Charlestown has already started enjoying the benefits of the first five years of in－ vestment under the capital program．Over $\$ 1.2$ million has been earmarked for parks and playgrounds． Barry Playground has al－
ready been completed along with Doherty Playground， while Ryan Playground is nearing completion．Work on Thompson and Hayes squares is slated to begin this summer，with the Har－ vard Mall slated for 1991 attention．
Infrastructure work on the Sullivan Square over－ pass has already been com－ pleted at a cost of over $\$ 6.4$ million．Over $\$ 2$ million has been earmarked for work on the North Wash－ ington Street Bridge．The Boston Redevelopment Au－ Boston Redevelopment Au－
thority has also been invol－ ved in major capital invest－ ments at the Navy Yard．
Funds have been commit－
ted for the Kent Communi－ ty School and work has al－ ready been completed at Charlestown High School and $\$ 515,000$ of renovation work is underway at the Ed－ wards Middle School．
Looking beyond Charles－ town，this plan includes a study which would precede
the development of a head－ quarters for the Police De－ partment．Also included are ongoing capital investments of $\$ 200$ million for Health and Hospitals，S165 million for schools，$\$ 90$ million for parks，$\$ 276$ million for pub－ lic works and $\$ 57.8$ million for police and fire．

\section*{With Huntington's Disease}

A great goal was scored recently for the Massachusetts Chapter of the Huntington's Disease Society of America. As president of the state's chapter since 1988, Charlestown attorney Willard J. Stievater is pleas ed to report that the recent llth annual Hoop-a-thon raised a record amount for the organization. Stievater estimated the funds raised at \(\$ 40,000\) and added that a large portion of that would go toward supporting a summer camp program for young adults affected by Huntington's Disease.

Huntington's Disease is a fatal genetic nervous disorder which generally begins to show symptoms when a person affected with the diease reaches middle age The defective gene causes deterioration of certain brain cells that control the nervous system throughout he body. The early symptoms are usually erratic and uncontrolled movement of the arms and legs, difficulty in swallowing and speech These symptoms gradually worsen over a period of ime, usually 10 to 20 years. Eventually the person is to tally incapacitated and unable to communicate. Death soon occurs thereafter

There is no cure for Huntington's Disease at the pre sent time. There is, how ever, research going on to find a cure at the Mass General Hospital's Neuroogical Department, located in Building 149 in the Charestown Navy Yard. This research is headed by Drs James Gusella and Marian

In addition to his role as president of the Mass. chapter of HDSA, Stievater also gathered a team of attorneys from his Charles-town-based law firm, McCullough, Stievater \& Polvere, who were among the several hundred participants in the Hoop-a-thon. Highlighting the event was the annual Celebrity ShootOut, featuring state politicians and personalities from local radio and TV.

According to Stievater, the success of this event moves the organization further toward achieving some of its goals. He said that the funds raised support the national organization as well as efforts in the New England area to provide information to families affected with Huntington's and toward funding for research. care and treatment of the disease
