The Boston Redevelopment Authority was represented by Assistant Director Paul Barrett and Deputy Director Bob Rush. Weigel, in his opening remarks, explained that the plans were preliminary, and they have yet to go before the BRA for design review. The developer, however has been granted tentative designation for both sites by he BRA Board.
The proposal for Parcel 7 includes a 12 -story biomedcal research building, 155 feet in height, with three levels of above-grade parking paces for 300 cars and nine levels of laboratory space. The penthouse, conaining the building's mechanicals, will add another 30 to 35 feet to the height of the building. The approxmate overall square footage of the building is 330,000 . Parcel 7 is located at the tip of the Navy Yard, known as Yard's End. It is shadowed by the Tobin Bridge and situated between the Little Mystic Channel, the proposed New England Aquarium and Buildings 114 and 199.

Weigel stated that the biomedical research center will generate 660 permanent jobs and 1,100 construction jobs. Linkage money from the project will include $\$ 1,150,000$ for affordable housing and $\$ 230,000$ for job opportunities. The site improvement will total $\$ 795,000$, providing pedestrian promenades with trees, benches and street lighting.
Vehicular access to the site, with its main entrance facing 16th Street, will be reached by entering Gate 5 from Chelsea Street, traveling down 13th Street to Fifth Avenue and onto 16th Street where cars will enter the parking facilities. Service access to the building will be accommodated on the north side of the building which faces Building 114. Pedestrians will enter the building on 16th Street and take an elevator to a fourth-level sky-lobby to enter the laboratories.
The exterior of the building will be similar to other

Navy Yard structures, using precast concrete, brick and metal. A covered arcade at the base of the building will offer shelter to pedestrians. The building will be set back from surrounding structures to offer pedestrians an open walkway. The project architect is Payette Associates.
Proposal plans for Parcel 4 include a 400 room hotel to be built in two phases. The first phase calls for the construction of 300 guest rooms and parking for 175 cars. The second phase, if the demand for additional hotel space warrants it, will see the construction of another 100 rooms. The hotel will also include meeting rooms and conference facilities.

Situated on First Avenue between the proposed New England Aquarium and the Bricklayer's affordable homes on 13th Street, the hotel will reach 135 feet in height on the First Avenue side of the building, stepping down to 85 feet at the water's edge. The mechani-

cals, positioned on the top of both ends of the structure, will add another 25 to 30 feet to the height of the building. The portion of the hotel facing the aquarium will reach 126 feet above ground level and the side facing the Bricklayer's homes will be 117 feet. If the additional 100 rooms are needed, that wing of the hotel will be built next to the Bricklayer's homes and will be approximately 65 feet in height. The overall density of the building is approximated at 300,000 square feet.
Community benefits offered by the developer for the Parcel 4 proposal include 600 permanent jobs and 820 construction jobs. Linkage money will include $\$ 1,140,000$ for affordable housing and $\$ 228,000$ for job opportunities.
Site improvements, totaling $\$ 1,250,000$, will include the construction of the Harborwalk along the water's edge, featuring wood deck ing, brick and concrete paving, plantings, benches and site lighting.

Vehicular access to the hotel will be at the main entry and drop-off point facing the aquarium. Entry to the garage is also situated at this location, with an additional entry and exit point on First Avenue. The loading dock on First Avenue will be fully enclosed with a door that will be down except for arrival and departure of delivery vehicles. The dock will contain a service bay and bay for the trash compactor.
Exterior materials of the building will conform to the established Navy Yard list of materials including brick, precast concrete, metal roofs and aluminum windows. The project architects are CBT/Childs Bertman Tseckares \& Casendino Inc. and Olson Lewis Architects and Planners Inc.

Weigel stated that the developer hopes to begin construction of the parcels in 1991 with a completion date of 1993.

a result of these two projects and additional development proposals being reviewed by the community have raised the concern of council members. The surety that Charlestown residents are made aware of the opportunites available to them and recruited to apply for the positions would generate in itself a full-time position, according to Cunha. The idea of hiring a Charlestown liaison to oversee job opportunities for Charlestown residents from the total buildout of the Navy Yard, is agreeable to The Raymond Group, according to Smith. A written agreement from The Raymond Group defining the liaison position was requested by Cunha.
The density of Parcels 4 and 7 , in particular the height of the two buildings, raised the most concern at the meeting. The biomedical research center on Parcel 7 will rise to a height of approximately 185 feet. The hotel on Parcel 4 will reach approximately 165 feet on First Avenue. The Navy Yard Master Plan calls for a height restriction of 155 feet.

To compare these proposed heights to other high points in the Navy Yard area, research has revealed the following statistics: Building 199 is 114 feet and with mechanicals on the roof, it is 129 feet; Building 149 is 110 feet and with mechanicals on the roof, it
is 138 feet; Building 197 (Flagship Wharf) is 123 feet in height to the cornices and the mechanicals on the roof bring the total height to 136 feet.
Also, the Tobin Bridge at its highest point is 254 feet at the collectors' booths. The bottom of the lower level is 145 feet above the water during an average high tide. Coming down the Tobin Bridge ramps toward City Square, the following heights exist: above the Little Mystic Channel it is 110 feet high; at Vine and Chelsea Streets the bridge is 70 feet high; and at Tremont and Lowney Way, it is 52 feet high.
Residents requested that a scale model be made available to them so that they could visualize the proposed buildings as they relate to the surrounding Navy Yard structures. Barrett announced that the scale model is available at the BRA conference room on the third floor of Build ing 33 in the Charlestown Navy Yard.
The next meeting of the Housing and Development Committee to further dis cuss Parcels 4 and 7 will be a public forum for community participation. That meeting will take place on Tuesday, June 26 , beginning at 7 p.m. at the BRA conference room and continuing at $7: 30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. at the Hull Room, Building 5, in the National Park section of the Navy Yard.

## Charlestown Woman Files Suit Against Boston Fire Department

 Julia Rodriguez of Tibbetts Town Way is suing the Boston Fire Department in Suffolk Superior Court, charging that she was sexually discriminated against and her civil rights were violated when she was fired while a firefighter on probation and in training last August. The suit also names Fire Commissioner Leo Stapleton, Deputy Chief Martin Pierce and Capt. Leo J. Sullivan.Rodriguez, the mother of
three daughters ranging in age from 7 to 1 , claims that she was told by fire officials that the job was too dangerous for someone with three babies. They claim that she was just not strong enough. Rodriguez passed the physical strength test shortly after having her last child and gained admittance to training. By the end of the 10 -week course, 5 -foot, 2 -inch and 124 -pound Rodriguez was terminated. She appealed last fall to the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination,
which never made a finding, hired attorney Jamie Katz in December and filed the law suit on June 1
'I'm the type of person that if something's not right, it's not right," Rodriguez said. "I don't think they realize I m ready for a fight."

Katz said Rodriguez wants to be reinstated and seeks compensatory and punitive damages.

Charlestown Students Urged To Apply For New Youth Leadership Program

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn urges young people from Charlestown to apply for selection to the newly established Mayor's Youth Leadership Corps. The program is part of the city's Safe Neighborhoods Plan and will be run by the city of Boston in partnership with Northeastern University and the Boston Bar Association.
Membership is open to students who are Boston residents currently in their sophomore year in public, private or parochial high schools. Eventually, the program will serve 100 young people a year. For its first class, approximately 25 young leaders will be chosen. Representatives from each of Boston's neighborhoods will be selected.
According to the brochure describing the program: "Corps members will be selected for the leadership qualities they have already begun to show. Selection will be based on conduct, character and contributions to community, as much as achievements in

The traffic pattern change on Front Street that was discussed in last week's CANA column has been postponed until the week of June 25 .
To refresh your memory on this traffic change, the following will take place:

- Traffic will be rerouted through the second portal under the North Washington Street Bridge, between Rapids Furniture and the old Maxwell Box building, past the Constitution Marina and then it will turn back onto the original Front Street.
- For pedestrians, the hike from City Square to Downtown Boston will be increased by a couple of hundred feet. You will now have to pass in front of the Maxwell Box, cross the new detour road and then proceed to Downtown Boston by way of the pedestrian ramp or across the dam. If you follow the painted red Freedom Trail, no one should get lost.

Another detour pattern will be implemented next week on Gray Street. This detour will allow for the installation of a temporary bridge so that the tunnel may be built without interrupting traffic on Gray Street. The traffic pattern will remain essentially the same with just a slight movement to the south.
Pedestrians are urged to use the sidewalk which will be on the south side of Gray Street.

Here we go again, digging up City Square! Next week, the gas company will be installing a line down Main Street in front of the bank and the court house to the Harvard Street area. We are sorry for the inconvenience but these utility lines must be put in at separate times.

tle. The grit is removed from the bottom of the tanks and then stored in containers, along with screenings, until removal by the contractor

Levy added, "In the past, we paid for hauling and disposal by the load. Now we will be billed for the weight of the material, rather than load, which is a more accurate and cost effective method of accounting."
