Jerry Steimel, director of the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club, recently attended the Boys Clubs of America conference in Houston, Texas and brought back with him an honor for the members and staff of the Charlestown clubhouse.

It was announced at the conference that the Charlestown club was one of only six clubs in the nation to receive the coveted National Honor Award for a program carried out by members. The six awards

were selected from a field of 410 applicants.

The local program, under the guidance of Membership and Day Camp Director Eileen O'Brien, provided gifts for homeless mothers and their children at Christmas.

Last fall, Mattel and Parker Bros. toy companies were contacted by the local club, and both made donations of toys to the project. In addition, the group sponsored a Dance-A-Thon in early December that raised \$500. Gifts were purchased for the mothers and children from those monies, and the members wrapped each gift in preparation for delivery. 


Good News





Scaffolding on high and sailors on ground was the action of the day. For the former, the duration could be well into the fall, while the latter has only 17 days to complete its objective.

Patent Corp. has assembled its structures at the Hoosac site of the former warehouse distributing facility. The Schrafft logo, which graced the building for many years, will undergo cosmetic renovations. Pointing of the facade will be undertaken with pampering. Exterior restoration of this famous landmark, which bears a Tudor Wharf plaque, will be hailed when finalized.

Be assured, Navy personnel of the Constitution, that state Public Safety Commissioner and Bunker Hill Day Parade Chief Marshal William McCabe guarantees sunshine and warm weather for your march. We are looking forward to the parade and commemoration of the 215th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill.

Staggering crowds have flocked to Disney World and its multiplicity of entertaining features. Still an enormous attraction is the "Pirates of the Caribbean." Boston's Capital Plan Moves Ahead

The Boston City Council has approved the Flynn Administration's request for capital loan orders, enabling the city of Boston to implement the fifth year of its Capital Plan "Rebuilding Boston: 1990-94." Released late in March, the plan encompases over 600 projects at a cost of \$1.01 billion. To date over 300 projects have been completed or are under construction.

Mary Nee, director of the Office of Capital Planning, said: "This year's plan is not full of new and expensive initiatives - but neither is it one which retreats from previous commitments. Over the next five years we will move the city forward by rebuilding our infrastructure and our public facilities and through strategic investment which serves to stimulate the private economy."

Mayor Raymond Flynn noted: "Despite the difficult financial times which have overtaken the Commonwealth, Boston remains determined to continue the work of rebuilding. In fact we will use our public dollars to maintain the economic momentum in Boston - to infuse our city and our neighborhoods with confidence and hope."

Charlestown has already started enjoying the benefits of the first five years of investment under the capital program. Over \$1.2 million has been earmarked for parks and playgrounds. Barry Playground has already been completed along with Doherty Playground, while Ryan Playground is nearing completion. Work on Thompson and Hayes squares is slated to begin this summer, with the Harvard Mall slated for 1991 attention.

Infrastructure work on the Sullivan Square overpass has already been completed at a cost of over \$6.4 million. Over \$2 million has been earmarked for work on the North Washington Street Bridge. The Boston Redevelopment Authority has also been involved in major capital investments at the Navy Yard.

Funds have been commit-

ted for the Kent Community School and work has already been completed at Charlestown High School and \$515,000 of renovation work is underway at the Edwards Middle School.

Looking beyond Charlestown, this plan includes a study which would precede the development of a headquarters for the Police Department. Also included are ongoing capital investments of \$200 million for Health and Hospitals, \$165 million for schools, \$90 million for parks, \$276 million for public works and \$57.8 million for police and fire.





Helping Those With Huntington's Disease

by Margaret Evans

A great goal was scored recently for the Massachusetts Chapter of the Huntington's Disease Society of America. As president of the state's chapter since 1988, Charlestown attorney Willard J. Stievater is pleased to report that the recent llth annual Hoop-a-thon raised a record amount for the organization. Stievater estimated the funds raised at \$40,000 and added that a large portion of that would go toward supporting a summer camp program for young adults affected by Huntington's Disease.

Huntington's Disease is a fatal genetic nervous disorder which generally begins to show symptoms when a person affected with the disease reaches middle age. The defective gene causes deterioration of certain brain cells that control the nervous system throughout the body. The early symptoms are usually erratic and uncontrolled movement of the arms and legs, difficulty in swallowing and speech. These symptoms gradually worsen over a period of time, usually 10 to 20 years. Eventually the person is totally incapacitated and unable to communicate. Death soon occurs thereafter.

There is no cure for Huntington's Disease at the present time. There is, however, research going on to find a cure at the Mass. General Hospital's Neurological Department, located in Building 149 in the Charlestown Navy Yard. This research is headed by Drs. James Gusella and Marian

Figlin.

In addition to his role as president of the Mass. chapter of HDSA, Stievater also gathered a team of attorneys from his Charlestown-based law firm, Mc-Cullough, Stievater & Polvere, who were among the several hundred participants in the Hoop-a-thon. Highlighting the event was the annual Celebrity Shoot-Out, featuring state politicians and personalities from local radio and TV.

According to Stievater, the success of this event moves the organization further toward achieving some of its goals. He said that the funds raised support the national organization as well as efforts in the New England area to provide information to families affected with Huntington's and toward funding for research, care and treatment of the






