Sen. Thomas F. Birmingham, Chairman of the Senate Ways and Means Committee cordially invites the residents of Charlestown to join with state and local elected officials, the Mass. Highway Department, the Galvin family and friends and members of the Charlestown Veterans Committee and Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion at the dedication of the Maj. Gen. Michael Joseph Galvin, USAR Green on Saturday morning, May 13 at 10 a.m.

The dedication will take place on the knoll of the "Galvin Green" at New Rutherford Avenue, directly across from the Shell Gas Station, south of City Square.

tee, Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion and the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, included language in Chapter 273 of the Acts of 1994 to name land located between the southerly side of New Rutherford Avenue and ramp T-L as the Major General Michael Joseph Galvin, USAR Green.

Birmingham has stated that it was an honor to have been able to sponsor legislation honoring a truly heroic son of Charlestown.

Maj. Gen. Michael Joseph "Iron Mike" Galvin, a son of Irish immigrants, had to leave school after the eighth grade to help support his widowed mother and his nine brothers and sisters. While working, he went to night school for 11 years, graduating from Charlestown Evening High School and Northeastern School of Law, after which he passed the Mass. Bar.

"In addition to being the commanding officer of the U.S. Army 94th Reserve Division, Gen. Galvin was an outstanding member of the Mass. State Senate.

"His death, with years of valuable service ahead for him, is a great loss to nation and to state.

"Gen. "Mike" Galvin typified to the highest extent humanly possible the citizen soldier of our country.

"He loved our country, dedicating his life to our nation's best interests, both in time of peace, and in time of war.

"Enlisting as a private in the 94th Division in 1928, he rose through the different higher ranks to later become its commanding officer, with the rank of Major General at the time of his death.

"During World War II, then a colonel, he served with the 6th Armored Division in the famed 3rd

Victims Of Violence Remembered At Candlelight Vigil

Over 400 people gathered at St. Catherine's Church on April 30 to gather strength from each other - those who have lost a loved one, friends, neighbors, representatives from agencies and organizations - as members of the CHarlestown After Murder Program (CH.A.M.P.) held its annual Candlelight Vigil to remember those whose lives have been taken too soon by violence.

Josephine Stone offered the welcome, with her daughter Beverly Gallagher and CH.A.M.P Cochairpersons Sandy King and Pam Enos at her side.

Stone stated: "Thank you for sharing this vigil with us who have lost so much. It is our way of letting people know they are not forgotten nor will they every be. As long as life and memory last, we will remember them. The Vietnam veterans have their healing wall. This vigil is our healing wall, and what better place than in God's house."


While tears were shed, there was music, prayers and even laughter during the ceremony.

Doherty Park is the last

remaining neighborhood

park designed by Freder-

ick Law Olmsted for the city of Boston. Olmsted is recognized as the father of American landscape design and is the one person believed to be responsible for this country's park system as we know it. He designed parks in almost every major American city, including New York City's Central Park and the Capital grounds in Washington, D.C.

While he was working on the Emerald Necklace for Boston, he and his firm were asked to design five neighborhood parks. There are only two left, one at Copp's Hill in the North End, and ours here in Charlestown. It has only recently come to light that

ours is actually the last of Olmsted's parks for the city; Copp's Hill was designed by his sons.

Through the efforts of The Friends of Doherty Park, the Parks Department has completed a master plan for restoration of the park and work will begin on different areas of the park this spring. Final steps are being taken toward the park's being listed on the National Historic Register.

Doherty Park is on Bunker Hill Street near St. Francis de Sales Church and runs down to Medford Street. In case of rain, the clean-up will take place on Sunday, May 21.

A letter announcing the drive will be sent to all postal patrons. Your let-


ter carrier will be doing a little bit more than delivering mail on that day and are asking for everyone's help.




Healthy Kids Day At The YMCA

(continued from page 1) Army commanded by his long-time friend Gen. George Patton. Patton recognized his ability as a fighting commander and it was in this role - in the lead tank of Patton's flying columns - that by his leadership and courage, he made a most impressive war record.

"At the end of World War II, he emerged as a colonel, and for his bravery and outstanding leadership he was awarded the Silver Star and two Bronze Stars for gallantry, the Legion of Merit and the Croix de Guerre with gold combat star.

"In 1959, Galvin returned to the 94th Army Reserve Division as a Brig. Gen. He helped turn it into a prototype Pentonic Division. Assuming command of the 94th in 1959, under his leadership this division was recognized as the outstanding Reserve Division in the country. Certainly there were none better.

"Gen. George Marshall once called Galvin the outstanding 'reservist of World War II.' Everyone recognized him as a warrior. In time of peace, he dedicated himself in the service of nation and state.

"A close friend of the Gov. of Mass. and Secretary of Labor Maurice Tobin, Michael Galvin served with great distinction as Undersecretary of Labor from 1949 to 1953. His services, on a very high level to carry out important assignments, were also utilized by former President Eisenhower. He was also a close and valued friend of the late President John Fitzgerald Kennedy.

"In 1962, Gen. Galvin was a candidate for the first time for an elected office, being the Democratic candidate for the State Senate in what was

considered a safe Republican District. The confidence and respect of the people of his Senatorial District, Democrats, Republicans and Independents, was evidenced on election day by a surprising and convincing victory.

"While his service in the Mass. State Senate, due to his death, was short, in that period of time he made a record that usually take a number of terms to make.

"His life is the story and the spirit of America where opportunity exists for all to go ahead and advance, if they have the ambition, the courage and the determination.

"The life of Michael J. Galvin, as a soldier and as a citizen, is one of Americanism at its best - an example and an inspiration for all to follow, and one that the youth of American should strive to emulate.

"In his death the nation has lost a great American; Mass, one of its outstanding sons, and I have lost a most valued friend."



of his father, Albie, among those of lost loved ones placed upon the altar. Mary, with tears streaming down her face, read a letter written to Aaron by his father just two months before he was killed. It told of his love for his son and for Mary.

Terry spoke of how she missed her son, noting that their family has been totally destroyed by this tragedy. She said: "I miss fighting with Al and giving him lectures and advice every day." She told of his addiction which started when he was 14 1/2. Terry went on to say that "he tried and tried and then would fall and we would be there. The only one Al ever hurt was himself and those he loved." She shared with the gathering his last day and the terrible moment when she got that call from Mary at 4:25 in the afternoon, adding that "he would have fallen over if someone breathed on him and there was no reason for those people to have done that to him."

Boston Police Officer Michael Charbonnier told of being the youngest of 11 children and his pride in being a member of the BPD. He spoke of the pain and anguish of Sept. 2, 1994 when his "cousin and dearest friend" Mass. State Trooper Mark Charbonnier was murdered. He said that Mark was devoted to his family and job. He related that people who commit such acts of murder "are cowards and have no conscience or morals." He said "Try to remember that tears and pain will not last forev-

er, but memories will . . . and we must maintain what is good.'

Beverly Gallagher, who resides in Florida, said in past years her heart has been here, and this year she was pleased that she could be present.

Boston Police Officer Jim McNamara presented three prizes in the CH.A.M.P. essay contest to Antonio Donahue, John Fabiano and McKenzie Ridings and Donahue read his first place essay. McNamara said that there were no loosers in the contest and asked for a round of applause for all participants.

Angel gifts from first and second grade students at Charlestown Catholic Elementary School decorated the walls of the parish hall and all the guests were invited to take an angel home with them.




A Few Words From An Adopted 'Townie'

GATT CONTAINS TAX PROVISIONS

Last December, President Clinton signed a law putting into effect the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, or GATT. The idea behind the law is that by cutting tariffs and phasing out quotas, businesses - foreign and domestic - will be encouraged to import and export more.

Lower tariffs mean less government revenue. Some analysts predict that the cost to the government of implementing GATT could be as much as \$11 billion.


To reduce GATT's impact on an already huge federal deficit, Congress has modified the tax law to offset some of these lost revenues. Some of these changes may affect you. For example:

 If you contribute to a 401(k) plan, the limit on contributions will go up less frequently. But for most middle income taxpayers, the \$9,240 ceiling will still exceed their annual contributions.


Community Open House At The Bunker Hill Monument
