

## 'HOPELINE' Opens May 13

The 1996 opening date of the HOPEline for summer jobs had been announced by Mayor Thomas M. Menino and the Boston Youth Clean-up Corps (BYCC).

Thousands of teens, ages 14 to 17 , will once again be turning to the city of Boston for summer employment opportunities by calling $635-4673$. This year, the line will be open from May 13 to May 24, Monday through Friday, 3 to 6 p.m.
Now entering its 11th year of service, the BYCC
summer employees have become a familiar sight in neighborhoods throughout the city cleaning vacant lots, playgrounds, tot lots and helping out in community non-profit centers.
Applicants must call the HOPEline personally and have the following information ready: name, complete address, mailing address (if different), phone number, and Social Security number.

Please note that you must have a Social Security number in order to be placed, and that the pro-
gram is open to Boston residents only. Also keep in mind that the HOPEline works on a first-come, first-served basis by neighborhood.
The HOPEline is a competitive process which requires patience, so be prepared to keep trying if you don't get through. If chosen, applicants will be notified by mail and provided with information on when and where to report for processing and placement.

Remember that only the HOPEline, 635-4673, can assist teenagers in applying for a BYCC job. No other agency or phone number will get you through, so jo down the HOPEline number and be prepared to call in starting on Monday.

## Local Quilters Completing Charlestown Pictorial Quilt

The Charlestown Pictorial Quilt is nearing completion according to Lillian MacAlpine, chairman of the quilt project. Raffle tickets for the quilt, made up of appliquéd squares representing familiar Charlestown landmarks, are on sale now. The quilt will be raffled off Saturday, May 18 at the reception following the Charlestown Preservation Society's House and Trolley Tour.

The original plan to create this pictorial quilt began last summer when two Charlestown Preservation Society members came up with the idea. In the fall, Peggy Bradley put the computer to work on this idea, and a preliminary layout for the quilt came into being. With a list of sites in hand, Joe Trepiccione found early pictures of the proposed sites, and the project was off the ground.

Since that time, approximately 500 woman-hours
have gone into the creation of this one-of-a-kind quilt. Each quilter used artistic license to adapt the old photos to quilting materials. Each designed and appliquéd their squares, the squares were then sewn together and a 10 -inch border was added. Cotton fill and backing were added to the quilt cover and the quilters are now in the process of quilting the natural colored squares that completes the quilt.

## Robin Lane Comes To Charlestown In 'Artful Lives'

Boston actress Robir Lane will perform "Artful Lives," a one-woman dra matization of the lives of Georgia O'Keefe, Frida Kahlo and Mary Cassatt, on Thursday, May 16 at 7:30 p.m. at the Charles town Branch Library, 179 Main St. The performance is funded by the Friends of the Charlestown Library and the Charlestown Pre servation Society and is free to the public.
During the past decade, Lane has gained a well-de served national reputation for her portraits of historical women.
In "Arfful Lives," Lane has created an engrossing production about women painters. She shows us the lives of these fascinating women and how they created their art.
Mary Cassatt was the only American painter ever o be accepted into the French Impressionist group that included Degas, Pissaro, Monet and Renoir.

 Her father's reaction to her desire to pursue a career as professional artist was to declare, "I would almost rather see you dead." Nevertheless, by the time she was 21 , she settled in Paris to study art. France, at that ime even more hostile to women than America, de nied her entry to formal classes. Refusing to be in timidated, she obtained licenses to copy masterpieces in the Louvre, say ing later that, "the instruc ion of the museum was sufficient."Cassatt was invited by Degas to exhibit exclusive-
ly with the Impressionists, who were constantly attacked as a movement of unatics. A reviewer for one of the Paris newspapers wrote after the first Impressionist exhibit, "There are five lunatics, one of whom is actually a woman!" Cassatt encouraged the wealthy Americans in her circle to purchase Impressionists paintings which later became the core of many museum collections.
Georgia O'Keefe, considered to be the most famous woman artist of our time, was intensely dedicated to her art throughout her long life. Born in Wisconsin, she studied in Chicago and eventually moved to New York City. When she ran out of money, she moved to Texas where she taught art in the public schools of Amarillo. Inspired by the sparse landscapes of Texas, she created abstract drawings which came to the attention of Alfred Stieglitz, the noted
photographer, editor and promoter of modernist art.

In 1917, Stieglitz gave O'Keefe her first solo exhibition in New York. Stieglitz divorced his first wife and married O'Keefe in 1924. This same year marks the emergence of Georgia's celebrated flower paintings. Following Stieglitz's death in 1946, she settled permanently in New Mexico where she continued her art until her death at the age of 99 .

The paintings of Mexican artist Frida Kahlo reflect both her passion and her pain. When in her teens, Kahlo was nearly killed in a terrible streetcar accident, which crushed her pelvis and spine.

Her passion was her love for Diego Rivera, one of the "great four" of modern Mexican art. Although Rivera was considerably older than Kahlo, she married him - twice - and their stormy relationship became as famous as their art.

## Charlestown Students To Learn About Monuments

What is a monument? Why are they built? Where are they built? What are they built with?

These are just some of the questions that 3 rd grade students from Charlestown's Warren-Prescott and Harvard-Kent schools will be asked to consider during this year's "Making a Monument" program with National Park Service Rangers and Boston National Historical Park's Artist-in-Residence.

Last year the program was given for the first time at the Warren-Prescott School and because it was such a success, this year it will be offered at the Har-vard-Kent School.

The two-hour program, which is designed for Boston Public School 3rd graders learning about local
history, consists of both a classroom session and a visit to the Bunker Hill Monument. During the classroom visit, students learn about different types of monuments and what they represent. The students then explore the artistic process of designing monuments.

Later, with the help of Boston National Historical Park Artist-in-Residence Jim McGowan, the students design and draw their own monuments. They can draw monuments commemorating everything from favorite places and people to lost pets and relatives to memorable or historic events. Following the session in the classroom, the students are led up to the Bunker Hill Monument where they have the oppor-
tunity to climb and learn about its construction and significance.

After the program, the students' drawings will be displayed in the Bunker Hill Monument Exhibit Lodge in time for the annual Community Open House which will be held on Saturday, May 18 from 1 to 4 p.m.

The "Making a Monument" program provides a wonderful opportunity for local students to practice their artistic creativity and explore neighboring Bunker Hill Monument, while being introduced to the concepts of commemoration and preservation.
This year, the program was on May 8 and 9 at the Warren-Prescott, and will be given on May 15, 16, and 17 at the Harvard-Kent.

* City Council Hearing On Kindergarten Phase-Out ... This year's Organization award went to the Charlestown Working Theter. Sisters Kristin and Jennifer Johnson noted CWTs Jim Doherty, who died earlier this year, for his contributions to the success of this year's awardwinning nonprofit organization.
Presenting the award, Jim Mansfield acknowledged the theater's work. "Tonight's performance by the Charlestown Working Theater's Junior Players exemplifies the talents of the many individuals involved," he said.
Donna Coleman, a Head Start teacher for more than 25 years, was

"With working, caring for his children and volunteering, Jack has a full day. And we want him to know that we do care that he cares for our children."
The Unsung Hero Award recognizes a Charlestown resident whose deeds within the community have gone publicly unhonored and result in the enhancement of the quality of life.

Thanking his friends and family, particularly his mother and sister, Mary and Katie Farrell, Schievink said, "Most of all, but not least, I want to thank my children who take a back seat a lot of times and get pushed aside."
Among the noteworthy supporters of the 1996 Community Appreciation Awards Night and distinguished guests were the Knights of Columbus, Kerrigan's Flower Shop, Charlestown Patriot Publisher Gloria Conway, Rep. Richard Voke, and Boston City Councillors Diane Modica, Albert "Dapper" O'Neil and Peggy DavisMullen. 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10th Annual Doherty Park Clean-Up On Saturday

The later start this year is to allow everyone to pitch in on the Charlestown Preservation Society's Phipps Street Cemetery clean-up before moving up to Doherty Park.
Doherty Park is the last remaining neighborhood park designed by Frederick Law Olmsted Sr. for the city of Boston. Olmsted is recognized as the father of American landscape design and is the one person

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believed to be responsible for this country's park system as we know it. He designed parks in many major American cities including New York City's Central Park and the Capital Grounds in Washington, D.C.
While he was working on the "Emerald Necklace" for Boston, he and his firm were asked to design five neighborhood parks. The year was 1891 and the city leaders were conscious of the congested and unhealthy conditions of many of the neighborhoods. Olmsted created these green patches to provide the people with a place to commune with nature and recreate.
Doherty Park, (originally called Charlestown Heights), once looked out over the wide Mystic River which has been considerably filled in at the shore line over the years. Benches lined the look-out terrace where people could sit
and enjoy the beauty and take advantage of the fresh air rising off the river below. There are only two of those original five parks left, one at Copp's Hill in the North End and ours here in Charlestown. It has only recently come to light that Doherty Park is actually the last of Olmsted's parks for the city; Copp's Hill was designed by his sons.
The final review of the application and historic research for placement of the park on the National Historic Register will take place near the end of May. News of the hearing date for those who are interested in attending will be listed in the Patriot.
Doherty Park is on Bunker Hill Street near St. Francis de Sales Church and runs down to Medford Street.

The rain date for the clean-up is Sunday, May 12. All are welcome to join in this clean-up effort.

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## Eminent Historian To Present

 The Life Of 'Old Ironsides' Second CommanderWilliam M. Fowler Jr., the chairman of Northeastern University's history department, will animate the world of Silas Talbot, USS Constitution's second commander and the subject of Fowler's latest historical biography, in a presentation at the USS Constitution Museum on Thursday, May 16.

Fowler will speak from 4:30 to $5: 30$ p.m., in the museum's Figgie Theatre. From 5:30 to 6 p.m., the author will sign copies of the newly released, "Silas Talbot, Captain of Old Ironsides." Immediately following the book sign-
ing, Fowler will be the guest of honor at a reception from 6 to 7 p.m.

Fowler's talk is part of the Samuel Eliot Morison Lecture Series sponsored by the Lowell Institute. The talk, the book signing and the reception are free and open to the public
In "Silas Talbot, Captain of Old Ironsides," Fowler explores 62 years of history through the chronicles of one man.
"Biographies are prisms, translucent devices through which we may view past times and events . . . (Talbot's) trajectory between 1751 and 1813 carried him
through a vaniety of universes: rural and urban, military and naval, east and west, poverty and wealth, and home and abroad. In each of these worlds he knew and was known by the great, the near-great and the forgotten," Fowler writes in the introduction.

Among the well-known historical figures in Talbot's life were Presidents Washington and Adams, Alexander Hamilton and the Marquis de Lafayette. It was under Adams that he served as USS Constitution's commander from 1799 until 1801.

## Boston Landmarks Commission Meets With Community

At the invitation of the Charlestown Preservation Society and the Neighborhood Council, staff members of the Boston Landmarks Commission (BLC), the city's historic preservation agency, met with community members on April 16 at the American Legion Hall.

The intent of the meeting was to discuss preservation tools available to the community, in conjunction with assistance from the Landmarks Commission, to honor, cel ebrate and protect Charlestown's historic buildings and places. The meeting marked the beginning of a planning process and dialogue between the BLC and the community.

Ginger Leonard, a trustee of the Charlestown Preservation Society, welcomed the BLC's Executive Director Ellen Lipsey, and its Architectural Historian, Maura FitzPatrick. Opening her remarks, Lipsey noted, "While the invitation was extended
to the Landmarks Commission before Christmas, it seems particularly timely, after the recent loss of 51 Park St., to take a deep breath, collectively, and move ahead." Lipsey outlined the BLC's mandates. She noted that much of the commission's activity over its first 20 years involved the preparation of historic/ architectural inventories, neighborhood-by-neighborhood, and that the inventory forms, which represent a sampling of Charlestown's historic buildings and places, are available through the Charlestown Preservation Society and the branch library, accompanied by a development history of Charlestown.
She summarized the two major protection mechanisms: Landmark designation, which affords maximum protection through regulation of all exterior changes visible from a public way; and listing on the National Register of Historic Places, which affords review of plans in cases involving federal
or state participation such as funding or permitting. She noted that public information efforts include the recently printed Charlestown brochure, in a series of 12 neighborhood brochures. She concluded by stating that the aim of the BLC, under the leadership of Mayor Thomas Menino, is reaching out to communities to help them achieve their goals.
FitzPatrick presented a brief slide show to highlight Charlestown's greater and lesser known architectural treasures. She also noted that a National Register nomination is currently being prepared, with the assistance of the Friends of Doherty Park, for that site, one of the few small neighborhood parks in Boston designed by Frederick Law Olmsted. FitzPatrick also mentioned the importance, in the history of Boston, of Charlestown's industrial buildings, including not only those in the Navy Yard, but other examples, around Sullivan

Square and along the waterfront.
A question and comment session ended the meeting. Peter Looney, president of the Neighborhood Council, acknowledged that we need to get the word out on how we can work together. Several comments addressed the pros and cons of protective preservation regulations.

The theme of the meeting expressed by those attending was clearly that Charlestown is our home and our heritage, we want to retain and continue to build a community worth living in.

In partnership with the Boston Landmarks Commission, we can achieve an appropriate plan for protecting Charlestown's architectural legacy. The key question is, what do we want for our town? The Neighborhood Council and the Charlestown Preservation Society encourage you to take part in the dialogue as it proceeds in the months and years ahead.

BUILDING A HOME? HERE'S A TAX RULE YOU NEED TO KNOW
If you're planning to build your own home, you'll probably start by buying land and then taking out a construction loan to fund the construction costs. When the house is built, you'll roll the construction loan and any loan you used to buy the land into a regular mortgage on the finished property. Interest on your final mortgage debt is generally deductible, but a special rule may apply to the interest you pay on your land acquisition and construction loans.
First, let's assume that when it's completed, the home is a "qualified residence." That means it is your principal residence or a second home such as a vacation cabin. You can deduct interest on debt used to acquire or construct a qualified residence, so once you move in, the mortgage interest is deductible. But what about the interest you paid during construction?
A special rule allows you to treat a home under construction as a qualified residence for up to two years of the construction period. So, if you complete construction in less than two years, you can deduct all the interest on land and construction loans during the entire construction period. But two years is the limit. If, for example, you experience delays and the construction takes 30 months, there will be a six-month period when you cannot take any interest deductions.
Note that interest is only deductible after construction has begun. You cannot take a deduction for the interest you pay on a land loan during the period before you begin to build. If you're planning to build your own home, it pays to plan the timing of purchase and construction carefully to maximize your tax benefits.

## HEROIN!

Heroin is quickly becoming one of the most widely used drug in Charlestown, along with angel dust, cocaine and alcohol. This week we will pass along some information about this drug. One point not listed below is if the drug is injected with a shared needle, the user may contract AIDS or other diseases.

## HEROIN

Heroin is a member of the opiate family of drugs, and is derived from morphine. It is not found in nature, but was synthesized originally by scientists searching for a non-addicting substitute for morphine. The result, ironically, was a drug with four times the analgesic effect of morphine and several times the addictive potential. The potential for abuse is so great that manufacture or importation of heroin is forbidden by federal statute.

Heroin is known by the street names of junk, H , Harry, powder, horse, white stuff, sugar, smack and scag. It is usually taken by injection into a vein - this is known as mainlining. It may also be injected under the skin (skin popping) or taken orally. When smoked, it is referred to as "chasing the dragon." The effects from heroin are usually felt from 2 to 4 hours.

There are some who believe that small doses of heroin can be used safely; this practice is known as "chipping." This is a dangerous fallacy.
Heroin is not a drug that incapacitates its victims. The heroin addict is able to perform work, but he/she is content to sit and dream in his/her euphoric trance. He is in danger of malnutrition, dehydration, disease from contaminated syringes, AIDS and poverty because of the expense of heroin and his/her criminal involvement.

If heroin is discontinued, there are definite withdrawal symptoms, including watery eyes, running nose, shakes, tremors and sometime convulsions. If you are withdrawing, seek medical help.

Overdose is characterized by stupor and death. The potency of street heroin is rarely known and most certainly is not pure. Therefore, overdoses are frequent.

Remember, it is never too early to begin drug education with your child and it is never too late to become educated yourself. Hang in there!

Hello! We're fifth grade students at the Harvard-Kent Elementary School. Our teacher is Mrs. D'Itria, and we're busily studying women's history, especially those women who have played a role in Charlestown's history.
