

Hundreds Gather To Remember Victims At Sunday's Candlelight Vigil

Warm sunshine reflected from white and gold balloons as a strong spring breeze carried them upward, causing them to strain against their ribbon tethers only, to bounce back down again as the wind subsided. Large bows decorated the doors and handrails of St. Catherine of Siena Church in Hayes Square, inviting all to enter. The festive decorations were a welcome, but those who entered the church last Sunday afternoon came with heavy hearts, carrying



the burden of the loss of a loved one, a friend, a neighbor, an aquaintance, or in support of those who are suffering the pain of losing someone to violence.

The occasion was a Candlelight Vigil under the sponsorship of the CHarlestown After Murder Program (CH.A.M.P.), a group of individuals with one of their purposes being the support of persons who survive the violent death of someone close as they seek to recover. Sandy King, whose son Christopher was killed in 1986 and son Jay killed in 1991, and Pam Enos, whose son Adam was killed in 1991, served as cochairpersons of the Vigil.

As persons climbed the stairs into the church, they were greeted and presented with a scroll containing a copy of the poem "Wake Up, Charlestown" by Marilyn Abromofsky, encircling a fresh green carnation.

Music and scripture readings, poems and prayers carried the almost 400 people in the church through (continued on page 10)

The student was restrained by school police and placed under arrest for assault and battery. He was take to the Area A Police Station to be booked before arraignment at the Charlestown District Court.



Dennis McLaughlin Dies Suddenly At 51

Edward Dennis Mc-Laughlin, chairman of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, died suddenly of a heart attack on Saturday, May 2. He was 51 years old.

A lifelong resident of Charlestown, he attended Mary's Grammar St. School and graduated from Charlestown High School in 1960. He received an associate degree from Suffolk University in 1980, majoring in business.

Mr. McLaughlin, known to everyone as Dennis, was an active member of the community who was well known across the city and the state as an advocate for the betterment of life for those who live in Charlestown, as well as in every neighborhood of Boston.

In the fall of 1991 when Action for Boston Community Development honored him at its 17th annual Community Awards Dinner, his true essence was declared when they described Dennis in this way: "Always willing to lend an ear, he has the ability to make both the lifelong resident of Charlestown and the newcomer feel like part of the the community." In presenting him with the ABCD Charlestown Community Award, it was noted that "his energy and dedication are an encouragement to others to participate in mak-

ing their neighborhood a better place in which to live."

He played a key role in the development of affordable housing for young families in Charlestown and was a moving force in the construction of the 50-unit Bricklayer Affordable Housing complex on 13th Street in the Charlestown Navy Yard. At the July 1989 ribbon-cutting ceremony at the waterfront location, he said: "I'm thrilled with it. It chills me to think how great this all is. These are people I've know all my life. This is why we (the Neighborhood Council) got involved. This is a thrilling day!"

Following the December 1987 arson fire that destroyed the Old Kent School in Hayes Square that housed the Charlestown Head Start and Day Care programs, McLaughlin played an active role in securing funds to rebuild the facility.

His commitment to the community, and especially to the needs of its people, was apparent by his being a founder and an active member of the CHarlestown Against Drugs program. At the time of his death, he was actively pursuing a means to provide housing and support for women recovering from alcohol and drug abuse. Through these efforts, the

Charlestown/Armed Services YMCA, under construction in the Charlestown Navy Yard, has dedicated a program and lodging for this purpose.

He was the organizer, first president and member of the board of the Friends of Metro Boston Inc., which provides recreational activities for the city's homeless mentally ill. He was also an active member of the Friends of the Lindemann Mental Health Center and the Bunker Hill Health Center's Camp Bunker Hill.

Besides taking an active role in establishing affordable housing for Charlestown families and elderly, he also was a pioneer in creating a locally based program that would house abused women and their families.

Dennis was a founder of the Charlestown-To-Charlestown Committee and the Bunker Hill Irish Heritage Society. He had been a member of the Bunker Hill Associates since its founding in 1984, and was its secretary at the time of his death. As a member of the Associates, he served as chairman of the annual Charlestown Pride Week activities that take place each year around Bunker Hill Day.

He was a delegate to the Massachusetts Democratic State Convention in 1990 and was re-elected to that position for the 1992 State Convention to be held in Worcester later this month. He was also elected to the Ward 2 Democratic Committee this past November. Active in politics, Dennis

served as coordinator of the Committee to Re-elect Raymond L. Flynn Mayor in the 1991 election.

He was appointed by Mayor Flynn to the Charlestown Neighborhood Council in 1986 and served as that body's chairman since January 1988. Under his chairmanship, the council deliberated over many controversial issues including the development of the Charlestown Navy Yard and the proposal to locate the New England Aquarium in the Yard.

Mr. McLaughlin was retired from the International Longshoremen's Association, Local 805. He expressed much pride in the I.L.A. as recent as the April Neighborhood Council meeting when he informed the I.L.A. that he would stand beside them on the picket line to fight to restore jobs on the Charlestown waterfront, feared lost through the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority's Boston Harbor Cleanup project.

Dennis leaves his wife, Jean M. (Smith) McLaughlin; one son, Dennis M. McLaughlin; three daughters, Denise Dagle, Jeanmarie O'Neil and Stephanie McLaughlin, all of Char-(continued on page 16)







The Charlestown Recycling Volunteers are pleased to announce an expansion of recycling services to our neighborhood. Beginning Saturday, May 9, the dropoff center will begin accepting plastic bottles labeled #1 (PET, commonly used for water and milk jugs and other translucent bottles) and #2 (HDPE, usually opaque, colored bottles like laundry detergent or shampoo).

Please note that only BOTTLES can be accepted at this time. A bottle is a container with a larger body than mouth or opening. For instance, we cannot accept yogurt cups, butter tubs, toys, plastic bags or other items, even if they are labeled #1 or 2. These items are manufactured with a different process than bottles, and cannot be intermingled for the purposes of recycling. You will be asked to take inappropriate items back home with you, as we do not have the capacity to dispose of them.

To determine the type of plastic, simply turn the bottle upside down and look for the reduce-reuse-recycle triarrow. The number inside the familiar symbol describes the type of plastic used to manufacture the bottle.

To prepare plastic bottles:

· First, use all the product inside. Turn bottles upside down to drain, and you'll get an extra wash or shampoo;

· Second, remove all caps, pumps, spouts and any other materials, and discard them. These are made by a

You may want to consider looking at the type of plastic before making your purchases. Your decisions at the store can have a great impact. Buy only items which are packaged in materials that are currently being recycled in the city, and you lessen the amount of materials you waste.

Charlestown residents voluntarily staff and operate the center on the second Saturday of each month at the Bunker Hill Mall. The next recycling day is Saturday, May 9 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.



* St. Francis de Sales School . . . A suspicious fire caused an estimated \$500 in damage to St. Francis de Sales School on Bunker Hill Street. The May 5 fire was discovered at 9:20 a.m. Students and faculty members were evacuated safely to Bishop Lawton Hall where they waited until they could return to the building.

The smokey blaze had its origin in the boys' bathroom on the basement level of the three-story building. A water sprinkler system and quick response by the Boston Fire Department (BFD) are credited with preventing major damage to the school. Students were allowed back into their classrooms at 9:50 a.m.

BFD Engine Companies 32 and 50 and Ladder Company 9 responded from Charlestown. North End Companies Engine 8 and Ladder 1 were also dispatched, as were Rescue 1 and the Tower Unit from downtown Boston. The Cambridge Fire Department sent its Ladder 1 to assist.

St. Francis de Sales School is in the midst of celebrating its 100th anniversary Jubilee. A reunion of over 750 former students and friends of the school took place on May 1 at Caruso's Diplomat in Saugus. Bernard Cardinal Law will concelebrate a Mass in honor of the occasion on Sunday, May 17.

* Charlestown Man Murdered . . . Boston Police have no leads in the May 2 murder of a Bunker Hill Street resident. Andrew Sheehan, 28, was found shot to death in his car at 6:04 a.m. by firefighters from BFD Engine Company 32. The car was located at the Sullivan Square rotary, and Sheehan was found slumped over the steering wheel.

According to the police, Sheehan had been shot several times in the head and face. Several bullet holes found in the car indicated that the shots were fired from outside the vehicle.

The victim was transported to Mass. General Hospital where he was pronounced dead at 6:28 a.m.

The murder is being investigated by Area A Detectives, the Boston Police Homicide Unit and the Suffolk County District Attorney's office.

★ Mishawum Park Water Shut-Off Averted . . . Boston Water and Sewer Commission (BWSC) Executive Director Robert Ciolek states that the scheduled May 5 water shut-off at Mishawum Park was called off when representatives from Phipps Management Co. met with the BWSC on April 30.

Ciolek informed the Patriot that the development's management company and BWSC reached an agreement on a payment schedule for outstanding water and sewer bills for the complex. Ciolek also stated that a written "Collection Agreement" was signed by Phipps Management Co. to continue payments until all back charges are brought up to date as well as keeping current charges up to date. Ciolek said that if the agreement is broken by the management company, the complex would "go back on the shut-off list.'

Meanwhile, Ciolek stated, the BWSC is willing to work closely with the tenants of the housing complex to keep them informed on the payments and, hopefully, avert any future threat of water loss to the residents.

* Board Of Appeal . . . The Public Facilities Department, for the National Council of Senior Citizens, appeared before the city of Boston Board of Appeal on May 5 requesting to erect a 6-story building at 100 Ferrin St. (the corner of Bunker Hill Street). The structure would contain 42 apartments for lowincome elderly.

The Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services (MONS) and City Councillors Robert Travaglini and Albert O'Neil asked the Board to approve the proposal. The Boston Redevelopment Authority requested approval with design review. J.K. Kennedy Center Executive Director Kate McDonough also voiced her approval for the elderly housing complex.

MONS Community Liaison Judy Evers informed the Board that the Charlestown Neighborhood Council had voted unanimously to endorse the proposal.

The Board approved the proposal with design review by the BRA.

* Charlestown Navy Yard . . . The Draft Environmental Impact Report for the Biomedical Research Center proposed for Buildings B and C in the Yard's End section of the Charlestown Navy Yard has been publised by the BRA.

Victor Karen, BRA Deputy Director for Economic Development, has made copies of the two-volume report available to the public. They may be obtained at the Patriot office at One Thompson Square.

Karen stated that although the development of the biomedical research center has been brought before the community through the Neighborhood Council over the past two years, the draft report was submitted to the state for approval only last week. Karen said that the BRA will make a presentation before the Council at the next scheduled meeting to bring the community up to date on the proposal.

* Charlestown Street Reconstruction Update . . . According to Ralph Cunningham, resident engineer with Bryant Associates Inc., the engineering firm overseeing the street reconstruction project, work is on schedule and proceeding without any interruptions.

Cunningham stated that the contractor, John Mahoney Construction Co., started up a second crew this week, excavating pavement on Nearen Row. The street was excavated, the curb and sidewalk removed and new light boxes installed. The contractor asked to excavate both sides of the street at the same time because it is so narrow, and did so upon receiving permission from the BRA.

The first crew completed hooking up the temporary water services on Chestnut Street and Mt. Vernon Avenue. With the assistance of the Boston Water and Sewer Commision, the crew activated the temporary by-pass water main. The water main crew also started at the Lowney Way end of Chestnut Street with new water main installations. They installed a new gate and connected it to the existing six-inch line from Putnam Street.

A change in the schedule will see Mt. Vernon Avenue being done along with Mt. Vernon street because the existing water main has to be shut off and joining the two streets will save on the amount of time residents will be inconvenienced by a loss of water.

The reconstruction project has begun on Essex Street with drainage and street work beginning this week. Next week, work will start on Adams, Devens and Washington streets.

Cunningham stated that overall, the no parking and traffic programs are working very well.



(continued from page one) personal thoughts and memories. As the people took their seats in the pews, soloist Debra Rogers touched the hearts of the gathering with her rendition of "Lean On Me."

When King came forward to welcome the audience, she spoke of how parents of murdered children really need the song and the message of "Lean On Me." She said that everyone's help was needed to stop murder after murder, noting that there were 50 victims of murder on the CH.A.M.P. roles, the latest one being only Saturday. Father Ron Coyne, pastor

of St. Catherine's Parish, was joined on the altar by Father William McConnell of St. Francis de Sales. Father Coyne spoke of his nearly two years here in Charlestown and the warm, welcoming people. He said that people come here from all over the world to visit the historic sites and they see a happy, vibrant community. He noted that what is not seen are the tragedies from murder and violence, the aching hearts and the sadness. In his prayer, Father Coyne said that the loss of a child is the greatest pain a person can experience in life, pointing out and giving thanks for the people who want to reach out and help those who are in pain.

Tears flowed as the children's choir sang "Let There Be Peace On Earth,'

with their young voices filling the church and its people with hope.

Marilyn Abromofsky, aunt of the slain Kenny Claudio, was introduced by Enos as a person of great courage who urged the members of CH.A.M.P. to go on. Abromosfky read a poem she had written for her friend Joann Barrett on the loss of her son Robert. She then read her poem "Wake Up, Charlestown" noting at its conclusion that there is a code of silence here in Charlestown. She said that she hoped the people would cooperate with the police, adding, "charge, arrest, convict and get them (the murderers) off the streets."

The song "My Son" was offered by Irish vocalist Joe Glynn, and this was followed by the reading of a poem by Peter Enos in memory of his brother Adam.

As vocalist Debra Rogers prepared to sing "Memories," she asked those in the audience with children to hug them as she sang, and those whose children were not present to hold them in their hearts. She then wrapped her arms around her own daughter and thrilled the gathering with her beautiful rendition of the song. As the service drew to a

close, Father Coyne said that he had been asked to deliver a blessing. He told the audience that it was not just a priest who could give a blessing, stating that the

presence of the CH.A.M.P. group in the community is a great blessing. Father went on to say that some children are unhappy and while there are many sad people in church for the Vigil, there is a difference in being unhappy. He added that there is hope in our hearts that things will get better and there will be an end to hatred and violence so no one else would experience losing a child through violence.

Vocalist Steve Sweeney and his singing group concluded the program with a song about the rainbow.

The gathering, which included Sen. Thomas Birmingham, Boston Police Commissioner Francis "Mickey" Roache and a delegation from the Boston Homicide Unit, then filed to the front of the church where each was presented with a candle lighted from the large Easter Candle.

All gathered on the church steps with their candle in hand and stood in silence as the list of residents of Charlestown who were victims of murder were read. As each name was spoken, Matthew King tolled a handbell in his or her memory.

Yes, there were many tears shed on Sunday, but it was a time for caring caring about the true victims of murder, those who are left behind.




The Central Artery Topic Of Adult Discussion Group


