Four Hours And Three Recounts Needed To Determine Seventh Place On CNC

Fourteen residents sought election on Nov. 2 to fill the seven at-large seats on the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) for a twoyear term. Many of the candidates spent the fourhour span of the election asking the 721 residents who came to vote at the Knights of Columbus Hall for their support. A sunny, but cool, day was a bonus for those who stood outside.

William "Bill" McCabe captured the top spot on the ticket with 536 votes. Se cond place went to Marty O'Brien Sr. with 475 votes. followed closely by John Dillon with 473 votes: Dillon delayed attending his nephew's wedding so be could work at the polls on CNC election day, but members of the wedding party came to him as they voted attired in formal tuxedos and gowns.

The fourth spot went to CNC Chairman Peter Loo-
ney with 453 votes. In fifth and sixth places, respec tively, were Mel Stillman with 437 votes and Edna Kelly tallying 424 votes.

The seventh spot proved to be the "problem child" of the election as Barbara Kelly and Jim Mansfield each came out of the initial count with 345 votes. This was Barbara Kelly's first run for a seat on the CNC. Mansfield has served on the CNC as an appointed nember representing the Charlestown Community Centers.

CNC member Bill Galvin, who was asked to assume the role of chairman on Saturday when the chairman, Tom Cunha, was called into work, took on an awesome task. Galvin noted that it took four hours and three recounts of the 718 valid ballots (three had earlier been declared invalid) to declare the winner of the seventh place spot. Somewhere near the
hour of 7 p.m., it was determined that Mansfield had edged out Kelly by three votes.

Assisting with the recount, along with Galvin, were CNC members Kate McDonough, Peg Bradley, Bill McCabe and Ken Stone. Judy Evers, Kevin Roche, Maureen McCabe and Elaine McCarthy also helped with the recount.

The remaining six candidates and their respective votes are: Brian Shaughnessy, 167 votes; Dan Kovacevic, 134 votes; Richard McCarthy, 123 votes; Bill Buckloy, 103 votes: Diane Hanson, 64 votes: and Morton Landy, 40 votes.

Cunha expressed his thanks to the members and volunteers who checked in voters and worked to tally the ballots.

The newly elected CNC members will assume their seats at the monthly meeting on Nov. 12.

## Charlestown Turns Out A 74\% Vote

Some 6,716 voters went to the polls on Election Day, Nov. 5, representing $74 \%$ of the town's 9,057 registered voters. This is a decrease of three percentage points from the vote in the 1992 presidential election. The unofficial vote of Ward 2 in 1992 was 7,101 with 6,748 votes in 1988.
The Clinton-Gore tally in the presidential race was $67 \%$ of the local vote for
that office - $14 \%$ higher than in 1992. U.S. Senator John Kerry will be back in D.C. with Charlestown's help as he captured $58 \%$ of the town's vote. U.S. Congressman Joseph P. Kennedy II took $78 \%$ of the vote in Charlestown as he enters his sixth term. However, Republican opponent R. Philip Hyde, a political unknown, drew 1,255 local votes.

One of the largest vote-getters on Tuesday was "blank," ranging from 167 blanks in the U.S. Senate race to 3,789 in the unopposed tally for governor's councillor. Many failed to cast a ballot in the unopposed contests.

The appointed School Committee Question 2 received approval from $75 \%$ who voted on the question. The unofficial tally is on page 9 .

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## 'Charlestown Meets The Press’ In 'Life In The City' Lecture

The last of "Life in the City" lecture series will be held in the fifth floor conference room of the Charlestown Armed Services YMCA in the Charlestown Navy Yard on Sunday, Nov. 17 from 12:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. The lecture will be "Charlestown Meets the Press" with the Globe's Editor Matthew Storin, City Editor Teresa Hanafin and Staff Reporter Kevin Cullen.

The purpose of the Sunday brunch and lecture is to provide a continuing forum for Charlestown's newcomers as well as longtime residents to meet and exchange ideas for improving the community and for building bridges both within and outside the town.

Matt Storin is the editor of the Boston Globe, the senior journalism position at the paper which is now owned by the New York Times. He has over 30 years experience as a reporter and editor, with stints at the White House, in Asia and as city and national editor.

He started in Springfield in 1964 with the Springfield Daily News, moved on to the Globe, then to US News and World Report, the Chicago Sun Times and the New York Daily News. He has even spent time in bucolic Maine as the editor of the Maine Times. He returned to the Globe in 1992 as executive editor and became editor in 1993.

Storin will bring with him a broad perspective on news, politics and neighborhoods gained from working and living in diverse communities.

Theresa M. Hanafin has deep Boston roots. Her father was bom and raised on Tremont Street in Charlestown. Her mother was borm and raised in Roxbury, and Theresa was bom in Roxbury and raised in Dorchester's Neponset neighborhood.

She graduated from the University of Mass. with a degree in joumalism, working as a summer intern in 1977 and 1978 with the Globe. She started her career at the Berkshire Eagle in Pittsfield, moving on to the Worcester Telegram and Gazette. Twelve years ago, she retumed to the Globe with an enjoyable assignment - open the Globe Bureau on the Cape. Since then, she has moved up at the paper, and is now city editor.

Shortly, Hanafin will be moving to Washington, D.C. for one year to fill in as news editor for the Globe's Washington Bureau. She looks forward to releasing her year-old puppy, Dorothy Barker, for a good romp with the Clinton's cat, Socks.

Hanafin is welcomed with the same enthusiasm which she displayed in accepting the invitation for the series, and it is hoped that she will be enlightened by the dialogue.

Kevin Cullen is well known to the

Charlestown community as a participant in last year's lecture series and as a sensitive reporter who succeeded in covering the 99 Restaurant \& Pub tragedy without condemning Charlestown as a place of violence.
Cullen began his career at Holyoke's Transcript-Telegram, joining the Globe in 1985. He has been a member of the investigative Spotlight Team, and covered criminal justice and legal affairs. For two years, he wrote a column on city life and now as a reporter at large, he frequently writes about the ordinary folk of Boston's neighborhoods.

Born in Boston, a summa cum laude graduate of UMass-Amherst, Cullen studied in Dublin, Ireland, where he developed a deep interest in Northerm Ireland. He has written extensively on that troubled land and is a regular contributor to Fortnight, a Belfast-based magazine on politics and the arts and to the BBC on AngloIrish affairs.

He has won a number of awards from prestigious news organizations, but none match the affection held for him for his sympathetic coverage of the Charlestown community

## CHECKING THE MARGINS

FOR 'ARMS'
When you're shopping for Adjustable Rate Mortgages (ARMs), the "margin" is almost as important as the initial rate. The margin is the percentage point above the average yields for Treasury notes on which future rate adjustments will be calculated.

Let's compare two hypothetical one-year ARMs. The first may have an initial interest rate of $8 \%$ with a 2.5 margin, while the second begins at $77 / 8 \%$ with a 2.75 margin. Both loans have rate caps of $2 \%$. Let's say that at the end of the first year of the loan. the average of the one-year Treasury note yield has been $61 / 2 \%$. For each loan, the lenders will add the margin to that $61 / 2 \%$ average yield. Thus, the interest rate for the first loan would increase from $8 \%$ to $9 \%$, and the second would go from $7 / 8 \%$ to 9 $1 / 4 \%$. While the first had a slightly higher initial rate, it will have lower rates in subsequent years unless the Treasury note rate increases enough to activate the annual caps on the amount of the increase. There is a wide variance among margins in ARMs offered by competing lenders, and this should be a factor when you decide which loan to select.

## ‘Townie Santa’ Looks To Community For Support Of Elderly Christmas Program

(continued from page 1)
1982, centering around the idea that something should be done for the shut-ins. In less than one month's time, this group expanded, money was raised, meals cooked and 48 baskets were delivered.

The four probably never anticipated that their discussion would be so contagious. Townie Santa has a unique way of drawing residents together who may not otherwise share similar interests. One reason for the attraction, states a committee member, is the simple fact, Townie Santa is a good cause. An-
other reason may be that inbred Charlestown responsibility of taking care of one's own. Or, more importantly, it may be that joy one receives from giving - something too personal for words. Whatever the reason, the number of volunteers grow with each passing year.

Townie Santa welcomes back a faithful contingent each year and expands with new faces from all parts of Charlestown Some pack and/or deliver the boxes, others do the work behind the scenes. Last year, there were volunteers from as young as 6 to over 75 years of age.


Almost 300 people donated either time, money, gifts or services in 1995 where in the first year, there were about 25 volunteers.
Letters are now being sent to merchants, businesses and organizations within and affecting Charlestown, seeking contributions to the Townie Santa fund. Canisters will be placed throughout the town for coin and bill donations. Articles will continue to appear in The Charlestown Patriot inviting residents to come to organizational meetings, or to submit the names of those they feel are in need of a visit from Townie Santa, or to send in monetary donations. All donations are publicly acknowledged in the Patriot. However, as many as 10 percent of those who contribute wish o remain anonymous, do-
ating just for the sake of Christmas.

In 1982, the Townie Santa fund was approximately \$1,000. In 1995. this figure rose to more than $\$ 10,000$. However, this does not truly reflect the total in donations received, since no value is placed on the gift donations. All the money received, with the exception of postage costs, goes directly to the packages.
"People wonder how much we give out in these boxes," related a committee member. "Well, just ask anyone who had to deliver one of them to a person living on a third floor. and they 11 tell you how heavy these boxes are.'

Those who are considered eligible are persons over 60 years of age who are shut-in with limited finances and family contact.

The selection of the names of recipients for a Christmas package is not an enviable or easy task. There is a screening committee who researches the names that are submitted and determines who will receive a basket. And despite the screening committee doing an excellent job, there is always someone else who also deserves a basket.
"You never get everyone," said a committee member, "You often hear later that we missed someone, but that's through no fault of the screening committee. This is why we ask the cooperation of agencies and residents in submitting names - and we are asking that the names be submitted by Wednesday. Nov. 20 to allow us an opportunity to finalize the list of recipients before it gets too close
to the day of delivery." If you know of someone who would benefit from a visit from Townie Santa, please take a moment to fil out the coupon elsewhere on this page so that the person may be considered for a visit from Santa.
An important fact to remember is that the idea behind Townie Santa is to bring some Christmas cheer to the elderly shutin. A committee member concluded, "These boxes do more than supply a person some much needed household and personal items - they tell the shut-in that we, the community. haven't forgotten them.

## TAX CHANGES

AND LONG-TERM CARE
If you buy long-term care insurance, you should be aware of some important tax changes. Beginning in 1997, you can include some or all of the premiums you pay for long-term care insurance as reimbursed medical expenses when you itemize deductions. And, as with a regular health insurance policy, most amounts you are unreimbursed for long-term care expenses will be free of tax

However, before you run out to buy long-term care insurance, there are some things to keep in mind. First, for a policy to qualify for tax deductions, it must meet strict federal rules on when you are eligible for benefits. These federal rules are tougher than the rules that some states have set. The states may change their rules to match the federal guidelines, but until they do, you should make sure that the policy you are buying qualifies for favorable federal tax treatment. Second, remember that the premiums will only be deductible to the extent that the total of all your unreimbursed medical expenses, including the premiums, exceeds $7.5 \%$ of your adjusted gross income. Third, depending on your age, only a portion of the premiums may be deductible
The new tax rules also affect chronically ill people who receive advance death benefits from their life insurance policies to finance their care. In recent years, many terminally or chronically ill patients have either sold their life insurance policies to third parties or have received advance benefits under a special rider on their policy. Proceeds of many such "viatical" settlements will be free of tax starting in 1997. To qualify, a patient must meet strict federal definitions of "chronic" or "terminal" illness, and there's a cap on the annual amount that can be received tax-free.
