

Boston Police Seek Suspect In Attempted Abduction In Charlestown

The Boston Police Department is seeking a suspect in the attempted kidnapping of an 11-year-old Charlestown girl from Vine and Corey streets. The incident occurred at approximately 7:25 a.m. on Tuesday, Dec. 3.

According to Officer John T. Boyle, the girl was approached by a stranger while she waited for a school bus and he offered her money. She fled down Corey Street with the man chasing after her. The man stopped chasing her and she ran into her home and her mother called the police.

The suspect is described

He was reported wearing a plaid shirt, black jeans and a red baseball cap with the printing "Fish Company." The car he was driving is a small two-door hatchback, beige in color.



loving family sustained her.


Although she was very busy with her family, siblings and her many, many friends, Marie made time to keep in contact with me.



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Warren-Prescott School Playground Dedicated At Gala Ceremony

Mayor Thomas M. Menino, Sen. John Kerry, Sen. Patti Murray, Charlestown residents, city and state officials, members of the Warren-Prescott Schoolyard Committee, parents, students and faculty of the Warren-Prescott School recently celebrated a dedication of the Warren-Prescott Schoolyard Improvement Project. Before the project began, the Warren-Prescott schoolyard had no play equipment and consisted of cracked asphalt.

Menino said, "This project focuses on what is important - our kids. Not only is a good education crucial for our kids, but play is also important in their development into responsible adults. I am proud to be a part of this wonderful renovation project."

In December 1994, a mayoral task force of educators, parents, students, community activists, pri-

vate funders and staff from Boston Public Schools, the Parks Department, and the Public Facilities Department began a series of meetings to define a publicprivate partnership for revitalizing Boston's schoolyards. The result was a set of recommendations called "the Boston Schoolyard Initiative - a Public Private Partnership" which emphasized the need for an inclusive community process in planning schoolyard projects.

Menino has committed a total of \$4 million in capital funds for schoolyard improvement projects. The Boston Schoolyard Funders Collaborative (Boston Foundation, Cox Trust, Hyams Foundation, Boston Globe Foundation, Steams Foundation, The New England Polaroid Corp.) have attracted over \$700,000 to the Initiative, both in capital money and in funding for programs; schoolyard \$150,000 in planning and organizing grants was given to 15 schoolyard groups selected through the first Request for Proposals issued in January 1996.

The Warren-Prescott is the first schoolyard to be bid under the Schoolyard Initiative. Construction cost for the project was approximately \$250,000. In addition to the city's capital funds, the schoolyard committee raised money from

the Charlestown Kiwanis, Mass. Biomedical Research Corp. and other private donors. Pat Simpson of the Playground Committee has tirelessly led the Warren-Prescott effort from the beginning. After the dedication ceremony which entailed the unveiling of a plaque, Menino and some students from the Warren-Prescott School planted some daffodil bulbs around the school.

Consumers Beware!

Our elected officials on Beacon Hill are in the process of reviewing options which will result in the Department of Public Utilities deregulation of the electric industry in the Commonwealth as of Jan. 1, 1998.

Attorney General L. Scott Harshbarger has issued guidelines to the DPU relative to this issue. One of those recommendations would require the electric companies in the state to sell or otherwise divest from the electric generating stations which they currently own and operate (the attorney general has ruled that in a deregulated environment, owning the generating stations as well as the transmission and distribution power lines would constitute a conflict of interest). The electrical generating equipment in these stations would then be reclassified for tax purposes, greatly reducing their current assessed value.

The safest and most efficient method to generate, transmit and distribute electricity is to have the supply as close



NEW DEPOSIT RULES FOR EMPLOYEE PLAN CONTRIBUTIONS

The federal government has just issued new rules governing how quickly employers must deposit retirement plan contributions they have withheld from their employees' paychecks. The rules cover plans such as 401 (k) plans where employees can elect to have their contributions withheld from their regular pay.

Up to now, employers have had up to 90 days after deducting the funds before they were required to send them to the retirement plan manager to be invested. However, late last year, the Department of Labor found that some employers were abusing this 90-day grace period and were using the withheld contributions as interest-free loans to their companies instead of sending them in to be invested. As a result, the Labor Department tightened the rules.

The new rules, which take effect February 3, 1997, require employers to invest employee contributions no later than 15 business days after the end of the month in which they are withheld. So, for example, any amounts deducted from your employees' paychecks in March must be invested by the 15th business day in April. Note that this is the maximum time allowed. The regulations actually require you to send in the funds as soon as reasonably possible. If you're an employer, you should review your payroll procedures now to make sure you can meet the new, shorter deadline. The crunch may come if you pay employees on the last day of the month. Then you will only have 15 business days to remit any amounts you have withheld from that paycheck. On the other hand, if you're an employee, the new rules mean that your retirement contributions should be invested and earning returns without long delays.



Scholarship Cash On The Line For Legion Oratorical Champion

High school students from Charlestown have the opportunity to earn more than \$18,000 in college scholarship money by winning first place in The American Legion's National High School Oratorical Contest. Other scholarship awards for the national winners are second place - \$16,000 and third place - \$14,000.

The competition begins locally with the Legion's Suffolk County District 7 Contest which will be held on Sunday afternoon, Jan. 26 at the Hull Room, 2nd floor, Building 5 (next to USS Constitution), Boston National Historical Park, Charlestown Navy Yard. It then progresses to the zone level, state finals and on to the national championship competition in Indianapolis, Ind., April 12 and 13.

"This competition provides benefits to each and every student who takes part," said Past National Historian James W. Conway, Chairman of the Department of Massachusetts, American Legion Oratorical Committee. "The oratorical contest creates an opportunity for students to learn more about the U.S. Constitution and it is a reallife learning experience as the student addresses nonstudent audiences."

The contest requires the student at the district level to give an original prepared oration on any aspect of the U.S. Constitution. This speech must be a minimum of eight minutes or a maximum of 10 minutes.

As the district winners progress to the next levels of the competition, they will be required to be knowledgeable about the four assigned topics, which are articles or amendments of the U.S. Constitution. One topic will be drawn in the second phase of the contest and the contestants will be required to speak on this topic.

"It is definitely a challenging competition," Conway said. "Yet, each year I am amazed at the knowledge, skill and poise of the young men and women who enter the contest."

There are cash prizes at every level of the Department (state) competition with the state first place winner receiving \$1,000; second, \$600; third, \$500; and fourth, \$400. The state champion also receives an additional \$1,500 for participating in the first level of the national competition and another \$1,500 if they do not win in the second level of national competition.

One might discount participation in the contest on the basis that they don't think there is a chance to win the national championship. This couldn't be further from the truth as, since 1983, contestants from Mass. have had one first place winner, three second place winners and one fourth place winner.

In order to be eligible for the contest, you must be certified by your high school principal on the application form contained in the Department (state) oratorical brochure. All schools in the state were sent a letter of invitation and brochure in October. If you are interested in entering the contest, the deadline for certification is Dec. 21.


