Bunker Hill Day Parade Committee Seeks Community Support

The Charlestown Veterans/Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee has voted to dedicate this year's parade to the veterans of the Korean "The Forgotten" War as well as to our patriot forefathers who fought for freedom 217 years ago on the hills of Charlestown during the Battle of Bunker Hill.

The committee is seeking

the support of the residents, merchants and organizations for the 1992 Bunker Hill Day celebration in order that the events will serve as a significant and meaningful tribute to all those veterans who served in the Korean War, especially those from Charlestown who made the supreme sacrifice.

The highlight of the cele-

bration will be the Bunker Hill Day Parade, which will be held on Sunday, June 14, commencing at 12:30 p.m. from the Hayes Square area of the town. This should be one of the largest and most outstanding parades in the Greater Boston area.

As you are most likely aware, due to both the fiscal constraints imposed on the city of Boston, the funds available from the city to help underwrite parades are extremely limited, and reserves that the committee had built up in the parade fund were almost completely depleted by last year's "Welcome Home" Parade and laser show. Thus, increased financial assistance must once again be sought from the community — from you the residents, local business people and community organizations — to make this, the 217th commemoration of the Battle of Bunker Hill — a success.

The fund raising for the parade and commemorative celebration again this year is being carried out by a small but dedicated group of residents. These people are giving many hours of their time to make this a truly memorable celebration for the community and they need the support of every resident, whether a lifelong "Townie" or a new-

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Neighborhood Council In Solidarity With ILA

In an impassioned plea for support, International Longshoremen's Association (ILA) New England Vice President Ed Connolly informed the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) last week that Longshoremen are battling to preserve their jurisdictional rights to work along the waterfront. Connolly vowed to fight Massport and the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) for their "union busting" tactics that would result in the "ILA ceasing to exist" if allowed to continue, he said.

Connolly came before the CNC at its monthly meeting on April 2. He notified the members that the MWRA was breaking the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) made with the community as part of the Boston Harbor Clean-up Project, by allowing packages to be transported between Charlestown and Deer Island. ILA members working on Deer Island, he related, have witnessed packages being taken off boats intended to carry personnel from the former Revere Sugar Site on Medford Street to Deer Island. The

MOU states that only personnel can be transported on these vessels.

MWRA Community Relations Coordinator Carrie Fuchs replied to Connolly's accusations by informing the council that MWRA is aware that transporting material on board the boats would be in violation of the MOU. She stated that the only items known to be carried on board the boats have been pieces of mail hand-carried by personnel. "You mentioned the word 'cargo'," she stated. "No cargo is being placed on boats in Charlestown." Fuch added: "There will be no cargo taken from the Revere Sugar site. We intend to comply with the MOU."

The ILA, Connolly stated, has been trying to negotiate with Massport and MWRA for three years to ensure its union's participation in the Harbor Clean-up Project. "I'm tired of talking," Connolly said. "They are coming onto our pier and trying to take our jobs." He added that Massport and the MWRA are hiring guards for security on the piers and "taking our people out."

"I am pleading with you (the council) to support us.

I want your support and personally hold every one of you responsible if our waterfront jobs are lost," he said.

Local 799, ILA Business Agent John "Buster" Woods stated that 587 Charlestown residents rely on the ILA for pensions, and the ILA intends to fight for their rights. He said: "We might not be able to win, but we'll fight you (Massport and MWRA). We'll never go out without a fight."

Connolly told the council that if the ILA demands are not met, his membership will be out in force. He stated: "On the first day in June, we'll be there at 5:30 a.m., eight hours a day, five days a week, blocking their Medford Street entrance."

CNC Chairman Dennis McLaughlin told Fuchs to bring a message back to the MWRA. He said: "Tell them that these are jobs that are a tradition in Charlestown. I'm telling you that if the ILA says they are going to picket the site, the community will support them." He added: "I suggest strongly that you report to the MWRA that the ILA will take action, and when they do, Charlestown will

stand beside them. Our patience has been tried."

In a show of solidarity with the union, council members informed Fuchs that they will also stand with the ILA on the picket line and stop any and every car trying to enter the Medford Street parking lot to board a boat to Deer Island when the Personnel Transfer Facility opens in June.

Fuchs told McLaughlin, "I did speak about the ILA demands and received this statement: 'The MWRA is reviewing carefully any opportunities that might be available to the ILA in regards to this site.'"

On a motion by member Jim Conway, the council voted unanimously to support the ILA demands and inform elected officials to do the same.

After hearing the council's comments and vote, Connolly said: "Thank you from my heart for all our members." To the MWRA and Massport, he said: "You'll have to fight us. You'll have to crawl over me, but you won't win."

★ **Neighborhood Streets . . .** BRA Assistant Director for Economic Development Paul Barrett announced this week that the long-awaited street reconstruction projects will begin on Tuesday, April 21.

The BRA Board of Directors has named Mahoney Construction Company as the contractor to reconstruct 28 residential streets, and the Middlesex Construction Company to refurbish the Mead Street Steps (40 Flights). The Bryant Associates Inc. engineering firm has also been hired to oversee the reconstruction projects on behalf of the BRA.

Engineers from Bryant Associates have already begun to canvas neighborhood streets included in the contract. Still photographs and videos are being taken by the company prior to the scheduled work start-up date.

The \$3.8 million contract will necessitate some inconvenience to residents, Barrett stated. A Neighborhood Liaison will be available for the duration of the project to answer questions and concerns.

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council Basic Services Committee will conduct a meeting on Tuesday, April 14 at the Charlestown District Court in City Square with representatives of the construction and engineering companies and the BRA. The meeting will begin at approximately 7:30 p.m., immediately following a Public Safety Committee meeting. The purpose of the meeting is to explain to residents the schedule of streets to be worked on and the construction process from beginning to end.

The streets included in the reconstruction contracts are: Chestnut, Essex, Adams, Devens, Washington, Russell, Concord, Putnam, Lexington, Lyndeboro, Park, Mt. Vernon, Prescott, Middlesex, Ellwood, Ludlow, Ferrin, Common, Lawrence, Prospect and Seminary streets, Mt. Vernon Avenue, Nearen Row, Winthrop Square, Monument Court, Monument Square and Rutherford Avenue, and the Mead Street Steps between Russell and Bunker Hill streets.

Committee Vice Chairmen Marty O'Brien and Bob Scalli advise residents living in these locations to attend this meeting so that they would be informed about the ramifications of this work on their neighborhoods.

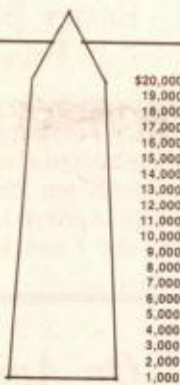

Committee Chairperson Nancy Keyes presented a document that outlined the guidelines for organizations and agencies to follow in order to apply for grants through MWRA mitigation. Keyes stated that the criteria included in the document came from community input at two public committee meetings.

The categories by which the organizations/agencies

can apply for funds are: capital funding, program/operational funding and emergency funding.

Keyes explained the application process to be used by those submitting requests for funds. She informed the council that a workshop will take place to assist any organization/agency in supplying the required information needed to complete the form.

After discussion by the

council members, the application process established by the committee was endorsed by a council vote with one exclusion. An 80 percent Charlestown residency participation in a program required to be eligible to apply for funds was stricken from the application process.

Keyes stated that applications for grants will be distributed throughout the community. The date and location of the workshop will be announced in an upcoming edition of the Pa-

Knight of the Knights of Columbus, who will be the council's special guest of honor. Joining the Supreme Knight will be Suffolk County District Attorney Newman Flanagan, a member of the Knights of Columbus Supreme Board of Directors, and John F. Oteri, State Deputy of the Massachusetts State Council of the Knights of Columbus. Mayor Raymond L. Flynn has also accepted the council's invitation to attend the ball.

As Supreme Knight, Dechant serves as the international president of what is now the world's largest Catholic fraternal society with more than 1.5 million

members, according to the K. of C. headquarters staff in New Haven, Conn.

The 13th Supreme Knight elected to this post since the founding of the Knights of Columbus in 1882, Supreme Knight Dechant oversees an international network of 9,800 councils that raised and donated \$94 million in charitable giving during 1991. 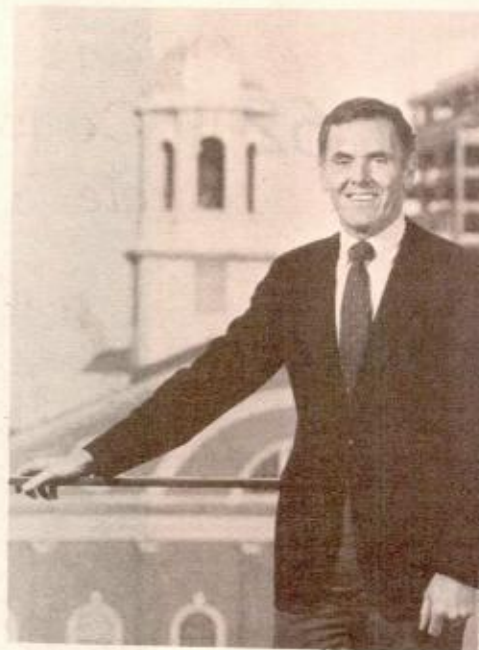

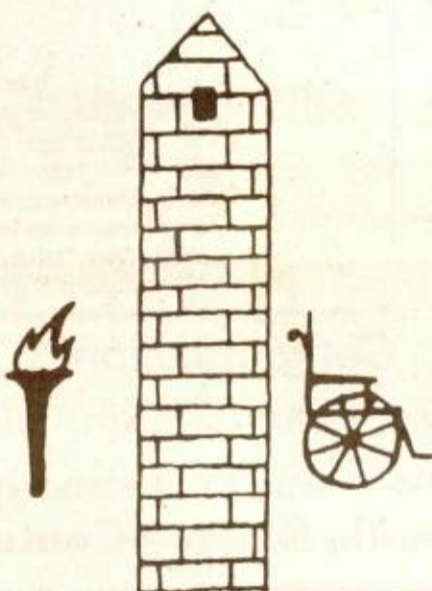

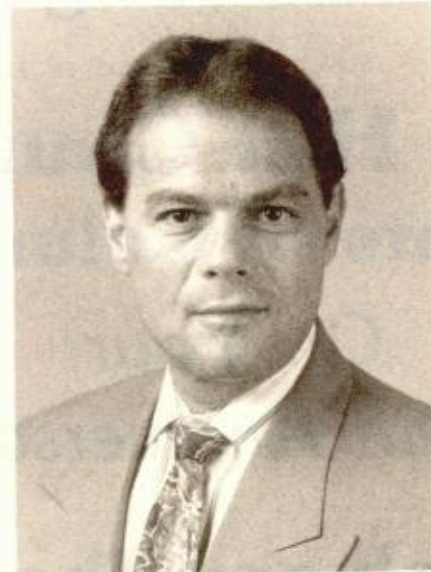

While visiting Ireland during the summer of 1962, President John Fitzgerald Kennedy made the following remarks at a tumultuous reception: "That wall of shame I witnessed in Berlin could not happen here because you're the boys of Wexford who fought heart and hand and burst in twain the galling chain to free your native land." Proud of his ancestral homeland, President Kennedy mesmerized the adoring crowd as he did so often in his brief 46 years.

Both patriotic and passionate for the just causes of his people, this will always be perpetuated by the boys of Bunker Hill Council No. 62, Knights of Columbus.

JFK's Early Years
President Kennedy's journey to the Bunker Hill Council, the first council in the second period of the Order and also the first council outside the states of Connecticut and Rhode Island, commenced with his birth in Brookline, Mass. in 1917. The future President of the United States was the second son born to Joseph Patrick Kennedy and Rose Elizabeth Fitzgerald Kennedy. Other siblings were Joseph, Rosemary, Kathleen, Eunice, Patricia, Robert, Jean and Edward.

Growing up in a household headed by the first Irishman to be appointed to the Court of St. James, Ambassador Joe had grand plans for his brood. At the precocious age of 25 in 1914, Joe became the

youngest bank president in the United States. His financial acumen was polished at the Columbia Trust Company, located in East Boston, a location that would play a significant role for his son John. A comfortable lifestyle was made possible by Joe's prudent investments that benefitted handsomely his nine children.

Educated To Lead
Education was paramount for Joe's children. To have the necessary learning skills to make a difference for John, Joe enrolled him at Choate, one of the most esoteric preparatory boarding schools in America. With the discipline inculcated at Choate, John was off to Harvard with a temporary layover at Princeton. A Catholic lad with a blue-blood university education was a paradox that father Joe relished.

In The Service Of His Country
Volunteering and enlisting are synonymous with the "Townie" tradition in the military. Young Jack Kennedy followed suit when in 1941 he enlisted in the Navy. Originally Jack was assigned to the Naval Operations Intelligence Department in Washington, D.C. An appropriate political maneuver allowed the youthful Lt. Kennedy to receive a transfer to sea duty which would propel his ascension on the political scene in a short five years.

It was a tropical setting, but the pace was torrid for the brave Lt. Kennedy in the South Pacific near the

Solomon Islands. Commanding torpedo boat **PT-109**, the name of which will ever be a legend, horror and heroism surfaced for Jack and his crew.

A Japanese destroyer collided and destroyed **PT-109**. Well-documented reports of the war incident detail how Jack dismissed his painful injuries and saved the life of engineer Patrick McMahon. His swimming prowess allowed Jack to guide and tow his crewmate out of harm's way. Jack displayed courage that would bring him recognition that he did not seek. Always giving praise to others in the **PT-109** mishap, Jack was a truly altruistic individual.

JFK Begins Career In Public Service
Keeping the legacy of the Kennedys of giving a little more, Joe Kennedy, the eldest of the family, tragically gave his life for his country while on a flying mission in Europe in August of 1944. The Navy Cross was awarded to Joe for his heroic actions and given to his parents.

The loss of Joe would always drive Jack to continue the leadership and qualities that Joe displayed. To be the firstborn was to be the first to enter politics in father Joe's scheme. As the torch was passed to Jack, the heat in the Massachusetts 11th Congressional District became intense.

With his assumption of the Mayor's seat on School Street, James Michael Curley relinquished his congressional seat. Perfect plans were put in place, and

with ambassadorial direction, father Joe made 1946 a very special year for the country and for Bunker Hill Council No. 62, Knights of Columbus.

JFK Joins Bunker Hill Council
The late Warren McCully, Past Grand Knight, sponsored John Fitzgerald Kennedy for entrance into Council No. 62. Brother Kennedy took his first degree on March 17, 1946 with charity as the lesson. On March 31, 1946, the second degree was administered with unity as the lesson. Fraternity was the lesson of his third degree, given on April 2, 1946. It was a most joyous day for the Kennedy family and for Bunker Hill Council No. 62, Knights of Columbus.

All lessons were well-learned, for on May 30, 1954, then Senator John Kennedy took his fourth degree and its patriotic lesson under the tutelage of former Supreme Knight John W. McDevitt, who was the Master of the Massachusetts District. Reaching the pinnacle of the Knights was a great accomplishment that certainly brought satisfaction to President John Fitzgerald Kennedy.

Mr. President
"Aggressive shyness" was the phrase that "Townie" Dave Powers pinned on President Kennedy. This was evidenced in "A Hero For Our Time" by Ralph G. Martin. Author Martin stated in his book that the Speaker of the U.S. House

of Representatives Sam Rayburn told the press: "Me and Lyndon Johnson, we only want to be in L.A. to pick up the pieces. That Catholic boy is only going so far." Kennedy's rebuttal was: "You can tell him that this Catholic boy doesn't

think there will be any pieces left when they arrive in L.A."

A dear and special gift from President Kennedy to Dave Powers summarizes his wit. On the mug is the following inscription: "There are three things

which are real: God, human folly and laughter. The first two are beyond our comprehension, so we must do what we can with the third."

The End Of Camelot

Camelot was over after a brief two years, 10 months and two days. Many will never forget his short 46 years on earth.

The plaque dedicated on June 6, 1964 at the council's former chambers at 44 High St. says it all about our late Brother: "Home Council of late departed Brother and beloved President of the United States. John F. Kennedy 1917-1963."

The Council Enters Its Second Century

From its auspicious beginning on April 10, 1892, Bunker Hill Council No. 62 has much of which to be proud. Its community assistance and awareness are legendary.

For Grand Knight Edward "Ned" Rosselle and Centennial Chairman Thomas Cunha, Past Grand Knight and Past District Deputy, may the festivities for Saturday, April 11, 1992 be a superlative success. As we journey into the 21st century and our next 100 years, may the Lord give caring and safe direction on the journey.



State Rep. Richard Voke has announced that the state will be offering a new lead paint abatement program. The program is designed to provide low- and moderate-income families with low-interest loans to remove lead paint from their homes. More than 1,000 homeowners are expected to benefit from this financing opportunity.

According to Voke, the loan program will assist families that want to delead their homes, but ordinarily could not afford it. "Given the economic times we face, the timing of this abatement program couldn't be better. Balancing the health needs of a lead-free home while providing other family necessities is not an easy task. It is my hope that these low-interest loans will help families remove lead paint from their homes; safely and affordably," commented Voke.

The terms of the financing allow up to \$15,000 per loan at a fixed interest rate of 5 percent or 7.5 percent. To qualify for a loan with a 5 percent APR, families living in the Boston area must have an income level of not more than \$43,000. Families with an income of not more than \$57,000 would qualify for the 7.5 percent APR. Income limits do vary depending upon the size of the household. Voke also noted that \$1

million in financing will be set aside at 0 percent interest for households who are under court order to remove lead paint, but whose income would prevent them from qualifying for a loan. Repayment of these loans is not required until the property is sold, transferred or refinanced.

Noting that priority will be given to households where children under age 7 reside, Voke stated that prevention is the focus. "We must ensure that children have a safe environment to live in.

This program takes a proactive approach to meet that goal," said Voke.

Financing will be available through local community development agencies and lending institutions statewide. For information on applying for financing, prospective participants should contact the Massachusetts Housing Finance Agency's Office of Family Programs at 451-2766.

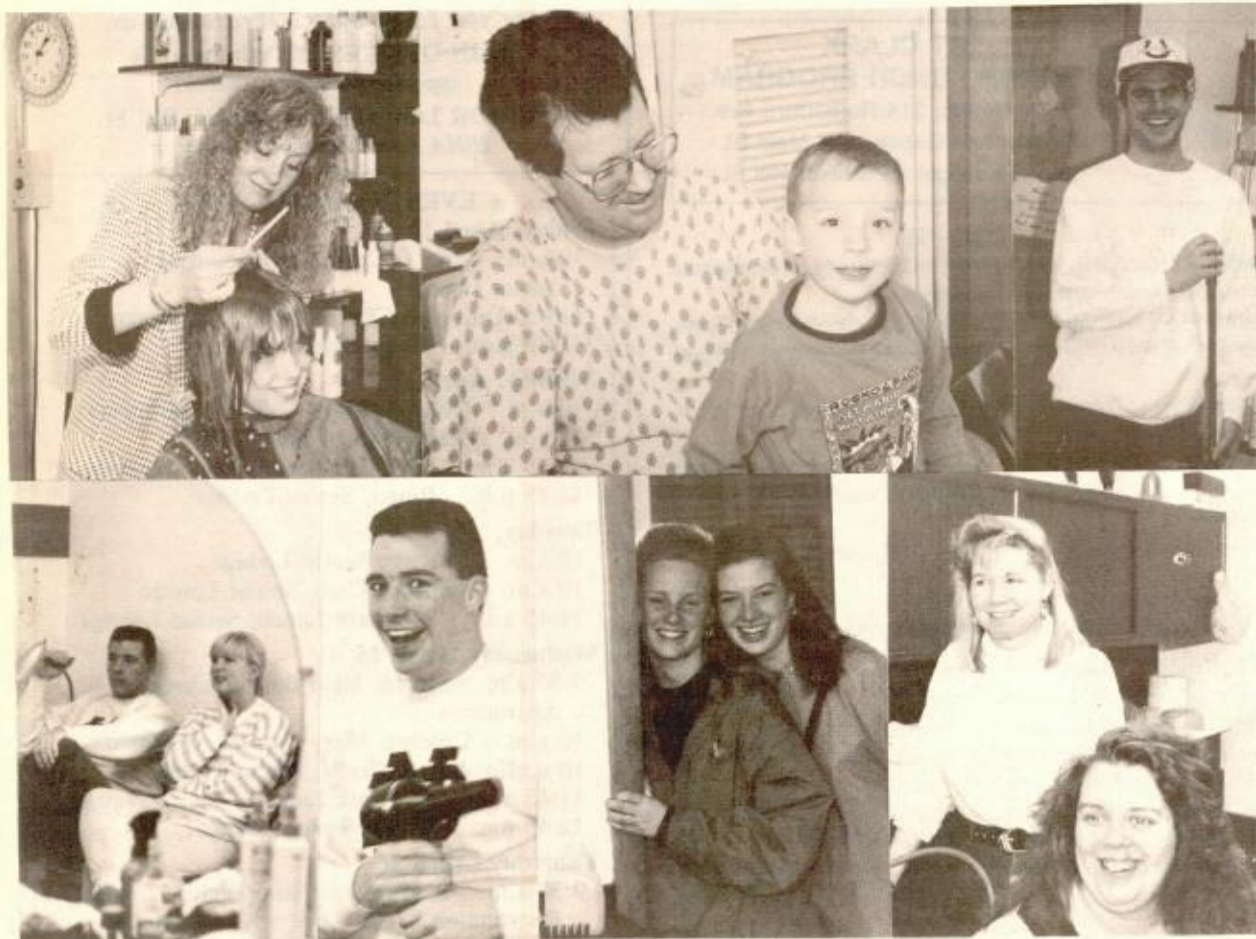

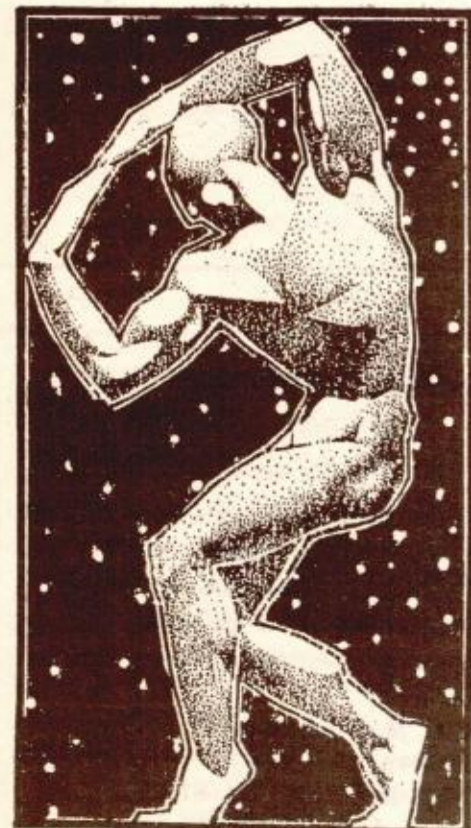

'USS Bunker Hill' Receives Second 1991 Warfare Excellence Award

USS Bunker Hill (CG-52) has received its second 1991 warfare honor — the 1991 Antisurface Warfare (ASUW) Excellence Award — from Vice Adm. Stanley R. Arthur, Commander, U.S. Seventh Fleet.

Permanently deployed to Yokosuka, Japan as a member of Battle Group Alpha, the ship was selected among all surface combatants deployed to the Western Pacific and Indian Oceans in 1991 for outstanding ASUW performance in high-tempo peacetime operations and actual combat during Operation Desert Storm.

Bunker Hill is the first Aegis cruiser to be equipped with the MK-41 Ver-

tical Launching System. While serving in the Arabian Gulf, Bunker Hill successfully launched 28 cruise missiles against Iraq, including strikes on Jan. 17, 1991. The ship coordinated with other forces in destroying Iraqi naval forces in the northern gulf.

After Desert Storm, the ship participated in Seventh

Fleet bilateral and joint service exercises throughout the Pacific. Exercises included naval gunfire support, over-the-horizon targeting, surface gunnery and cruise missile employment.

Bunker Hill was commanded by Capt. Thomas F. Marfiak in 1991, and is now commanded by Capt. E. Richard Diamond Jr.
