Shawn Rogers, son of the late Margaret Rogers of Charlestown, a student at the Cotting School in Lexington, has been named the 1995 recipient of the Steven J. Della Porta Award and the Theron Gough Award.
The Steven J. Della Porta Award is given to a Cotting School senior who has demonstrated the "qualities of a cheerful and positive attitude and the quiet posture of constant courage so abundantly displayed by former student Steven J. Della Porta."

ed to the student who "presents courage and perseverance in a cheerful manner."
While at Cotting, Rog ers was on the yearbook committee, received the "Citizenship Award" for 1995 and participated in Project Bridges, a commu-nity-based work program. After graduation, Rogers will work in the community as part of a vocational support program.
Founded in 1893, the Cotting School was the nation's first day school for children with physical disabilities.

Hunter to have the roof raised and a dormer installed on a one-family dwelling at 291 Bunker Hill St. Hunter made a presentation to the board on her own behalf. Abutter James Conway spoke in favor of the request, as did Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services. Boston City Councillors Diane Modica and Albert O'Neil were recorded in favor of the petition. The board voted to approve Hunter's petition with design review.

The second Charlestown petition to
come before the board on Tuesday was by the Doe Family Trust to erect a lighted sign at 29-31 Austin St., the 99 Restaurant. Attorney Stephen Miller withdrew the petition. The board voted to deny the request without prejudice.

* 500 Rutherford Avenue ... An explosion in a trailer at a loading dock in the rear of the Hood's Plant at 500 Rutherford Ave. occurred at 12:14 a.m. on Tuesday, June 20. The occupant of the trailer, Daniel Merchant, reportedly suffered second and third degree burns to 35 percent of his body from a propane explosion. Damage to the trailer, which is owned by Spencers Towing, was estimated at $\$ 5,000$.
Boston Fire Department Engine 32 and Ladder 9 responded to the scene and the fire was extinguished within five minutes of their arrival. EMS was called for the burn victim who was transported to Mass. General Hospital.
David Walsh, spokesperson for the Boston Fire Department, stated that the fire is of suspicious origin, and it is under investigation by the Arson Squad.

## BUSINESS SUCCESSION PLANNING

WHAT DECISIONS MUST YOU MAKE?
Succession planning is very important for a family owned business. Before you sit down with your tax and legal advisors to draw up a succession plan, you should think through three key issues: whe do you want to succeed you; when do you want the transition to take place; and how do you want to structure the transition?
The question of who will succeed you in the business can be the toughest of all, largely because there is so much emotion involved. Most owners want to pass the business on to the family. But are your children willing to take on the business, and if so, are they capable of running it? Will it cause a family squabble if one or two children want to run the business, but others are not interested? Resolving these issues may take a lot of honest, open discussion with family members to discover their true feelings. If there is not an obvious family successor, other alternatives include selling the business to an outsider, promoting an existing employee to head the business while you retain ownership, or even selling the business to the employees.
When you make the transition depends on a number of factors, such as your age, health, retirement goals and the readiness of a successor. Consider whether you want to maintain some involvement with the business or make a clean break. Remember, though, you should always have a contingency succession plan in case of sudden death or disability.
How you structure the transition depends partly on the answers to the earlier questions and partly on financial considerations. Think through issues such as whether you need retirement income from the business or whether you primarily want to minimize estate taxes. Knowing your goals for the transition will make it much easier to tailor a succession plan that fits your specific situation.

Birmingham And Voke Announce Legislature Enacts Supplemental Budget

Sen. Thomas F. Birmingham and Rep. Richard A. Voke announced the enactment of budget recommendations meeting current fiscal year obligations and benefitting Charlestown. The supplemental budget totals approximately $\$ 67$ million in net spending for Commonwealth operating expenses.
The budget recommendation, which enjoyed uncontested support in the House and the Senate, primarily funds obligations the state has to satisfy in order to close out the current fiscal year.
This includes appropriations for unavoidable costs due to caseload increases at the Department of Social Services and the Department of Youth Services, recently signed collective bargaining agreements for state employees and rate increases for special educa-
tion services.
The supplemental budget includes $\$ 3$ million for the local housing authorities and fully funds their efforts to provide decent, safe public housing in Boston. Birmingham, chair of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means, said that "many of our senior citizens live in public housing. I am hard pressed to magine a more important expenditure of money than keeping these buildings well-maintained, clean and safe." "By continuing our strategies to maintain and update quality, affordable housing stock in Charlestown, these funds will have a tremendous impact," added Voke, the House Majority Leader.

In addition to these requisite expenditures, the budget includes a $\$ 550,000$ appropriation for generating additional summer jobs for Boston's youth.

Due to an innovative partnership between the Commonwealth and the Boston Private Industry Council, the appropriated funds will provide a job-for-job match for each private sector summer employment secured by the PIC. "Given that this is a budget dedicated primarily to unavoidable expenses, it is particularly gratifying that the Legislature approved an appropriation for summer jobs for Boston's youth," said Birmingham.
"As we heard so articulately from Peter Looney
at the Bunker Hill Associates Breakfast, a major way we can keep kids out of trouble is to get them into summertime jobs. I am pleased to join the fight to give our kids a fighting chance at a better future," stressed Voke.

The enacted budget recommendations is now being reviewed by the Govemor, who has 10 days in which to veto particular sections of the budget. The Legislature may override vetoes with a twothirds vote in both the House and Senate.

The Liberty Ship SS John W. Brown is returning to Pier One in the Boston National Historical Park section Charlestown Navy Yard on Tuesday, June 27 to participate in Boston Harborfest's starspangled Fourth of July celebration. Its participation honors veterans of all services.

Exhibit On The First Battle Of International Importance Fought By Americans To Open At Charlestown Navy Yard
"Siege at Louisbourg, 1745: New England and the Struggle for World Empire" will open Wednesday, June 28 at Boston National Historical Park at the Charlestown Navy Yard, next to USS Constitution. Parks Canada, (Atlantic Region) and the U.S. National Park Service, in cooperation with a consortum of New England historical institutions, are presenting this free exhibit, which will be open from 9 a.m. to $6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. seven days a week. After Labor Day, the exhibit will close at 5 p.m.

Two-hundred and fifty years ago, Royal Gov. Willliam Shirley, whose home is now a museum on Shirley Street in Roxbury, or-
ganized an expedition of New Englanders to attack the mightiest French Fort in North America, the Fortress Louisbourg. The New Englanders won the day. While colonists had engaged in successful military operations prior to this, the capture of Louisbourg represents the first time that American arms successfully challenged and significantly affected the affairs of European powers.

Today, the Fortress of Louisbourg National Historical Site is North America's largest historical reconstruction. Located on Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia, it faithfully depicts what life was like for the French colonists of 1744.

To commemorate the 250th anniversary, the Parks Services of both Canada and the U.S. are using the occasion to expang the awareness of Boston's visitors and residents about life in colonial times.

The multi-media exhibit will feature an impressive collection of artifacts, photos, portraits, models and much more. Several special events are being planned in the Boston area surrounding the exhibit. On June 18, King's Chapel on Tremont Street is reenacting the service given at the church when victory was declared. Strawberry Bank in Portsmouth, N.H. is planning a "send off" on July 8 and 9 for the period
costumed soldiers who will take part in a Grand Encampment to be held in Louisbourg, and the Shillex Eustis House, 33 Shirrby St. in Roxbury, is conducting a symposia in the fall.

Louisbourg itself is planning numerous activities including an Acadian festival from July 21 to 23 , a Grand Encampment with over 1,300 historical re-enactors attending from across Canada and the U.S. which includes a visit of the Tall Ships from July 28 to 30 , and craft and wine shows all summer long.
