# Voke Summons MBTA To Charlestown Meeting

Representative Richard Voke has summonsed officials from the MBTA to a public meeting to be held next Monday, June 11, 1979 at 7:30 p.m. at the American Legion Hall, 27 Chestnut Street.

In announcing the meeting, Rep. Voke challenged the MBTA to come to Charlestown and respond to the complaints about poor service and to the concern for the continuation of the downtown bus run. When Richard was asked why he felt this meeting was necessary, he said "I want some of those bureaucrats who think they're running an efficient mass transit system to come out from behind their desks and into this community so they can hear first hand of the many problems we've been having here in Charlestown. After all, the people in this town are paying a lot of money to the MBTA for fares and through their tax dollars; yet, the community has not been getting the service it deserves.

As for the issue of the downtown service on the Main Street and Bunker Hill Street bus routes, Rep. Voke reports that thus far the MBTA has not agreed to continue the downtown service after September 8, 1979, although he has been negotiating with the "T" to extend that service. "It would certainly help our cause if everyone who has contacted my office inquiring about the downtown service could come to the meeting and declare their support for the downtown run directly to the MBTA," said Rep. Voke. "If we can demonstrate to the "T" that there is a tremendous public demand for the downtown service, then we will be one step closer to convincing them to continue it."

The format for the meeting will be informal and everyone will be encouraged to participate—so please come and make yourself heard. This may be our best chance to improve MBTA service in Charlestown.



# **Attend Washington Conference On Elderly**

For Helen Lawler and Ethel Hazelton it was a chance to see the inner workings of a powerful congressional office.

Last month the two Charlestown women were interns in the office of Rep. Thomas P. O'Neill, Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives.

Lawlor, 63, and Hazelton, 66, joined 163 other senior citizen interns from 34 states and the District of Columbia for 12 days of seminars and briefings on legislation and federal programs affecting the elderly.

The highlight of the program was a meeting with President Jimmy Carter in the White House Rose Garden.

"He was great, "Lawler said. "I couldn't wait to get home with his picture. He's much slighter in person than he is on television."

The Congressional Senior Interns Program began in 1973 with four congressional offices and nine interns.

This year the group met with House and Senate committees on the aging, the federal agencies that serve senior citizens and private groups that lobby for legislation to benefit the elderly.

In their spare time the interns worked in the congressional offices assisting with legislation and constituent service.

Each year O'Neill choses an intern from a different part of the district. Last year the intern was from Somerville and next year one will be chosen from Brighton.


Usually there is only one intern to an office, but Lawler asked to bring along her friend, Ethel, and Congressman O'Neill's office agreed.

Lawler is an elderly affairs coordinator at the Kent Community School and Hazelton is a said Massachusetts senior citizens make out better than the elderly in other states.

"When we listened to people from rural areas," she said. "We found they don't have anywhere near the service for the elderly that we do here. For instance there are no buses in rural areas to take elderly people to stores or to the doctor." Lawler said she enjoyed the internship thoroughly. She said the toughest part was walking from one building to another for all the meetings.

"One man put a device on his

leg to measure all that walking. By the end of the program he had gone 65 miles.", she said. "But it was worth it. Each meeting was more interesting then the one before it."

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# Boys' Club News

Good News for the ever growing legions of road racing fans! The Annual Boys' Club Road Race has been lengthened to five miles. Because the three mile distance formerly covered by the event was not long enough to attract some of the more prominent names in road racing, Physical Education Director, Joe McGonagle, decided a change of format was in order.

What makes the local event so attractive to the residents of Charlestown is the fact that the full five mile course will be run over the neighborhood streets.

The event is to be held on Saturday morning, June 16, beginning at eleven o'clock. The course will run as follows:

The start will be on High Street, at the corner of Elm, directly in front of the Boys' Club Gym. The runners will follow High Street to Winthrop Street. They will travel down Winthrop to Warren, where they will turn right. They will continue along Warren, through Thompson Square, picking up Main Street at that point.

They will follow Main to Sullivan Square, at which point they will turn up Bunker Hill for what will surely be the most difficult part of the race. The runners will cover the full distance of Bunker Hill, from Sullivan Square to Chelsea Street, where they will turn left and proceed on to Medford Street.

The full length of Medford Street will be negotiated before the runners return to Sullivan Square and turn back up Main Street. They will continue along Main until they reach Monument Avenue, where they will turn left and head up the hill to High Street at the Monument.

The entrants will then race around the Monument on Monument Square before returning to High. The straight-away, from High and Monument Square back to the Boys' Club Gym at High and Elm, should provide for an exciting finish.

Trophies in many categories will be awarded to participants upon the conclusion of the race at an Awards Ceremony to be held in the Boys' Club Gym.


#### **Boston In The 80's**







