Dukakis And Bush Leave Field Behind In Primary Vote

Just over 31 percent of the total registered voters in Ward Two, Charlestown, went to the polls on Tues day, March 8 to cast their ballots in the Presidential Primary and elect a State Committeeman, a State Committeewoman and the Ward Two Democratic and Republican Ward Committees.
Out of a total voter registration of 8,221 in Ward Two ( 5,888 Democrats, 384 Republicans, and 1,949 Unenrolled or Independent voters), 2,584 voted on Tuesday.
Representative Richard A. Voke captured the largest percentage of all the candidates on the ballot, with 63 percent of the Democratic voters giving him
the nod for State Democraic Committeeman. In the Presidential preference, Governor Michael S. Dukakis took 59 percent of the Democratic vote, followed by Richard Gephardt, a distant second at 12 percent.
Vice President George Bush received 56 percent of the Republican vote for President, followed by Bob Dole with 26 percent.
There was no contest for either the Democratic or Republican Ward Two Republican Ward Two Committees, with all candidates in the race elected to their respective committees.

Representatives was ordered by the Federal Court to submit a redistricting plan that included 35,915 persons in each of the State's districts, with a variable of plus or minus five percent. Voke said that in the original plan devised by the Committee on Redistricting, the members attempted to maintain the integrity of communities, keeping a community as a whole within the district. The $\mathrm{Fe}-$ deral Court declared this plan unconstitutional and a new plan was subsequently drawn up. The premise ly drawn up. more important than keeping communities intact. The suggestion that a portion of Charlestown might be placed with the North End surfaced several weeks ago when a Boston Globe editorial recommended the Charlestown Navy Yard portion of Precinct Two should be redistricted with the North End-Waterfront. This brought letters and verbal opposition from this community, citing the importance of keeping Charlestown united in one district.
As for the present Second Suffolk District, its population according to the 1985 census exceeds the target district of 35,915 and can only approach the required number by transferring a portion of this district to another. On the other hand, the Third Suffolk District,

## State Treasurer Seeks To Return \$23 Million In Unclaimed Funds

Massachusetts State Treasurer Robert Q. Crane has released the names of 32.000 businesses and individuals that are due more than $\$ 23$ million from abandoned accounts.
Under the state's Un claimed Money Law, bank accounts, insurance proceeds, checks, stock certificates and the like that have gone untouched for at least five years are deemed to be abandoned. All such accounts must be reported to
the Treasury, which then attempts to notify the rightful owners or legal heirs. Last year Treasurer Crane returned more than half of the $\$ 20$ million in reported abandoned accounts.
Crane said compliance with the law continues to improve. "Nevertheless, once again we have had to assume the role that rightfully belongs to others How can anyone fail to locate Boston Gas, Conrail Newsweek or The New

Owners of abandoned property need not pay a finder's fee to anyone to claim what is rightfully theirs.

Treasurer Crane noted one important aspect of the Unclaimed Money Law which requires that until claimed, all funds are kept in the state's General Fund where they are invested for the benefit of all residents and taxpayers here in Massachusetts.

## Planning And Zoning Committee Votes To Increase Parking Ratio Formula

by Kathy Giordane
In an attempt to respond to the present and future parking crisis in Charlestown, the Planning and Zoning Committee of the Neighborhood Council met again on March 3rd to discuss residential concerns voiced at an open meeting held the previous week. The need to replace the current city zoning formula of 0.9 off-street parking spaces per new unit was expressed by the community to bring the ratio in line with regulations now in place elsewhere in the City.
Although residents had requested an upgrading of the 0.9 formula to a new ratio of 1.5 off-street parking spaces for each newly created unit(s) between one and six, 1.75 parking spaces for each new unit between sev-
en and nine, and two spaces for each unit with ten or more newly created units, the committee felt the need to expand on that formula. It was stated that the need It was stated that the need to slow down condominium growth in single family homes by discouraging buyers from purchasing a single family with the intent to convert it into a multiple unit dwelling, could be obtained through zoning "the best way of controlling this type of growth." To this end, the committee voted in an even more stringent parking ratio formula to present before the Neighborhood Council for their approval. The new committee proposal requests one off-street parking space for each newly created unit between one and three units and two off-street parking
ated four or more units. "We are not trying to discourage new constructio in Charlestown, but in Charlestown, but rathe respond to the parking cri sis that already exists," stated one committee member The added desire to have each newly created unit include a deeded parking space(s) rather than have parking provided at an added cost, was requested to ensure the use of the parking space provided for that unit. This request was the result of complaints from neighborhood residents fored to deal with additiona cars on the streets around newly developed housing while parking provided for these units remains unused because of the added cost above and beyond the rent or sales price for that unit.

It was noted that parking spaces are being sold for $\$ 45,000$ at one of the new condominium developments in Charlestown.
Dave Armanenatti, spe cial assistant for the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) stated that although he "understood the community sentiment" on this is sue, "forcing a developer purchaser or renter to go along with this proposal would have to be studied by the BRA legal department."
Jim English, director of Harbor Planning and Development for the BRA questioned the new formula, asking if it would apply to all future developments in Charlestown. Kathryn Downing, committee CoChairperson, explained that this formula would apply to any new unit created, whether it be a multiple unit construction, a conversion of a single family to two or more units, or an additional unit built onto an existing building. Exceptions would be, for example, converting a three family apartment building into three condominiums, because there would be no change in the number of units.
The Neighborhood Council will hear this new proposal at their next monthly meeting to be held on April 5th.

## Mitigation Committee Chairman Calls For Community Alert On MWRA Actions

by Kathy Giordano "Spread the alarm! We're really, truly, honestly alone," stated Moe Gillen, Neighborhood Council member and chairman of the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) mitigation committee, at the Neighborhood Coun-
cil's March 1st meeting. Referring to the overwhelming opposition being mounted in other communities such as Lynn and Quincy, to prevent transfer facilities being placed in their communities, Gillen urged all interested parties to participate in the upcoming mi-
igation meetings and contact their elected officials to do all in their power to fight for Charlestown.
"We have been assured that we will not get sludge in Charlestown, but there are two other transfer sites under consideration by the MWRA (referring to Quin-

cy and Lynn) and Lynn is telling the MWRA that Charlestown is the better site. We should be on guard and do what we can to protect our community," Gillen stated.
At a previous Mitigation Committee meeting, residents asked that Massport representatives attend the next committee meeting and explain their involve ment and plans for the area. Massport has signed a letter of agreement with MWRA RA to lease the former Re vere Sugar site on Medford Street as an equipment transfer facility.
At this Neighborhood Council meeting, a letter was read from Massport Executive Director David Davis to the Council that, in Davis to the Courcil hat, in part, stated, "I do not view Massport as the third partner in MWRA's Mitigation agreement with Charlestown." This statement angered Council members gho have been involved with the continuing mitigation process. Council member Tom Cunha stated, "Massport has said to us 'you're on your own' - in other words, we stuck you in the middle." Cunha further noted that "Massport ther noted that "Massport has a responsibility to this community to sit down with
us at these hearings with us at these hearings with
MWRA. We should not accept this letter. Massport is the third party" in these

# proceedings. 

Gillen stated that through the mitigation process thus far, it has been noted that if Charlestown becomes a site for a facility, MWRA Executive Director Paul Levy has agreed to supply jobs and job training programs within the community and hold an annual job fair in Charlestown for local residents.
As for potential jobs, Gilen stated that the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA) has asked that any waterfront work that would result from the ocation of a transfer site in Charlestown, continue to be Charlestor coners. given to their membership. Council member Bill Gal vin voiced his concern with the ILA request, stating that Eddie Connolly of the ILA "implied at the last meeting that he had a responsibility to his membership and I don't know what percentage of the ILA lives in Charlestown. I expect that it migh be only ten to 15 percen and if these jobs come, 1 want them to come to Char lestown residents, not ILA lestowners who perhaps 90 members who perhaps 90 percent of them might come from outside. That's my concern and I think it's legitimate.

Galvin also requested that the Neighborhood Council receive a written agreement with Massport agreement with Massport
that they will enter into no
lease agreement with MWRA that would include any possibility of a sludge plant being placed on Massport property. Council member Kathryn Downing reiterated Galvin's statement, reminding Massport representatives in the audience that Massport owns the property and thus had a long term control over what happens to Charlestown. Downing stated "You (Massport) are ultimately responsible." Council Chairman Dennis McLaughlin agreed with Downing on Massport's place in this mitigation process.
When the Council meeting was opened to the floor for comments, Soley Street resident and longshoreman Arthur Crotty, stated the need to have Massport and MWRA agree not to place a sludge plant in Charles town prior to any other discusstons taking place. "Th cussions taking place. The LA has gone on record as opposing the placement of a sludge plant in Charlestown," Crotty added.
Kim Zullo, Massport Project Manager at the Revere Sugar facility, stated that Massport had restrictions on their lease agreements as to what would be placed at that site. She said, "When Charlestown came out strongly against a sludge plant, we (Massport) did also." Referring to the (continued on page 10 )

City Seeks Neighborhood Input In Billboard Review

Acting on the first opporunity the city has had in five years to participate in the permitting process for billboards, Mayor Raymond L. Flynn announced that his administration will work to ensure that neighborhood residents can fully participate in a state process to review the permits for most of the billboards in Boston.
On February 18 , the city took its first steps toward increasing neighborhood participation in a bid by Boston's largest billboard firm to renew permits for more than 630 billboards within the city. In response to a request by Don Gillis, director of the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services (ONS), the Outdoor Adver-
lising Board of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts agreed to extend the public comment period on the 630 billboards, including 27 billboards in Char lestown, through March 31st.
These billboards have not been subject to the Outdoor Advertising Board's annual permit review process for the past five years because of a consent decree between that firm and the state Attorney General's Office.
Working together on the issue, the ONS and the city's Inspectional Services Department have adopted a three-pronged approach to the billboard issue.
First, ONS has asked concerned residents to write letters to that office detail-

ng their objections. These letters will then be passed on to the Board at an upcoming hearing.

Second. ONS, working with the Inspectional Services Department, will meet with concerned community groups and residents to gain input from dents to gain input from them regarding billboards. And, third, inspectors from Inspectional Services will begin reviewing existing billboards to determine their compliance with state and city regulations.
"The bottom line here,"
noted Gillis, "is that, at present, the Outdoor Advertising Board has regulations governing where billboards can legally be placed. The city expects that all billboards within Boston comply with existing regulations. We will ask that the state bring billboards into compliance."

Residents and city officials will have opportunities to present their concerns at two Outdoor Advertising Board Hearings - one on March 24 and the second
on April 21.
At present, the city will inspect billboards for compliance with the Outdoor Advertising Board's regula tions because that state board currently has no investigators.

## Renovation Of Ryan Playground <br> Discussed At Community Meeting

by Kathy Giordano Representatives from the Boston Parks and Recreation Department met with residents on Wednesday, February 24th at Charlestown High School to discuss proposed improve ments for the Ryan Playground at Sullivan Square Stating that a grant had been received from the Commonwealth for the needed renovations, Blair needed renovations, Blair
Hines, Landscape Architect for the Parks Department. displayed four plans that were conceived since the last meeting with the community showing various design uses that would make the park a more viable facility for the entire community.
Major renovations would take place on the ball field with the delineation of four separate playing areas: a softball field, baseball field, Little League field and a practice Little League diamond. The baseball field would overlap other playing fields, but would not be in use at times when Little League or softball games are scheduled.
Discussions took place as to the future use of the handball and basketball courts and tot lot. It was suggested that a combination basketball, street hockey and tenis court be buit
to replace the existing courts and that a new fen-ced-in tot lot be placed closer to the field. Parking spaces would be included at the Main Street end of the park, with an entrance and exit situated so that a vehicle could negotiate the roary at Sullivan Square, thus eliminating the need to go into Everett to take a turn back into Charlestown
Jim Walsh, Regional Ad ministrator for the Parks Department, asked the residents for suggestions as to what amenities they would ike to see in the play ground. Requests were made for a drinking fountain for each field, a bicy. cle path and bike racks. more seating and a fence enclosure for the Little League and softball fields, runners* path, a scoreboard and improvements to the existing lighting
It was noted that The Schrafft Center has propos ed an extension of the City Harbor Walk to include the perimeter of the playground at the Mystic River, which would involve scenic plantings and seating to allow a view of the wateřway, and a walkway for pedestrians. The addition of another facility for the Courageous Sailing Program would be located behind the Schraft building, as will a planned
water shuttle to downtown Boston.
Walsh stated that the renovations are being made with the exclusive use and enjoyment of the residents of Charlestown in mind. A priority has been placed on permits for field use so that Charlestown teams would always receive preference on requests made for the playground.
Work on the field is scheduled to begin in September, 1988 after soil testing is completed and the leagues have finished their seasons. The Parks Department will now review the feasibility of the requests from the community and place priorities on these requests within the constraints of their $\$ 400,000$ budget. Another public meeting will be held with the community when final plans have been made to see if the designs for the playground meet with the approval of the residents

Precinct One is geographically a sizable portion of the community, extending from the Training Field area to City Square, over

Town Hill, along Warren Street, Washington Street, Old Rutherford Avenue, down Main Street to number 260 , and includes a portion of Mishawum housing, as well as part of High Street and several of the side streets.

chunk of Charlestown. Still another resident noted that this move will decrease the political base in Charlestown and will further diminish any possibility that a local resident might be able to run for a seat in the House. While another resident was irate at the thought that, with so many projects and changes being forced upon Charlestown, this was just another means of dividing this community.
John A. Whelan, chairman of the Ward Two Democratic Committee stated that he was opposed to splitting Charlestown in any way. He said that the town has been divided too many times already and was concerned that since Charlestown will have a smaller percent of the population in the district than previously, it would reduce the amount of leverage the community might have.

Whelan pointed out that the community has been fortunate to have had Dennis Kearney as the local Representative following the first redistricting and Representative Richard Voke in the second redistricting, both of whom have served Charlestown well. He noted that in the future, the community might not be so fortunate.
Whelan stated that the Ward Two Democratic Committee would register their objections to this proposed redistricting plan that would cause a split in this community.
Voke said that "no one is happy" about this redistricting plan and the resulting divisions in communities throughout the state.
Voke stressed that, if reelected, he would continue to try to represent and assist all the residents of Charles-
