Elected Mayor

White Wins Charlestown

Kevin H. White was elected to an unprecedented fourth term as Mayor of Boston this past Tuesday, capturing every precinct in Charlestown and coming away from C-Town with a 600 vote plurality.

White, who had lost Ward 2-Charlestown by 40 votes in the 1975 run-off with Senator Joseph F. Timilty, received 2682 votes to Timilty's 2080.

Only slightly over 60% of Charlestown's registered voters went to the polls with 56% of those voting casting their ballot for Mayor White.

Boston City Councillor Raymond L. Flynn commanded an outstanding lead here in Charlestown with 3123 despite a vicious leaflet campaign by unsigned hate-mongers. Ray has served the city well and was deserving of a big win in our community.

City Councillors Rosemarie Sansone and Louise Day Hicks came in second and third respectively in Charlestown. Mrs. Hicks' seat on the next City Council is tenuous for as we go to press, just five votes separate her from incumbent Councillor Pat McDonough who is presently in tenth position and a

recount is almost certainly in the offing.

Voke Votes Against Pay Raise

Charlestown Representative Richard Voke last week voted against granting pay raises to himself and his colleagues in the Massachusetts Legislature. Representative Voke gave many reasons for his vote, but the chief reason for his opposition was his belief that it would be hypocritical for a legislature which passed historic legislation limiting government spending to turn around and vote itself a pay raise.

Not enough members of the Legislature agreed with Representative Voke however, as the bill was passed by both branches and signed into law by the Governor last Sunday.

On Tuesday morning, November 13 a Public Hearing will take place at 9:45 a.m. in Room 801 of Boston City Hall before the Zoning Appeals Board at which time the YMCA at 32 City Square, Charlestown will petition for approval to continue the Detention Center under the Department of Youth Services that has been housed at the 'Y' illegally for the past seven years.

Both of these hearings should be of concern and Charlestown residents should make every effort to attend.

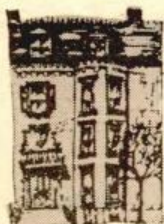
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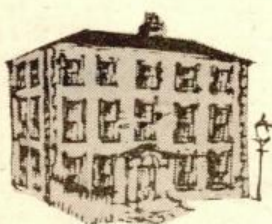
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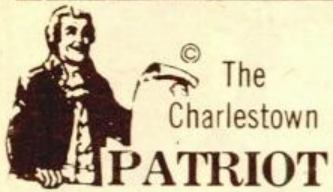

The Boston Veterans' Day Parade will be held in downtown Boston on Sunday afternoon, November 11, 1979, stepping off promptly at 1:00 p.m.

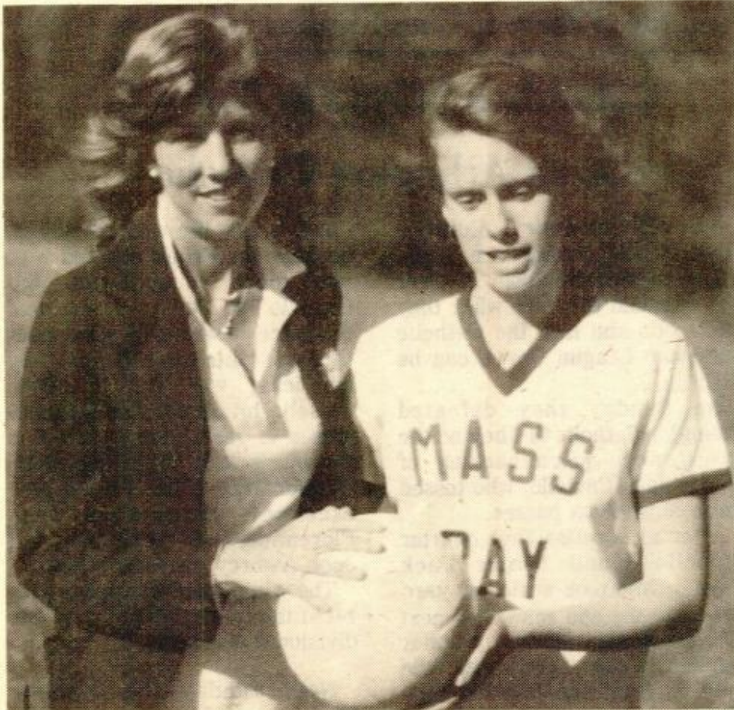

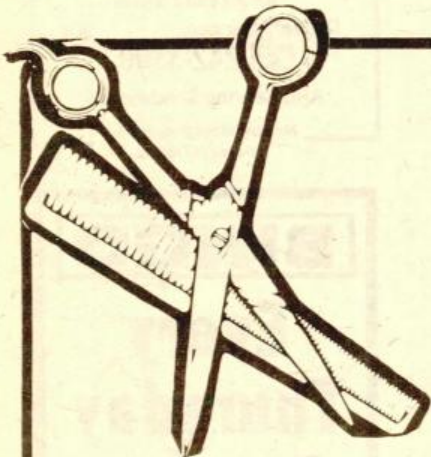

A group of Charlestown parents heard of the many ways they can contribute to the education of their own children and of other students through the varied programs of School Volunteers for Boston at a recent meeting at

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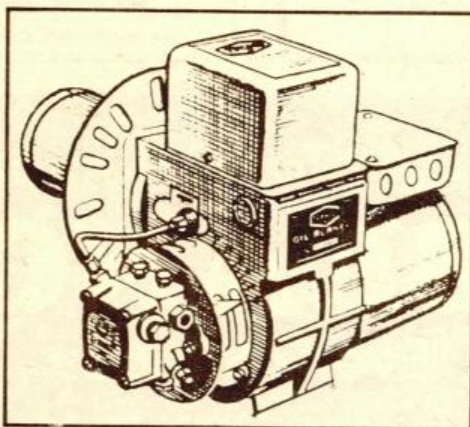

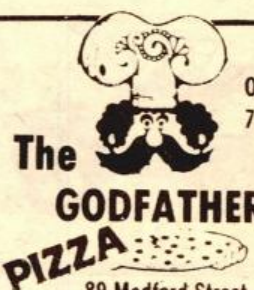

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Charlestown Community Gardeners

A Homegrown Thanksgiving

For thirty Charlestown families, Thanksgiving began some time back in the early summer when fresh peas first appeared on their dinner tables. The spirit of the harvest continues even now as the last vine-ripened tomatoes are savoured and the acorn squashes are brought steaming from the oven. The knowledge that this food was raised on a former vacant lot here in Charlestown makes the celebration a well-earned and meaningful one for all those who have helped the community garden flourish.

summer, the group has swelled in numbers and enthusiasm. This year, 35 residents have tilled plots, laid out stone paths, planted grass and colorful flower borders, and built a compost bin. They hope to complete their new water system in the spring with the help of a \$2500 Community Development Block Grant awarded to their group "Gardens for Charlestown."

"We could not have kept the garden going without the cheerful persistence of our gardeners and a little help from our friends," says coordinator Nina Gomez-Ibanez. "The Boston Gas Company, after tearing up 13 gardens to put in a new gas line, ended up giving us a boost by bringing in more topsoil, fertilizer, stone for the pathways, and some piping for the new water system." She adds that the Fire Station and Conway Trucking both donated

water, the Parks Department supplied materials to build two benches, and ABCD had additional topsoil trucked in. The Suffolk County Extension Service, through its new urban gardening program, hired Mrs. Gomez-Ibanez as part-time summer gardening assistant for Charlestown, giving the group necessary educational and organizational support.

Gardeners range in age from 12

to 76, all residents of Charlestown, they agree to plant and maintain their plots year round in addition to beautifying the entire site voluntarily. The Boston Redevelopment Authority, owner, leases the land to Gardens for Charlestown with 30 days' notice to vacate. Currently the group is seeking ways to have the site designated as permanent garden space so that beautification and soil im-

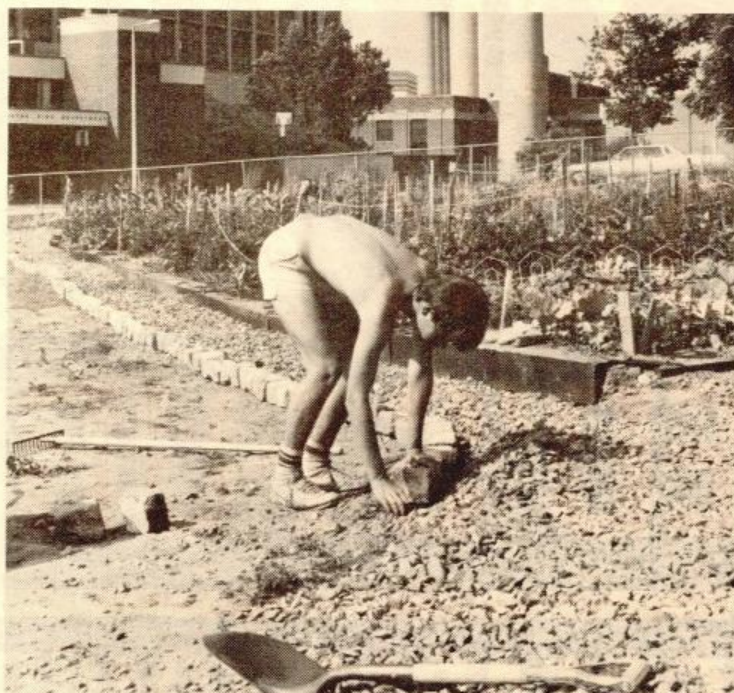
provements may begin in earnest.

Keep On Keeping On!

More and more, the neighborhood has become the focus of politics by both liberal and conservative activists as well as government at all levels.

In cities across the country, neighborhood organizations are taking on city halls over large issues such as city-wide tax inequities, local economic

development, control of city social programs and forced busing, yes, forced busing!

However, in 1976, the National Association For Neighborhood Schools, Inc. was formed because opponents of forced busing across America realized, first, that forced busing is not a uniquely local problem or policy - Busing is a national policy, a national problem!

In short, NANS is doing at the national level what no local group could do alone. And because the national office cannot, because of limited resources, rush into each and every locality, they provide leadership and assistance to local affiliates like our own NANS of Massachusetts.

Recently, NANS leadership here in Boston formed a Political Action Committee. After the preliminary election, they sent all 10 School Committee candidates letters requesting interviews and a NANS application. Those in favor of the "neighborhood school concept" were the candidates endorsed by NANS-PAC.

This political action committee was formed because it is a recognized fact that all politicians and administrators are responsive to public pressure. In order to end the senseless, ineffective, highly bad educational and hugely ex-

pensive mandatory busing schemes, citizens must band together into a constituency capable of making a credible political threat.

It is, by the way, a paradox of political life that one of today's most powerful lobbies represents a seemingly invisible and silent constituency.

But millions of Americans have made the single issue of a Constitutional Amendment outlawing forced busing a political litmus test. NANS-PAC, here in Boston, hopes to become the political arm of the anti-busing majority, breaking through the thick smokescreen of confusion surrounding the issue.

Someone once said, "Politicians never give up power voluntarily. To make them accountable, you have to build your own power base and use it when and where it counts the most." NANS-PAC has high hopes as the political year of 1980 approaches. 1980 is going to be the watershed year for parental political clout!

There is nothing that the pro-busers would like better than to see the forced busing issue go away - as a political issue. They prefer to treat it as a "non-issue." However, it will never go away so long as busing doesn't go away. NANS-PAC isn't going to let the politicians off the hook that easy!
