Central Artery/Tunnel Meeting

According to Stone, the meeting will focus on three areas. SHOULD YOU PREPARE YOUR OWN TAX RETURN?

Many people have given thought to preparing their own income tax returns. With computer tax preparation programs selling for as little as \$20 to \$50, it seems as though there is money to be saved. But are the perceived savings really there?

Your experience (one tax return per year) must be weighed against the experience of a professional accountant who does hundreds of returns every year. When you engage an accountant, you get something that doesn't come in a computer program. An accountant's judgment, wisdom and ability to deal with the IRS and all of its regulations will be worth much more than the fee you pay for a professionally prepared return.

If you have a business, rental property, investments in stocks, bonds or mutual funds, or if you've purchased or sold a home during the year, you will benefit by getting professional help with tax preparation.

Your accountant is able to spot errors in third party documents such as 1099s, W2s, mortgage documents and IRS correspondence. He or she will give you suggestions for recordkeeping, personal and business financial planning, and gift and estate planning.

Computer tax software does a good job of computing the tax from the information entered. But it cannot determine if you have entered the correct dollar amount or if you have entered a figure in the wrong box. It cannot help you determine the basis (depreciable cost) in a business or rental asset. Your software may be of little help in filing state income tax returns. And who do you call midyear with your tax and financial questions or for assistance if you're audited?

If you do your own tax returns, consider having a professional review them every third year. Those are the "open" years for amendments.







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Is An Assisted Living Facility Possible In Charlestown?

The Charlestown Interagency on Aging (CIA) is looking into the idea of assisted living for the elderly and whether Charlestown could support such an endeavor. Since so many elderly Charlestown residents have lived here all their lives, it seems such a shame that they have to go to another community to get long-term care when they become so disabled that they can no longer live independently and take care of themselves.

The CIA has long been interested in a supported living situation for the frail elderly. The idea of a nursing home has been explored but does not seem possible at this time. One of the CIA members related the need for some type of long-term care facility in Charlestown to a developer. He has expressed interest in building "affordable" assisted living for seniors in Charlestown.

Assisted living provides a system of care beyond that which can be provided in the home but less than would be done in a nursing home. This is a special combination of housing, personalized supportive services and health care designed to respond to the individual needs of those who need help with activities of daily living but do not need the skilled medical care provided in a nursing home.

In most programs, each resident has an apartment with a kitchenette and bathroom. In addition, the dining room serves three meals a day. Residents are provided help as needed with bathing, eating, dressing, toileting, walking, medication reminders, housekeeping services, laundry, chores and transportation.

Services of a home care agency are also still avail-

able such as nursing, home health aides, physical therapy, occupational therapy and speech therapy. Staff is available 24-hours a day to meet scheduled and unscheduled needs, and there is a 24-hour security service. Social and recreational activities are also planned.

Since assisted living has many additional services, it is more expensive than living at home. However, assisted living provides services which are less intense and therefore, less expensive than a nursing home.

The Cohen Florence Levine Estates in Chelsea is assisted living, and half of its apartments are for low-income residents. The Boston Globe had an article on Nov. 10, 1996, which states that this program "was built under the Mass. Housing Finance Agency's Elder Choice program. It uses federal

tax credits and other federal programs to reduce the cost of capital for assisted living facilities that promise to set aside at lease 20 percent of their units for low income residents.

In addition, the low income residents are subsidized under Medicaid's group adult foster care program, which provides about \$1,000 a month to pay for non-medical services for elderly and disabled Medicaid recipients."

This type of care is licensed by the state. Residences must comply with local building codes and fire safety regulations.

The CIA will be looking into the possibility of an assisted living facility in the next few months. If anyone is interested in learning more about this topic, please call the CIA at 241-2751 and leave your name and phone number.

DEMOCRATS TO CAUCUS STATEWIDE

Registered Democrats in Ward 2, Charlestown will be holding a caucus on Saturday, March 8, 1997 at noon to elect delegates to the 1997 Massachusetts Democratic Convention.

Ward 2, Charlestown will be electing 12 delegate(s) and 4 alternate(s), equally divided between men and women, to send to the Convention. The apportioned number of delegates has been allocated on the basis of a formula giving equal weight to the Democratic Party registration and the average vote for Democratic candidates in the last general elections for Governor and President for which figures were available at the time delegate tabulations were prepared.

Donna O'Brien and Sheila Brown will call the caucus at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School St., Charlestown. The caucus is open to all registered Democrats, persons ineligible to register and media representatives. The only persons eligible to participate in any portion of the caucus are those who are registered Democrats in the ward or town as of February 19, 1997. There will be no absentee or proxy voting.

Candidates for delegate and alternate must also be present, voting and give his or her written consent to be nominated and that nomination must be seconded by two persons present at the local caucus.

All ballots will be written and secret. Those candidates receiving the greatest number of votes on the first ballot will be elected.

Each candidate will be allowed to make a two-minute speech and to distribute material on their behalf.

Slate-making is allowed, but no special preference shall be given to slates. There is no quorum requirements for the caucus.

There will be no admission or expense charge at the caucus, although donations may be solicited.

Discrimination on the basis of race, sex, age, color, creed, national origin, religion, ethnic identity, philosophical persuasion or economic status in the conduct of the caucus is strictly prohibited.

Challenges to the delegate selection process can be filed in writing with the Compliance Review Commission, c/o The Massachusetts Democratic Party, 129 Portland Street, Boston, MA 02114 no later than March 10, 1997.

People go to the pool for many reasons. These may include swimming lessons, exercise, swim competitions, or just to have fun in the water. The American Red Cross of Mass. Bay helps people prepare for and be safe in the water year-round by offering a variety of water safety courses, including lifeguard training which will be offered at the Cambridge YMCA, 820 Mass. Avenue, Boston, on Sundays, March 2, 9, 16, 23, 30 and April 6., from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Lifeguards are trained to prevent injuries and respond immediately if any emergencies occur. Through simulations, demonstrations and lectures, the course teaches basic aquatic res-

Students will learn how to perform techniques for approaching passive and active victims and how to properly handle rescue equipment such as rescue tubes. All lifeguards are trained to handle spinal injuries. After successfully completing the course, certificates will be issued in First

Aid and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR).

The lifeguard training course costs \$149, which includes all books and materials. Anyone over 15 years of age can register by calling 375-0700, ext. 221.

Prerequisites include: swimming 500 yards continuously using front crawl, breast stroke, and side stroke; treading water for two minutes using legs only; and swimming to the depth of seven feet to retrieve a weighted object and bring it to the surface.

"These promotions reflect the creativity and hard work of these managers who have succeeded in making Tufts the fastest growing managed care plan in New England," said


