Travaglini, Flynn And O'Neil Top Ticket On Election Day In Charlestown

Eight years have passed since Raymond L. Flynn first sought the office of Mayor of Boston. In 1983, 79 percent of the registered voters in Ward Two, Charlestown went to the polls on election day. There was a 44 percent voter turnout in Charlestown in 1987 as Flynn ran for re-election. In Tuesday's Municipal Election, that vote dropped once again - this time to 42 percent. It appears as though the percentage of voters going out to the polls is dropping as the number of registered voters in the ward increases.
Although the percentage in Charlestown was slightly above the citywide average, it is low for this traditionally politically active area. The unofficial tally listed 3.390 of the total of 8,069 registered voters in
this community as going out to the polls.
Mayor Flynn captured over 69 percent of the Charlestown vote, with 31 per-

50 percent tally. Incumben Christopher Iannella logged 41 percent of the vote followed closely by incumbent Rosaria Salerno with

37 percent.
37 percent.
Newcomer to the City Council race Peggy DavisMullen, who finished out of the money, landed a 39 percent vote here in Charlestown. Francis Costello, in his first time out, garnered 31 percent of the Ward Two vote.
Incumbent District One City Councillor Robert Travaglini was re-elected to a fifth term, tallying 75 percent of the vote cast in Charlestown for that office.

Aquarium Suspends Plans For
Charlestown Facility
by Kathy Giordano New England Aquarium trustees voted unanimously on Nov. 4 to actively continue expansion efforts at their Central Wharf location and suspend planning for a new facility in the Charlestown Navy Yard. News of the vote shocked both community advocates who fought to bring the aquarium to Charlestown and the hierarchy of the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA).
An aquarium committee, consisting of trustees associated with construction and real estate businesses. reviewed the proposed $\$ 100$ million project for Pier 11 . Dry Dock 5 in the Charlestown Navy Yard over the past four months. After analyzing the current value of
the downtown location, they found its sale would no longer produce the financial backing needed to construct the new facility, according to John Prescott, executive director of the aquarium. Additional resources from a major capital fund drive would not be considered a realistic option due to current economic conditions. he said.
BRA Director of Economic Development Paul Barrett said that the BRA was disappointed that the aquarium did not give them a chance to address the trustees before the vote was taken. "We are confident that the money can be found from federal and state sources" to make up the gap between what the Central Wharf property might
have realized in the 1980s real estate market compared to the price tag it would realize today.
Barrett stated: "Anyone involved in planning a new aquarium is disappointed that the Charlestown option has been put on hold. At the request of Charlestown community leaders and following discussions with a number of aquarium trustees, the city has agreed to spend the next four to six months systematically evaluating all possible sources of federal and state assistance for this deserving project. Significant assistance of this kind will be necessary to make the Charlestown project happen."
Barrett will head the committee of city and com-

Charlestown Heights/Doherty Park To Be Topic At CPS Meeting

There will be a general meeting of the Charlestown Preservation Society at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, Nov. 18 , at the Bunker Hill Health Center, 73 High St. All interested residents of Char estown are welcome A slide show will center around the history of Doherty Park, which was previously known as Charlestown Heights, and a general discussion of a proposed rejuvenation of the back slope will follow.
In 1891 the entire parcel of land, consisting of the playground and the slope below it, was selected and designed by the well-known landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted. Other Olmsted neighborhood parks planned for the city of Boston at the same time
were the Fenway, Franklin Park and the West End, now Storrow Drive/Embankment Road. The parks are known today as Boston's "Emerald Necklace." Work began on Chalrestown Heights in 1891 and was completed in 1895. Since 1991 is the 100th anniversary of the Park's conception, it is hoped that the grounds of the back slope, badly overgrown and in disrepair, will be re-established as a "livable" park for all to enjoy as our own jewel.
Everyone is encouraged to participate with ideas and questions. It will be fun looking at the Park's Victorian history together.

« CANA Update - During the week of Nov. II, a new traffic pattern will be established in City Square, according to Stephen Collins, community liaison for the Central Artery/Tunnel project. This new pattern will allow for the removal of the temporary bridge at Gray Street so that the north section of the tunnels can be completed.

Collins stated that the next phase of the project will be the construction of Chelsea Street. At that time, Front Street will be closed to allow for the construction of Water Street/Constitution Drive and the extension of Warren Street.
Pedestrians and motorists are advised to be alert to changes in the traffic, following the signs which will be posted in the area. Collins will present details of the new traffic pattern at the CNC Public Safety/Police Community Relations meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 12 at 7 p.m. at the Kent Community School, 50 Bunker Hill St. He also will address the issues of detail police officers and pedestrian safety in City Square.
Ed Barr, Central Artery North Area coordinator, stated: " Due to citizen concern, the level of detail police will remain the same at City Square. Placement of police," he continued, "will be evaluated and adjusted as necessary with pedestrian safety being the utmost concern."
$\star$ Fire At CANA Site - At approximately 11:06 p.m. on Monday, Nov, 4, the Boston Fire Department was called to the CANA site for a fire in a construction trailer within the tunnel. Lt. Richard Powers, public information officer with the BFD, reported that the main problem the department had in fighting the fire was access to the trailer which was located some 200 feet inside the tunnel. Firefighters had to back the engines down a steep grade and cut through a metal fence in order to reach the trailer.
According to Bill Rogers, resident engi neer with the CANA project, the trailer, which he termed a storage box used by the P/K/A Construction Co., contained tools and construction supplies. He said that he was called to the site when the fire erupted and stayed on the scene until the all-out at $1: 0$ a.m. It was also reported that magnesium was burning in the trailer which Rogers attributed to the tool casings.
The fire, which resulted in an estimated $\$ 50,000$ in damage, was reportedly the act
of vandals.

* Robbed At Gunpoint - According to a police report, a 12 -year-old Charlestown boy was robbed at gunpoint on Tuesday morning in the Doherty Playground on Bunker Hill Street. The incident happened at approximately 11 a.m. when the victim was approached by two youths, described as being 14 and 16 years of age. One of the youths displayed a small-caliber handgun and demanded that the youngster give them the blue Notre Dame University baseball cap he was wearing. The police said that the two youths then ran toward Medford Street.

## Editorial

## Veterans Day 1991

One day each year Americans come together to hon or all those men and women who have served their nation in uniform.
The day was born out of war - at 11 a.m. on Nov. 11, 1918, the fighting in World War I ceased with the signing of an armistice. The uneasy peace after that event was hard won by those who fought in the trenches of Europe. Since then, American service members have been sent around the world to defend liberty in large conflicts and what some people might call "brushfires." Combat is a deadly behavior, regardless of its scale, and those people who serve us and come home to rejoin the daily lives of private citizens have earned our respect, our admiration and our gratitude. Of course, on this Veterans Day, many of us will reflect on the newest generation of veterans - the brave men and women of Operation Desert Storm. Many of our newest veterans may be our next door neighbors, our doctors, lawyers, grocery clerks and plumbers. In the American tradition of the citizen soldier, volunteer members of the Reserves and National Guard, the best and brightest, again set aside their careers and postponed their futures to answer their nation's call.
Their combat service in that far away region demonstrates that military service is not always easy, and that the unthinkable one day can become the routine of today. It is the devotion to duty we see every day that we salute on Nov. II.
For more than a decade veterans fought to return Veterans Day to Nov. 11 from what became a convenient Monday holiday. The people who waged that campaign knew what others forgot - the day was set aside to honor those who sacrificed for their country. That is not a weekend endeavor; it is not an occasion for mattress sales; it is not a time to go to the beach. Rather, it is an appropriate time to pull back from the workday world and reflect on the sacrifices made by brave service men and women that have made America the envy of the world. To Clarify Resale Of Bricklayers Affordable Houses In Navy Yard Nov. 5, 1991
To the Editor, "Charlestown Patriot"
We appreciated your article in "Around the Town" on the two affordable units being offered in the Bricklayers' development in the Navy Yard. It may be helpful to your readers if we clarified certain aspects of this complex resale.
Specific income limits were required of buyers at the original offering of units when the housing opened. However, these will not apply in the resale, although it is intended that persons of moderate income should find the housing affordable because of the limits imposed on sales prices,
There is a specific method for establishing the resale prices for each affordable unit which is contained in the Convenant attached to the deed. It provides for adding to the purchase price, interest compounded each year, the value of certain capital improvements, and the use of a real estate agent the resale price, representing the total of these elements. The deed also requires BRA approval of the price as within the Maximum Allowable Resale be recorded with the next deed. In order to maximize interest in the resale of affordable units, we have recently established a policy that units not be advertised in excess of the top allowable price in order to avoid the chilling affect such a practice could have on our targeted market.
Therefore, given the above concerns, it is my understanding that the current allowable prices should be in the area of $\$ 105,000-\$ 106,000$. I would urge any interested potential buyer to contact the owner or broker for more detailed information. These are excellent units.
