'Townie Santa' Looks To Community For Support Of Elderly Christmas Program

The weather continues to be relatively warm and Halloween is still two weeks away, but a group of residents have been meeting and planning for a Christmas program for Charlestown's elderly.

Christmas can be a very sad and lonely time of year for the needy, elderly shutin. While the rest of us may be gift giving, card writing, and simply caught up in the tinsel and glitter, there are others for whom Christmas is just another lonely day.

In Charlestown, however, residents remember the true meaning of the Christmas season. Through "Townie Santa," elderly, needy shutins who may otherwise be alone or forgotten, receive a visit from "Santa," who could be anyone, but represents everyone, and lets the person know, yes, we remember you. In its 11th year, Townie Santa, through donations and an evergrowing number of volunteers, provides some 120 elderly with a hot turkey dinner and boxes of gifts.

Townie Santa was born from a conversation between four Charlestown residents in November 1982, centering around the idea that something should be

Celebrate The 195th Birthday Of 'Old Ironsides' On Oct. 17

The 195th birthday of USS Constitution will be celebratred on Saturday, Oct. 17 (raindate: Sunday, Oct. 18) with seafaring music, birthday cake and gifts. The birthday celebration is sponsored by the USS Constitution Museum with the cooperation of the U.S. Navy and the National Park Service. The museum is in the Boston National Historical Park at the Charlestown Navy Yard.

"Old Ironsides" was launched on Oct. 21, 1797, and she is the oldest commissioned warship afloat in the world. She is currently in Dry Dock 1 in the Navy Yard for inspection and repairs. U.S. Navy crew continue to give guided tours of the ship's spar deck while she is in dry dock.

In the two weeks since residents took part in an informational picket at the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) offices in the Charlestown Navy Yard and a Stop Work Order was issued to the MWRA prohibiting the transfer of landfill from Deer Island onto 425 Medford St. by J.M. Cashman Inc., there has been relatively little activity on the former Domino Sugar refinery site.

Meetings have reportedly continued between Cashman, the MWRA and elected and appointed city officials, but a permanent resolution to the transfer of landfill and the resulting truck traffic has yet to be announced.

An inspection of the exterior of 425 Medford St. was done on Oct. 9 by inspectors from the city's Health & Hospitals (H&H) Department and the state's Department of Environmental Protection. According to an H&H spokesperson, the focus of the inspection was the progress made in the removal of asbestos and asbestos-containing materials on the property, ordered by Health & Hospitals last April. The H&H spokesperson said that Hamilton Realty, owners of the property, were asked to have soil samples tested to determine the effectiveness of the asbestos removal procedure. The city is awaiting the results of these tests.

* Gather For Memorial Tribute . . . The men of the destroyer USS Meredith (DD 434) and the tug USS Vireo (ATO 144) are gathering in the Charlestown Navy Yard today, Oct. 15, alongside USS Constitution to observe a Memorial Tribute to the 237 shipmates lost in the sinking of the two ships 50 years ago - Oct. 15, 1942 - near

The Meredith's legacy began on June 1, 1939 when a huge crane lifted a long, slender steel beam to the shipbuilding ways of Dry Dock No. 1 at the Boston Naval Shipyard. She was commissioned a ship of the line on April 24, 1940 and placed into service with the Atlantic Fleet on March 1, 1941. Most of the enlisted crew were from the Boston/New Eng-

The ship's historic performance was ended by an attack by 38 planes from the Japanese carrier Zuikaku, just 75 miles short of her mission completion. The total personnel on the Meredith and the Vireo was 330, and 97 survived after four days and three nights of swimming in sharkinfested waters. Forty-seven of the 97 survivors have been located and invited to this reunion.

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'Townie Santa' Begins 11th Year

(continued from page one) done for the shut-ins. In less than one month's time, this group expanded, money was raised, meals cooked and 48 baskets were delivered.

The four probably never anticipated that their discussion would be so contagious. Townie Santa has a unique way of drawing residents together who may not otherwise share similar interests. One reason for the

attraction, states a committee member, is the simple fact, Townie Santa is a good cause. Another reason may be that inbred Charlestown responsibility of taking care of one's own. Or, more importantly, it may be that joy one receives from giving something too personal for words. Whatever the reason, the number of volunteers grows with each passing year.

Townie Santa welcomes

back a faithful contingent each year and expands with new faces from all parts of Charlestown. Some of them deliver the boxes, others pack them and others do the work behind the scenes. Last year, there were volunteers from as young as 6 to over 75 years of age. Almost 400 people donated either time, money, gifts or services in 1991 whereas the first year, there were about 25 volunteers.

Beginning each fall, letters are sent to merchants, businesses and organizations within and affecting Charlestown, seeking contributions to the Townie Santa fund. Canisters are also placed throughout the town for coin and bill donations. Articles begin to appear in The Charlestown Patriot inviting residents to come to organizational meetings, or to submit the names of those they feel are

in need of a visit from Townie Santa, or to send in monetary donations. All donations are publicly acknowledged in the Patriot, however, as many as 10 percent of those who contribute wish to remain anonymous, donating just for the sake of Christmas.

In 1982, the Townie Santa fund was approximately \$1,000. In 1991, this figure rose to more than \$10,000. However, this does not truly reflect the total in donations received, since no value is placed on the gift donations. All the money received, with the exception of postage costs, goes directly to the packages.

"People wonder how much we give out in these boxes," related a committee member. "Well, just ask anyone who had to deliver one of them to a person living on a third floor, and they'll tell you how heavy these boxes are.'

Those who are considered eligible are persons over 60 years of age who are shut-in with limited finances and family contact.

The selection of the names of recipients for a Christmas package is not an enviable or easy task. There is a screening committee who researches the names that are submitted and determines who will receive a basket. And despite the screening committee doing

an excellent job, there is always someone else who also deserves a basket.

"You never get everyone," said a committee member, "You often hear later that we missed someone, but that's through no fault of the screening committee. This is why we ask the cooperation of agencies and residents in submitting names - and we are asking that the names be submitted by Monday, Nov. 16 to allow us an opportunity to finalize the list of recipients before it gets too close to the day of delivery."

An important fact to remember is that the idea behind Townie Santa is to bring some Christmas cheer to the elderly shut-in. A committee member concluded, "These boxes do more than supply a person some much needed household and personal items they tell the shut-in that we, the community, haven't forgotten them."

I am a daily "walking commuter" to Boston, like many of my Charlestown neighbors.

Last Monday night (Oct. 5), I was appalled to find no traffic direction at the busy intersection of Warren and Park streets. The familiar traffic signal had disappeared and there was no policeman directing traffic.

Sure enough, at 3 p.m. on Tuesday, there was no traffic signal and no policeman at the busy intersection. An officer was watching a construction crew by the Ironside Grille on Park Street as heavy construction trucks went hurtling through the intersection.

At 5:05 p.m., ditto during the busy rush-hour traffic. At 8:35 a.m. on Thursday, ditto again with rush-hour traffic, compounded by many construction trucks.

At 7:15 p.m., ditto in pitch darkness with unrestrained traffic coming from Boston and the Navy Yard on Warren and Park streets.

Charlestown has already suffered one pedestrian fatality on the CANA project. Tony Mellino, a neighbor and Charlestown native who is still remembered for his athletic prowess, was struck by a construction truck two years ago.

Oh, CANA is great on public relations. They held an "open house" recently for its new tunnel under City Square. It was attended by state and local luminaries who extolled the project.

Ironically, the same week that the pedestrian safety controls disappeared from Warren and Park streets, the Charlestown Neighborhood Council Planning and Zoning Committee met to continue its review of plans for City Square development in the middle of the CANA project.

In these deliberations, the townspeople of Charlestown must summon all their creative and political energy to see that the CANA project benefits the town.

Remember, CANA doesn't care.
