

Tune Car - Save Cold Hard Cash

First off, do a visual inspection of your car inside and out. Make sure that all the 4x4 auto parts are up for the tough drive. Which parts are these? These are the brakes, battery, axles, cooling system, driveline, engine, exhaust, suspension, lights, and of course, the car's body or frame. Check that no unusual noise comes from these parts whenever you drive your car.

I always look at the seller's feedback. Look specifically for the number of items sold, the years he has been a member and the number of negatives and neutrals he has. Generally, the more items sold and the longer in business is a good thing. Look at some of the comments under positive and negative feedback. I like to see things like "fast shipping" and "item as described" and "good communication." Don't hesitate if you see a negative or two - take a look at the comments and see if the complaint was resolved. There will always be problems - what counts is how they are resolved.

Next on our to-do list is the air filter. This is another easy thing to do. Under the hood of your car there is a big black box with some clips on it. Just unclip the top of the box and you have found your air filter. Most of them slide out pretty easily and you can check to see how dirty it is. You can blow it out or vacuum it, but if the manual says it's time to change it you probably should. The last time someone at a repair shop wanted to change it for me I said now and I was glad I did. They wanted \$40 to do it! I went to an 24 hour parts store near me instead and bought one for \$15 and put it in myself. It took less than 30 minutes including the amount of time it took to buy it and I saved \$25. So now you can save \$25 and get better gas mileage.

How would you like to have an almost endless supply of car parts? If the vehicle in question is an older make, model, and year, you may get your wish. When cars stop running, many owners decide to sell or giveaway the entire car. They are doing so because they just don't want to deal with the problem. Even if the engine no longer runs, a vehicle still has hundreds of other salvage parts. For that reason, don't just search for auto parts, but entire cars too.

For example, a water pump for a BMW 740i may cost \$140 new. Expect to pay \$70 (in cash) at the junkyard.

Junk parts are hard to come by, when you need something in particular. These places are the best to go to, when you need something like a new car door, a hood, or anything that's a part of the exterior. You're really going to gamble when you buy parts for underneath the hood, etc, because you have no idea on how old they are going to be, or if they are going to work.

You can also try to Google the name of the shop/company for additional info. If there is any

dirt to them you will find it in various blogs listed in Google.
