## The John F. Kennedy Family Service Center 30 Years Of Service To Charlestown

by Lynn Peters The John F. Kennedy Family Service Center. Maybe you've heard of it or happened by it on Winthrop Street. You know, it's right along the Freedom Trail near the Training Field. More commonly called the Kennedy Center, some people confuse it with the Kennedy Library, the Kennedy Building or some kind of tourist attraction where Kennedy family secrets are kept.

It was indeed named for President John F. Kennedy but that was out of respect for his ties to Charlestown and not for any connection with his family. John F. Kennedy Jr. did happen by the Kennedy Center himself this time last year, actually on his father's birthday, as he walked the Freedom Trail. He had never heard of it either. After 30 years one might think that most everyone in Charlestown would know exactly what it is and what it does.
The Kennedy Center is Charlestown's social service agency, providing residents with resources for an array of needs. It was the very first neighborhood anti-poverty program in Boston unde President Lyndon B. Johnson's Office of Economic Opportunity. A non-profil organization, the Kennedy Center operates with the help of foundation and corporate supports, govermment grants and contracts, the United Way, client fees and third party payments.
The founding principle of the Kennedy Center was to provide Charlestown residents with the skills for selfsufficiency; to be a helping hand, not a handout. Today, approximately 80 staff members work to uphold the original mission, and at least 75 percent of the employees are Chariestown residents. To date, some 800 different people receive 100,000 units of service each year at the Kennedy Center. The agency's low profile is necessary for providing individuals and families with privacy, sensitivity and confidentiality.

Yes, 27 Winthrop St. used to be part of St. Mary's Grammar School back when some of our "older" neighbors were learning to read and write. But, for the past


30 years, 27 Winthrop St. is associated with counseling, advocacy, emergency services, substance abuse treatment, information and referral, job training and teen programs.
But there's more to the Kennedy Center than 27 Winthrop St. It offers Head Start and daycare services at the Old Kent School in Hayes Square. Actually, the Kennedy Center is the only social service agency in Boston with licensed Head Start, substance abuse and mental health facilities at the same organization. The Kennedy Center's Head Start program has been consistently rated as one of the two outstanding Head Starts. in Boston by the federal government. At the same time, the Kennedy Center is one of the three lead agencies in Boston selected for a fiveyear $\$ 20$ million federal drug treatment demonstration program.
The Senior Lounge at 55
Bunker Hill St. is also a vital

[^0]ed presidents in their 20 s . This year's board of directors includes a member of the very first Head Start class in the agency's history.
There have been many residents who landed their first summer jobs as teens at the Kennedy Center. Many others at some time or another have gone on to work at the agency. One Head Start mother entered the Kennedy Center through the Action for Boston Community Development ( ABCD ) education program. She went on to earn her bachelor's and masters degrees and later became a director of the Head Start program her family had started with.
The agency is most proud of its community-mindedness. The Kennedy Center is about community empowerment and strives to network and collaborate with all of Charlestown's resources for a vibrant community. The center was one of the planning group members for the development of what became the Bunker Hill Health Center and Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC). Over the years, the Kennedy Center has been proud to be a part of established and varied neighborhood groups, such as CHarlestown Against Drugs (CHAD), the Healthy Charlestown Coalition, the Christmas Walk, the Adolescent Task Force, CHAP, CIA and neighborhood farmers markets.

The Kennedy Center staff members and board of directors continue to work toward growth and empowerment for all of Charlestown's residents from birth to old age. And a lot of its 30 -year history has been spent quietly in the background advocating for economic and social self-efficiency for all of Charlestown's individuals and families.
So, whether you will ever work or volunteer at the Kennedy Center, send children to daycare, serve on the board of directors, need some kind of support in your life or are just sauntering by 27 Winthrop St., 55 Bunker Hill St. or the Old Kent School, you'll at least know a little more about the Kennedy Center

## D-DAY Exhibit Lands At Kennedy Library

Fifty years after the Allies landed on the beaches of Normandy in the tuming point of WW II, the Kennedy Library will open a special exhibition commemorating history's most devastating global conflict.

Opening ceremonies for the exhibit on June 5 will include remarks from U.S. Congressman Joseph Moakley, a WW II veteran. Congressional Medal of Honor recipients from Massachusetts; D-Day, and other WW II veterans will also be in attendance.
"World War II: Personal Accounts - Pearl Harbor to V-J Day" opens to the public, June 6 and runs through September 5, tracing the war's poignant story through images and words of the actual participants.
"Personal Accounts" features hundreds of dramatic letters, diaries, photos and objects from combatants who witnessed the war's heroics and horrors. The nearly 250 items displayed are on loan from veterans or their descendants, and 21 institutions from the U.S. and abroad. They include:

- A rare six-minute film depicting the actual Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor
- Letters and diaries from soldiers, sailors and marines, recounting their experiences at Pearl Harbor, Guadalcanal, Coral Sea, Normandy, Iwo Jima and other major theaters of the war.
- Captured photographs from the "Bataan Death March." Letters from Prime Minister Winston Churchill, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Generals Charies DeGaulle, Hideki Tojo, Jimmy Doolittle and George S. Patton.
- Photographs of General Erwin Rommel's operations in the North Africa Desert, his compass, and excerpts from his letters home, describing the campaign.
-The sword of the Japanese commander of the River Kwai prison camp; Hitler's will and political testament and entries from the diaries of Nazi propaganda chief, Joseph Goebbels.
- General Patton's diary; General Eisenhower's personal campaign jacket; and General McArthur's famous sunglasses and pipe.
-The safety plug that was removed from the atomic bomb dropped on Nagasaki, Japan.
-The Japanese and German surrender documents signaling the end of the war.
"We're pleased to have the opportunity to present this incredible exhibition," said Kennedy Library Foundation Director, Charles U. Daly. "World War II played such a major role in President Kennedy's life, as it did in the lives of millions of us, and 'Personal Accounts' truly captures the spinit of an cra."

The ship conducted these operations last year on its six month deployment off the coast of Somalia and in the Persian Gulf. The USS Nashville is the third U.S. Navy Ship to be named after the capitol of Tennessee.

## Menino Unveils 'Street Smarts' Youth Violence Prevention Initiative

Citizens for Safety, the Suffolk County District Attorney's office, neighborhood organizations and a growing number of area businesses and includes five component programs:

- Multi-media arts contests - including poster and rap contests and the Louis D. Brown essay contest - will challenge Boston's high school students to develop their own ways of dealing with violence.
- The Gun BuyBack Program, sponsored by Citizens for Safety, will run from May 15 through July 8 to remove guns from Boston's streets.
- The Peace League, developed by Boston Community Centers and Citizens for Safety, will bring rival gang members together in basketball competitions to provide nonviolent alternatives for interpersonal conflict.
- Non-violent martial arts training through the Boston Kung-Fu Tai Chi Institute will enable participants to learn
constructive alternatives to guns and violence by developing the mental discipline that martial arts requires.
- Through Street Smarts Conflict Resolution, coordinated by the Boston Management Consortium, professionals currently involved in youth violence issues will be trained to teach Boston's young people skills to resolve conflicts nonviolently. The professionals include officers and youth service officers from the police department's Anti-Gang Violence Unit, Boston Housing Authority Youthworkers and members of Youth Safety Task Forces in neighborhoods throughout the city
Boston Police Commisssioner Paul F. Evans explained, "The multi-phase Street Smarts Initiative builds on the three principles of community policing. Through partnership, problem-solving and prevention, the program takes a holistic approach to violence prevention among youth.

## Voke Moves To Add

More Boston Police

Local efforts to "beef up" community policing could get big support should the funding initiated by Rep. Richard Voke as part of the state's FY '95 budget make it through the adoption process. The House version of the $\$ 16$ billion budget, recently approved by the recently approved by the
House of Representatives, House of Representatives,
provides two pools of funding totaling $\$ 11$ million to support specific communities. Through Rep. Voke's efforts, Boston is not only listed in both categories, but is also guaranteed funding based upon grant submissions.
"Instead of spreading a somewhat greater amount around the state, as the Weld Administration plan proposes, I have been successful in advocating in the House budget a concentration of funds in those communities who are most in need. While every community can probably make an argument
why they need state support to add additional police officers to their forces, certainly Boston, and a handful of other communities, have the types of pressing needs which should be priontized for this state support," stressed Voke, who, as Majority Leader, helps establish the policy objectives of the House.

Under the Voke plan, Boston would automatically be approved in FY '95 for the same $\$ 421,885$ it re ceived from last fiscal year's first-of-a-kind state commu nity policing initiative. In addition, Boston would get an additional $\$ 1.5$ million from a second funding pool.

## Adding to the communi-

 ty policing grants, Voke says the House budget provides an additional $\$ 40$ million to local aid, another $\$ 40$ million for water and sewer relief, $\$ 214$ million more in educational aid and $\$ 11.5$million to fully fund "Quinn Bill" incentives to educationally qualifying police officers.
"Getting state funds back
to provide programs and ser-
vices to the people I represent will continue to be my top priority. I am very pleased that Boston does so well in our budget," concluded Voke.

 add to the trauma that accompanies divorce. All too often divorcing couples don't think about the tax ramifications until it's too late. Such oversights can affect their pocketbooks for many years. The time to contemplate these matters is prior to negotiating the divorce settlement - not after.Planning to minimize your tax bill following a divorce can be a complicated procedure . But with the enactment of the Tax Reform Act of 1984, the rules have become somewhat easier for most taxpayers to understand. The federal tax law now provides greater flexibility in structuring divorce settlements to benefit both parties. As painful as most divorces can be, paying attention to the applicable tax rules before entering into any financial agreements can slash your tax bill for many years after the settlement is finalized.

Alimony and separate maintenance payments you make to your ex-spouse are generally deductible on your tax return. What's more, you need not itemize to deduct these payments. And, although such payments must be included as income by your ex-spouse, your former partner can use these alimony payments to qualify for an IRA.

While child support payments are never deductible, nailing down the dependency exemption can be important. For most agreements entered into after 1984, the parent who has custody can usually take the dependency exemption. But whether or not you gain custody, the parent who pays the child's medical bills can add them to his or her own medical deductions.

While attorney costs for a divorcing couple are generally not deductible, payments earmarked for legal advice concerning the tax consequences of the divorce are deductible. Make sure, therefore, that such costs are separately itemized on any invoices you may receive.

* Street Reconstruction Update . . . Work is proceeding on Winthrop. Tremont and Union Streets as part of the current Boston Redevelopment Authority street reconstruction project. Construction activities are scheduled to continue mainly on these three streets for the next few weeks.

The base course of pavement has been placed on Winthrop Street during the past week. Currently, work crews are resetting the granite curbing and are placing new concrete for the sidewalks. Wheelchair access ramps are being installed at the street comers and will be connected with crosswalks after the finish course of pavement has been installed.

On Tremont Street, work continues on construction of the brick-faced concrete retaining wall at the Harvard Kent School. The roof drain connections and the lead water services are scheduled for completion this week. week. Boston Gas Company crews are installing service piping to the concrete gas street light bases.

Excavation will start this week on the upper portion of Tremont Street. Placement
of the base course of pavement is scheduled for next week and will be followed shortly by curbing and sidewalk replacement.

The drainage improvement work on Union Street is nearly finished and crews wil now begin connecting building roof drains to the drainage system. Any existing lead wate services will soon be replaced during this stage of work. Concrete bases and service piping for gas street lights will begin shortly as well.

Union Street residents are once more reminded that the locations for the proposed tree plantings as well as the new gas street lights will be marked out. Light locations will be marked with an "L" in white paint and a green circle with a " $T$ " will indicate the proposed tree locations. Residents should immediately contact the Community Liaison Peter Looney at the number listed below if the locations present a problem or hardship.

Parking restrictions remain in effect on Winthrop, Tremont and Union Streets. Residents are requested to continue to comply with these restrictions so the reconstruction work can be completed as quickly as practical .
