What is Yukon Rookie League?

The Yukon Rookie League Program is a youth led program designed to support youth from across the Yukon Territory through a series of motivational workshops and youth led community baseball leadership programs. We incorporated the participation and leadership of youth between the ages of 12-14, who signed up to be Youth Coaches.

This Yukon Rookie League program is designed with an understanding that the majority of inspiring programming offered for youth around the world is designed and led by youth themselves. The Yukon Rookie League program works with youth who want to strengthen their leadership skills and who are willing to learn and implement baseball programming with and for their peers.



INPIRATION

This event is inspired by Chief Wilton Little Child, a TRC Commissioner, who said "we are calling on you to link arms with us, that all Canadians Indigenous or not, young or old, first-generation or tenth- generation, that we work together to heal and secure a better future" (2015).





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April 2017 to February 2018

Youth Advisors

In spring 2018 four Indigenous youth advisors were recruited to help with the development of the project. Our youth advisers were active in contributing leadership skills, sharing their ideas and working as part of team, as they provide guidance in developing the Yukon Rookie League project with the Jays Care Foundation and Yukon Child and Youth Advocate Office. Our youth Advisors for this project are:

Neveah Webb: Nevaeh is a citizen of Little Salmon Carmacks First Nation in Grade 8 at Porter Creek Secondary School.

This meeting was held to debrief on the October leadership training workshop and to update the adult supporters on next steps for planning the second series of Youth Leadership Workshops.

This meeting created a space for community supporters to also talk about how they see themselves involved as YCAO works towards planning the second series of workshops.

Community supporters were able to identify areas of coaching and leadership workshops that they can bring to the second workshop.











December 2017 - January 2018:

- -Community supporters were invited to provide a workshop for February youth coaches training:
- -One on one meetings were held with community supporters to gain more insight in to what type of workshop they can host during the second youth leadership training workshops. The idea was to share what our objectives were for the workshops and work out how the community supporter workshops can be aligned with the Yukon Rookie League Objectives.

The Yukon Rookie League objectives include:

- Youth Led
- Develop youth leaders (coaches) to run youth projects
- Youth will learn about First Nations culture and history in Canada and Yukon
- Youth learn about United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) and how to incorporate them into project activities
- Youth will learn about importance of, and will experience belonging, mastery, independence and generosity (Circle of Courage Model)
- Develop ball skills
- How to implement games in the community
- How to engage participants and ensure peers take part in activities/play
- Ultimately to reduce social risk factors (long term goal)



<u>Youth Coaches training- Yukon Rookie</u> <u>League – February 7, 8, 9, 2018</u>

Twenty-eight young people attended Yukon Rookie League leadership training at the Canada Games Centre. The goal of this workshop was to immerse all participants to the Yukon Rookie League Program, define what it means to be a Youth Coach, explore different games and activities youth can facilitate in community programs, develop community program plan and recruitment process.

There was an **Elders lunch** that was hosted on the second day of the youth leadership workshop. The following elders attended: Annie Bernard, Judy Gingell, Mary Decker, and Louie Smith, Elsie Cletheroe. (May be missing some names).

After successful completion of the February Youth Leadership Workshop, youth partnered up to run their programming in their community.

There are eight youth led programs that have been formed, which include programs in Teslin, Old Crow, Beaver Creek, Elijah Smith Boys, Elijah Smith Girls, Kwanlin Dun, Boys and Girls Club, and Jack Hulland School. We have coordinated so that each group has an adult supporter in place to provide support to the youth as they coordinate and run their programming.


Jays Care Foundation has provided ball equipment for all of the programs. The equipment is to help the youth to run their ball program effectively and ensures that they have the necessary equipment in place to teach ball. Jays Care provides incentives for numbers of sessions run. When the programs complete eight sessions with their group, they will be eligible to register

their team in the celebration tournament.

A part time coordinator has been hired to assist the youth and their adult supporters to get the programs up and running. The coordinator also attended the full three days of leadership training with the youth in February and is familiar with the youth and their programs that the youth had created for in their communities.

Full group sessions are being offered at the Canada Games Centre on the following dates:

-Sunday April 8th (1215-115pm),
April 14th, May 12th and June 2th
from 1:00 – 3:00 pm. This will
provide an opportunity for the youth
groups to come together, share
components of their programs with
each other and also play a game of
ball as a group. This component will
also ensure youth remain connected
with each other over the next few
months while they run their
individual group programming.

Dirt from the Kwanlin Dun field will then be given to the Jays Care Foundation representatives to transport back to the Rogers Arena in Toronto, where the dirt will be permanently placed.
