## April 14th Is Clean-up Charlestown Day

The Charlestown community is slated for a massive clean-up day on Saturday, April 14th as city departments cooperate with neighborhood organizations and residents to clear away the

debris of winter. Some city owned lots and parks have been identified and will be on the clean-up schedule.

Residents of all ages are urged to assist in the clean-up. Workers should meet at Thompson Square at 9:30 a.m. where work assignments will be made. Equipment such as rakes, shovels, and trash bags will be provided by the city. There will also be trucks to collect the trash accumulated that day.

Also, residents are asked to cooperate in street

cleaning efforts on that Saturday. Residents should park their cars on the odd numbered sides of the streets from 8:00 a.m. to noon and move to the even numbered sides of the streets from noon to 4:00 p.m. Boston Police Deputy Superintendent Joseph Saia has stated that police will be cooperating in this effort by announcing the parking restrictions over the loud speaker and cars left on the sides of the streets slated to be cleaned, will be tagged.

The clean-up will run from 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and free T-shirts and refreshments will be provided.

the states of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont and Massachusetts compete for scholarship prize monies. The winner of the Monday contest will compete in the Sectionals on Wednesday, April 11 in Dover, New Hampshire and the winner of that contest will meet three contestants from throughout the country in Lansing, Michigan on Friday, April 13th. The first prize in the National Contest is \$16,000.

On Monday, the four contestants will each deliver an eight to ten minute prepared oration on some

aspect of the Constitution. One of six Amendments to the Constitution will then be selected in a random drawing, and the contestant will be required to give a three to five minute oration on that Amendment. The contestants are judged on oratory skills, knowledge of the Constitution, and content of both the prepared and extemporaneous orations.

The chairman of the Regional One Contest is James W. Conway of Charlestown. The National Commander's Representative to the Regional Contest is John P. Comer of Quincy.

### CLOSING DOCUMENTS

After all the house-buying details have been taken care of, you will finally come to the closing of the transaction. There will be two very important documents given to you, the buyer — the mortgage and the deed.

The buyer will be signing two papers for the mortgage. One is the bond (or note), which is a personal promise to pay back the debt. The other is the mortgage itself, which gives the lender a claim against your house if you do not pay back as agreed. Then the lender will give you a check (probably the largest you'll ever see). You get to hold it just long enough to endorse it and turn it over to the seller.

Actual transfer of the property takes place when the seller signs the deed and hands it over to the buyer. After the closing, someone will have the deed copied into the public records. It will probably be sent to you later. If no one is available to record the deed, talk to the country clerk and do it yourself - immediately. Recording the deed promptly is of utmost importance.

## Presentation By Sheriff's Department

### Facts About Drugs - F.A.D.

Why is it so difficult for parents to see that their kids are into drugs? Because we as parents want to believe that "it can't happen to me." We deny the identifying signs, or say that they are just typical teenage changes. There are some signs that we can observe in our teenagers that point to chemical abuse:

- Any significant behavior changes. A teen may become quiet and withdrawn when he was once outgoing, or the opposite.
- Extremes of aggression or passivity. Some days, he is angry and threatening, and the next day, he is quiet and unmoved.
- Poor self image and low self-esteem. "I'm no good." "I can't do anything well."
- A drop in motivation in school work.
- Appearing sleepy in school or at home when there is no obvious reason for it.
- Your son or daughter excessively stares or avoids overt eye contact.
- General change in appearance: the clothes become sloppy and there is a decline in cleanliness.
- Frequent gum chewing, or breath mints, especially after lunch.
- Your son/daughter is impossible to get up on Monday for school.
- Your teen drops out of a known group of friends and chooses friends you don't know or trust.
- Unusual perspiration, and very emotional reactions to things.
- Frequent cold or flu symptoms.
- Occasional mild disorientation.

If there are many of these signs, a parent can become suspicious of chemical abuse. If the behavior is mentioned to the teen and it does not improve with time, then a parent should be alert and express his concern to his teenager. Trying to talk about this is a way to begin.

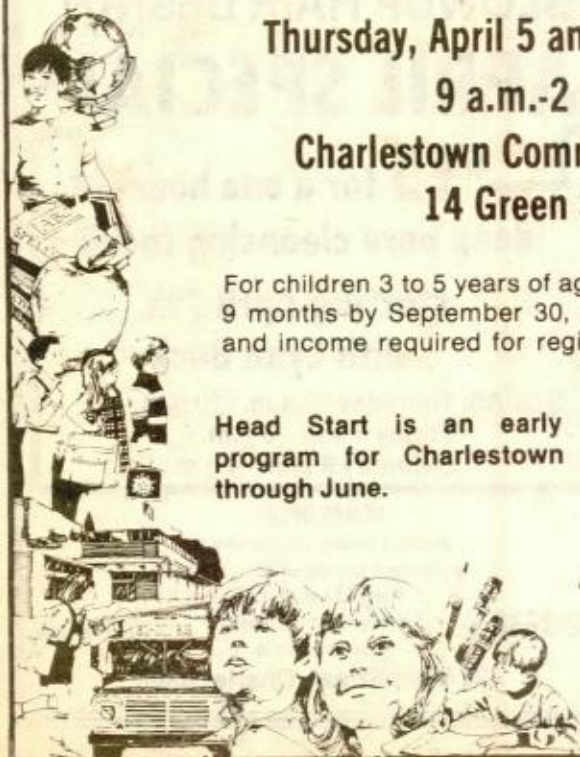

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### Voke And Lacy Working For Charlestown's Elderly

Charlestown's State Representative, Richard A. Voke, and Charlestown's own Silver Haired Legislator, Mrs. Zelma Lacey of Mount Vernon Street, are happy to report that numerous

legislative proposals benefiting the elderly were enacted by both branches of the legislature and signed into law by the Governor during the past legislative year. Because of their concerted ad-

vocacy efforts, elderly residents of Charlestown, as well as those in other cities and towns across the Commonwealth will enjoy a higher quality of life.

Representative Voke revealed that he was intimately involved with a number of initiatives which the Silver Haired Legislature and the state's Department of Elderly Affairs considered among their highest and most important legislative accomplishments. Included among these successful proposals was a bill establishing a Nursing Home Ombudsman Program for

those senior citizens who are residents of nursing homes. The law provides for an employee of the Department of Elder Affairs to investigate complaints of nursing home residents and assures confidentiality of records and identity. An amendment to the budget which he sponsored increased the personal care allowances of nursing home residents from forty to forty-five dollars per month.

Representative Voke worked closely with Mrs. Lacey throughout the year. Her insight helped assist the Charlestown legislator

in his understanding of the needs and desires of the elderly in Charlestown. His expertise with the legislative process ensured that Mrs. Lacey's term in the Silver Haired Legislature was positive as well as worthwhile.

Voke made the following comment: "It was an exciting legislative year for the elderly and my enjoyment of the law making process was enhanced by working with

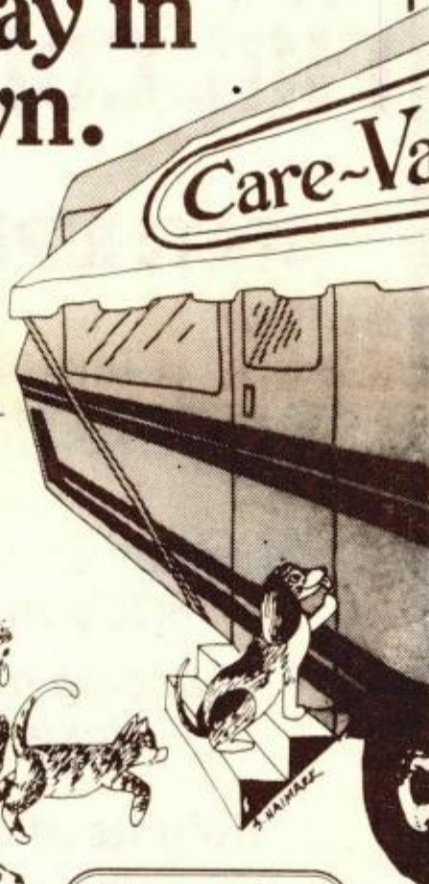

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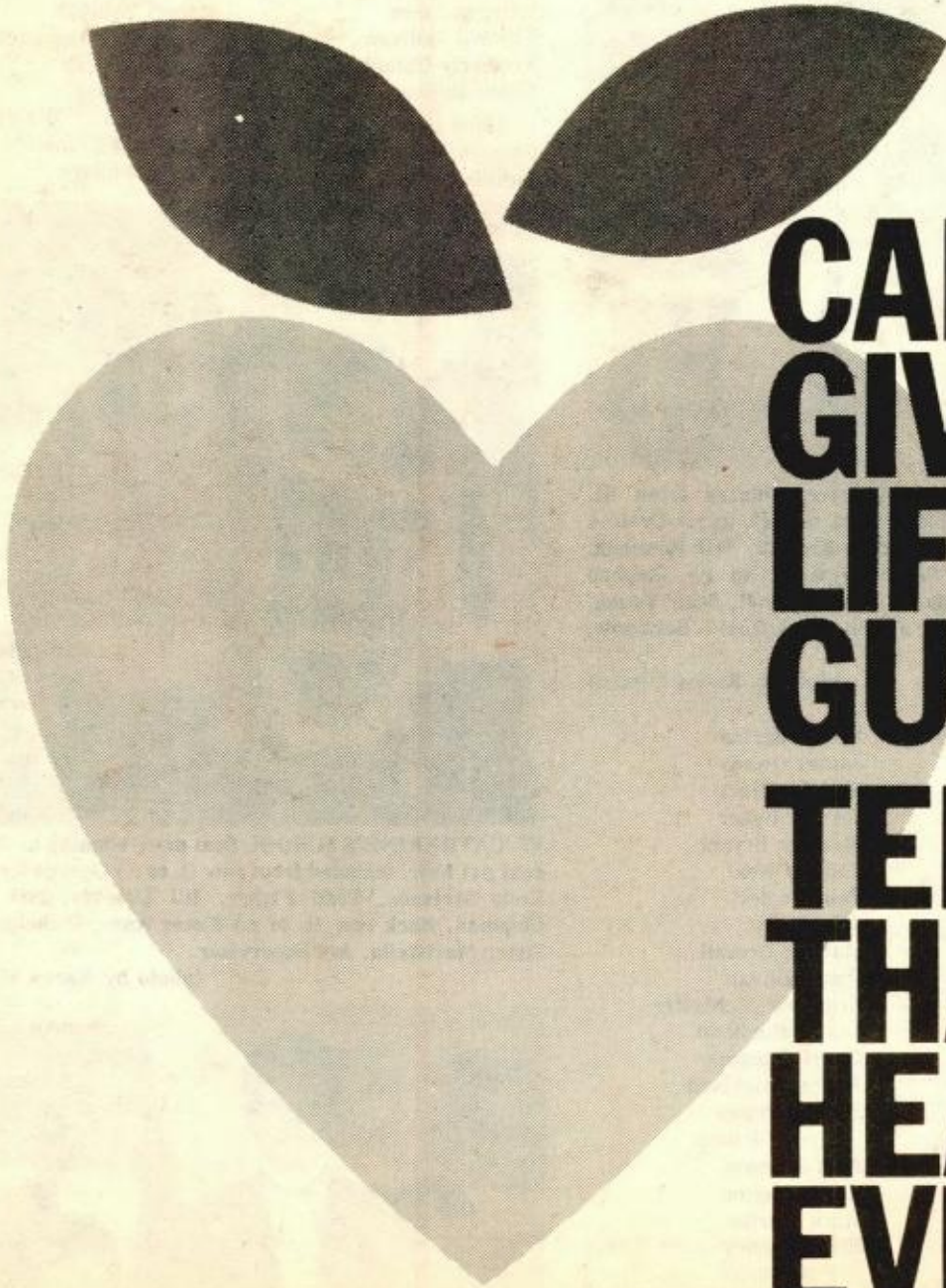

Commander Herman O. Sudholz, USN, commanding officer of USS Constitution, will introduce the film in the Hull Room, located in the Visitor Information Building in the Charlestown Navy Yard. 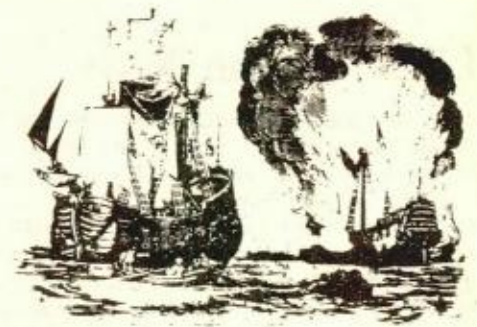
Audiences hoot and holler as the star of the film, a life-size replica of Constitution, sails forth! Charles Farrell, Esther Ralston, Wallace Beery, and George Bancroft bring romance and adventure on the high seas to life, along with a cast of 2,000 extras.

This 1925 epic of the seas written by Laurence Stall-

ing, opens with a meeting of the Continental Congress. Thomas Jefferson delivers his famous warning "Millions for defense, but not one penny for tribute" as the new Republic sets forth to destroy the Barbary pirates who have terrorized the seas for hundreds of years. USS Constitution is launched to uphold the ideals of the nation and assure the freedom of the seas.

Another ship Esther, docked in Salem and owned by a fearless and foolhardy sea master, leaves to deliver tea to European ports, confident that Constitution has preceded him. But Esther sails directly into the clutches of the pirates, the crew is sent to the quarries, and the master's family is held for ransom.

"Old Ironsides" comes to save the day, and a thrilling episode of hand-



to-hand battle ensues. The scene depicts Hollywood's first aerial photography, where twenty-two camera men and all 2,000 actors are instructed by the director via radio.

The film symbolizes a huge undertaking even in modern-day terms. Over 52 ships were used in all, with twelve schooners towed from Baltimore to Los Angeles. Over 10,000 pounds of rope were used for rigging and 50,000 rounds of ammunition set off in the battle scenes. The largest order for cannons since the war was placed for the filming. A school to teach over 500 actors how to sail the huge ships was created on Catalina Island, California.

A small city was built on the island to house the cast, complete with a hospital, laundry, and recreation area. A 200-foot dock was constructed to receive the 12 speedboats and one steamer which transported all the actors as well as the 7,000 pounds of food delivered daily.

During the filming, five vessels sunk and deep sea divers were hired to dynamite the wreckage, burning the debris after it was carried ashore to safeguard navigation off the coast.

The film is a tribute to the great innovations of the film industry as well as to "Old Ironsides" and the Spirit of the New Republic and her Sailing Navy.

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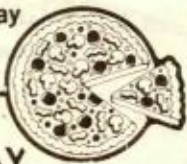

lighted by a five-goal performance in the EMass semifinals and a four-goal night in the finals.

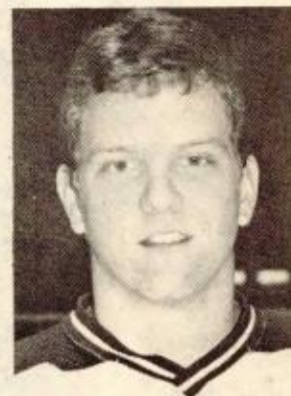

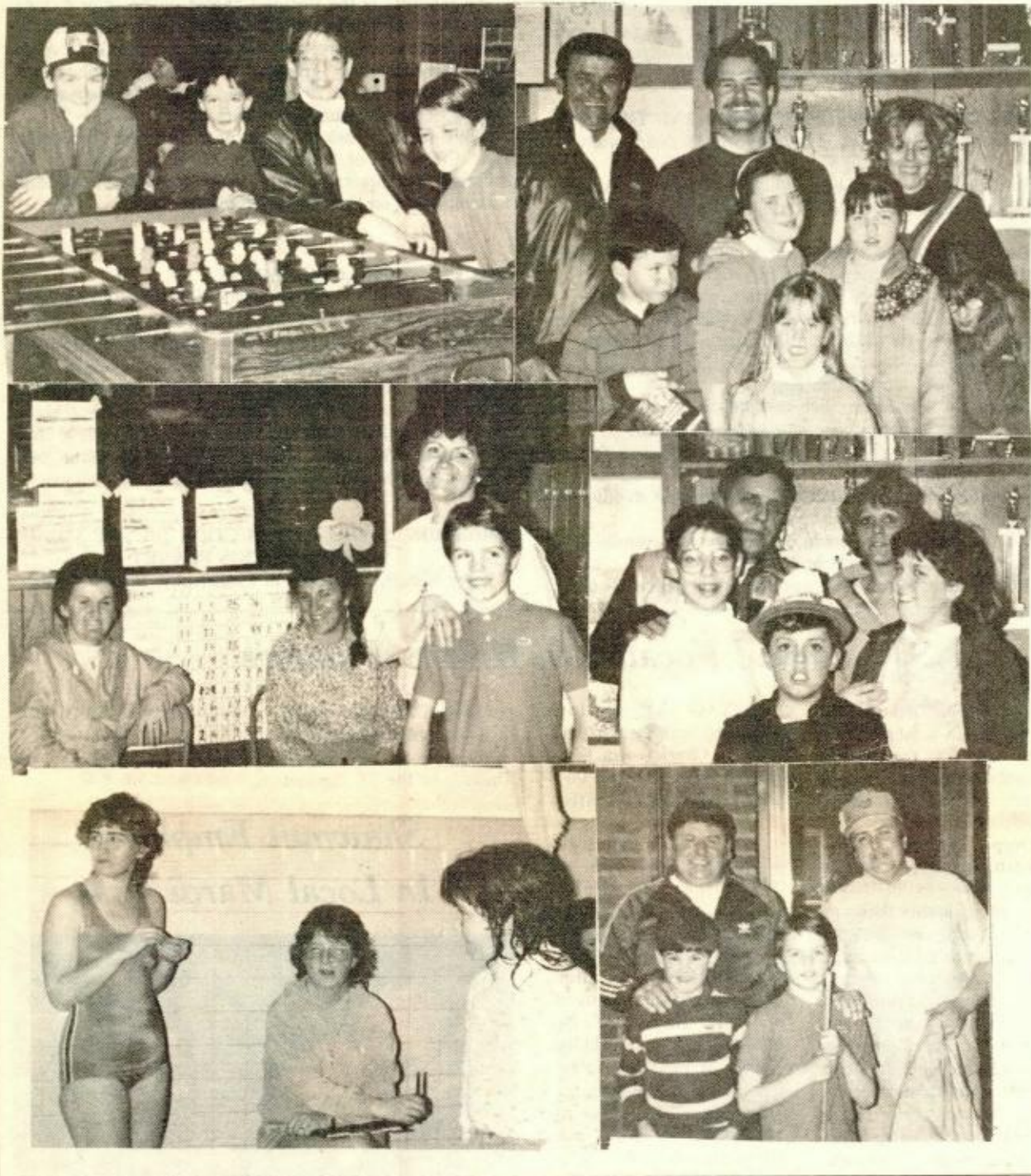
## Parents' Night At The Boys And Girls Club

### Hope Wants Of Neighborhood Coincide With Actions Of Government

Dear Miss Girvin:

I would like to comment on your March 22 article regarding the proposed development of the Bunker Hill School as I believe some points you've mentioned need clarification.

You state that the New England Housing Development Corporation's proposal has "lost ground", also a previous Patriot article indicated this same proposal was favored over others. The March 22 Patriot also included a section wherein New England Housing directs answers to some questions raised at the February 15, St. Francis de Sales meeting.

As far as I can determine, there has been only the one public meeting regarding this property, therefore, no one proposal had been made public prior to that date. Consequently, I am somewhat confused as to how one could be favored over another or lost ground as reported.

Equally confusing is New England Housing's addressing of "concerns" which I fail to remember as being the most topical that evening. They have chosen to overlook the most pointed question put to them by a resident who wanted to know how many people have been able to buy a co-op at their other developments and none was their reply. Also, it was determined that this "non-profit cooperative" would serve as an extended tax shelter for its investors. I can only assume that this will mean the building would not pay its true potential in taxes and at some point will cost local taxpayers additional expense due to the high number of units they propose.

After this meeting and the discussion of same with area residents, it was clear that the least desired developer was New England Housing. This was proven by two petitions circulated in our neighborhood, one asking the Public Facilities Department to prevent use of this building for cooperative units and one signed by abutters and other neighbors endorsing the Crowninshield Corporation proposal. This sentiment was reinforced by an informal poll conducted by City Councillor Travaglini that showed the Crowninshield proposal was favored by a three to one (3-1) margin.

As you can see a great deal of positive interest has been generated by the proposed reuse of this building and it is clear that the Crowninshield Corporation has this neighborhood's support. The homeowners in this area are hopeful that this will be that exceptional occasion when the wants of the neighborhood coincide with the actions of city government.
