## Grandson of R. J. Reynolds Visits Charlestown Boys \& Girls Club

Patrick Reynolds, grandson of the founder of the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company and founder of Citizens for a Smoke-Free America, recounted his strongest memories of his father recently to a gathering at the Charlestown Boys \& Girls Club. The event was sponsored by CHarlestown Against Drugs (CHAD), the Charlestown Boys \& Girls Club and the Mass. Tobacco Control Program (MTCP).
Patrick Reynolds recalled his grandfather as a dying, smoking, coughing man, gasping for breath. His father died of a smoking-related disease when Patrick was just 15 years old.
"Cigarettes are addicfive. Once you start smoking, you may never be able to stop. And, besides, it looks so stupid!" he said.

In his lively presentation to the group, Patrick touched on some serious issues.
"You all are moving into an age when you are about to go through the normal passage of breaking away from your parents," he said. "It's the journey between childhood and adulthood. You're going to be deciding what time you come home and if you come home; and who to spend your time with. It's that breaking away process - you'll be making all of your own decisions."
"In this normal time of separation from your parents, you will differentiate yourselves from your parents as distinct and independent personalities, some of you will dye a lock of your hair orange or green; you will say no to whatever your parents want and some of you will start smoking," Reynolds continued.
"There will be a strong urge to say no to your parents, to separate from them as you make the transition

London's Time Out Magazine calls "The Gut Girls" a "vigorous and intelligent new play . . . Daniels writes vividly and humorously." Set in the gutting sheds of the slaughterhouse at the Cattle Market in late Victorian England, "The Gut Girls" takes an unflinching look at the lives and spinit of the women who handle the offal, and how their world is dramatically changed when their work is declared illegal.

Considered little better than whores, these boisterous and quick-witted women were rumored to gallivant about town with no undergarments, bedecked in flamboyantly outrageous hats, go out to work like men, drink like men, curse like men, abstain from sex for fear of preg. nancy and shame a sexist comedian offstage.
"The world knows what they do for a living and has labeled them accordingly. By themselves, they are hardly likely to find the incentive to fight against becoming rough and unladylike." After making this statement, Duchess Lady Helena, the antiseptic, selfproclaimed benefactor of the gut girls, opens a club (a la Dr. Henry Higgins) for their embetterment.
The establishment is described by one of the girls as a "do-goody thing run by some interfering ladies with Jesus between their ears." Here the begrudging girls are first taught how to sew bloomers, followed by instruction and training to land a job in "service" as an undermaid to the upper crust, or to become a fit mother and wife. During the ensu-

Up until recently, persons heading for Chelsea could take a bus from a stop adjacent to the City Square Park. Now, with no notice to the community (as usual), that bus stop has been removed. Anyone wishing to take the bus to Chelsea must now go into Haymarket and come back through Charlestown.

It seems that all planners must be fortunate enough to drive autos but maybe they should take into consideration that not every one drives, it's an expensive taxi ride and it's a very long and difficult walk!

* "Red Shirt" Winter Clean Up . . . Mayor Thomas M. Menino assigned a large contingent of Boston Youth Cleanup Corps "Red Shirts" to a citywide clean up effort last Saturday. The mayor decid-
ed to take advantage of the unusually mild winter and stay ahead of litter and debris.

The cold didn't deter the local group who, under the direction of Mike Walsh, tackled some of the trash collecting on Main Street, bagging it and piling it to be collected by city trucks.

The Red Shirts play a key role in meeting the overwhelming employment needs for Boston's young people. Each summer, young people take to the streets, parks, vacant lots, housing developments and community centers of the city wearing their signature Red Shirts. These work crews give Boston its annual facelift by removing debris, whacking weeds painting benches and helping non-profit groups provide family services to the community.

This past year, the mayor pushed for greater job creation for young people and the Red Shirts answered by employing an all-time high of 2,870 young people. The largest workforce ever of Red Shirts also set new highs by clearing 837 tons of debris and cleaning 34,000 sites in 1994.
$\star$ "Gateway Project" Is Underway . . Mayor Thomas M. Menino recently launched the Boston Public Library (BPL) and Boston Public Schools (BPS) "Gateway Project," a computer linkage initiative that hooks up via computer all of the 117 Boston public schools to the Boston Public Library, its 26 branch libraries and its online services, including the worldwide In ternet.

The Gateway Project provides a noncost "gateway" for students to access from the classroom all of the resources at the BPL and its branches, as well as the worldwide Internet. The project received $\$ 150,000$ in support funding from Ray-

Mayor Thomas Menino brought his playground drive into Charlestown recently with a visit to the Warren-Prescott School The construction of school playgrounds throughout the city is part of Menino's program to upgrade Boston city Schools.

The mayor praised the staff and parents of the Warren-Prescott School for their initiative in identifying the need for safe, secure and functional playgrounds in the city. He said that it reflected his belief that schools need to be inviting places for children.
The school's Parent Council spearheaded the drive for the playground after discussions with school administration, teachers, parents and community residents.
"The advantages of a playground at the WarrenPrescott are so compelling that we had to do something," explained Patricia Simpson, co-chairperson of the council. "It will be a place where both school children and children from the neighborhood would have a safe and convenient place to play," Simpson stated.

Simpson said the school has made some very conscious efforts to make the school an integral part of the community, citing a shared use of the school yard. The School Street yard is used by the school for its activities on school days from 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. It is open for young

people to play off-street from $2: 30$ to $5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. on weekdays. From 5 p.m. to 7:30 a.m., it is available to neighbors for off-street parking. Many of the neighbors have donated funds to help the staff pay for the plowing of the yard during major snowstorms.

We see the school yard as a continuing effort by the Warren-Prescott to reach out to its neighbors. A school yard is not only good for kids, it enhances the school environment and the community as a whole," said Simpson.

She said that the project received its biggest boost when a proposal for the playground was presented to the Kiwanis Club of Charlestown. "The Kiwanis Club was very supportive and generous of the Warren-Prescott School
playground proposal," said Simpson. "I think they saw the necessity of the playground and an opportunity to make a significant and lasting contribution to young people as well as the Charlestown community."
Simpson stated that the support for the playground has been overwhelming. The mayor, school administration, teachers, parents and neighbors have all been enthusiastic. Community meetings have generated a number of suggestions which will be incorporated into the design, construction, maintenance and security of the playground. Many community leaders and a local contractor have already committed to help.

Simpson said that additional fund raising is plan-
ned to supplement the contribution already made by the Kiwanis Club of Charlestown. The funds would be to provide additional enhancements to the plan and provide for ongoing maintenance.
"We're taking a preemptive approach in our planning. Playgrounds need upkeep like everything else. With proper maintenance it will always be a neighborhood jewel," concluded Simpson.
Because of their interest in developing school playgrounds for school and neighborhood children, Simpson and the Warren-Prescott School's principal, Dr. Domenic Amara, have been appointed to the mayor's commission to study ways to help other neighborhoods obtain playgrounds.

satety officials do their very difficult jobs. Millions for new police cruisers, telecommunications equipment, builet-proof vests and updated police stations are all vital gains. I will continue to seek ways such as these to fund local crimefighting." added Birmingham

## IRS NOTICES

Don't ignore correspondence from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). If you get a request for additional information, take it to your tax preparer immediately.

Failure to respond in a timely manner to an IRS notice could result in penalties and interest that might otherwise be avoided.

For example, here is the penalty schedule for late deposits of payroll taxes by an employer. If deposits of payroll taxes are late, the amount of penalty is determined by how late each deposit was:

- $2 \%$ for deposits made one to five days late,
- $5 \%$ for deposits made six to 15 days late,
- $10 \%$ for deposits made 16 days or more late. Also applies to amounts paid to the IRS within 10 days after the date of the first notice the IRS sends you asking for the tax due, and
- $10 \%$ for deposits made at unauthorized financial institutions or made directly to the IRS.
Once the IRS notifies you that they are charging a penalty, you have 10 days from the date of that notice to pay the amount due. If you don't make your payment within 10 days, the IRS will automatically increase your penalty to $15 \%$ and show that amount on the next notice they send to you.
