BALLOT QUESTIONS

QUESTION 1

LAW PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or the House of Representatives before May 1, 1996?

SUMMARY

This proposed law would prohibit the use of certain traps for fur-bearing mammals, prohibit certain methods of hunting bear or bobcat, and eliminates some restrictions on who may serve on the state Fisheries and Wildlife Board.

The proposed law would prohibit the use, setting, manufacture, of possession of any trap to capture furbearing mammals, except common mouse and rat traps, nets, and box or cage traps that confine a whole animal without grasping any part of it.

A yes vote would prohibit the use of certain traps for fur-bearing mammals, prohibit certain methods of hunting bear or bobcat and eliminate some restrictions on who may serve on the Fisheries and Wildlife Board.

A no vote would make no change in the trapping or hunting laws, and would retain restrictions on who may serve on the Fisheries and Wildlife Board.

QUESTION 2

Shall an act passed in the General Court in 1991, entitled "An Act Reorganizing the School Committee of the City of Boston" be repealed as of January 1998 and in place thereof the school committee structure as existing in 1991 be reconstituted after an election held in 1997.

A yes vote would be in favor of a school committee elected by the registered voters of the city of Boston.

A no vote would continue the current school committee appointed by the Mayor of Boston.





Neighborhood Council Hosts Presentation of November Ballot Question 2

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council recentlyhosted a community discussion on the upcoming Nov. 5 ballot Question 2, whether to keep Boston's seven- member mayoralappointed School Committee intact or return to 1991 legislation of an elected body of 13 in January 1998.

Facilitated by the council Public Safety Committee's Co-chairpersons Bill McCabe and John Dillon, the forum featured pro-elected Dr. Daniel Burke, and pro-appointed Jean Sullivan-McKeigue, both former chairmen of the elected school commit-

In 1991 Mayor Raymond Flynn effectively abolished Boston's elected School Committee, replacing it with seven of his appointees for four-year terms. Built into the new Act was a provision to put the question to Boston voters in this year's election.

Acting and then 1993elected Mayor Thomas Menino appointed current school committee members: Chairperson Robert P. Gittens, Suffolk County's first assistant district attorney; Vice-Chairperson Dr. Elizabeth Reilinger; Crittenton Hastings House president and CEO; Felix D. Arroyo, Egleston Square Neighborhood Association executive director; Alfreda J. Harris, Boston Parks & Recreation deputy commissioner; William Spring, Federal Reserve Bank vice-president for District

& Community Affairs; John Gould, Associated Industries of Massachusetts president and CEO; and Dr. Edwin Melendez. director of the Mauricio Gaston Institute for Latino Community Development and Public Policy at U.Mass/Boston.

Burke said that nearly all decisions put to the committee over the last four years have ended in 7-0 or 6-1 votes.

"I never saw a group that got along so well," he

Burke also said that, while the committee was given a \$10 million budget, "The fact is that teachers are still buying supplies for their classrooms and that test grades are down."

Burke said that he did

not necessarily agree that the elected committee should include 13 members, but voting yes would at least address the first of a two-step problem.

"An appointed committee is a number one violation of what Boston stands for," he said, "and that is taking away a person's right to vote."

The second step would be to create a Blue Ribbon Committee to find a system that works, Burke said.

"The reality is that neither system is working," he

McKeigue said that she believed Menino's appointed committee has been working.

"There is a great deal of hope in the school system that did not happen in past administrations," she said.

According to Mc-Keigue, the appointees, Menino and recently hired superintendent Thomas Payzant, are working together toward the same goals as Burke, but an elected body is "not the best educational solution."

She asked that residents not "make people lose hope" by voting yes. "Electing members makes a lot of adults happy," she said.

In Charlestown, residents commented on the appointed committee allowing for improvements at Charlestown High School, specifically noting the removal of principal Stacey Johnson, whom they believed was an ineffective administrator.

Burke pointed out that

Johnson was removed from Charlestown but not the system. While Burke and residents also credited Menino with successes and accomplishments in his administration, questions were raised about how effective another mayor might be when appointing future Boston School Committees. Currently, a Home Rule Petition looks at the question of election versus appointed school committees every six years.

A yes vote to the binding referendum Question 2 on Boston's November ballot will provide for an elected school committee to take office again in 1998 after a 1997 election. A no vote will retain the current appointed committee.



Sobel To Profile The Inventor Of The Chronometer At The USS Constitution Museum

Dava Sobel, the author of the bestseller, "Longitude," offers her compelling insight into the lone genius who solved the most challenging scientific puzzle of the 18th century when she appears as a guest speaker in the Seafaring Scribes authors' series at the USS Constitution Museum on Thursday, Nov. 7 at 5:30 p.m.

In a slide presentation in the museum's Figgie Theatre, Sobel will render the absorbing tale of John Harrison, an uneducated clock

maker, and his discovery of an ingenious timepiece, called a chronometer.

During this great age of exploration, the "longitude problem" had posed a grave threat. Without the ability to determine longitude, sailors and their ships were often lost at sea. Ships ran aground. The most distinguished minds of the era had tried to unravel the mystery, but couldn't. To spur the effort, in 1714, the British Parliament offered a £20,000 prize to anyone who could find the answer.

Harrison, a true visionary, revolutionized navigation by inventing the chronometer but was forced to battle the scientific establishment and the British Parliament for 40 years to claim his rightful prize for solving the longitude con-

Vote YES On Question 2 . . . 4 The Kids

Dear Gloria,

The Boston Municipal Research Bureau's recent "Why change to the appointed school committee" is widely cited by opponents of an elected committee. It's time to set the record straight.

The Bureau cites chaos, claiming that the 13-member elected structure was too large and unwieldy. Advocates for an elected committee agree, and want a smaller committee with members serving overlapping terms. The only way the mayor and city council will consider such a homerule petition is a YES vote on Question 2.

The Bureau cites no accountability, claiming the mayor was required to raise funds, but the committee decided where to spend the money. In fact, Proposition 2 1/2 prevents the mayor from raising taxes.

The Bureau cites cost, with the elected committee having frequent deficits. Yes the elected school committee had frequent operating deficits, but that was how the game was played. The "deficits" were readily made up each year. The appointed committee has not had deficits by making significant cuts some years, and getting supplemental budgets - over \$10 million this past year.

The Bureau cites the elected committee's budget for their own staff as excessive. Advocates for an elected committee agree. A smaller elected committee with shared staff would cost much less.

The appointed committee has not brought fiscal stability to the public school system. Instead, they brought a court case from custodians they fired that will cost about \$5 million. They were silent about charter schools, which now cost about \$10 million a year. They changed how students were assigned to increase busing and segregation, with busing costs rising about 30% (from \$29 to \$38 million) in the past four years.

With the appointed committee, class sizes are larger, funds for textbooks are inadequate and successful programs that cost more are being cut. If this is better management, our children don't need it.

The Bureau cites politicians, with members unconcerned with educational issues and using personal staff to serve constituents. Yes, some elected members were not effective. The solution is to support and elect good school committee members. Children need committee members who are effective advocates.

The Bureau cites voter apathy, with low voter turnout in the 1989 election. In fact, the 1989 school committee election was overshadowed by the ballot question on elected vs. appointed school committee.

The Bureau cites candidate apathy, referring again to the 1989 election. In fact, there were at least five excellent new candidates who ran that year.

The Bureau cites indecisive elected committee, not being able to break out from constituent issues to make sound decisions. Not all of the elected committee's decisions were sound. That was a major reason why candidates wanted to be elected - to be able to make better decisions. The appointed committee has also made its share of poor decisions.

A major criticism of the elected committee was that it got too involved in personnel decisions. In fact, a 1987 state law drafted at the behest of elected school committee members prevents the committee from personnel decisions. The abuses of the past cannot happen with a return to an elected committee.

Boston needs an elected committee structure that gives it an excellent chance of success, while unlikely to disrupt Superintendent Payzant's or the mayor's commitment to Boston schools. The following structure would accomplish these goals. It would provide a transition over four years from an appointed to an elected committee.

Keep a seven-member board serving four-year overlapping terms. Have appointed members continue to serve until their terms expire. Beginning next year, elect new members citywide. Do not allow personal staff.

Here is how I add up the reasons for an elected commit-

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

INVENTORY CONTROL IS VITAL

If you run a business, you probably manage your cash very carefully. But what about your inventory? It's almost as valuable as cash, but does it get the attention that it deserves?

You might think of inventory as the items sitting on your shelves, but inventory is actually a process. For a manufacturing business, the process begins with the purchase of raw materials, and it moves through production and sale. For other companies, the inventory process begins with a purchase and ends with a sale. In every type of business, inventory requires careful management:

- You must have enough inventory to support your business, as well as to handle sudden or unexpected customer demand. But you should avoid excessive inventory, which can tie up cash and shelf space, require extra security and warehouse personnel, increase insurance costs, and trigger additional borrowing.
- You must have up-to-date information. You need to know what's in stock, how quickly your inventory turns over, and all the costs associated with carrying inventory. At any given time, you should also know which items are selling and which aren't - in effect, you need an aging of your inventory, similar to the aging of your receivables.
- · You should know how well your customers are being served, which is ultimately the most important function of any inventory system. For example, what percentage of your orders are shipped on time? How long does it take to fill back orders? What is the ratio of customer complaints to shipped orders?

An effective inventory system is one of your best business investments, but it isn't a do-it-yourself project. Please give us a call.



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


