## Neighborhood Council Wants To Get Back To Community Values

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council has decided to get back to the basics. Weighed down with hefty development issues for many months, the council voted at their July meeting to form a committee to set aside an annual night to honor the community and its people for their everyday efforts to make Charlestown a better place to live.

Overworked in trying to keep up with the hectic demands put upon them by schedules to review multi-million dollar development projects, this group of non-paid council members decided to stop, look around them and take note of the true meaning of "Neighborhood" in their title. The basic needs of the community will be given more attention and public note will be made of residents who unselfishly give their time to help their neighbors.

The July 10 meeting was lengthy with committee chairmen trying to fit in all business reports and meetings before the council takes its summer break for the month of August. Members in attendance included Chairman Dennis McLau-

ghlan, Vice-chairman Bill Galvin, Secretary Stephen Collins, Jim Conway, Nancy Keyes, Jim Mansfield, Kay Whelan, Kate McDonough, Bud Coleman, Peter Looney, Tom Cunha, Ed O'Connell, Dan Kovacevic, Bob Wallace, Moe Gillen, Mel Stillman, Ellen D'Ambrosio and Ken Stone.

### Public Safety Mel Stillman, chairman

Stillman reported that a request had been made by residents of CharlesNewtown for the placement of a traffic guard on Medford Street in front of their housing development. He stated that a formal request had been made to Boston Police Commissioner Micky Roache and Stillman asked that the council send a letter endorsing that request, which the council approved.

Stillman reported that the next meeting of the Public Safety/Police Community Relations Committee will take place in September.

### Basic Services Peter Looney, chairman

Looney reported that after a rocky start, Camp Bunker Hill is now operating on a limited basis. "Through the efforts of

Mass. General Hospital, Charlestown Community Schools, Congressman Joseph Kennedy, Councillor Robert Travaglino and many residents, some kids have been given a place to go this summer," he stated. He also said that money is still coming in but much more is needed.

Looney requested that council members attend the first annual Junior Park Ranger's picnic on July 14 to show their support of the program and the youngsters involved. The picnic is open to the public on Saturday between noon and 4 p.m. on the Commandant's House lawn in the Navy Yard.

### Haul Road Moe Gillen and Bob Wallace, co-chairmen

A presentation was made on the proposed Haul Road from Sullivan Square to Terminal Street that would link traffic to the Navy Yard. Boston Redevelopment Authority Assistant Director Paul Barrett and Senior Project Manager Don Klavin, Transportation Department Senior Planner Joseph Beggan and Bruce Campbell & Associates President Bruce Campbell made the formal presentation. A public meeting, including this presentation, will be held on Tuesday, July 17 at 7 p.m. at Bishop Lawton Hall, St. Francis de Sales Church, 313 Bunker Hill St. Gillen urged all residents, especially those abutting the proposed road and businesses on the north side of Medford Street, to attend the meeting.

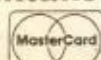
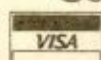

### Housing and Development Tom Cunha, chairman

Cunha reported that meetings are being scheduled to discuss the development plans for the parcel of land on Common Street and to update the status of the former Nancy Sales building at Medford and Terminal streets.

Cunha reported that The Raymond Group will present their final document on proposals to develop Parcels 4 and 7 in the Charlestown Navy Yard on Thursday, July 19 at 7 p.m. at the Kent Community School, 50 Bunker Hill St. He stated that he had requested that the developer include more information on the proposal to build the biomedical research center on Parcel 7 in that document.

Raymond Group Director of Governmental Affairs Linda Smith reported that copies of this document will be made available to the public on Wednesday afternoon, July 18 at The Charlestown Patriot office.

Cunha also reported on the status of two other development projects. A request for a public hearing by the developer of Building 104 in the Navy Yard will be put off until after the September council meeting. The Request for Proposal for Parcel R-107, located on Main Street at Lawnwood Place is receiving finishing touches by the BRA Legal Department. According to Cunha, a meeting will be scheduled as soon as the proposal has been completed.

### Mitigation

#### Bill Galvin, chairman

Galvin reported that the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between Massport, Boston Transportation Department and Mass. Water Resources Authority is being reviewed on MWRA's plans for their use of the former Revere Sugar Refinery on Medford

Street. Also being reviewed is the status of Charlestown Marine Park's use as industrial space rather than marine-related industries. An update on both issues will be presented at a meeting being scheduled for late July.

According to Galvin, the Transportation Department and Massport will not take action on the MOU until after the community has an opportunity to have input in the document.

Galvin had requested and received by a unanimous vote, the council's approval to send a letter to the Department of Environmental Protection asking them not

to approve any industrial use of Charlestown Marine Park without a vote of endorsement by the council.

### Veterans

#### Jim Conway, chairman

Conway deferred his committee report to hear an update on the progress of the development of the Thompson Square Park, "especially the inclusion of the dedication to Edward 'Gus' Whelan," he stated. Kovacevic informed the council that a meeting had been held with the Whelan family and a report had been received from the Browne Fund stating that the progress of both the

Thompson Square and Hayes Square projects were on schedule after a year's delay. The council voted to commend the efforts of the Bunker Hill Tenants Task Force and the Charlestown Preservation Society to make the parks a reality.

The Film Program for Children will be presented at the Charlestown Branch Library, 179 Main St., on Tuesday, July 17 at 10:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.

The features will be "Tortoise And The Hare," in which Toby Tortoise and Max Hare race once again;

The council will hold their next meeting in September. The agenda will most certainly be a heavy one, and the desire of the members to get back to the basics on the community's real needs will be put to the test.

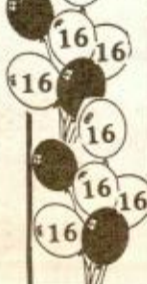

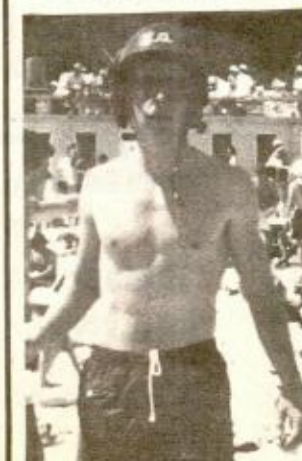



## Raymond Group Presents Development Benefits Package

The Raymond Group, the primary Navy Yard developer, presented a Preliminary Draft for Public Benefits to the Housing and Development Committee of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council at a committee meeting on July 9. The benefits package is part of The Raymond Group's proposal to develop Parcels 4 and 7 at the Yard's End portion of the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The proposal for Parcel 4 includes the construction of a 13-story 400-room hotel. A 12-story biomedical research center is proposed for Parcel 7.

Committee Chairman Tom Cunha was joined by council members Dennis McLaughlin, Stephen Collins, Bill Galvin, Dan Kovacevic, Kevin Roche, Ellen D'Ambrosio, Jim Mansfield, Peter Looney, Moe Gillen, Mel Stillman and Jim Conway. Representing

The Raymond Group were its president, David Francis, Linda Smith, director of Governmental Affairs and John Weigel, director of Planning and Design.

Weigel responded to the concerns of abutters raised at two previous committee meetings on the proposals. Issues regarding the reduction of the height of the two structures, parking for residents of the Bricklayers affordable housing units, pollution, loss of views and privacy, and a shadow study, were among the topics discussed. The benefits package also addressed jobs for Charlestown residents and affordable housing linkage money as well as a continuing commitment to the community by The Raymond Group of approximately \$60,000 annually.

Cunha requested that The

Raymond Group return to the committee with a final draft of their proposal package that would include answers to comments made by council members and residents at the three public meetings on the proposals. He stated that the council would review the document, hold another public meeting and vote on the proposal.

Paul Barrett, assistant director of the Boston Redevelopment Authority, proposed that a committee be established consisting of Navy Yard residents, representatives of the development team and members of the BRA staff as a "formal working group." This committee would work toward addressing all the concerns raised by the development plans proposed by The Ray-

mond Group. Barrett's suggestion was taken under advisement by the committee.

The meeting closed with Cunha asking for a final package from The Ray-

mond Group. He stated that a public meeting would be scheduled to hear that package as soon as the information became available from the developer.
