Contrast this to 1973, when a bachelor's degree was a rarity and just 47% of high school graduates went on to college. By October 2008, that number had risen to nearly 70%. And being in the top 70% isn't in the top at all. The statistics demonstrate the relationship between oversupply and graduate **Total Keto Boost** unemployment. In the United States, a record 10.6% of recent graduates are unemployed. different kind of mind. The era of 'left-brain' dominance, and the information age that it engendered, is giving way to a new world in which creative and holistic 'right brain' abilities mark the fault line between who gets ahead and who falls behind.

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
