



Housing and Development Tom Cunha, chairman

Cunha reported that meetings are being scheduled to discuss the development plans for the parcel of land on Common Street and to update the status of the former Nancy Sales building at Medford and Terminal streets.

Cunha reported that The Raymond Group will present their final document on proposals to develop Parcels 4 and 7 in the Charlestown Navy Yard on Thursday, July 19 at 7 p.m. at the Kent Community School, 50 Bunker Hill St. He stated that he had requested that the developer include more information on the proposal to build the biomedical research center on Parcel 7 in that document.

Raymond Group Director of Governmental Affairs Linda Smith reported that copies of this document will me made available to the public on Wednesday afternoon, July 18 at The Charlestown Patriot office.

Cunha also reported on the status of two other development projects. A request for a public hearing by the developer of Building 104 in the Navy Yard will be put off until after the September council meeting. The Request for Proposal for Parcel R-107, located on Main Street at Lawnwood Place is receiving finishing touches by the BRA Legal Department. According to Cunha, a meeting will be scheduled as soon as the proposal has been completed.

Mitigation Bill Galvin, chairman

Galvin reported that the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between Massport, Boston Transportation Department and Mass. Water Resources Authority is being reviewed on MWRA's plans for their use of the former Revere Sugar Refinery on Medford

Street. Also being reviewed is the status of Charlestown Marine Park's use as industrial space rather than marine-related industries. An update on both issues will be presented at a meeting being scheduled for late July.

According to Galvin, the Transportation Department and Massport will not take action on the MOU until after the community has an opportunity to have input in the document.

Galvin had requested and received by a unanimous vote, the council's approval to send a letter to the Department of Environmental Protection asking them not

to approve any industrial use of Charlestown Marine Park without a vote of endorsement by the council.

Conway deferred his committee report to hear an update on the progress of the development of the Thompson Square Park, "especially the inclusion of the dedication to Edward 'Gus' Whelan," he stated. Kovacevic informed the council that a meeting had been held with the Whelan family and a report had been received from the Browne Fund stating that the progress of both the

Thompson Square and Hayes Square projects were on schedule after a year's delay. The council voted to commend the efforts of the Bunker Hill Tenants Task Force and the Charlestown Preservation Society to make the parks a reality.

I wholeheartedly agree with neighborhood residents who see the need for a full-time community representative who has access to the inner workings of the project and can advocate effectively for the Charlestown community. In relation to other communities, Charlestown is currently among the most heavily impacted by construction and deserves to have a representative assigned to the area.

For these reasons, I strongly urge the Massachusetts Department of Public Works to fill the position of Charlestown community liaison. Naming a successor as soon as possible will help assuage community concern and will provide residents with the needed assurances that the project will be carried out with the least amount of impact on their neighborhood.

For the past two years people have asked me who John Boyle O'Reilly was. The memorial stone in the park named for him in front of the Neworld Bank says it best. O'Reilly was a poet, novelist, orator, labor leader, civil rights leader, journalist, editor/owner of the Boston Pilot, president of the Boston Press Club, charter member of the St. Botolph Club, Irish American, patriot and Charlestown resident.

O'Reilly was imprisoned for his Fenian beliefs in Ireland, jailed in Australia and escaped to the United States.

"The most distinguished Irishman in America" wrote the Harper's Weekly in his obituary in 1890.

On Friday, Aug. 10, the Friends of John Boyle O'Reilly will hold a 100-year anniversary Mass at 6 p.m. at St. Mary's Church. It is most fitting that O'Reilly be remembered at St. Mary's because it was there that he lay in state for three days after his death.

Following the Mass, a wreath-laying ceremony will be held at the O'Reilly Park in the Bunker Hill Mall. Then the group will proceed to the Knights of Columbus hall, 75 West School St., where the recipients of the John Boyle O'Reilly scholarships will be announced. A Charlestown boy and a Charlestown girl will each receive a \$1,500 award toward their education.
