## Is Resident Parking The Answer To Area Parking Problems?

The snowbanks on the streets of Charlestown have increased the difficulty in finding a parking space and have added problems to an already congested parking situation in the community. The result has been residential frustration and anger focused primarily on commuters who use the streets as a free parking lot as they take the bus or walk into town, and also on the large number of residents who have out-of-state license plates months, or even years, after they take up residency in the town.

Some 50 residents came to the K. of C. Hall on March 21 to voice their concerns to representatives of the Boston Transportation Department (BTD) and members of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) including Chairman Peter Looney, Second Vice Chairman Mel Stillman, Judy Brennan, Ken Stone, Moe Gillen, Dan Kovacevic, Bill McCabe and Kay Whelan.

Looney opened the forum stating that a solution to the parking problems is wanted - one that would make parking easier for the residents and harder for the commuters.

Don Keough, chief traffic investigator, and Jim Mansfield, director of community affairs, both of the BTD, were on hand to lead residents through the Resident Permit Parking Program and to listen to their con-

Keough, at the outset, pointed that such a parking program is initiated in the community at the request of

the residents and the only program currently in Charlestown is in the Sullivan

Square area. The procedure is that after a community meeting, neighborhood organizers must circulate petitions provided by the BTD and secure signatures in support of the program from 51 percent of the residents in the affected area. He was not specific on the number of streets that would be considered a minimum in setting up such a program, stating that the BTD would discuss specific areas with interested residents.

Keough did say a parking program would be tailored to the needs of a specific area with the BTD working with the residents. He said that various aspects of the program could be combined in one area, such as Resident Permit Parking Only, Visitor Parking/2-Hour Limit/Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Parking/2-Hour Limit/ Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., Except Re-

According to Keough, enforcement of parking regulations in such areas is carried out. He did say that these programs do eliminate parking by commuters but don't add more spaces. In fact, he stated, in some instances the number of parking spaces in any given area may be reduced as codes and regulations are more strictly enforced such as the required 20-foot setback from each intersection and the elimination of parking from one side of a street (continued on page 4)

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



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## Meeting Held To Address Problems At Charlestown High School

Peter Looney, chairman of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC), last week requested a meeting with city and school department officials to address ongoing problems relative to student attendance and transportation at Charlestown High School.

In an effort to seek remedies to these problems, District One Boston City Councillor Diane J. Modica organized a meeting at City Hall with representatives from Charlestown, the Boston School Department and the Boston Police Department. In attendance, along with Modica, were Councillor Peggy Davis-Mullen, chairman of the council's Education Committee; Stacy Johnson, headmaster of Charlestown High; Capt. Stephen Doris and Officer Kevin Witherspoon, both of Area A of the Boston Police Department; Peter Looney, chairman of the CNC; Moe Gillen, CNC member; Bob McGann of the Charlestown Community Centers; and Ken Caldwell and Al Holland, both of the Boston School Department.

Looney, members of the CNC and concerned residents and business people have sought the cooperation of school and police officials in resolving Charlestown High-related problems with students going and coming from school, on public transportation and within the neighborhood.

The urgency of addressing these problems came to the forefront on March 16. On that date, two Boston Police officers were assaulted by a group of teenagers, many of whom attend Charlestown High, when the officers were attempting to arrest an individual who allegedly had stolen a car. This incident occurred in the morning after school had begun and raised the question as to why the students were not in school.

"Concerns were raised about Charlestown High students leaving the school at different times during the day and wandering the streets during school hours," stated Modica. "Concerns were also raised regarding students' conduct when congregating on Bunker Hill Street after school while waiting for public transportation," she added. "We are pleased that all parties came to the table and acknowledged the need to find solutions sooner rather than later," she said.

Davis-Mullen added, "We felt it was imperative to act, not react to the concerns of the people of Charlestown, both at the community level and at the school level. I am pleased that we were proactive instead of waiting for a serious problem to occur. We believe that there will be visible concrete solutions that come out of this meet-

Possible solutions discussed at the meeting included increased security at the doors of the school to prevent students from leaving the facility, better ways to encourage use of the existing shuttle buses and alternate transportation for the students. The school department pledged to develop a plan to deal with student attendance issues and present it to the councillors within a week. Follow-up meetings will be scheduled to ensure that these issues are addressed in a timely and satisfactory manner for all the parties involved.

Looney thanked Modica and Davis-Mullen for their cooperation in facilitating this meeting. He said that he is "cautious at the moment," waiting to see the plan promised by the school department regarding the attendance and transportation issues, noting that the residents have "gone down this road before and complaints brought up at previous meetings have fallen on deaf ears." Looney added that he hopes for increased cooperation with the school and police departments and the residents.

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
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

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#### **CUTTING THROUGH THE** RED TAPE AT THE IRS

In an organization the size of the Internal Revenue Service, documents are sometimes lost, misfiled or inadvertently discarded. What's more, taxpayer attempts to straighten out these problems often fall on deaf ears. When this happens, most of us can become extremely frustrated. It seems as if no one within the IRS bureaucracy cares or, worse yet, wants to get involved in tracking down the problem.

But when tax-related administrative problems cannot be resolved through the normal IRS channels, there is someone you can turn to who will take an active and immediate interest in your problem. That person can be found in the IRS Problem Resolution Office (PRO). Each district office, service center and regional office has a PRO.

The IRS Problem Resolution Program, started in 1977 made tremendous headway in helping taxpayers resolve administrative problems. From lost refund checks to simply getting someone to respond to your ignored correspondence, these PRO staff members will cut through red tape, pinpoint the problem and get results.

Before you call or write, however, be sure you have first exhausted every available channel in your attempts to resolve the problem. Otherwise, the PRO will not get involved. Make sure you know the dates and file numbers of your prior correspondence, as well as the names of those who you have talked to on the phone. The PRO will try to resolve most administrative problems within five working days. But even when unable to do so within this period, you will at least get a prompt answer as to what may be causing the hang-up.

A major goal of the Problem Resolution Program is to analyze internal procedures that, if altered, would prevent a specific problem from occurring in the first place. By studying the cause of each problem, the IRS hopes to minimize future bottlenecks in its pipeline.

(continued from page one) if that street did not provide a 10-foot travel lane. Keough added that there is sometimes an exception to the latter provision if officials from the fire department and emergency services determine that their vehicles can maneuver on the streets.

One BTD regulation that met with wide approval from the gathering was that in order to obtain a sticker, the automobile must be registered in Charlestown. Keough added that there is no charge for the sticker, but initially, residents must come to City Hall to fill out an application and bring along their registration and another form of identification such as a utility bill. and all parking tickets must be paid. There is an annual renewal which may be done by mail. In response to a question, Keough stated there is no limit on the number of stickers issued to a household as long as each meets the requirements.

Keough stated that other considerations residents should think about relative to a parking program is that health-care providers, nonresident employees and workmen not in clearly identified commercial vehicles are not covered under the program. Also, visitors parked in specified spaces must move after two hours. Mansfield added that the BTD has no jurisdiction to institute a parking program

within the Boston Housing Authority, CharlesNewtown and Mishawum Park housing.


As to people who live in the town but do not register their cars here, Keough noted that this is illegal. He advised residents to notify the Registry of Motor Vehicles with the license plate number and the person's address. Mansfield added that his office could conduct a parking license survey of a street where there are a large number of outof-state vehicles, and they would contact the Registry in that particular state reporting the cars abandoned.

Other complaints centered around vehicles left parked on neighborhood streets for weeks at a time; out-of-state drivers who honk their horns at residents to hurry from their overnight spaces so they can park; lack of parking for businesses with the recommendation that the empty lot adjacent to the K. of C. Hall be taken by eminent domain and parking meters installed; and concern that residents make an "informed decision" before asking for a parking program.

Mansfield has information booklets available for persons interested in the Resident Permit Parking Program and also has petitions for gathering signatures to institute such a program. He may be reached at 635-4810.





#### Hayden Seeks To Clarify Incident In Charlestown On March 16

Deputy Superintendent Robert E. Hayden Jr. of Area A of the Boston Police Department contacted the Patriot this week regarding the incident on March 16 involving a stolen car, the subsequent arrest of five Charlestown teens and the injuries to two police officers who were in the process of arresting a teen who was suspected of stealing the vehicle.

Hayden stated that the initial telephone call came in from a resident on 911 at 7:55 a.m. on Wednesday, March 16 relating that a stolen car was traveling 80 miles an hour through the streets of Charlestown and there was fear that children on their way to school might be injured.

The Deputy pointed out that there was never a car chase as the dispatcher, the sergeant and the officers agreed not to even think about a chase with the congested streets at that time of the morning. Officers Desmond Tyler and Kevin Witherspoon were on patrol and saw the car in question come toward them. When the car passed the two officers, they recognized the driver. They then went to a location on Pearl Street where automobiles are frequently abandoned and found the vehicle.

According to Hayden, about 15 minutes later, the officers observed the driver on foot at Polk and Medford streets. Witherspoon left the cruiser and ran down to cut the suspect off while Tyler circled in the cruiser. Tyler responded to a call from Witherspoon for assistance in making the arrest and when the officers attempted to place the suspect in the cruiser, a group of 15 to 20 teens appeared.

The officers reported that the group attacked and Witherspoon was on the ground with the suspect while Tyler tried to keep the teens away as they charged the officers. Tyler took out a canister of Mace and sprayed to get the teens off. Witherspoon received an injury to his hand while Tyler reported a twisted back. Both were treated at Mass. General Hospital. Hayden related that Witherspoon has the uniform he was wearing that day and it is covered with footprints from the kicking he recei-

As to rumors in the community that the police officers used excessive force in handling the teens, Hayden replied: "No officer beat

Hayden went on to say that neither Tyler or Witherspoon nor any officer in the station feel even remotely that this was a racial incident. He noted that the two officers are "proud of the relationships made with community residents, feel strong ties to Charlestown and want to continue to work in the area." He stated that this was a "misguided group of young people trying to rescue a friend."

According to Hayden, some two dozen telephone calls have been received at Area A inquiring about the condition of the two officers. He added that a communication from a group of teens has come in to them asking that a softball game or athletic contest be set up between Charlestown teens and the officers of Area A. The teens wanted it to be known that only a small number were involved in the incident, not the majority of Charlestown teens.

Hayden said that the officers "used good common sense" in not chasing the car in question and the decision was a credit to them. He added that the decision was "probably responsible for an innocent child not being run over."



The choir, now number-

ing from four to seven members, is working on a repertoire from the Sacred Harp, a collection of 18th and 19th century music written by and for amateur performers from the deep south of the United States.

"Sacred harp music," says Witte, "is not all stuffy. It has rough-hewn, wild qualities. It breaks the rules of classical writing right and left."

Nonetheless, as Witte notes, "The backbone of Episcopal church music is Renaissance polyphony, especially from the Tudor period. As the choir grows and becomes more used to singing as an ensemble, I hope we can move into music of this period, because I don't want to short-change our Angelican traditions."

Witte also hopes to promote the use of St. John's as a regular concert space.
