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Massachusetts Korean War Veterans Memorial Dedication July 27

Just over a year ago, Korean War veteran Joseph P. McCallion wrote: "The Korean War has a sad lament, there's no memorial, no monument. No landscaped grounds or hallowed halls, no bronze statues or marble walls . . ."

On Tuesday, July 27, veterans of the Korean War will gather at the Charles-

town Navy Yard with veterans of other conflicts, former military leaders and representatives of the city and state governments to remember the often-termed "Forgotten War" and the 54,246 men and women who were killed in that three-year conflict. In particular, the 129,000 from Massachusetts who served in the Korean War, the 1,620 who died and the 105

still unaccounted for will be permanently memorialized at a landscaped spot in Shipyard Park overlooking Dry Dock 2 and the harbor.

Korean veterans from throughout the Commonwealth have labored long and hard to secure the land and funds so that a fitting memorial could be constructed honoring those native sons and daughters

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Parks To Be Dedicated In Honor Of Zeke Marsden And Bryan McGonagle

The dedication of two community parks will take place on Saturday, July 24, honoring two native sons of Charlestown.

At 10 a.m., the playground at Cook and Hill streets will be dedicated to the late William "Zeke" Marsden.

Zeke, who succumbed to a battle with cancer just over two years ago, was active in many community

endeavors. He served as president of the St. Francis de Sales Parents Club and was a director of the Bunker Hill Monument Association. He left his wife, Marie "Peachie" Marsden, and children Cherie, Billy, Melanie and Michael.

The second dedication will take place at noon at Ryan Field in Sullivan Square where a newly refurbished playground will

be named in memory of Bryan McGonagle.

Bryan, age 9, died as the result of injuries sustained in a bicycle accident on Labor Day weekend two years ago. The son of Barbara and Patrick McGonagle and the brother of Michael, Bryan was a student at St. Francis de Sales School. He played for Charlestown Little League, Charlestown

Efforts Continue To Fund Testing For Baby Kyle Bone Marrow Match

From the flyers in almost every store, to the canisters on the counters, the name of Kyle Fitzpatrick has become a household word. One-year-old Baby Kyle, the son of Bobby and Cindy (Venezia) Fitzpatrick, has leukemia and his only hope for survival is to find a compatible donor who can give him a small amount of healthy marrow, the "Living Gift Of Life."

The recruiting and testing of potential donors for Kyle is being organized by Friends of Baby Kyle in conjunction with the HLA Registry Foundation Inc., a not-for-profit organization and member of the National Marrow Donor Program.

A testing session will be held at MIT as part of an effort to find a bone marrow donor for Baby Kyle. Anyone between the ages of 18 and 55 who is in good health and willing to give a blood sample can be tested on Sunday, Aug. 1, between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m.,

or on Monday, August 2, between 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. The testing will be done on the second floor of the Stratton Student Center at MIT, 84 Massachusetts Ave., Cambridge.

In order to accommodate Charlestown residents who will be going to the testing site on Sunday, Aug. 1, the Bunker Hill Council No. 62, Knights of Columbus and the Bunker Hill Associates have coordinated transportation to the site with the assistance of Teamsters Local 25. Between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. on Aug. 1, residents are invited to park at the K. of C. Hall at 75 West School St. and enjoy some refreshments. The Local 25 van and driver will then transport them to Cambridge and return them to the K. of C. after they take part in the testing session.

All test results from the donor drives will be entered into the HLA Registry data base and made availa-

ble to Kyle and the other 9,000 victims of blood disease in search of a "miracle match."

Though each donor drive builds hope, it also creates bills. Initial blood tests for potential donors are expensive, costing \$50 each. The Friends of Kyle have been working to raise money to cover the cost of the testing through fund raisers and donations. The momentum and spirit of this effort has been wonderful to date and the family and friends are most grateful. It is hoped that the effort can continue.

Last Friday night's Karaoke Night, run by Kyle's sisters Kim and Kelly Fitzpatrick at St. Catherine's Hall, was a great success and these young women should be commended for their efforts.

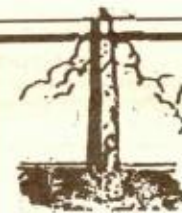

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Joint Tech Prep Education Program
Being Implemented

The Metro Boston Tech Prep Consortia met at Bunker Hill Community College to implement a joint Tech Prep education program that would provide a well-defined path of preparation for technically demanding jobs of the future. This agreement between presidents of schools and colleges was formally signed at this annual meeting.

Guest speakers included Robert Antonucci, Mass. Commissioner of Education, and state Rep. Mark Roosevelt. Citations from Governor William F. Weld were issued to all school members "for their leadership and willingness to take bold steps to improve education in Mass."

The consortium is an organization formed in cooperation with the Mass. Department of Labor, with funding from the Department of Education. The mission is to implement a Tech Prep Preparation degree program for students in member schools which blends academic and technical courses with work-based experience for students in grades 9 through 12.

Membership in the consortium includes the Boston schools system and North-east Metro Regional Vocational School/Wakefield; Roxbury Community College, Franklin Institute of Boston and Bunker Hill Community College.

In only 18 months, the Metro Boston Consortium has made significant progress in piloting Tech Prep courses of study, staff development in applied academics and career counseling in urban school sites.

Lydon Announces Candidacy For Mayor Of Boston

The campaign of mayoral candidate Christopher Lydon has begun operating its free "Did you know . . ." hotline which will operate throughout the campaign and will offer the public a stream of facts and statistics documenting the ways in which our city doesn't work. The hotline is free and can be reached at 723-4128.

At his first mayoral forum appearance last week, candidate Lydon wasted no time in distinguishing himself from the rest of the field. He sent a murmur through the audience when he questioned his opponents' ability to focus on the relevant issues facing Boston.

"At last week's forum, my opponents demonstrated why we must take career politics out of city hall," Lydon said. "Boston politics, as the professional candidates play it, is driving students out of our schools; it is driving families out of the neighborhoods they built; and it is driving jobs and business out of town in a stampede that is getting serious," declared Lydon.

Lydon, who formally entered the mayor's race just this week, calls his campaign "a citizens' candidacy." He pledges to tell the truth about city government, "even when it hurts." Last week, he blasted his opponents for their knee-jerk support of a costly taxpayer-subsidized "megaplex" at the expense of finding solutions to real problems like education.

Lydon called the Boston public school system "a rotten school system we may have to blow up to save." He is the only candidate who has called for re-designing the schools and smashing what he calls a "monopoly controlled by its employees." He noted that other candidates have clung to limp cliches like "school-based management" which, in its present form, Lydon calls a "sham."

Lydon is calling for the rewriting of teachers' contracts to meet the challenges of educating a highly skilled work force.

He added, "The second way to bust the monopoly is to introduce a meaningful

Accepting patronage means the mayor's office owns a part of them and that is why I don't accept jobs and why I am so independent.

I am well aware that I am not too popular with some of my colleagues because I have a habit of questioning everything that comes before the council. I am sure they wish that I would go away and get lost but, rest assured, I do not intend to do so, and I will never change.

In 1974, I voted against the creation of the Water and Sewer Commission because I knew then that we as taxpayers would be crucified with high sewer and water bills. When the hearing was held to create that monster, I asked just how many people would be hired and they said no more

than nine people and 338 people were hired, and that is how the water and sewer commission was created.

What about the school budget? Of course I voted against it. In 1974 the budget was \$107 million with 93,000 students. We closed 92 schools and now the budget is \$374 million with only 52,000 students in our school system. The buses alone cost us \$32 million with three to four youngsters riding in them.

There are 520 administrators in our school system with only 52,000 students. New York City has about a million students, Chicago and Los Angeles each have 800,000 students and they only have about 100 administrators. What in God's name are they running in

The U.S. Navy has loaned several Naval artifacts to the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) for display at Shipyard Park in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Among the items loaned to the BRA on a long-term basis are two large 16,000-pound Navy ship anchors and a smaller 5,000-pound anchor. The three anchors have been refurbished by the BRA and are now on display at the head of Dry Dock 2 at the Navy Yard.

In addition to the anchors, the BRA has received two large bronze ship propellers as well as two large buoy bells with stands. These artifacts are planned for display at appropriate locations around Pier 4 and Shipyard Park.

This permanent loan arrangement was made possible under the U.S. Navy Surplus Property Loan Program, whereby municipalities and non-profit organizations can request Navy surplus property from the Naval Historical Center in Washington, D.C. The stipulations are that the artifacts have to be displayed with dignity and maintained in good physical condition.

Shipyard Park, where the Navy artifacts are displayed, is a 16-acre public park which has just undergone extensive renovations by the BRA. These Navy artifacts are in keeping with the BRA's goal of preserving the Naval history and character of the Navy Yard.

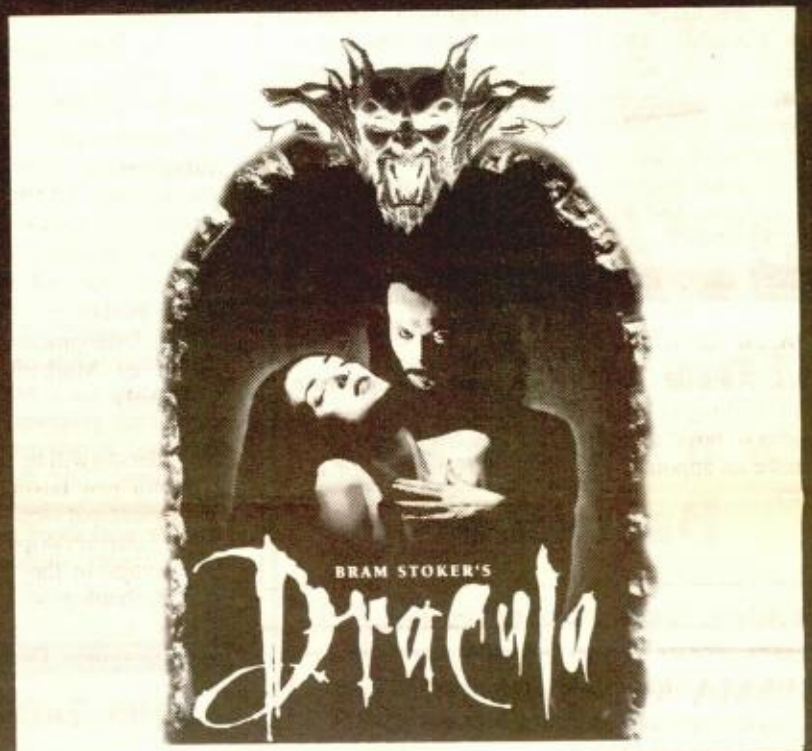

Plans Being Formulated For The Charlestown Emergency Fund

On July 19, criteria for the establishment of a Charlestown Emergency Fund was brought before a gathering of residents at a meeting called by Charlestown Neighborhood Council member Bill McCabe. The fund has as its financial basis grants from the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority community mitigation monies for the years 1992 and 1993.

McCabe, who is serving as interim chairman, stated that the committee will consist of nine members — three representatives from the community and six members, one each representing an elected official, the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, the Bunker Hill Health Center, the Charlestown clergy, a social service agency and an elderly advocate.

According to McCabe, he will represent the Neighborhood Council, while Edna Kelly, Nancy Keyes and Bill Galvin will be the three community representatives. In addition, Galvin will serve as the attorney for the committee and will

draw up the by-laws.

McCabe went on to say that as the committee has been established, three members will serve for one year, three for two years and three for three years. The terms will be staggered to provide for continuity.

He said that persons applying for funds on an emergency basis should be assured that their appeals will be confidential.

The committee will meet on Monday, Aug. 2 at 7 p.m. at a site to be announced to formalize the

membership of the committee and to discuss the by-laws.

In the meantime, if an emergency arises, McCabe said that the committee is prepared to address it and he should be contacted.

Harvard-Kent Students Discover AquaSMARTS

"Harvard-Kent!" answers a group of second graders with astonishing volume. The questioner, New England Aquarium staff person Valerie Chambers, has just goaded these Harvard-Kent School students with a very leading question: "What's the best school in the world?" "And who are the smartest kids in the world?" Chambers continues. "AquaSMARTS kids!" comes the response, even louder than before.

AquaSMARTS, the source of these second graders' enthusiasm, was initiated this past school year at Charlestown's Harvard-Kent Elementary School. It will expand in subsequent years to reach students in grades

three, four and five.

The four-year pilot project, a partnership among the Boston Public Schools, the New England Aquarium and Boston Partners in Education, is driven by a pragmatic interest in developing more effective approaches to math/science education at the elementary level.

Boston Partners in Education is the lead agency in the partnership and is directly accountable to the National Science Foundation, the major funder of the project. A three-year grant has also been made by the Charles Hayden Foundation with additional support provided by the Cabot Corporation Foundation and the Executive Service Corps of New England.

Focusing on the world of water, AquaSMARTS incorporates hands-on classroom activities, a volunteer mentoring program, field trips and enrichment presentations. The initiative also provides for parent and teacher workshops and family events during the course of the year.

What exactly do children learn in AquaSMARTS? The best answer comes from the students themselves. Thanks to another Harvard-Kent project organized through the Center for Applied Special Technology (CAST), students have the opportunity to keep writing journals on a computer. Many of the second graders have used these journals to write about AquaSMARTS.

One of the students, Nigel Monge, wrote about a classroom presentation by a woman from the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority. "I was putting the water pipes together and the lady showed us a picture of Boston. The pipes put the water in my sink." Over half of the AquaSMARTS volunteers at the Harvard-Kent come from the MW-RA and from Orion Research, both Charlestown neighbors.

Ashley Murphy wrote about one of the tastier experiments. "We weighed some apples with water in them. We let them dry. We weighed them again. The apples with water in them weighed more than the dry apples. We had fun. We tasted the apples with water and the dry apples." As classmate Todd Harper put it, "water is everywhere — even in people!"

Another favorite unit concerned rain forests. "We built a rain forest in a tank," reported Ray Mac. "We put in leaves. We put in water and soil. It makes its own water every day." Student skits helped make the rain forest unit come alive. "I was a bee in the play," wrote Sarah Gebrekristos. "I told the man not to cut down the kapok tree because my hive is in this tree. All things in nature depend on one another."

Charlestown resident Daniel Ortega thought the program was "great!"

who served their country between June 25, 1950 and July 27, 1953. Their labors, supported by financial assistance from the state Legislature, has brought this memorial from a dream to a reality.

At 10 a.m. on the morning of July 27 — the 40th anniversary of the Korean armistice, the Massachusetts Korean War Veterans Memorial will be dedicated.

The commemoration will get underway on Monday, July 26 with a sold-out dinner at the Knights of Columbus hall in Charlestown.

On Tuesday morning, July 27, representatives of each of the five branches of the military, all of whom served in Korea, will be at Shipyard Park. The military delegation will be headed by Gen. William C. Westmoreland, U.S. Army (Ret.). Also on hand will be the Hon. Jong Koo Ahn, Consul General of the Republic of Korea.

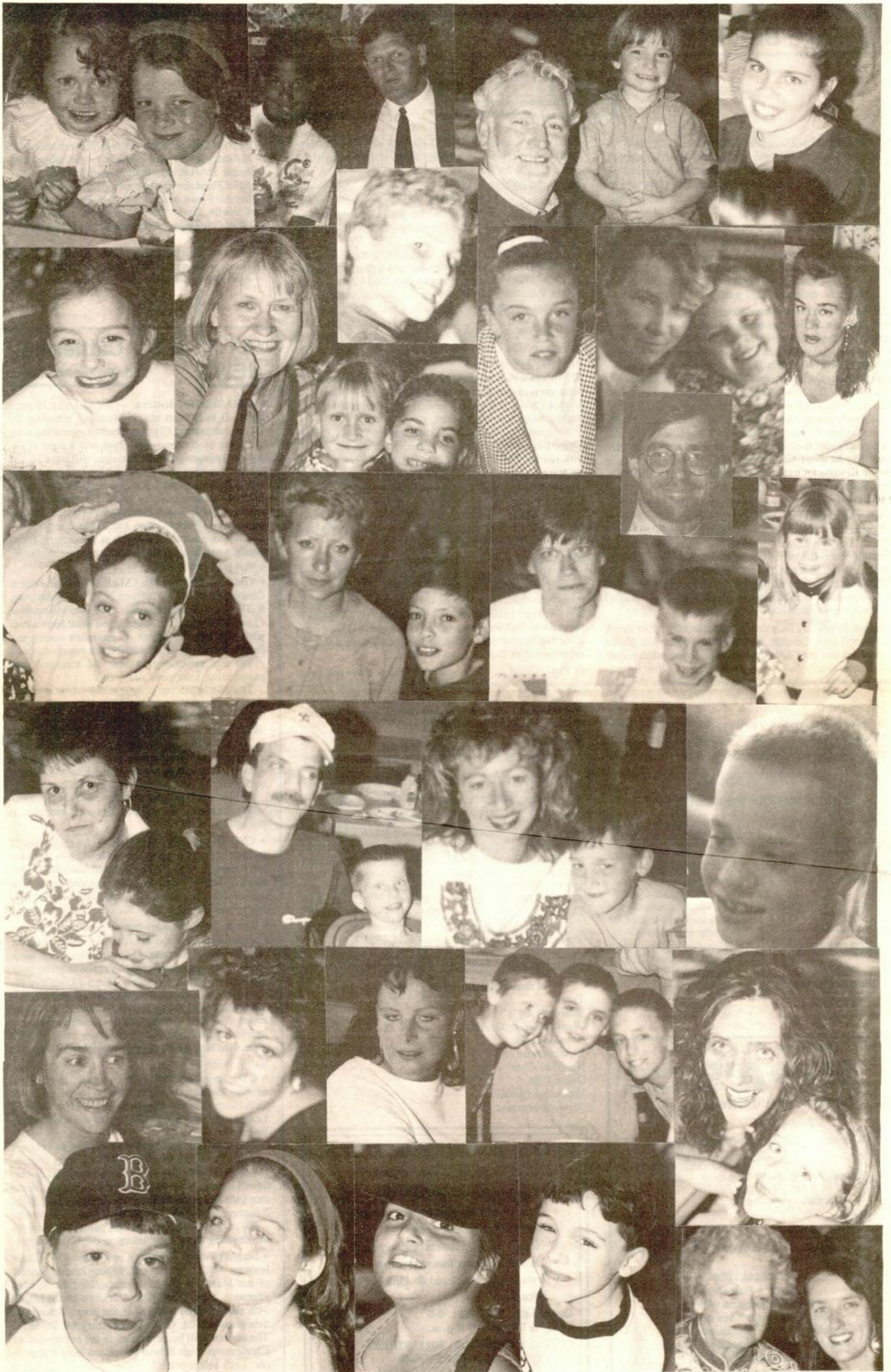

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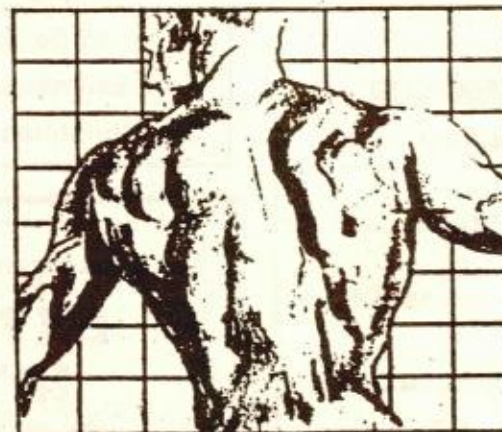
