He clearly remembered the October day of nearly thirty years ago when first he saw the clock. It was in the window of a cut-rate jewelry store on a street whose shops drew the boundary of the downtown shopping district. He was sixteen year old, and for the first time during the Christmases of his young life, he was working. The job was not much, part-time after school and Saturday mornings. His duties included delivering heavy reams of stationery to business offices and keeping the stock room in some semblance of order. For his efforts he was paid one dollar per hour, which translated into nine or ten dollars and some loose change in a small, brown payroll envelope each Friday afternoon.

To be sure it wasn't much, but in a day of five cent student bus fares and fifty cent movie admissions, it serv-

It was nearly Christmas now, and he had been thinking of the clock for more than two months. It would be the first time he could afford a decent gift for his parents from money he had earned and saved, but it had not been easy

Each day he walked through the shopping district, past the stores which now have become but shadowy ghosts in the memories of those still here to remember. They sold clothing, uniforms, shoes, and tobacco. And one, the special shop which held the clock, sold cut-rate jewelry.

It was gold in color, stood about a foot tall, and was embedded with red and white stones which, in his mind, were rubies and diamonds. It was the pendulum though, that had convinced him that this was a special clock. Back and forth it moved, back and forth magically, hypnotizing its admirer.

A small white price tag dangled loosely from a part of the clock. The movement of the pendulum had turned it, and from the street, it could not be seen. Being pure gold and studded with precious diamonds and rubies, it had to be expensive, perhaps too expensive.

He watched as the man reached into the display of watches, rings, and other clocks to turn the tag.

"Fifteen ninety-five, son."

He was right. It was expensive, very expensive.

If he saved two dollars per week until Christmas, he could buy the clock. But two dollars out of the nine or ten he earned each payday would be quite a chore. He remembered the holidays to come, those he would not

be paid for, and the Saturday mornings he would not be asked to work. On those weekends, he would be paid less than the nine or ten dollars, sometimes as little as five or six

"Could you hold the clock for me? I'll pay you something each week."

"Sorry son, this is strictly cash and carry. If I hold it for you, and you change your mind, or cannot save enough money, I'll be the loser."

Each day he came to the store front to see if the clock had been sold. An uncomfortable emptiness visited his inner self when this possibility found its way into his thoughts.

"Why," he wondered, "would something as beautiful as this clock not be sold."

The idea of the cut-rate jeweler having a dozen or more of them in stock never really entered his mind. To him the clock in the window as the only one of its kind, and it would be his to give to his parents as a gift on Christmas Day.

The days began to take on the chill of early winter, and the coins built until they could be turned to bills. Still, the clock stayed in its place in the window, and still the pendulum swung back and forth magnificently. Beyond its beauty, the boy recognized in this clock its accuracy. From day to day it kept perfect time.

When he was finally able to buy the clock, only a few days remained before the arrival of Christmas. He watched eagerly as the man reached into the window case to remove the prized timepiece. From there it was nestled carefully into a long, grey, tissue-lined box.

"Gift wrap it for you, son?"

"Sure, sure!" After all, it was a gift, was it not? And the first real gift he had ever bought.

He could now only envision the joy that would certainly find its way to his parents' smiles as they undid the next ribbon, removed the wrapping paper, and opened the box. For him, Christmas could not come quickly enough.

He was not prepared for the disappointment he experienced when the anticipated elation was not forthcoming. For two months he had saved enough money to buy the clock. He had fretted over the possibility of it being sold, and now they did not like his gift!

"How much did you pay for this?" his father asked.

"This is not a question that is asked when a gift is given," he thought through his deep disappointment.

"That is not important" he answered. "It is paid for, and it is yours. Don't you like it?"

The boy fought the swelling in his throat. He hoped the tears building in his eyes could not be seen.

"It is not that we don't like it, in fact it is very beautiful, but we feel it may have cost more than you could afford to spend. Why don't you just return it and perhaps buy something a bit less expensive?"

"I'm not taking it back. I don't want the money. And if you don't want my gift, you take it back."

He was surprised at what he said, but even more surprised at how he had said it. It was not his nature to speak to his parents in that manner.

Even the soft scent of a freshly cut Christmas tree could not relay the spirit of the day to him in that moment. He left the room quickly.

What he left behind were words he did not hear.

"Whatever he paid for this was too much. Look at it.
It is no more than a piece of junk."

"Yes, I know that and you know that, but the boy doesn't. For all these years we have been giving what we can afford to give, and we've learned to do that, we have not learned to receive."

"You are right. I think we have hurt him."

The clock was removed from its cardboard container and placed atop the black and white Philco console. It was plugged in and the hands set properly.

The boy was called back to the room. There was an apology and an explanation. This was the finest gift they had received this Christmas, he was told, and their only concern was with the money he had spent. Of course, they would keep the clock. It was a beautiful gift.

He watched the pendulum swing back and forth as the clock sat in its new found splendor atop the old television set. They were his parents. They said it was their favorite gift, did they not? They had no reason to lie to him. He smiled now, noticing how much better the clock looked than it did for all the weeks it rested in the jewelers window.

I was reminded of that story of the Christmas of 1957 recently when I sat in my parents' living room watching a pendulum swing magnificently and silently beneath two hands still, after twenty-eight Christmases, not too tired to point perfectly to the time.

THE HOLIDAY BLUES

The Holiday Season can be a tough time for all of us. Sometimes we find ourselves feeling "blue" or "down" and are puzzled because we don't understand why we should feel that way at such a happy time of year. These "holiday blues" can have several sources.

During the holidays, we are all bombarded with pictures of how good and perfect life is supposed to be. From radio, television, and magazine advertising, from television programs and movies, we are all presented with scenes of people frolicking and enjoying each other's company. Families are shown together in blissful harmony; young couples cavort romantically without a hint of disagreement; children are shown receiving expensive gifts which their parents afford with no strain on their pocketbooks. In countless ways we are all given the message that the holiday season is a time when everyone is happy, when disagreements don't exist and when we all love each other perfectly and without mixed feelings.

In the privacy of our own throughts, few of us can avoid comparing these images of the way life is portrayed for us during the holidays with what we actually are experiencing. In very few cases does the reality of our lives measure up to the pictures that the media gives us of what we "ought to have" at this time of year. Our families sometimes fight, our spouses sometimes grumble and bicker, our children often request gifts beyond what we can possibly afford to give them. It is this difference between the perfect images of the holiday season and our own, imperfect experience of it that can cause us to feel "down".

There are other reasons for feeling "blah" too. Often the holidays stir memories of loved ones who have died or who are alive but far away and unavailable. Often the holidays stir memories from childhood, when life seemed simpler and when parents, at least in memory, were there to take care of everything and to "make things right." Few of us can escape an occasional or more than occasional - wish that we could be children again, that our parents were still there to take care of us, and that our biggest problem was which present to open first. For most of us childhood was never as wonderful as it seems in our memories. But even those who are able to recall some of the frustrations of growing up may wish for a kind of childhood they never had and feel depressed by the knowledge that the opportunity for such an experience is forever lost.

For most of us the "blahs" remain just that - the "blahs". We are struck by a momentary blue moment or mood, but it passes relatively quickly as we appreciate the real rewards and pleasures which the holiday season does offer us. For some, however, the "blahs" don't go away so quickly. They take hold and don't let go. Anyone who finds himself seriously unhappy for a substantial portion of the holiday period should consider getting some professional help. This is particularly true when a person is bothered by thoughts of doing harm to himself or to someone else. In this situation a person should definately come in for psychological help. For most of us the holiday "blahs" will be perhaps a minor annoyance at an otherwise happy time, but for those who are unable to shake free of that "down" feeling the Health Center, and in particular, the Community Mental Health Unit, is available to offer help and hope. All you have to do is to call 242-5760 to make an appointment or come up to the Third Floor at the Health Center. We will take good care of you.


