

# New Property Assessments Available For Public View

Acting Assessing Commissioner Ronald Rakow has announced that newly established assessed values for Fiscal Year 1993 will be available to Boston property owners beginning on Monday, Nov. 23.

Both residential and commercial property owners are invited to review new assessments and consult with staff from the department's valuation division for a three day period starting on Monday, Nov. 23 and continuing through Wednesday, Nov. 25. Public review hours are from 9 a.m. through 5 p.m. each

The new residential property values and assessing department staff will be available at the Assessing Information Center in Room 301 at Boston City Hall, telephone 635-4287.

New commercial values and departmental staff will be available at the Assessing Department's downtown Boston location at 294 Washington St., on the fifth floor of the Old South building.

In addition, both residential and commercial taxpayers may review their new assessments and consult with departmental staff at the Boston Public Library, Main Branch, in Copley Square during this threeday period.

The new property values are based on an assessments date of Jan. 1, 1992 and reflect Boston real estate market activity during calendar year 1991. Over the past several months, sales that took place during 1991 were analyzed as were other important factors including commercial property rents, and interest and vacancy rates.

Staff also conducted field visits in all Boston neighborhoods, inspecting properties that had been sold or subdivided and parcels for which building permits had been issued during calendar year 1991. The department's extensive research has shown that there has to be a continued decline in the assessed values of commercial properties; and residential assessed values have also been affected by the continuing slowness of last year's real estate market. Overall, assessed values across the city - when all property types and locations are considered - have fallen by 8.5 percent; again, this overall figure will vary from parcel to parcel.

The new assessments will be indicated on the FY'93third quarter property tax

bill, which will be issued at the end of this December. In addition, any exemptions to which homeowner-occupants may be entitled -Residential and Clause (personal exemptions extended to homeowners who are elderly, blind, widowed or disabled veterans) Exemptions - will also be indicated on this third quarter bill. Boston property

owners will have a payment deadline of Monday, Feb. 1, 1993. The filing deadline for abatement applications will also be Monday, Feb. 1, at 5 p.m.

The Assessing Department will make additional information and assistance available to taxpayers once the third quarter bills have been issued.

# Local Feeding Programs Receive Money Raised In Walk For Hunger

At their annual grant ceremony, Project Bread awarded a total of \$1,277,830 in grants to 153 emergency feeding programs in Greater Boston. These funds will help feed a growing number of hungry people throughout the city.

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received a total of \$7,300, with \$2,800 awarded to St. Catherine's Food Pantry, \$3,500 to the Charlestown Community Centers and \$1,000 to the J.F.K. Family

Nov. 19, 1863, Abraham Lincoln dedicated the national cemetery in Gettysburg, Pa., where a few months earlier, 51,000 men were killed, wounded or captured in one of the bloodiest battles of the Civil War . . . Despite the fact that he was the president of the U.S., Lincoln was not the featured speaker. That honor went to Edward Everett, the former governor of Mass. who was famous for his rich oratory. Some 60,000 people gathered for the dedication ceremony. Everett's speech lasted three minutes shy of two hours, and while he spoke, Lincoln made last-minute changes to his remarks . . . When Lincoln finished his 269-word address, he was not happy with his performance. Everett, however, had a different opinion. "I should be glad," he wrote to Lincoln, "if I could flatter myself that I came as near to the central idea of the occasion in two hours as you did in two minutes."

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# Material Recovery Facility To Open In Charlestown In January

Charlestown will become the home to a state-of-theart Material Recovery Facility (MRF), slated to open on the first of January. It will be located at 410 Rutherford Ave. on the extension of A Street, adjacent to Costa Fruit and at the back of Bunker Hill Community College

The MRF, called the Prins Recycling Center, is a private facility owned by the Prins Recycling Corp. of Fort Lee, N.J., with 27 years in the recycling industry. Marc Shaener will be manager of the Charlestown plant. Prins is leasing the local site with an option to buy.

According to Fred L. Prins, president of the corporation, recycling within the Greater Boston area has been, and will be in the future, a critical issue. More and more cities and towns are looking to expand recycling to meet new state mandates and to respond to environmental concerns.

The plans for the local MRF is that materials will come to the site from haulers with curbside, municipal, commercial and industrial contracts. It will process old newspapers, magazines, corrugated cardboard, clear and colored glass, aluminum, tin and plastics carried to the site by the commercial haulers. Shaener stressed that this will not be a center for individuals to drop off their recyclables.


Shaener explained that

the haulers will drive their trucks into the facility where the load will be "tipped." The contents of the truck will then go into a sorting belt where employees will separate the items, and from there they will go into a high-density compactor and pressed into 2,000pound bales. The bales will then be transported by truck, rail or ship to domestic and foreign buyers. The proximity to major highways, an adjacent rail line and the short distance to the Moran Terminal were some of the reasons that the Charlestown site was selected for the MRF. He added that there is a demand and market for all materials and thus there would be no stockpiling of recyclables at the MRF.

All work at the center will take place inside the building, stated Shaener. The trucks going to and from the building will be the only activity visible to the public.

Shaener explained that there will be no noise or air pollution eminating from the site. He added that rodents will not be a problem as they will not be dealing with garbage or waste, but they will undertake a regular rodent extermination program as they are in an industrial area. Shaener noted that there will be no toxins or hazardous materials on the site.

Boston-area contractors are presently renovating and waterproofing the facility in preparation for its January

Shaener stated that the hours will be from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m., six days a week at the opening, with possible expanded hours if the volume demands. He anticipates 50 to 60 trucks going to and from the MRF daily, including five 18wheelers.

The annual tonnage projections for the Charlestown MRF, considered a regional facility, are: 40,000 tons of old newspaper, 10,000 tons of old magazines and 7,200

tons of other recyclables including clear and colored glass, aluminum, tin and plastics.

According to Shaener. the company will be advertising for employees starting in early December. He said he hopes to draw the majority of his workforce from the Charlestown area. He went on to say that at the outset, he will be looking to hire approximately 30 persons, including one or two office workers, 10 machine operators and 20 which

the building and tips its load. Front-end loaders then transfer the materials to a sorting belt where employees sort and direct the recyclables into separate bins. From there, a conveyer belt carries the material to a high-density baler where the material is bound in 2,000-pound bales, loaded onboard a truck and brought to a processing plant or to a point of shipping the materials by rail or overseas by ship.

would be classified as lowskilled labor - jobs that would be appropriate for the mentally retarded and/ or homeless veterans.

Shaener stressed that the firm is "not here to get into the hauling system . . . but are in the area to support recycling. We are here to develop Boston's recycling infrastructure, work with area haulers and bring Boston up to standard in recycling." He added that Prins does have contracts with area haulers and are

ready to go come Jan. 1.

In addition, Shaener stated that the company has educational programs on recycling and representatives will be available to speak to any organization or school that requests such a program. In fact, he said, they have programs suitable for ages 2 to 3 through to senior citizens.

Residents will be able to view the MRF in the spring when Prins plans a grand opening tour of the facility.

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
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# Tucker Will Perform As 'Fritz' In Boston Ballet's 'The Nutcracker'

(continued from page one) schedule, especially rehearsing for and performing in "The Nutcracker" would put the most energetic adult to shame. He seems to take it all in his stride, but did note that it takes a lot of effort on the part of his mom, driving him to and from school, sports, dance lessons, rehearsals and all of his other activities.

Jonathan has been dancing for three years, studying with the Boston Ballet School. Asked what inspired him to study ballet, he says the family has a summer home in Saratoga, N.Y. which is where the New York City Ballet summers. He frequently saw that ballet troupe perform and decided that he would like to dance

When the family returned to Charlestown, Jonathan's mother sought to enroll him in a ballet school. He said that she happened upon the Boston Ballet School "quite by accident" - and he began studying "at the best school." He added that there are 400 to 500 girls at the school, and only eight boys.

Jonathan progressed to the point that during the 1991-92 Boston Ballet season, he performed in four out of its five productions, including "Giselle," "The Nuteracker," "Midsummer

Nights Dream" and as Punchinello in "On The Edge."

Asked if dance is his only interest, Jonathan replies by shaking his head vehemently "No!" He said that he plays sports after school two times a week and especially enjoys soccer. He also related, smiling, that he goes to a ballroom dancing class on Friday nights at The Dexter School and, along with a group of his friends and "girls wearing little white gloves," he is learning the Waltz, Foxtrot . . . and The Electric Slide.

When the Charlestown Little League season opens, Jonathan is on the field as a member of the Teamsters team. He believes that his training in ballet has helped him play baseball. He said that he has "flexibility, speed and the ability to jump and turn on the field."

His last season's Little League coach Marty Fabiano had nothing but praise for his player. Marty said that he could see how his studies in ballet gave him agility on the field. He said: "Jonathan is a super kid . . . he never complaints . . . he plays hard . . . and he has a lot of heart." He added that Jonathan is easy to get along with, and he is "funny and makes the other kids

Jonathan has also studied

Kung Fu and is a member of the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club. He admits that his schedule has been so hectic that he has spent little time at the club recently. He spends a month each summer at a camp in upstate N.Y. which he says he really likes.

In his 10 short years, Jonathan has traveled more than many persons do in a lifetime. He lived in France with his parents from the age of 2 to 4. He said that although French was his first language during that period of time, he has forgotten a lot since he returned to the U.S. He has also traveled to England, throughout Europe, to Japan and to Morocco.

As to whether ballet will be his career, Jonathan is unsure at this point in his life. He said he will have to just "wait and see."

His ballet teacher, Ke-Juan Han, who is a soloist with the Boston Ballet, said: "Jonathan has the potential, and with hard work he will turn out to be a good dancer.'

Asked if his sister Jennie, 6, is interested in dancing, Jonathan says "no, not at all. She is taking piano lessons.

Right now Jonathan is rehearsing for "The Nutcracker" three days a week, and has ballet classes on

two days. He said his teachers at school have been pretty good to him and will, at times, give him his homework assignments in advance when he has ballet classes and rehearsals on the same day.

Traditionally, children have been a vital part of celebrating the holiday season with the magic of "The Nutcracker." Featuring the familiar Tchaikovsky score, fairytale scenery and stunning costumes, the ballet is yuletide entertainment for the whole family. This year's production will mark the 100th anniversary of the ballet's first performance in Russia in 1892.

According to the Boston Ballet, performing in a fulllength ballet exposes children to aspects of ballet life they don't experience in a regular ballet class. The children learn about the hard work, rigors and enjoyment that goes into every facet of a live ballet performance.

Jonathan, who will be dancing in 20 performances of "The Nutcracker" from opening night through Dec. 8, said that it was somewhat easier this year as it is his second year as Fritz and he knows the role and what to expect.

The story of "The Nutcracker" begins in the Silberhaus home where preparations for a Christmas Eve celebration are underway and the children, Fritz (played by Jonathan) and Clara, eagerly await the

holiday festivities. Their godfather, Dr. Drosselmeyer, arrives and presents Clara with a nutcracker. Jealous of his sister's present, Fritz seizes and breaks the new toy. Dr. Drosselmeyer comforts Clara by mending the broken nutcracker. The ballet continues as Clara is carried on a magical journey with The Nutcracker who has been transformed into a handsome young prince.

Jonathan was asked how he felt going out onto the enormous stage at the Wang Center to perform. He said: "I can't really see the audience from the stage . . . only the red 'Exit' signs, and there seems to be 50 or 60 of them. I just concentrate and go about doing my part . . . it is exciting!'



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
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
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# 'Jack The Barber' Roasted At A Sell-Out Event At The K. Of C.



the Office of Environmental Affairs of the city of Boston Department of Health & Hospitals, dated Nov. 2, relative to the asbestos health hazards at Charlestown Marine Park, 425 Medford St., it was noted that some residual fragments of asbestos in the soil of the site have been cleaned since the city and state inspectors visited the site in October. It went on to say that some soil sample results from that inspection indicate a few more asbestos remnants need to be picked up. The city's Office of Environmental Affairs and the state's Department of Environmental Protection are now coordinating a final resolution of the outside areas so that interior asbestos abatement can go forward.

- ★ Gauge Found . . . Stephen Collins, community liaison with the Central Artery/Tunnel project, reports that the gauge containing radioactive material that was stolen on Nov. 6 from a locked trailer at the CANA Field Office at 250 Front St. was found along Front Street under Route I-93.
- \* Street Reconstruction Update . . . Work continues and the paving of the streets left open by the Mahoney Construction Co. gets underway. The long-awaited day finally arrived on Monday, Nov. 16 when all in one day Susi's paving subcontractor put base and binder pavement down on the compacted graded gravel of Putnam, Ellwood, Lyndeboro and Middlesex streets and Monument Court. Susi may still have to dig through the base and binder to do a couple of gas light hook-ups prior to putting down the top course, but it is felt that it is better to get most of the pavement down from an overall standpoint of the project, especially with the risk that the asphalt plants may close if it gets

Everyone is working hard, primarily raising castings, to make sure all is ready for the top course of pavement for the other streets. Concord and Chestnut streets and Nearen Row are next in line for top course with Adams, Devens, Washington, Russell and Essex streets and Old Rutherford Avenue to follow. Paving will continue as long as there are roadway subgrades available.

The gas light services are being tested by the gas company prior to the final pavement being put down to ensure the new pavement does not have to be dug up in the future for any underground repairs. Everyone's cooperation in adhering to the "No Parking" leaflets is and will be appreciated.

There are still several sections of sidewalk to be installed. Once there is sufficient roadway ready for paving, Susi plans to begin the installation of the new gas light poles/tops and the roof drain connections sometime this week, followed by back-of-sidewalk repairs next week.

The Middlesex Corp. continues to work on the Mead Street Stairs (40 Flights) getting the next flight of stairs poured, stripped and rubbed out. About one-half of the stairs have been installed to date. The walls for the top set of stairs were poured this past week. The railing subcontractor has been on site to coordinate the work for new railings and some sample newly cast railing posts will be brought on site for review. The contractor has also adjusted some of the castings on Mead Street at Russell Street so Susi can put down the final pavement at Russell Street.
