tours And Foods At Harborpark Day In The Charlestown Navy Yard

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn joined thousands of Boston residents and visitors in a celebration of Harborpark Day on Sunday, September 14th which included groundbreaking ceremonies for two new parks on Boston's harborfront and the first project in the Charlestown Navy Yard offering home ownership opportunities to moderate income families.

Harborpark Day, jointly sponsored by the Boston Redevelopment Authority and the Mayor's Office of Business and Cultural Development, highlighted the city's program for increasing public access to Boston harbor and efforts to spur job growth and new housing opportunities on the waterfront.

Mayor Flynn said, "The projects we are launching today are perfect examples of what Harborpark is all about. We are adding two attractive parks, places where everyone in the city can come together to enjoy our beautiful harbor. At the same time we are taking vacant land at the Navy Yard and building homes for moderate income people on a site overlooking the harbor."

"Most of all, with the events and activities of Harborpark Day we have given a lot of people an opportunity to see what an attractive harbor we have and how more of the harborfront is now accessible to the public."

The projects begun on Harborpark Day in Charlestown

were groundbreaking by the Bricklayers and Laborers Nonprofit Housing Corporation who will develop 80 townhouse units on a site that was originally designated for development by Immobiliare New England. Immobiliare is assisting in the development of the housing by transferring development rights to the Bricklayers group so that housing will be developed that is within the price range of moderate income families. The units will be sold for prices ranging from \$72,000 to \$78,000. Immobiliare has also pledged a portion of its proceeds from the sale of condominiums on adjacent Pier 7 to offset any gap in financing needed to produce units at prices affordable to moderate income families.

The Mayor also broke ground for Shipyard Park Phase III, which will be a wood-decked pedestrian promenade constructed around the perimeter of Dry Dock 2. The dry dock will be permanently flooded. Landscaping and fencing of the Phase II portion of the park will help tie together the existing Shipyard Park with the Boston National Historic Park Area, which is the location of the USS Constitution.

Musical entertainment was scheduled throughout the day and included the Pat Benti Band, The Cadillacs, The Tokens, and The Brooklyn Bridge.

A free shuttle service, via ferry, was provided so that

anyone attending the event was able to enjoy festivities at both the Navy Yard and the downtown Waterfront.

Children received a free balloon and a painter's cap, featuring the Harborpark logo.

Activities at the Navy Yard provided a full afternoon for visitors of all ages. Entertainment for the children included games, train rides, a small animal zoo and face painting.

There was no need to cook on Sunday, for fish and chips were served on Pier 5 under yellow and white tents, along with all the tonic anyone could ever hope to drink and for dessert there was a huge slice of a decorated cake, depicting such Boston sights as the Bunker Hill Monument, Old North Church, Faneuil Hall, as well as the Harborpark logo.

Special focus of Harborpark Day festivities was the intensive development activity underway at the Navy Yard. Developers carrying our historic rehabilitiation at more than 27 buildings held an open house, at their respective projects.

The Navy Yard project now has some \$240 million in private investment underway. It is anticipated that the development, when completed, will contain over one million square feet of office space and 100,000 square feet of retail space. The Navy Yard will eventually provide more than 5,000 permanent jobs and have a population of 10,000 people.
